## Eagleville Times Celebrates One Year Anniversary

The August 2004 edition of the *Eagleville Times* will mark the one year anniversary for this community based paper. It is amazing to think that one year ago, Eagleville did not have a paper and now it is a much anticipated publication at the beginning of each month. With its modest beginning, the paper has grown to 40 pages in each edition and is circulated to over 1,000 homes across over 25 states. Vendors in Rutherford County and in counties and communities surrounding Eagleville sell the paper each month as readers anticipate down home advice, articles that reminisce the past, and articles which highlight current and past members of our various communities. Citizen of the month is an important focus of the paper each month and through this feature all of us have learned about the outstanding citizens in our communities. Another favorite is the feature on surrounding communities, their history, the history of the schools in the area, and the changes they have undergone. Everyone has benefited from the helpful hints and medical articles featured in the paper and readers also enjoy the Yard of the Month, Pet of the Month and Guess Who This Is photograph.

During the fall, the paper published articles about the Eagleville volleyball teams, the football team and

Football Homecoming among others. Laying Sod on the new football field was front page news and highlighted the community spirit of Eagleville. The TVP-PA Tractor Show was also highlighted in the paper. During October, the successful Car Show sponsored by the Eagleville School cheerleaders and the Eagleville Marching Band found space on the pages of the *Times*. The November issue which paid tribute to the veterans was an outstanding salute to these brave men and women. The December and January issues featured stories of the season and highlighted the Christmas Parade, Let Freedom Ring, the Elementary Christmas Program at the school and letters to Santa from area children. Songwriters Night was front page news in February. Winter issues also included articles on the high school and middle school basketball programs at Eagleville School, Middle School and High School Homecoming and the King and Queen of Hearts competition among the elementary students. The twins article in March was fun for all and featured twins of all ages from infants to senior citizens. Spring found articles about neighbors and friends and highlighted area schools and community sports events. Boy Scout Troop 123 was highlighted at regular intervals and articles on recent Eagle Awards paid special tribute to the young men who achieved this rank. Mr.

Buddy Pate was honored in the April issue as he announced his retirement from Rutherford County Public Schools and principal of Eagleville School. Graduation highlights and an article on Just Dance recital were included in the June paper.

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# ROCKVALE CHURCH OF CHRIST VOLUNTEERS IN BAJA MEXICO

A group of road weary youth and adults returned from the trip of lifetime on June 12<sup>th</sup>, exhausted from their travels, glad to be home, and committed to the new relationships they established during the preceding week. This group of committed Christians traveled to Baja Mexico to participate in a week of building, teaching, sharing and growing through Baja Missions. The group included pastor Don Mangrum and his wife Kayla, Jay and Elizabeth Priestly, youth pastor at Rockvale Church of Christ, Roy and Judy Robinson, Terry Green, Chad Green, Jordan Vaughn, Kinsey Doss, Jesse Emery, Ben Dodd, Jon Price, Jeff King, Jimmy and Teresa Priestly, and Brandon Jones.

Baja Missions, based out of the City of Children in Ensenada Mexico began in 1997 and has welcomed many teams to this area on a number of mission trips. Through this ministry, God is being offered to the people of the community and immediate and long term needs of individuals and the community are being met.

The Rockvale group participated in the established Baja Mission Program in a poor section of Mexico, Maneadero. Each member of the Rockvale raised funds to pay for the trip, received additional monetary and resource donations. They were allowed one bag for their per-

sonal belongings and an additional bag loaded with supplies and resources to use during their week of service.

The group spent part of their time constructing homes in the community Maneadero and El Zorrillo. By U.S. standards the homes are small measuring 12 feet by 26 feet and primitive, built on a slab, consisting of two rooms, with no indoor plumbing or electricity. Compared to the structures made with packing crates, billboards, tarps and whatever other scrap materials the people can find, these houses are palaces. Eventually the home will be inhabited by families who attend the Baja Mission churches.

In the afternoons the group members taught Vacation Bible School to the children in the community. Over 100 children, youth, parents and single adults attended the nightly activities. The group taught Bible stories, provided snack, sang songs in Spanish and English, and performed puppet shows for the children. Adult classes were also provided and three of the men from the Rockvale group preached with the help of a translator. T-shirts complete with promises of God's love and Bible verses written in Spanish made lasting gifts to the children the team members taught and grew to love.

Food packages including a months' supply of flour, oil, meal, rice, sugar and beans were distributed to 20 families by the team. An additional 10 was given to the pastor of the El Zorrillo church for distribution as needed. The group found much time to visit and love the children and families they met. They also managed to sample the local food and went on a brief shopping excursion to an open air market at the Blow Hole, La Bufadora.

Wednesday evening was a tearful event as youth and adults prepared for the return to the U.S. and said goodbye to new friends they had made "across the border". The group returned blessed by the experience of giving and blessed by all they received from the people they grew to love. They are already making plans for the next visit.

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## College Grove Red Hats Lunch & Learn at Wartrace's Historic Chockley Tavern



On July 20, the College Grove Senior Enrichment Center Red Hats, the "Groovy Grovettes" traveled to Wartrace's Historic Chockley Tavern for a "lunch and learn program" at the Civil War era tavern. Proprietress Blossom Merryman in her role as Mrs. Chockley had her serving girl greet the group at the door as they stepped back in time to a tavern in

1863. With unleavened but seasoned bread at each table, the Red Hats sat down to here the latest news from the "War" and a treat of period music and song from the Confederate Widow, Mrs. Sarah Crawford, a member of the Chockley Tavern Troubadours.

Later during the lunch, Blossom Merryman stepped out of her character as Mrs. Chockley and explained to the group about the history of the house, Wartrace as headquarters of Gen. Patrick Cleburne, who later died at the Battle of Franklin and the action of the Tullahoma Campaign of 1863 which led to the retreat of Confederate forces from Middle Tennessee between the Battle of Stones River and the Battles for Chattanooga and Chickamauga.

"It is not everyday that you can enjoy such a delicious history lesson," said Cherry Ralston, Center Program Director. "The theme of the time comes alive with the period costumes and reenactment that era."

Following their time travel, the group continued on to Bell Buckle to shop and tour in

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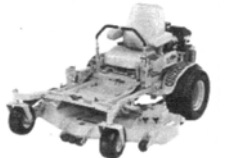
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# FEEDING THE MINDS OF THE COMMUNITY SCHOOL VIKINGS

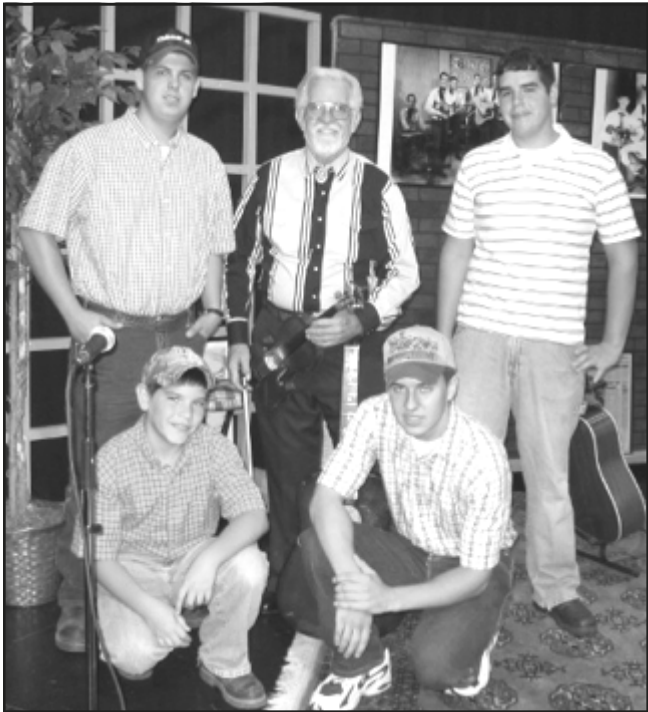






# Rank Strangers Airing on Nashville Cable Station

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I have been a resident of Eagleville all of my life. My daddy was Dr. J.E. Stephenson, a dentist from Spring Hill, Tennessee, the son of George W. and Lucy Elizabeth Epps Stephenson. My mama was Mary Claire Hughes of Eagleville, daughter of David Henning and Lucy Holland Jones Hughes. There were two boys and four girls in our family. George Hughes, Elizabeth Holland (Holly) died at age two, Walter Henning (Bub), Virginia (Sis), Pauline (Paul), and Mary Jane (that's me). We lived on Hwy 99, second house on the right going into Murfreesboro, where Suzanne and Johnny McClaran now live.

Our house was, you might say, in the middle of town and a good place to play. All of my life I can only remember our yard being full of boys and girls of all ages,

ready to play games such as, kick-the-can, hiding, croquet, card games and many others. It was just a convenient place to gather. Daddy and Mama like for all the children to be in their yard. They said that when the children were in their yard, they knew where their own children were and they knew all were safe. Mama didn't have any flowers or shrubs

in the yard until all of us were grown up and going our own way. It was just as well because we would have killed them while playing. We all did have lots of fun. I can't begin to name all that came to play, but they knew they were always welcome.

Our summers were always fun. In addition to all of our friends getting together, we liked to do different things. Lots of days we all would walk about three miles to the river to go swimming. Mrs. Penson, a very nice lady, would let us come into her home and change our clothes. She also let us come back into her home, wet as we were, to dry off and change clothes again. Daddy would usually come and get us when he got home from his office. We didn't have to walk back to Eagleville.

Traveling shows use to come to Eagleville in the summertime. This was something different. It didn't cost much to get in the show. They sold little boxes of candy and crack-jacks, which had prizes in them. They really made it sound like we would be getting valuable prizes but we soon found out that wasn't true. One show set up in a vacant lot owned by Mr. Riley Wheeler, about where the Mexican restaurant is now located. At a different time, I remember one in the lot where Mrs. Dot John's house now sets, then, there was a carnival like show that set up in a vacant lot on Mr. Ed McCord's farm on Hwy 41A, North. These shows didn't come to Eagleville often, but they were fun and something different for all.

Gypsies used to come to Eagleville. They were people that just wandered from place to place. Everyone always dreaded seeing them coming to Eagleville. They went into the stores and would steal items and distract people while they picked pockets. This made the people of Eagleville very uncomfortable while they were in town. I was afraid of them. One time, when I was very small, it seemed that you couldn't look in any direction unless you would see several of them. I locked every outside door so that they couldn't get in the house. Bub, my brother, came home from the store and couldn't get in the door. He started rattling doors and making all kinds of noises. This really upset me. I just knew something bad was going to happen to us. Mama went to the door finding only Bub playing a joke on us. I was really mad at him. He just laughed and laughed at me. The gypsies usually stayed around for three days to a week and would then move on.

Then, there was the "Goat-man" (that is what we called him) that came through Eagleville many times. I don't remember much about him other than he had a wagon pulled by a team of goats. I think goats also followed the wagon. There was a young boy that was always with him. They would stop, feed and water the goats. The "Goat-man" and the boy would eat and rest and be on their way.

A memory that is very vivid in my mind is the first day of my school years. Fall of 1934, age five years & seven months, Miss Grace Fann (married Mr. Bill Wheeler later) was my 1<sup>st</sup> grade teacher. Our parents left all of us with Miss Fann. This was not to my liking. Miss Fann led us into a large room, the auditorium, where the whole student body and visitors assembled for the first day of school activities. I was in the seat next to the center aisle (lucky for me). Being very unhappy to be there, I looked to the back of the room and saw my mama. I ran as fast as I could go to get to her and everything was finally good again.

Miss Fann taught 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grades, Miss Erlene Carlton (later married Grady Elmore) taught 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grades. Due to some changes the next year, Miss Erlene also taught us in the 5<sup>th</sup> grade. Mrs. Frances Nance taught 6<sup>th</sup> grade. The 7<sup>th</sup> grade was different for us because for the first time, we had a man teacher, Mr. Raymond (Bull) Brown. I really liked him. He coached the high school basketball teams. In the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, we had two men teachers, Mr. J.B. Pressgrove and Mr. Lemmie Manier. Miss Ethel Elmore taught music. This included all kinds of instruments, voice and glee clubs. Teachers changed from year to year. These are the teachers that I had in elementary school. Grade one



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through eight only went to school eight months out of the year. Grades nine through twelve went nine months a year. The year that I was in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade was the last for anyone to go only eight months.

School was never called off due to bad weather, at least when I was in elementary school. If the school buses couldn't run, everyone got to school the best way they could. Usually the ones at school were those that lived close in Eagleville. I remember one big snow, Mr. Grigsby with the permission of all parents, went with the students to Mr. Sam William's hill. We did have fun sliding down the hill on slides and whatever we could find to slide on. Another time, the weather was so cold that the river in front of Edna Jackson's house froze over. We sure did have fun ice-skating.

High school found us changing classes all day. This was different for us. The teacher that I remember when I was in high school at Eagleville were Mr. Bill Wheeler, the principle, who also taught Spanish, English and maybe some math; Marie Farmer taught Home Economics, some Science classes and maybe English; Mrs. Edna Windrow taught Science and math classes; Mr. Lemmie Manier taught history, geography and social studies; Rush Taylor, Jr. coached basketball, baseball and softball teams. He also taught some classes in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. Other principals that I remember were Mr. Ray Dowdy and Mr. Charles Grigsby.

The competitive sports that we played in high school were basketball, softball and baseball. There were very little changes in the rules, if any; in the way the boy's basketball and baseball games were played. The players did not have the run of the whole court. The floor was a three-division court, two forward players, two center players and two guard players. I played this way when I was in elementary school



as a center. When I played in high school, the rules for the girls changed to a two-division court, three forwards and three guards. I played forward position. We could only dribble the ball one time until the rules were changed again for us to dribble twice. We thought we could really cover a big area with that second dribble. Fast-pitch softball was all we ever knew. We never heard of slow-pitch. That was the only difference in softball. No lights, so we had to play games in the afternoon, during school hours, sometimes at our school and sometimes at the school of our opponent. We usually had a crowd at the games because most of the student body was excused to watch the games. Daddy and Mama always went to all of our basketball games. They didn't ever go by themselves because when time rolled around to go to the away games, many students that had no way to go were at the house to see if there was room for them. Daddy never refused to let anyone



ride. One time I remember, there were eleven that rolled out of the car. They didn't mind how crowded, just along as they could get to the game.

Graduation finally came the spring of 1946. After two years of college, two years teaching at Eagleville School and finishing college in 1951, Milton Simpson and I were married the day after I finished. Milton farmed full time until sometimes in the early 1970's. At that time, he farmed part-time and worked in construction. We lived in Eagleville with my mother. I taught one year at Rockvale and two years at Chapel Hill. At this time an opening became available at Eagleville School again. I accepted that position and became a permanent fixture at Eagleville until I retired in 1983, with 31 years of teaching experiences. Since the year that I taught in Rockvale, I have been the song leader and choir director at the Eagleville United Methodist Church, of which I have been a member since 1938.

We have two daughters, Suzanne, married to Johnny McClaran and, Rita, married to George Boyd. They each have one child; Davy McClaran married to Melissa Daugherty; and Gretchen Boyd Thompson married to Lucas Thompson. We are proud parents, proud grandparents and now proud great-grandparents of Ryley McClaran and Lizzy Thompson.

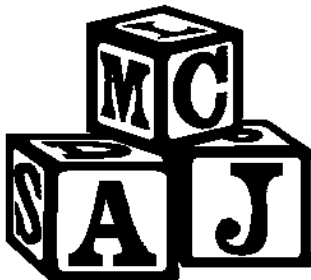
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# Tennessee Lions State Convention

Vantrease Little Russell was born in Eagleville, Tennessee on August 20, 1913. She weighed two pounds and was not expected to live. Her grandmother Sheffield fed her with her mother's milk suckled through cheesecloth. Charlie and Mae Little, her parents, lived on the Nashville

Hwy across from Mary Jean Haye and, next door to the McCords. She had one sister, Helen Howell of Columbia, Tennessee, who passed away in March of 2003. She also had a brother, Urban Little, who passed away in 1989.

Vantrease graduated from Eagleville School and then attended Murfreesboro State Teachers College. She then went to Nashville to teach at the Tennessee Industrial School where she met James Scott Russell. They married and moved to Orlando in 1934. They had five daughters and two sons.

We have great memories of the summers we spent in Eagleville as children. We went to the movie theater

where we loved the ice cream cups with the pictures of movie stars on the lid. We also liked to pop tar bubbles on the road.

I, for one, remember the stories she shared of her fond childhood memories and friends. She told us of traveling to school in the spring wagon and how chickens were kept at the school. As school children, they would gather the eggs. She also told us of the first toll road on the Nashville Highway in Eagleville. She said they rolled a log across the road and you paid a nickel to Mr. McCord, who was the operator, before you could pass through.

Our mother, Vantrease, was one of the pioneers in establishing a home for physically and mentally impaired children. She received the first license issued by the State of Florida in 1951. She cared for over 1,500 disabled children during her lifetime and was known as a modern day Mother Teresa.

In 1964, with the help of her minister of the First United Methodist Church of Orlando, she incorporated her own home as a Non-Profit Home for Atypical Children. She received no federal, state or local funds. She had faith in the goodwill of her community and, tremendous trust in God, in knowing the needs for the children would be provided.

Today 26 children reside in the home, including the first child Vantrease took into her heart and home in 1950, when the child was three. She recently celebrated her 59<sup>th</sup> birthday.

The home continues to rely solely upon the friends of the community, churches and organizations.

Vantrease is recognized throughout the United States and today we receive private donations from individuals wanting to help continue our Mother's mission. She be-

lieved in providing a home for these special children, giving them the quality of life she felt they so deserved.

Vantrease received numerous awards, one of which is the National Caring Award she received in Washington, DC along with Rosalyn Carter, when received her award for Mental Health Services.

Our mother passed away in June of 2003 at the age of 89. We, her daughters, are committed to continuing her mission of love in caring for these special children. 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# CITY HALL

Continuing with information regarding the Legal Basis for Zoning.

- Regulate the development of land through subdivision regulations and site plan review (TCA 13-4-302);

The *Tennessee Code* gives local government the necessary authority to adopt and enforce subdivision regulations. The law defines what constitutes a subdivision, provides that no plat may be recorded until it is approved by the planning commission, prohibits a county register from recording a plat until it is duly approved, provides procedures for the adoption of regulations and for the submission of plats, and provides penalties for transfer of sale of lots in unapproved subdivisions. TCA is rather liberal in its grant of power to the planning commission, and the community may, if it so chooses, adopt stringent controls. TCA 13-4-303 provides that in exercising its powers the planning commission shall adopt regulations, and those regulations may provide for the harmonious development of the municipality and environs, for the coordination of streets with existing

or planned streets or with the plan of the area for adequate open spaces, for traffic, recreation, light, air, and “ for a distribution of population and traffic which will tend to create conditions favorable to health, safety, convenience, and prosperity.” This last part appears to give a planning commission authority to consider the spatial relationships and timing of new developments.

Creating a subdivision regulation is the sole responsibility of the planning commission. However, prior to adoption, the planning commission shall hold a public hearing. Any revisions to the subdivision regulations must have a public hearing prior to adoption.

Site plan review is a planning commission power only through the enforcement of a zoning ordinance. Once the zoning ordinance is adopted, the planning commission may be given the prerogative to review and approve or disapprove a site plan of any proposed use on any lot prior to the issuance of a building permit. The enforcement of these provisions can result in the improved location, layout, and design of buildings on individual lots.

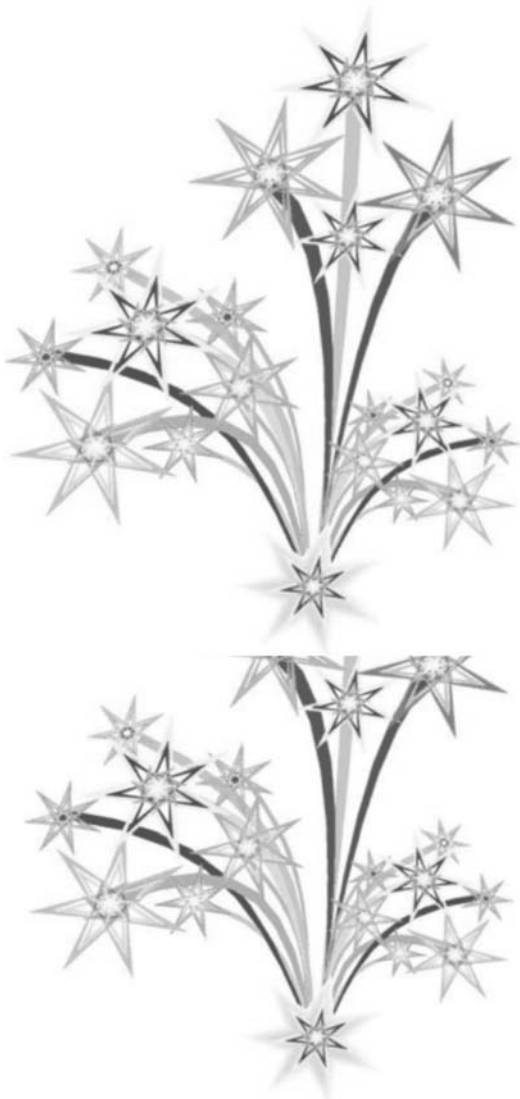

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# A Step Back in Time - Cedar Grove School

On July 27, 1901, Deacons of the Cedar Grove Missionary Baptist Church; R. S. Hendrix, J. A. Hendrix, \_\_\_\_\_ Jordan, George Hughes, Sam Swancy and Ned Hayes signed a deed to the School Directors for ½ acre of land for a school. The first schoolhouse was located across the road from the church at the intersection of Rocky Glade Road and John Windrow Road. It was a one-room frame building with one door and four or five windows. The school was for grades first thru eighth with one teacher for all classes. Some of the teachers who taught at the old Cedar Grove School were: Fred Jordan, L. T. Glanton, Henry Osborn, Mr. Rideout, Fruzzie Holford, Florence Holford, Charlotte Burns, Polly Smith, Henry Isom, Sally Blackman, Miss Jones, Edith Ransom, Ida Bracey, Viola Rouser, Stella Douglass, Marie Bright, Little Mae Puckett, Lydia Jackson, Richard North, Willie Lee Freeman, Margaret Smith, Wintonia Green, Miss Hamilton and Lydia Glanton.

Modena Glenn, a much loved and respected citizen of the Rockvale community, attended the first school at Cedar Grove. She remembers she was about 13 years old and it was Monday, December 8th, 1941. A neighbor to the school, Mrs. Jim Bracey came to the school and notified them that Pearl Harbor had been bombed the day before. This was a very scary time for the adults and children as

well. After completing the eighth grade at Cedar Grove School, Modena attended Holloway School in Murfreesboro.

On October 4, 1952, Freeland Bracy, Elam Bracy and wife Mary signed a deed to the Rutherford County School Commission for five acres of land for a new school. The new school built in 1952-53 was located on John Windrow Road about ½ mile north of the intersection with Rocky Glade Road. Cedar Grove School became a two-teacher school at this time with grades first thru eighth.

The school building was constructed of concrete blocks. It had a porch in the center front and classrooms with windows of small panel glass. This building is still standing. (See picture). In February 1953, Beech Grove School in Eagleville closed and the teacher, Alice Cleora Washington and students were transferred to Cedar Grove School. Teachers of the new Cedar Grove School were: Margaret D. Smith and Alice Cleora Jordan Washington. In 1953, Mrs. Annie W. Huddleston replaced Margaret Smith and Miss M. L. Lawrence taught in 1963. In 1967, the school was closed and the students were consolidated with Rockvale and Eagleville Schools. Some of the family names of students included; Sheffield, Jordan, Johnson, Dotson, Carney, Patton and Bracey.

On April 12, 1977, the Rutherford County Board of Education signed a deed to William E. Bracy and wife, Addie L., for the Cedar Grove School property.



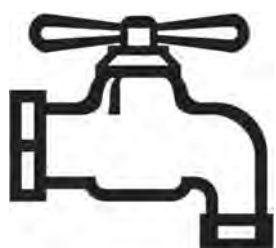

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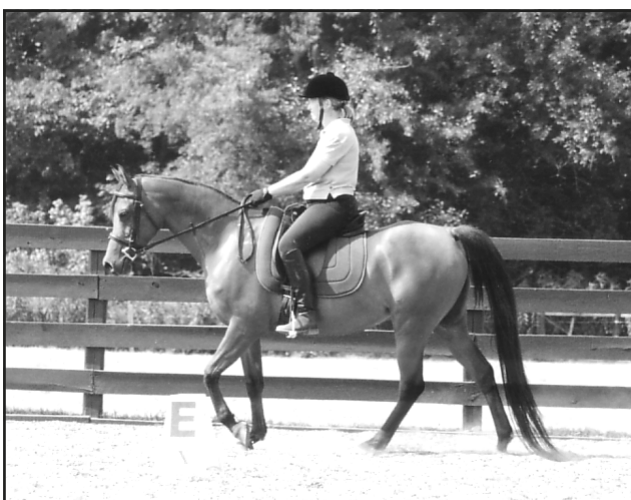
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## Making A Great Team

Since my move to Eagleville, I'm often asked "Those aren't walking horse, what kind are they? What kind of riding is that and what do you do with all those letter?" Well, I ride Arabian horses and my riding passion is Dressage. With the Olympics only weeks away, dressage is one of the three Olympic equestrian disciplines. I thought this might be a good time to briefly answer the question of "What is dressage?" and why it is such a wonderful sport for me.

Dressage is a French term simply meaning training. It is a program of suppling, balancing and obedience work that prepares a horse for future pleasure riding or competition, Western or English. In dressage training, the natural movements a horse can make on his own, free in the pasture, are repeated as exercises. These range from simple patterns and circles at the walk, trot and canter to move-



ments of extreme collection. In a competition, a dressage test is ridden in a riding arena, using a pattern of letters as direction markers for test movements. Tests are of increasing levels of difficulty, and range from basic levels (within the reach of every horse and rider) to the difficult demands of tests at the International level.

A great team (horse/rider combination) should function as one unit, performing the movements effortlessly. It should appear as though the rider is just sitting there and the horse is executing the movements all on his own. This is a very simple explanation of the dressage objective but gives you a general idea of the goals involved. Any horse that achieves these goals will be easier to handle and more relaxed and as a result will perform better no matter what discipline he is in.

A great thing about this sport for me is that it is truly good for all horses and any age rider. In August I will celebrate my 50<sup>th</sup> birthday and I am proud to still be able to be in the saddle and compete with my horses as an athletic partner. A little known fact is that our equestrian riders that will be representing the United States in Athens, ages range from 37-49 in dressage. It takes years to perfect this sport and get to the Olympic level. It is true that when talented horses and riders compete, you will see a kind of beauty and poise that reminds you a top notch figure skating or gymnastics, and there may be moments when one thinks that this has become an art; it is like ballet.

I feel very fortunate to have chosen the Eagleville area to make my new home. It is an area rich with very good dressage trainers, good local shows and a dressage club, the Central Tennessee Dressage Association. I have been able to make many good "horsey friends", with whom a horse lover can never be without or have too many of. But what counts most of all in dressage is the close relationship it makes between horse and rider, that's what it will always be all about for me!

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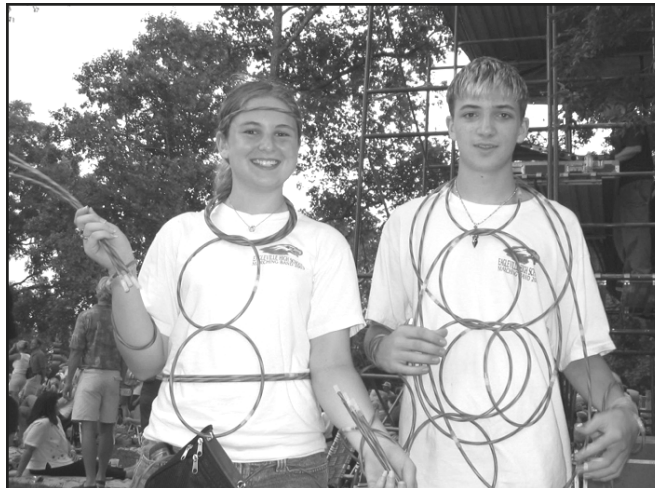

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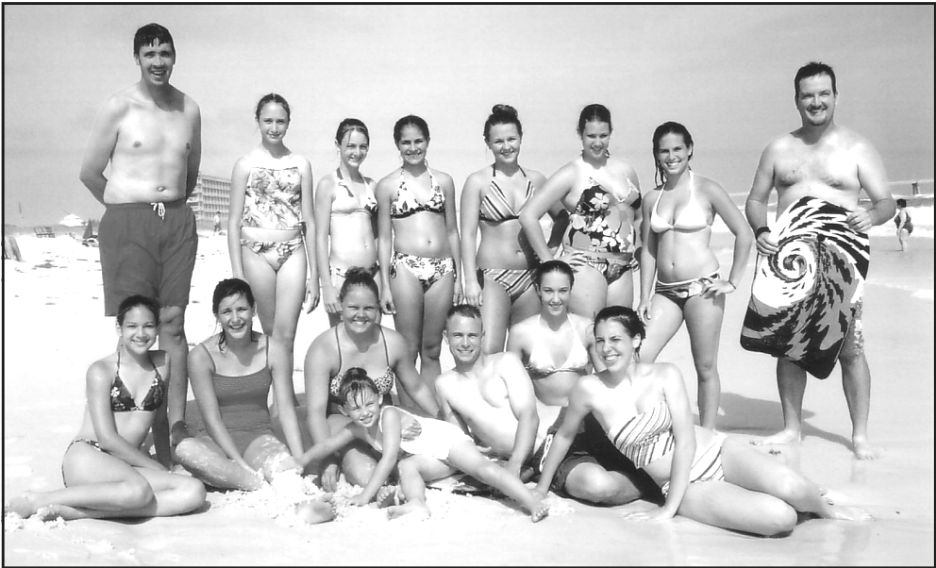

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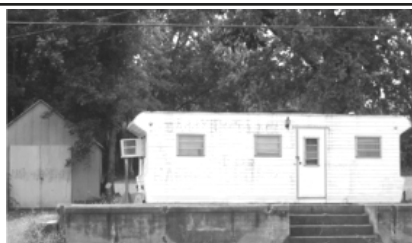
