An Incredible Journey

The History of the Tennessee Valley Pioneer Power Association

If you build it they will come. And come they have for the past two decades as thousands of spectators and exhibitors have traveled from all across the country and many walks of life to gather in Eagleville Tennessee for our annual Antique Tractor and Gas Engine Show.

In the mid 80's several local people where traveling to McMinnville monthly to compete in an antique tractor pull. Some of these people were Horace & Robin Jackson, John Patillo, Johnny McClaran, Raymond Fields and Buddy, Belinda & Megan Woodson. As time went by, some of us wondered how many tractors would show up if we attempted to host a pull and show in Eagleville. Curiosity got the best of us and we decided to hold a meeting in January of 1988 at the Community Center, advertise it by word of mouth and see how many people showed up.

After a general discussion in January a second meeting date was set up for February 20th, 1988 and we moved forward with electing officers and a Board of Directors. The founding Board of Directors elected that night were Buddy Woodson, Embree Blackwell Jr., William Boyce, Horace Jackson, Don Miller and

Omri Rawlins. Buddy Woodson was elected President, Embree Blackwell Jr. vice president, Horace Jackson treasurer and Omri Rawlins secretary.

The club was officially named the Tennessee Valley Pioneer Power Association on March 19th, 1988 and incorporated on June 9th of the same year. The club's purpose is to promote the collection, restoration and display of antique agricultural equipment and to provide a forum for its members to discuss topics of interest.

The first show was held on September 10th, 1988 on the campus of Eagleville School. The one-day show featured 138 tractors and 100 gas engines. 80 tractors competed in the first tractor pull utilizing a sled furnished by Lanny Turner. Horace Jackson, John Patillo and I pulled it out of a fence row on Cheatham Springs Road, pulled it down the asphalt road with sparks flying to the school grounds and it is still in use 23 years later! We basically just scraped the grass off a strip of ground beside the old ball field and started tractor pulling! As much as things have changed over the years, our resident mechanic, John Patillo is still driving the same gray and white Chevy pickup that he followed us in down the road that day!

In addition to using the old sled, we use a more modern self-propelled today for the larger and faster tractors, but some of the

most memorable moments in our history were watching the old sled in action. It had a long pan and when we got to the heavier more powerful tractors, we actually had to drive a tractor onto the pan for additional weight. When that wasn't enough to stop the likes of Johnny McClaran, Raymond Fields and Bill Caldwell on their big John Deeres, in addition to the largest tractor that we could fit onto the pan we had people stand all around the tractor. Somewhere there has to be a photo of these guys going for "Bragging Rights" in the heavy class!!

Other tractor events were held and Charlie Woodson of Eagleville won the first tractor slow race on a rusty old A John Deere right out of the hay field with the hay mower attached. Murfreesboro's Wayne Propes won the first tractor handcranking contest on a B John Deere. Wayne never left the tractor seat as he used his foot to turn the flywheel and start the tractor!

The first two-day show was held in 1989 as we immediately saw the need to include more time for the show. Within a couple of years we were over 300 show tractors and soon over 500 a couple of years after that. We've never really tried to count the tractors, so I don't know what our record has been, but I do know we've had a bunch over the years! One year at the school, we pulled 505 tractors using one sled! The need for a 3 days show was apparent as we parked cars, trucks and trailers in the nearby cornfields of John and Judy Turner Continue on page 2JOURNEY

Opening its doors on July 5th, The Barber Shop, located at 115 North Main Street in downtown Eagleville is open and ready for business with convenient parking only steps away from the front door.

The Barber Shop is owned by Master Barber Tim Buckner who has been cutting men's hair for the past 10 years. Buckner is a traditionally trained barber, graduating from the Middle Tennessee Barber College where he studied under the late Bill Kennedy and also became a licensed barber instructor himself.

Allured by the city's nostalgic past, Buckner is a native Mid-westerner who grew up across the United States with his family and a Dad that served in the military before relocating to Eagleville from the Murfreesboro area.

From the antique barber's station recovered from a barn in Smyrna during a recent Craig's List find, to the completely original 1950's barber's chair, Buckner is a little different from

most thirty-something's, placing emphasis on an era in which barbershops were not only where men went to get a haircut, but where they went to socialize as well.

"The Barber Shop is a place where you can come in and cut up and just be a man," said Buckner who maintains the traditional all male clientele of a classic barbershop.

Although Buckner does not cut hair of the opposite sex other than that of various family members, (including wife Bethany who is also a Barber in Brentwood), he does not want to discourage Moms who need to bring in their sons for a haircut. "The Barber Shop still maintains a family atmosphere," explained Buckner who also has 2 young children that attend Eagleville School.

Buckner decided to open his own barber shop when Eagleville's own barber, M.A. Smitty traded in his clippers for an auctioneer's gavel in a recent career change.


and sewage was gushing everywhere. I had to ask for forgiveness and also ask him to call maintenance in the same breath so we would not be flooded out. Sunday night after the show, we had to take it all down so school could resume Monday morning.

One memorable Saturday night in the mid 90's one of the electric transformers blew around midnight. We used flashlights to continue the show and pull until Matt Hodge could go to Murfreesboro, get a truck and install a new transformer, as our flashlights were growing dim! Another year the engine blew up in the motorized sled around midnight and several of the pullers worked all night to find another engine and install it for Sunday afternoon's pull. I will never forget one of the guys calling a friend who had a wrecked car with a good engine about 3 am and he started the conversation what, what ja doing!

For several years we had a man come to the show from Laurel Mississippi to "shoot" a blacksmith anvil high into



the air. He always told us it would go straight up and straight down with a sheepish grin, but we always had him set up his demonstration in the middle of John Turner's field below our show grounds. He put a black powder charge under the anvil and on our show grounds, he



One major challenge for my family each year was to get our tractors washed and moved from the house to the show grounds about 3 miles away. Those were the days when every member was bringing everything they could to help build our numbers for a really "big" show. One year we drove, pulled and hauled 52 tractors. We usually invited friends over for a pizza party and washed tractors on the Sunday afternoon before the show. On Wednesday morning, rain or shine along with many friends we would start driving some, pulling some and hauling some. It was a day long task, but somehow by Wednesday night, everything would be at the show. In reverse, it took all day on Monday after the show to get them back home. Now, I wonder how we did it, as it's a pretty good struggle for Belinda and I to get 4 or 5 tractors cleaned up and moved to the show. Youth is (was) a wonderful thing!

1999 brought major changes to the Eagleville School Campus with the completion of the new (now old!) ball field. The school was very generous to continue to allow us to host our show on the new ball field, but with the show's growth and continuing building on the school campus we started looking for another site to host the

show. In the fall of 1999 we purchased 35 wooded acres on Chapel Hill pike and began to design and clear the property. With the dedicated work of James Rigsby, John E. Turner and Richard Kieffer and many members and volunteers, the property was cleared and the first show was held on the new site in 2003.

We continue to improve the property as time and money allows and have constructed restrooms and a pavilion. Work will begin shortly on a new concession stand to better serve our attendees. A huge part of our success

I will also never forget the first show and its impact on our future. The skies were gray all day as a hurricane churned in the Gulf and none of us knew what to do at a show or what to expect. There was a gentleman named Joe Bellenfant who was a well respected tractor and implement dealer in the Eagleville and College Grove communities who came forward and worked the entrance gate, welcoming everyone who came and thanking them for coming as they left. At the end of the day there was a little more money in the pot than the number of attendees and while I don't know it for sure, I think Joe was responsible for that act of kindness.

We were also blessed when Mr. & Mrs. Eagleville (Gordon & Mary Alice Lamb) joined our association. They have spent most of their lives making Eagleville a

Shardanè Fishery Eagleville's Best Fishing Hole Now Open!

Eagleville adds yet another agritourism opportunity with Shardanè Fishery, whose waters span 8.5 acres, making it one of the largest catfish lakes in Rutherford County.

An on-going project for 14 years, Shardanè Fishery, named after owners Danny and Sharon Coffey offers fishing for anglers of all ages. With ample lake shore making it

easy to spread out, bring the entire family and spend the day.

"We stocked the lake last Fall with over 2,000 catfish, and we're going this weekend to get some larger fish around 15-20 pounds, said owner Danny Coffey who always wanted a stocked pond to share with his grandchildren and then expanded on the idea to share the fishing experience with the public.

Keeping what you catch is optional and only \$2.00 lb. live weight. However, albino catfish, bass, and grass carp stocked to maintain the algae must be released. While Coffey does have a few fishing poles on-hand, you will need to bring your own fishing gear and must use barbless

Shardanè Fishery wants to share the fishing experience with everyone both young and old and are happy to make the proper accommodations. "If someone requires assistance, we have golf carts to shuttle you to a place in the shade, and will be glad to move you to different areas throughout the day," explained Coffey.

The lake is teeming with small blue gill that will keep the attention of even the smallest of

anglers, while Coffey already has plans to create a children's playground area at the far side of the lake, and host a kid's fishing rodeo once school is back in-session.

"We wanted something that was family-friendly where kids can come and have a good time," said Coffey. "There's nothing like watching the kids' reaction when they get that little handful of catfish food and throw it out for the fish to come up, or when they pull out their first fish."

And for all of you who want a day outdoors but may not want to give up modern conveniences, there is even a brand new bathroom facility on-site, complete with running water.

Once things cool down in the Fall, anglers can purchase a bundle of firewood for a nominal fee for onsite fire pits, while plans for a few fishing tournaments and Senior day are already in the works. "We hope that one day we will be able to offer a few campsites," added Coffey.

Complete with picnic tables under the covered pavilion, Sharon and Danny will be glad to work with you on making Shardanè Fishery your place for family reunions, church

outings, company picnics, birthdays, and other special occasions.

If you're planning a trip to the Shardanè Fishery, here are some helpful things to know before you go: Fishing hours are 8 a.m. - 12 noon and again in the evenings from 4 p.m. - 8 p.m. Thursday-Sunday. When you arrive, simply pull up to the covered pavilion

where you can take a look at the rules/liability law, pay admission, buy bait, or even a drink.

Shardanè Fishery welcomes to bring a cooler (no alcohol permitted) and stay for the day, but pets are not allowed, so leave Spot at home and instead see which of the Coffey's pets will make an appearance, including pet goats Gilligan and Skipper, who can often be found on the lake's island.

If you're up for a little competition, try to break the record catfish catches of 9 lb. 7 oz. and 10 lb. 8 oz caught in one day by a couple out of Franklin, TN, and Danny will give you a free Coke. Make the Shardanè Fishery your favorite fishing hole and if you're on Facebook, don't forget to request them as a friend to keep up to date with the latest happenings.

Our family moved to Eagleville in late fall of 1951. Soon afterward, our high school English class was studying Thornton Wilder's "Our Town". Our teacher, Mr. Urban



Elmore, asked the class to write an essay about the town where we lived. Most of us had a hard time thinking of something to write because Eagleville seemed so plain and simple.

Fifty-nine years have passed. How well I remember our town of 1951! Moving north on the south end of the east side of Main Street, there was Blanton's Auto Parts and Blanton's Service Station. Next there was the City Hall that was opened only for an occasional night meeting, and the city jail in which I never saw a prisoner. Then there was Shelton and Smithson's Garage, the busiest of the town's service stations.

Next there was Joe Crosslin's Garage and Used Car Lot (he called himself "Honest Joe"). Next door was Howard Marshall's Grocery and I never knew him to deny credit to anyone. In the same building was Bud Walker's Barber Shop, and the stories he could tell about his son Bruce, and how strong he was as a young man, can still be remembered. In the north end of the


Marshall's Grocery building, was Arthur Barnes' Blacksmith Shop, and I still say he could put more curse words into one sentence than any man I've seen before or since. Continuing north, there was Crosslin Supply Company, where I worked part time

for two years. Next-door was the movie theater that had a full house every Tuesday night because; following the Tuesday movie, there was a drawing. Adiacent was a restaurant/drug store and Jim Neely's Electrical Appliance Store.

Across the street and moving back south, Ira "Dutch" Hay Grocery, the People's Bank with Dr. Stem upstairs, a dentist, who was so old he had lost his strength and removed teeth with a hammer-like instrument, as he did when my Daddy had all his teeth removed. Next location was "Little Green Hay's Big Hardware Store", that was owned by one of the town's most colorful characters. Moving on down the street was, The Bank of Eagleville, which made most of its loans, requiring only a signature for security. Also in this building was the office of Dr. Garrett, who had delivered most of the babies in Eagleville for 40 years. Dr. Les Williams dry good and drug store where Dr. Williams always wore a suit and bow tie, and always showed class. Sneathen Bellenfant and sons operated the garage and service station on the corner. Crossing the Allisona Road, was a frame building where the Post Office and Russell Puckett's Grocery was located and Lowe's Hardware Store. The poolroom was the last building on the south end of the west side of the street.

This was the business area of this one-red light



I grew up and left home - first to college, then to the Army, followed by a job that required

me to live in five towns in two states. For several years, I've worked with many small towns as an employee of the Farmers Home Administration.

I now live many miles from Eagleville, but many times, through the years, Our Town has crossed my mind. The people were good people – the salt of the earth.

None of the 15 mentioned above are now alive, but all of them will live in my memory because they all were a part of Our Town, a town I truly love.

Many changes have occurred since 1951 when the Hatcher Family moved into the Eagleville Community. At one time Eagleville was a very busy place. Multiple grocery stores and service stations were operating along with other various

about half of the town. The big fire of 1952 destroyed Russell Puckett's Grocery, the Eagleville Post Office, which was located in the rear of Puckett's Store, Lowe's Hardware Store and a pool room, all on the west side of main street. In 1960, the Eagle Nest, a restaurant and unoccupied hotel, above the restaurant, located on the north end of Eagleville were consumed by fire. In September 2008 at this same site, another fire destroyed the Puckett Grocery Store. On May 3, 1971, another grocery store, Marshall's Grocery, burned to the ground. This large frame building also had previously housed Bud Walker's Barber Shop, Arthur Barnes' blacksmith shop and the upstairs apartment where the Barnes family had previously lived. Although the McRae Hotel wasn't mentioned in the above article, it was also destroyed by fire in 1963. It was located on a lot near the area Russell Puckett's Store and Post Office once stood. For many years especially in the late 1800's and early 1900's this was a very popular hotel for teachers and students of the prestige Savage School, which had students enrolled from out of state. At the time of the fire, the hotel was a family residence.

We can only imagine what our hometown would have been if it had not had the misfortune of the above fires. Hopefully it will again grow to be the busy little town, as in the past.



Healthy Pets, Healthy Family

a menagerie of animals from turtles, birds and lizards to dogs, cats, and horses

I have had my share of licks, bites, and scratches from the animal kingdom. My cat Jasper awakens every morning with one thing on his mind - playing. The problem, Jasper's eyes peel open between five and six in the morning searching for anything to fetch, throw, or chase. Before the fog in my head could clear a few mornings ago, Jasper returned with his toy of choice. As I rearranged myself beneath the covers, Jasper leaped into action as his imagination ran wild seeing my covered feet more interesting for interactive play. As quick as a blink, Jasper sprung high into the air as he pounced on my feet with all his might. On examination of my foot, I found a small cut; it did not cause much pain or concern so on with my day

There are few relationships in life that are as strong and unconditional as the bond with our pets. Our pets accept us unconditionally even if we are fat, skinny, sick, healthy, moody, and are there to bring us joy through thick and thin in the best and worst of times. Because of our pet's strong unconditional bond, they become a significant extension of our family and our health.

devoted unconditional The companionship we build with our pets is only the beginning of the benefits we reap from a human animal bond. According to Mayo Clinic cancer specialist, Dr. Edward Creagan, "seniors with pets have twenty one percent fewer physician visits, lower blood pressure and better coping skills." The US Department of Health concluded pets increased survival rates of heart attack victims by 28% vs. only 6% for non-pet owners. Other health benefits of pet ownership include: decreases in blood pressure, cholesterol and triglyceride levels and the feelings of loneliness while increasing opportunities for exercise, socialization and outdoor activities.

Obviously, there are many benefits to pet ownership. However, there are also risks our pets may transmit infections to their human families. The good news is, this does not happen often. Most pet-

Growing up with to-people diseases can be avoided if we follow a few common-sense rules.

- your veterinarian's recommendations on pet vaccinations and deworming
- Control flea and tick populations both in the home and on the pet
- Do not feed raw meat to your pet
- Do not allow your cat or dog to hunt or eat wild animals
- Keep your pet away from stray animals that may not be properly vaccinated
- Try not to touch urine or stool or objects soiled with urine or stool with your bare hands. Always wash your hands carefully including under the fingernails after contact with pet
- Avoid oral contact with your pet, especially sharing food or kissing your pet on the mouth
- Do not allow small children to play in uncovered sandboxes that might be used by cats as a litter box

It is important to minimize the risk of transferring germs from our pets to their human families. The cut on my foot I received from Jasper while playing, bought me a visit with my health care provider to get a tetanus booster and some antibiotics. It is important even with a small cut or bite to wash the wound with soap and water at least once or twice a day. Keep the wound clean and covered with a bandage. Watch for signs of infections such as redness, pain, red streaks, hot to the touch or drainage from the site; and seek medical attention immediately.

For a particular concern about your health and pet ownership contact a veterinarian. Please, be a responsible pet owner by properly vaccinating, deworming, and neutering your pet. Remember, your health and the health of your pet relies on using a little common sense.
