First Issue

A NEW CITY PARK

The city of Eagleville is finally getting a city park! Feedback from concerned citizens regarding the desire for a community park with ball fields, a playground, and pavilion with restrooms led to the appointment of the Eagleville Beautification/Parks and Recreation/Historical Committee. Approximately three months ago this committee embarked upon a mission to locate an acceptable location for this park. After visiting neighboring communities and attending park and recreational meetings, the committee was eager to begin work toward our goal. Our

data revealed that the majority of these parks were in low lying flood zones. Analysis of properties owned by the city of Eagleville revealed thirteen undeveloped acres of land in the old industrial park, located off 41-A South behind Tru -line Tool and Manufacture. The committee solicited the city for this parcel of land and after three-month discussion, this acreage has been relinquished for the new Eagleville City Park.



You only have to drive down highway 99 toward Murfreesboro to realize that something big is happening at Eagleville School. Machines are grading a field, bringing in dirt, lights are installed and a concession stand building is near completion. Yes, it is the beginnings of a football field and the continuing of a football program at Eagleville High School and Middle School. Building on the 2002 strong record of 9 wins and 2 losses, Eagleville will play a regular season schedule this year, competing for a birth in the playoffs and working towards a state championship. Summer Gardening



It's hard to believe that we are finally in the hot season -the time of year when the weeds won't stop and we have to keep everything watered. Here are some tips to keep your garden beautiful: When watering, consider soaker hoses or some similar system to avoid using an overhead sprinkler. If this is not available there are some other methods you can utilize. First, simply take your water hose and hold it right down at the roots so that you are not wasting water. The water is going right where it is needed without evaporating. Make sure the water is a slow trickle. This takes longer but is more effective and also reduces the chance of disease. Second, you can take a 2-liter bottle, cut the bottom off, turn it upside down and bury the spout next to a plant. Fill it up with water and the water will slowly soak into the soil right by the roots. And, of course, water in the morning so the plant is not sitting wet overnight. This also reduces the chances of diseases.

Consider putting a 2" layer of mulch on your garden beds. This not only helps the soil retain

Consider putting a 2" layer of mulch on your garden beds. This not only helps the soil retain moisture but it helps prevent weeds - and it looks pretty!

If you are growing vegetables,

keep up with your harvesting. If you let things go to seed your production will slow down or even quit.

For your flowers, keep them deadheaded (removing the spent flowers) this will allow the plant to put its energy into producing more flowers rather than seed and will look beautiful for a long time!

Most of all, enjoy your garden!

Margaret's Helpful Hints



Use baking soda on a damp sponge to clean sinks, counters, microwaves, pots and pans silverware, food containers, counters, tubs, tiles, toilets, and more. It doesn't scratch. It cuts grease. It removes soap scum.

If you accidentally over-salt a dish while it's still cooking, drop in a potato slice.

Tired of buying those expensive dryer sheets? I've got a solution. Find a container such as a plastic bowl with a lid. Place 1 or 2 regular kitchen sponges into the container and add one part liquid fabric softener to one part water. Keep this mixture near your dryer. Each time you dry a load of clothes, simply wring the sponge out lightly and toss into the dryer. This sponge will act a those expensive dryer sheets.

When preparing your summer fruit trays, add a special touch to your bunch of grapes by emerging them in water and then rolling the bunch in grape flavored Jello powder. This will give your grapes a beautiful frosted look and they taste scrumptious.

They have lived in Eagleville for 52 years, raised 5 children and spoiled twice as many grand-children and great-grandchildren.

Mr. and Mrs. Lamb specialize in service, service to the community, the church, the school and civic organizations. Mr. Lamb is a solid member of the Lions Club, Eagleville chapter and without him and Mrs. Mary Alice there would not be a Walking Horse Show each June to raise money for the programs the Lions Club supports. Mr. Gordon and Mrs. Mary Alice are long time members of the Eagleville United Methodist Church where they have served and continue to serve in various capacities such as Sunday school teacher, church committees, church trustee, and membership chair. Every year they provide a picnic lunch to the children and staff of the vacation bible school. They attend weekly service, sitting in the same pew each Sunday, only missing due to illness. Through their efforts, the role of the Eagleville



United Methodist Church in the community is strong and the ministries of the church are effective.





A Step Back in Time

Finis E. Tucker
Eagleville's First Mail Carrier
1905 to 1911

One day during a bad ice storm while Finis was delivering the mail, the wheels on the buggy iced over. Finis rolled the mail up in a blanket, left the buggy and rode the horse home. Pearl, one of Finis daughters was the substitute mail carrier, who sometimes had to help out on those stormy days.

Finis was born on November 24, 1863. He died on October 6, 1946. His corpse was carried up the steps in the old Eagleville Bank building on Main Street for the viewing of the body.



David shared details of the mission trip at the Eagleville Baptist Church on Sunday, July 13.









City Ordinances: One of the most important responsibilities of the City Council for the Town of Eagleville is the drafting and institution of ordinances. An ordinance is a law requiring or restricting certain behavior of the citizens and others located within the corporate limits of Eagleville. During the fifty plus year history of the Town of Eagleville, numerous ordinances have been passed by the City Council governing everything from the speed limits on our roadways to the requirement of a building permit for the construction of buildings. While the ordinances are, for the most part, well known to the City

Council and other town officials, there has never been a comprehensive collection of the town's laws.

For the past several months town officials have been collecting and reviewing all evidence of ordinances passed by the current and previous councils. The council is currently editing, amending and supplementing the amount ordinances and organizing the same into a single municipal code. The code will contain every current ordinance governing the town and will provide citizens and town officials with a single, organized and indexed source for our laws.

A final draft of the proposed new code is expected to be available for citizen review at the public library and on the internet at

www.eaglevilletn.com sometime in July. A public hearing on the proposed code is expected to be held at the regular council meeting in August or September of this year. The exact date and time of the public hearing will be advertised in the Daily News Journal,, the Eagleville Times and on the town's website, at least thirty (30) days prior to the hearing. Passage of the code will require three (3) readings and an affirmative majority vote of the council at each reading.

CHILDREN AND VISION

Does this sound familiar? "Little Tommy, in the 3rd grade, is falling behind at school. He seems to understand the subject matter when we go over it, claims Mom. But he takes so long to get his work done that he gets points marked off. The school checked his eyes and they said everything was all right." If you are a parent, grandparent, or teacher chances are you have experienced this or have heard someone utter a similar statement. Vision problems can drastically slow a child down with schoolwork. "But the school eye test said he was O.K.," says Mom. Unfortunately, the vision screening performed in schools will detect some problems, not all. Many small amounts of hyperopia (farsightedness) and astigmatism can be overlooked without a comprehensive eye examination by an Optometrist.

rienced enough good focusing or good vision to know the difference between poor vision and good vision. Simply put, a child does not recognize that he/she is having trouble focusing on the pages of the book at hand. These kids would rather be out on the playground or doing more hands on tasks in the classroom. They will avoid anything visually stressing to reduce frustration.

Of course many children do complain of headaches and

poor vision. Anytime this is the case, the child should be examined in an eye doctor's office as soon as possible. The health of the eyes is also a concern and should never be overlooked. A thorough eye examination will insure that the eyes are healthy and performing together. It could be that a simple eye glass prescription will tremendously improve the child's performance at school.

Don't get a false sense of security when a child successfully reads the eye chart for the screening at school or at the pediatrician's office, then please schedule one very soon. Numerous conditions can go undetected, and if are left untreated for too long, serious problems can occur that could have been avoided.
