




She is survived by daughter Earlene McDaniel of Eagleville; 13 grandchildren; 12 great-great grandchildren; and six great-great grandchildren.

William "Bill" Morgan and Frankie Edward met and fell in love during WWII. Bill, stationed at Camp Hood, Texas (presently called Ft. Hood) met Frankie who at the time was working in the PX (Post Exchange) on the base. Frankie originally was Harrisburg, Illinois was in Texas visiting her older sister. Her 'return home money" was needed elsewhere, so Frankie went to work in the PX to make enough money to return home. But as fate would have it, she met and married her husband, Bill and later made Rockvale, Tennessee her home.



WHERE ARE THEY NOW?


When I left Eagleville in late October 1951 to enter the US Air force I little knew that I had set in motion a train of events which would ultimately result in my taking up residence in another country and never again returning to the USA as a permanent resident. On completion of training in the States I was sent to Europe for a 3-year tour of duty and stationed at Rhine Main Airbase Frankfurt Germany for the entire period. I enjoyed my time there very much as I could indulge in my favorite past time of travel being able to visit several European countries observing their culture close up.

In mid 1954 an English girl who had been working for Pan Am Airways in New York and had come to Germany to learn the language joined us in my unit. We started dating and in November 1954 married at her home near London. On our return to Frankfurt we lived off base in Morfelden near Frankfurt. In June 1955 we returned to the US sailing from Bremahaven on the USS General Hood. After a visit to family and friends we went to North Carolina where I was based at Fort Bragg. My enlistment ended October 1955 and we decided to return to England via New York-Southampton on the QE 1.

After settling in we moved to West Hampstead in London. For a brief period I worked for an American food distribution company. But after a few months I decided to embark on a career in Industrial Electronics. Over the next 5 years I attended college at night and part time day release to gain recognized qualifications in the field and in 1968 joined the company from which I retired, firstly as Sale Manager then as Marketing Director retiring after 22 years in 1990.

In 1985 my 1st wife and I separated and later divorced, following this I formed a relationship with my 2nd wife Jean and we married in Las Vegas in the millennium year.

I have only positive thoughts about my life in England, and take great pride in my children and grandchildren who have been brought up in the English culture. I have found English people very friendly and welcoming an in fact feels being an American has helped me both socially and in business. There are many Ameri-



cans living in the Country and in London we have many clubs where we can meet with our fellow countrymen to discuss the issues of the day. I am still an American citizen, keep my passport up to date and would never relinquish it willingly, any more than I would ever trade my experiences of growing up on a farm in Tennessee for anything. There are certain aspects in the American culture that I miss but at the same time there are many things in the English culture that I admire greatly.

The one thing that cannot be replicated wherever I go is the sense of belonging, when I return to Eagleville to visit family and friends. The people of Eagleville are so friendly and welcoming that I always feel as though I have just returned from a few days away. On balance I believe I enjoy the best of both worlds!

Note: Jack is the son of the late Aubrey and Pearl Tomlin McClaran. He was one of eight children of which 5 are still living. He graduated from Eagleville High School in 1948. There were 10 graduates in the "class of 48".

I wander around Rutherford County and surrounding areas in search of new restaurants. I also wander over to the local theatre and movie rental store at least once a week for a little entertainment. I'd hate for all these experiences to go to waste so I'm sharing them with you here in the Eagleville Times



For my first restaurant review, I found myself wandering into Fuji Japanese Steakhouse and Sushi located at 352 West Northfield Blvd in Murfreesboro. Fuji is primarily a Hibachi restaurant with a large sushi bar in the back. If you wish to be seated at the sushi Bar, be sure to tell your hostess before being seated. The tables are designed around grills at which a chef will cook your meal for you as well as entertain you with

flashy knife work, humorous antic dotes and the occasional jumping flames. My friends and I chose to have both Sushi and the Hibachi dinner. The sushi came out quickly, was fresh, and appropriately chilled. For those new to Sushi, it isn't just raw fish, but in fact quite a few are grilled, fried, or baked before being served. They even have their sushi menu split into 3 sections, Beginner, Advanced and All-Pro. We had a wide selection of some old favorites and a few new items to try out. I for one was impressed. Our hibachi meals came with soup and salad a nice little appetizer before the main meal.


When it came time for our meal, Chef Anthony rolled out his cart of goodies and started

the show. He went to work, chopping up and scrambling some eggs for fried rice, slicing up shrimp and vegetables. His knife work was mesmerizing. He said it was his first day at the restaurant but he'd been doing it for 8 years. The food he prepared was flavorful and fresh...it had to be, he cooked it right at the table. The overall experience was very enjoyable and satisfying, though the prices were very high for my taste. For those with a taste for alcohol, Fuji serve sake, plum wine, a wide selection of bears and cocktails. I had a glass of the plum wine and found it a nice change of pace from the usual mixed drinks.



All in all the service was excellent. The atmosphere was inviting yet still felt out of the ordinary. The food was fresh and wonderfully flavorful. The even have a website complete with menus located at www.fujisteakandsushi.com.

I give Fuji Japanese Steakhouse and Sushi, 4 chopsticks out of 5.

ry rhyme from England is the basis for the film, "V for Vendetta". The story is set in London some 22 year from now. America is consumed by plagues and riots while England's new government rules its peo-

ple with an iron fist. Actor Hugo Weaving (whom you may recognize as Elrond from the "Lord of the Ring" movies) portrays V, a protagonist who uses bombings and murders to influence the people of England to change their unjust government while actress Natalie Portman plays Evey, a woman caught by circumstance who is morally forced to join in his

The film itself is a wild mix of drama, action, explosions, dark comedy, and love. The focus of the movie, though, is not just action, but almost to satire politics both past and present. The director goes through great lengths to draw similarities between the new fictional British government of the film and the former Nazi Regime of World War II Germany. The central theme of the film is summed up by the movie's catch phrase, "People should not be afraid of their government, governments should be afraid of their people."

As a rule, I don't encourage parents to take their children to see an action and this is no exception. The movie isn't child friendly but mature teenagers should love it. There are no sex scenes but there is a fair bit of violence, both implied and shown as well as some blood spilled. The film's comedy is of a dark nature, as satires tend to be, but does have a few moments that had the whole audience laughing. The plot is compelling and the acting is on the mark. Overall, V for Vendetta is a great film for movie goers and should make an excellent home theatre rental or an outstanding Movie Theatre experience.

I give V for Vendetta 4 action packed explosions out of 5.

I recently caught a showing of "Inside Man" at my local theatre. The film revolves around a perfectly planned bank robbery and stars such big names as Denzel Washington, Jodi



Foster, Christopher Plummer, and William Dafoe. The main stage of the film is a bank founded by Arthur Case (Christopher Plummer). Robbers, dressed as painters walk in, disable the cameras, and order everyone to hit the dirt, more or less. From there, the heist seems to spiral out of control, all the while the robbers are calm and collected. The film is directed by

Spike Lee, who paints a picture of mystery and intrigue while hostages cower for their lives at the command of the armed robbers. There were quite a few moments that surprised and excited the action star in me, but there wasn't really any comedy to speak of. With the few special effects and many twists and turns, "Inside Man" kept me guessing. As such, I give it 4 "What just happened" moments out of 5.

That's all for this edition's travels of the Wandering Fool. I hope you enjoyed reading it as much as I enjoyed living it. 


Gardening With Allergies

For some, gardening is enjoyable all year long. Others, however, are not so fortunate. Seasonal allergies can stop some people in their tracks with sneezing attacks, watery eyes and noses or an inability to breathe. Spring begins the allergy season with the pollen of ash, birch, elm, hickory, and other trees. Late spring and summer brings problems with grasses. Summer and fall continues the agony with numerous weeds such as dock, ragweed and amaranth.

People who are unaware of their particular allergies often want to blame plants with bright, fragrant flowers even though these are often not the culprit. The plants that often cause allergies are those whose pollen is windborne and have inconspicuous flowers. Brightly colored, fragrant flowers have heavy pollen that need insects for transfer. Unfortunately, highly susceptible people may be affected by insect pollinated plants as well.

The first step in gardening with allergies is to identify the plants which cause problems. Allergies can change over time as can sensitivity. By knowing your allergies you can begin developing avoidance strategies. Altering your surroundings can significantly reduce your exposure to your allergies (triggers). The microenvironment you create for yourself may not help much on windy days at the peak of your allergy season, but it should help at other times. Utilize plants throughout the landscape

that do not cause problems for your allergies. If you have allergies to tree pollen, your yard may be sunnier than your neighbors. If grasses cause problems, avoid large expanses of lawn.

Once you know your triggers and have employed all the avoidance strategies you care to, then you can plan your outdoor activities accordingly. The American Academy of Allergy and Immunology ("United States Pollen Calendar," 611 E. Wells St., Milwaukee, WI 53202; 800-822-ASMA (2762)) offers a calendar indicating the average bloom period of many plants. Your doctor can help in this area as well. Knowing when your particular allergies are likely to flare up can help you plan major garden projects.

Pollen counts from the previous day are often published in local newspapers. Pollen forecasts are commonly given with the weather report. Both counts reflect conditions at particular sampling points, so individual situations may differ somewhat. Some people's allergies are worse in the morning, others in the afternoon and evening. Wind, humidity, and cloudy conditions all play a role in allergic responses as well. If you do venture out during times of high pollen counts, a small mesh face mask might help as will goggles and a head scarf. Showering immediately after prolonged exposure and changing into clean clothing is also helpful. If allergies are a part of your life, following some of the above suggestions may help you enjoy the gardening season and the outdoors a little more comfortably.





Margaret's Helpful Hints



You won't waste syrup or honey if you first dip your measuring cup in flour. Sticky mixtures will slide out easily and completely.

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter, cut up

4 oz. (1/2 of 8-oz. pkg.) Cream Cheese, cubed

1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1 cup flake Coconut

1 cup pecan pieces

Preheat oven to 350°F. Prepare brownie mix as directed on package for cakelike brownies. Pour batter into greased 13x9-inch baking pan.

Place butter and cream cheese in small saucepan; cook on medium heat until cream cheese is completely melted and mixture is well blended, stirring frequently. Stir in brown sugar. Add coconut and pecans; mix well. (Mixture will be thick.) Drop spoonfuls of the cream cheese mixture over brownie batter in

Bake 30 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 1 hour. Store leftover cake in the refrigerator.


