Walfred Alvin "Buddy" Pate Jr., principal of Eagleville School announced his retirement for the end of the 2003-2004 school year. He has served Rutherford County School for 37 years as teacher, coach and principal. He has been principal at Eagleville since 1995 and has been instrumental in adding several valuable sport programs to our school. When Buddy came to Eagleville, only basketball, volleyball, baseball and golf were offered. Since then, he has established middle school softball and baseball, track and field, middle school and high school football and high school girl's softball. Buddy with the help of the Eagleville community fought hard and was successful for getting the football stadium for the Eagleville School. Rhonda Holton, Eagleville assistant principal stated," On the academic side, Pate did a great job of hiring qualified teachers and appointing committee leaders. He has worked hard to improve test scores. Pate also organized an active booster club that's raised a tremendous amount of money and he's been a big

supporter of the school's Parent Teacher Organization. "Buddy commented, "the community has always been supportive of Eagleville School and I appreciate that greatly. Anytime we needed things we have been able to go to the community and the community has responded."

Buddy, son of Alvin and Margaret Pate, lived and grew up in he Patterson Community. He spent all his school years, 1st thru 12th grades at Eagleville, graduating in 1963. He was always involved in sports as a student, playing basketball, baseball and softball. His parents said he had played ball ever since he was born. He and his father, Alvin, played on ball teams together for Triune, College Grove and Patterson. Buddy's interest in sports carried over to his years in the education field. Buddy earned a bachelor's degree from MTSU in 1967 and returned to Eagleville to serve as a physical education teacher and girl's basketball coach

#### Eagleville School at 6:30 a.m.



for the next nine years. During these nine years the Eagleville girl's basketball team averaged over 20 wins a years, a total of 187 wins and 54 losses. Buddy transferred to Riverdale High School to coach girl's basketball and golf and teach driver's education. While at Riverdale, his team went 31-0 before losing to Warren County High School in the state championship game in 1979 before 11,000 fans. He said that was the largest crowd to ever see a high school basketball game. After 19 years at Riverdale, Buddy returned to Eagleville as principal.

Buddy plans to travel, play golf and enjoy retirement with his wife, Bernice, who retired last year from the Federal Government. I'm sure he'll also be spending a lot of time with his son, Drew and granddaughter, Lily. Thank you Buddy for all you have done for Eagleville School and you will certainly be missed by the faculty, students and the Eagleville community.

We are speaking of the annual Easter community sunrise service and free country ham and egg breakfast. This tradition started with the idea and hard work of this month's featured couple, Mary Ella and Herman Clark.

In the early 1970's, Herman Clark and Lanny Turner had a vision to host an Easter Sunrise Service and country ham and egg breakfast to follow. This was to be for any and all people in the surrounding communities. The first two services were actually held on the Turner hill and the third one on the Clark hill. Buses were loaded at Eagleville School which brought folks to the sunrise service. The service grew to the point that it became impractical to have the services on top of the hills, so the services were moved to the school grounds where the breakfast followed in the school cafeteria. Over the years, this event has become a dream come true for Herman and Mary Ella. It has been made possible by God's guidance and the help of many dedicated and generous people working together. Again, this year you will hear the joyous Easter songs and smell the delicious aroma of fried country ham at Eagleville School

Mary Ella is the daughter of Laura Bell Thomas Vaughn and Talmage Vaughn. She has one sister, Alma Vaughn Steagall.

Herman is the youngest son of Young Leslie Clark and Nannie Lou Burns Clark. He has 6 sisters and 5 brothers. Both were born in Rutherford County. Mary Ella has lived all her life except five years in Rutherford County and Herman has lived all of his life in the Rockvale/Eagleville area.

The first time Herman saw Mary Ella was at the Rockvale, Fourth of July picnic. She was about ten years old and he eleven. Mary Ella wasn't at all happy about the decision her mother had made to leave before the festivities were over. Herman said he thought to himself, "That young lady needs a spanking as much as anyone I have ever seen." And so it began.

Mary Ella and Herman were friends throughout their school days at Rockvale School but did not date until both had graduated. Not many months after Mary Ella completed her high school education Herman was helping his dad drill a well for Mary Ella's parents. Mary Ella made a caramel pie and brought it out to the rig for their lunch. Herman's dad said, "If I were you I would call that little gal and ask for a date." Herman thought that was not a bad idea and the rest is history. From then on Herman knew if Mary Ella made a caramel pie something was at

Mary Ella and Herman began housekeeping in a little trailer parked in Herman's parents' yard. Shortly after, they moved into a little house near the Vaughn's on Snail Shell Cave Road. Their first child, Theresa Kaye, was born in 1952. In 1955 they built their house in Rockvale on a parcel of land that Herman had played and hunted on all his life. It adjoined his home place on Jackson Ridge Road. In 1959 Mary Ella and Herman had a daughter named Veronica that only lived 5 hours. In 1960 Joyce Loureen was born. They decided they would try for a boy and so in 1964 Herman Talmage (Tam) Clark was born.

Herman drilled wells with his brothers, Y.B. and Horace Clark, until 1957 at which time he was hired as one of the first eight employees at the new General Electric plant in

Murfreesboro. He also raised beef cattle. At one time Herman aspired to show registered Polled Herefords. However, it seemed just when he got one groomed to show it would up and die for the strangest reason. Her said he guessed God didn't intend for him to take this bend in life so he gave it up and when back to just raising and selling unregistered beef cattle.

Mary Ella worked in Nashville at the State Farm Insurance Company until 1955 when State Farm opened a new branch in Murfreesboro. However, Mary Ella quit her job when she became pregnant with their second child. Even though she did not work at a public job she was a very busy lady. Mary Ella was involved in all school activities, including the P.T.A. and room mother, as well as youth group leader at the Rockvale C.P. Church over a span of 25 years. One Saturday Herman was going to a cow sale. She asked him to pick up one good jersey so they could have fresh milk and butter. Herman, always knowing a good deal when he saw it,

brought home 8 cows ready to milk that night. "They went so cheap!" he said. They had to go buy two buckets to milk in that very afternoon. Herman narrowly escaped a sudden death that day. However, Mary Ella acquired tow used milking machines and sold mild to the Ole Creamy in Murfreesboro. Theresa and Mary Ella milked the cows while Joyce and Tam played in the yard nearby and Herman worked the night shift at G.E.

In 1967 Mary Ella and Herman bought the Concord Grocery for Herman's 'Uncle Doc Burns. Mary Ella ran the store as well as answered the phone and kept the books for Herman who went back into the Water Well Business. The store at Concord became a great hangout for the Clark children's friends. They sold the store in 1971 and began to put all their energy into the water well business.

In the early 1970's Herman and Mary Ella bought land on the Cheatham Springs and Floyd Roads in Eagleville. After putting much thought and prayer into the decision, they decided they would build on top of a hill the looked out upon the town of Eagleville. They moved into their new house in the spring of 1974. Both Joyce and Tam graduated from Eagleville School and Theresa has taught there many years. Two of their grandchildren, Blake and Peyton, also attended all 13 years and recently graduated from Eagleville. Because Mary Ella's and Herman's children live close by they can often be seen at ballgames, concerts, and many church and school events. They have sponsored many teams and given donations to the athletic programs because they are firm believers in children and community pride.

Joyce is married to Timothy Merritt, an Eagleville graduate. They have four children; Jonathan, Kimberly, Josh, and James. They live in Cookeville. Joyce is a teacher and has recently graduated from seminary. Timothy is a marine biologist for the federal govern-

Tam lives in Mary Ella's home place which he bought some years ago. He recently started touring all over the U.S. with The Roosevelts, a band he has been in for the last several years.

Up until about six months ago Clark Water Wells was still going strong. The business was stared in 1885 by Herman's grandfather, Willy Clark. Herman always said he had the only business he knew that started at the top and aimed for the bottom. Herman decided it was time to retire this past October. Several of Herman's nephews have drilled with him including Burns Jr. Clark, Terry Clark, and David Clark, all sons of Herman's well driller brother. Y.B. Clark. Tam, his son, has drilled and worked in the pump business off and on through the years and has recently served as foreman of the business. Dee Smith, a lifetime and devoted employee, set thousands of pumps for the Clark business. There have been many other loyal and appreciated people that Herman saw not only as employees but his friends. As stated by a recent employee, Paul Snook, "Leaving Herman Clark Well Drilling is like leaving my family. It really hurts."

Mary Ella and Herman have always believed in dreaming big and then turning it over to God. Even though not every dream has come true, there is one that was fulfilled this past Christmas. When Mary Ella was about six years old she asked Santa Claus for a little roll top desk. Santa did bring her a desk but it wasn't at all the one of which she dreamed. Of course, when she became a little older she understood why. But every Christmas that rolled around, she always recalled the Christmas that she didn't get that little roll top desk. It was a dream that had never come true. She even bought Herman a big oak roll top desk on Christmas. But, it somehow didn't make the disappointment of that unfulfilled wish disappear. However, this story has a very happy ending. This past Christmas Herman was able to locate an antique child's roll top desk that was made in the early thirties. Tam drove to North Carolina and found the desk to be in mint condition. Herman purchased the desk, put crayons, a coloring book and several storybooks inside. And placed a big red bow on top. After the gifts were opened this past Christmas, Herman told Mary Ella that Santa had roped off an overdue gift for her. Of course, it was the desk. After shock and tears Mary Ella said, "See, you should never give

up on your dream. It may not be when or how you planned but don't give up." This little story is one of the gift and the giver of which Mary Ella and Herman are both to many.

Both Mary Ella and Herman are worker in their business, church, community, and home, but they do find time for hobbies that add beauty to their corner of the world as well as the community.

Mary Ella has a green thumb in the flower garden, roses being her specialty. Not only does she derive pleasure from growing them but her biggest joy is arranging and giving bouquets to be used in churches, hospitals rooms, school events, or just sharing with a friend. When asked had she ever thought about opening a business to sell her roses she replied, "I wouldn't want


to do that. It would become work and do it for the joy not the money."

One of Herman's hobbies is rockwork. He has a special knack for putting together unusual rock shapes and colors to make interesting and unique displays. Many of the rocks he has used in his designs are rocks he has picked up where he was drilling a well or on his farm as he walked through the fields to check on his cattle. Throughout the Rockvale and Eagleville community you can see his craft in churches and houses. Just take a drive up Cheatham Springs Road in Eagleville and you will enjoy seeing the rock fences and fountain he built just a few years ago. When asked what his secret is to getting his on-of-a kind effect he said, "patience and a good eye for rocks".

Mary Ella and Herman do not have to tell people they are Christians. Their lives are living proof of their faith. Herman and Mary Ella have always put God first, family second, and the rest of life just seems to fall into place. They have been through hard times, lean times, and sad times as most people have. But there have been many happy, wonderful, blessed times for which they give God all the credit. Herman and Mary Ella are members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church. They have given their

time and talents as youth advisors, Sunday School teachers, elders, missions directors, superintendent, and children's ministry just to mention a few of the church roles they have served over the many years.

After 54 years of marriage, Herman and Mary Ella would tell you neither has changed much. Mary Ella says Herman is still stubborn and too good for his own good and Herman thinks Mary Ella probably still needs a spanking but he reckons he'll just let it slide.

She touched countless lives of young people during her 44 years of teaching in Nashville and touched the lives of all us in the greater Eagleville area.

Those were the famous words of someone I love dearly, and I will never forget when I would look off the mound and see that smile. After that, she would help me with my homework because she was a really good teacher. She would take me places, and I would always know who to call if no one was around.

My final reason why Edna means so much to me is basically because she has just done so much for me and helped me in so many ways, and now she is really ill. She can't get out of bed. She can't eat. It just kills me to have to go visit her and see her like this. I know when she's gone, I will be glad that I did. As much as she has done for me, I owe it to her. If there's anything I can do to help her caretakers, I will try to do it because she is such a special person.

In conclusion, Edna means a lot to me and is really close to my heart. I have so many memories, and no one will ever be able to take them away from me. I will always be able to look back at what she has taught me as a person, I will carry it throughout life.

Stonehenge is one of the most famous prehistoric monuments in Britain. It is visited by so many people, that it has been necessary to fence off certain parts to prevent further damage by visitors. It stands on Salisbury plain about 8 miles from the Cathedral City of Salisbury in the County of Wiltshire.

Stonehenge was used from about 2800 BC until after 1100 BC, a period of some 17 centuries. The Heel Stone, which leans towards the centre of the monument was originally upright. It weighs about 35 tons and would have required about 250 men to transport and erect it. Counting women and children the total would have been about 500, which gives some indication of the population in the area. Inside the surrounding bank there are 56 pits, now called the Aubrey Holes after their discoverer, John Aubrey. Their exact purpose is not known but they were at some stage used for the burial of cremated human bones, one found dates back to 2200 BC.

Around the centre is a circle of blue stone, the name derived from the colour. These stones came from the Preseli Mountains in South West Wales, 135 miles from Stonehenge. On the north east side of the site, an entrance, marked by extra stones, pointed down the Avenue to the Midsummer Sunrise. Four station stones lie at the corners of a rectangle, the short sides of which point to the rising sun at Midsummer Sunrise and the setting sun at Mid Winter, and the long sides to the most southerly rising and most northerly setting of the moon. The latter events occur once every  $18\frac{1}{2}$  years.

The Druids, a religious sect, come early midsummer's day to watch the sunrise. They are the only people that have been allowed to step inside the stone circle in recent times, although my wife as a child when visiting was allowed to climb over the stones but as I have said to preserve the site one is only allowed to walk on the footpath around the stone circle. Then as

now, she experiences a feeling of eeriness at Stonehenge and surrounding area.

It is thought that Stonehenge was built by the Beaker people, so called from their habit of burying pottery beakers in graves. They settled in Britain between 2,500 and 2000 BC. and transformed the life of the native Neolithic population by introducing metal working of copper and gold, also burying their dead singly instead of communally.

Between 2000 and 1500 BC, the Norman invaders arrived in England. The early Bronze Age saw a rise in the rich and powerful dynasties of chiefs, with large flocks and herds, who also controlled the increasing trade in bronze tools and weapons, manufactured for the European market.

These people were the builders of Stonehenge III, the most remarkable stone circle in Europe. The height of the stones is greater than the others. They are more refined in shape and joining, and uniquely, have lintels on top of the uprights. Transporting and placing of the larger stones would have required about 1500 men, who would have been drafted in from the surrounding areas, indicating some central control.

It is not known what religious beliefs Stonehenge represents. It could have been used as an astronomical observatory, to record the movements of the sun and moon.

There can be no certainty, just speculation based on scientific study. The mystery is still there, lost in the mist of time.

#### The Allergy Season and Your Eyes

Spring is in the air --- literally!! The trees are budding. The grass is greening. Flowers are blooming. And if you suffer from seasonal allergies, the next few weeks will be miserable!! Along with the beauty of springtime comes that time of the year when allergy sufferers are frequently bothered by itching, watering eyes, sneezing, headaches and general fatigue. A large percentage of the general population living here in the middle Tennessee area must deal with allergies to anything from pollen and spores to mold and dust. Many allergy sufferers find relief from over the counter remedies. Many more need the strength of prescribed antihistamines. Whatever the case, the eyes are sometimes the most affected part of the body. As the pollen levels rise, the eyes will begin to water and itch. They may then get red and swollen. For some, the symptoms can be mildly annoying. For others, the aggravation is intolerable! Those with mild ocular allergies can find relief in over the counter ocular antihistamines, such as Naphcon A or Opcon A. These eye drop medications can be safely used up to four drops a day in the affected eyes. People with more severe symptoms will benefit from prescribed ocular antihistamines such as Patanol or Alrex. But before rushing off to your pharmacist and demanding prescription eye drops for your hay fever allergies, it is best to have an evaluation with an eye doctor to see just which solution is right for you.

For those people who take daily doses of prescription antihistamines such as Allegra or Zyrtec, the ocular symptoms may be sufficiently suppressed. In other words, you may not need any further assistance for the itching and watering eyes. However, many times even this is not enough and ophthalmic remedies are valuable. But not

everyone should use eye drops for allergies, prescribed or otherwise. People who wear contact lenses have special needs and should consult with their eye doctor before beginning any allergy treatment. If you take allergy medications such as Claritin or Allegra, the eyes can become too dry and intolerant to contact lens wear. Many times I will recommend lubricants or rewetting drops to replenish moisture to eyes that have been dried out by prolonged use of allergy medications. Moisture drops also have the double advantage of keeping the eyes flushed of the offending pollen. Eye drop medications should never be used with contact lens use unless specifically recommended by an eye doctor who is familiar with various contact lens products in use today.

Another common side effect of ocular allergies is conjunctivitis, or pink eye. Some people develop an eye infection during allergy season. This is many times created by an existing sinus condition or a bad case of sinusitis. These people need to visit an eye doctor for treatment, as typical over the counter remedies will be ineffective and the infection could spread. A classic case of 'pink eye' will be very painful and will have a larger amount of mucus discharge from the eyes than usual. Vision can become blurred and the person will many times be very sensitive to light. With this set of symptoms, you should visit an Optometrist or Ophthalmologist as soon as possible. There are numerous variables when an eye infection is present. A proper diagnosis and treatment in a timely manner will provide relief and prevent further complications.

There are times when the swelling can be controlled

by using cold compresses over the eyelids. This simple, but effective remedy can do wonders for increasing your comfort during a particularly rough allergic episode. Be careful with any type of swelling of the eyes, however. A stye is treated in a much different and aggressive manner. So, if you are in doubt as to what is causing the swelling, do not hesitate to call me or your current eye doctor.

Eventually, the hay fever allergy season will wind down. But for the next few weeks many of you reading this will know when you have been outdoors too long. At the Eagleville Eye Clinic we see and treat a large number of people who suffer from ocular allergies and eye infections. The weather is getting pleasant so we all want to be out side as much as possible. The bottom line is this; if you are in doubt as to what to do for your eyes --- then please do not hesitate to call us at the clinic. A proper evaluation and treatment can help you get back outdoors enjoying the wonderful spring weather!!

#### Easter Eggs



Of all the symbols associated with Easter the *egg*, the symbol of fertility and new life, is the most identifiable. The customs and traditions of using eggs have been associated with Easter for centuries.

Originally Easter eggs were painted with bright colors to represent the sunlight of spring and were used in Easter-egg rolling contests or given as gifts. After they were colored and etched with various designs the eggs were exchanged by lovers and romantic admirers, much the same as valentines. In medieval time eggs were traditionally given at Easter to the servants. In Germany eggs were given to children along with other Easter gifts.

Different cultures have developed their own ways of decorating Easter eggs. Crimson eggs, to honor the blood of Christ, are exchanged in Greece. In parts of Germany and Austria green eggs are used on Maundy Thursday (Holy Thursday). Slavic peoples decorate their eggs in special patterns of gold and silver.

Austrian artists design patterns by fastening ferns and tiny plants around the eggs, which are then boiled. The plants are then removed revealing a striking white pattern. The Poles and Ukrainians decorate eggs with simple designs and colors. A number of eggs are made in the distinctive manner called *pysanki* (to design, to write).

Pysanki eggs are a masterpiece of skill and workmanship. Melted beeswax is applied to the fresh white egg. It is then dipped in successive baths of dye. After each dip wax is painted over the area where the preceding color is to remain. Eventually a complex pattern of lines and colors emerges into a work of art.

In Germany and other countries eggs used for cooking where not broken, but the contents were removed by piercing the end of each egg with a needle and blowing the contents into a bowl. The hollow eggs were died and hung from shrubs and trees during the Easter Week. The Armenians would decorate hollow eggs with pictures of Christ, the Virgin Mary, and other religious designs.



#### CITY HALL

With the assistance of City Planner, Bryan Collins, the topic of "Zoning" will continue from previous articles.

When a community decides to create land use laws, it's generally out of a desire to establish compatibility between the acceptable uses and the notso-acceptable uses. Here, the goal is compatibility. Historically, modern zoning evolved from nuisance laws, sanitary and housing codes, European law and English common law. Even early Roman law addressed a need for protection against encroachments in certain areas and the spatial relationships of certain buildings to other structures. Acceptability of land use controls in the United States was not immediate or universal. Numerous reasons for its slow development could be noted, but perhaps the most significant reason was the tendency of the courts to go to great lengths to assure that individual property rights were protected from arbitrary control of government. Public control of private land was not only uncommon, it was contrary to the

independent rural agrarian and enterprising values of that time. Much of that philosophy is still evident in Tennessee today. <sup>1</sup> To be continued next month.

#### A Step Back in Time - EARLY SCHOOLS

By Bobbie Sue Shelton

In the late 1800's and early 1900's the Eagleville Community like most rural communities had several small schools scattered in different areas. At this time it wasn't uncommon for children to walk or ride horses several miles to the school closest to their home. At this time there were several one-room schools in this area with one teacher that would teach all grades. The Eagleville community was fortunate to also have a private school during this time but these schools charged a tuition to attend, so most of the children in the area around Eagleville attended the one-room or very small country schools.

The BUNKER HILL SCHOOL was located near Eagleville in the Bunker Hill area. The original school building was located on property now owned by the Manier family. Professor Walter Cole was the teacher in 1898. Mr. Aub McClaran was the last teacher in the original schoolhouse. The new Bunker Hill School was built down the road from the old one next to the drive leading to the present home of Ray Frost, previously known as the Ralston home place. Mr. Bryson taught in the new school and in 1914, Miss Annie Wilson, daughter of John Wilson was the

teacher. According to Mrs. Mary Pearl Taylor and Allen Hudson who attended the Bunker Hill School, the recess was the favorite time of the day. They boys would play ball or pitch horseshoes. The girls would make playhouses out of rocks. Each child carried their lunch for the day. The teacher would often go home and spend the night in the children's home. Allen Hudson remembers a Miss Pomeroy staying at their home one night. Allen and his brothers went to school in the spring wagon that day because she was going home with them. One of the boys thought it would be fun to give her a fast ride. She was on the seat with Puckett Hudson, the driver. He got the horses going pretty fast and Miss Pomeroy got pretty upset them them. I'm sure their parents weren't too happy about this incident but the boys had a good laugh. When Bunker Hill School was closed, most of the students in this area went to Rover and Eagleville Schools.

In 1914 Miss Annie Wilson was the teacher and W. J. Owens, Officer of Bunker Hill School.

That year, Miss Wilson gave all her students a "School Souvenir" booklet that included a "School Days" poem, list of students and a message from the teacher. This program (pictured at right) belonged to the late Eth "Teet" Rowland, one of her students in 1914. 




