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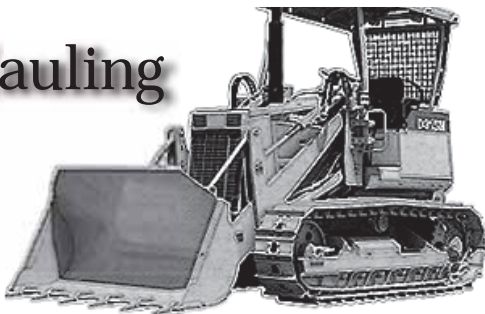

'SORGHUM MAKER' DIES IN PATTERSON – Funeral Rites Held for T. M. Patterson at Rehobeth Church-

Funeral services for T. M. Patterson, 80, prominent citizen of Patterson, who died at 3:40 o'clock Sunday morning were held at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the Rehoboth Methodist Church. The Rev. Ragsdale and the Rev. C. R. Cunningham were in charge of the services and the burial was in the cemetery at Triune, under direction of, Woodfin and Moore.

Mr. Patterson was recognized as the "champion sorghum maker of Middle Tennessee" through articles in the newspapers of Murfreesboro and Nashville. He was postmaster when an office was maintained at Patterson.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Jimmie Patterson, three daughters, Mrs. Mary Locke of Nashville, Mrs. Kate Maxwell and Mrs. Blanche Pate, all of Patterson and two sons, R. F. and R. L. Patterson, both of Patterson.

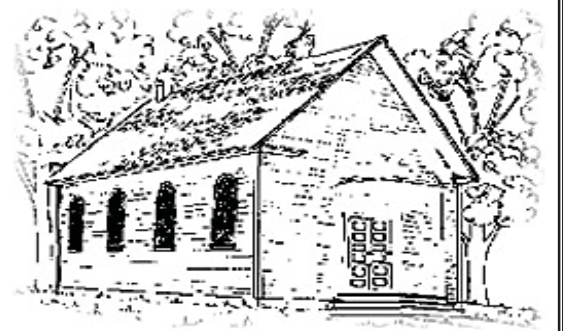

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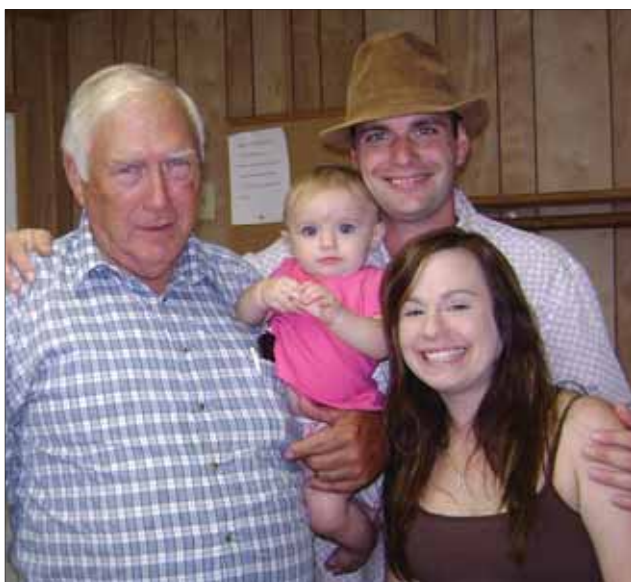
Richard Carlton born in 1720 with ancestral ties to Scotland and England spent some time in Chester, Pennsylvania before relocating to Craven County, North Carolina. In the 1750's, he received land grants for fighting in the king's army. Richard was the father of 12 known children. Later after the Revolutionary War, his son, Blake's children Benajah and Thomas H Carlton relocated to Tennessee in the early 1800's. These two grandsons of Richard Carlton are the ancestors of the Carlton's in Rutherford, Bedford, Williamson and others in Middle Tennessee.

Benajah Carlton came to Tennessee before the 1810 census and settled on land at the headwaters of the Overall Creek. This land has been identified as the current farm where Arnold and Marie Williams live on Windrow Road, however, at this time in history it sat on the county border of the newly formed county in 1803 of Rutherford. His children William, Blake, Kenion, Frances, Louisa, Nancy and Mary Ann were first generation born Tennesseans.

William Carlton born 1812, the first born to Benajah, married Emily Rucker and had three children. John Abner (b 1837) had one brother, Minos (or Milton) Benejah (b 1834) and one sister, Sarah Elizabeth (b 1842). Minos was a preacher and Tennessee Walking Horse trainer. Shortly after the formation of Bedford County, William was sheriff; he was killed at age 49 when his horse was spooked.

John Abner Carlton, (b 1837 d 1911) during his life, was a Confederate soldier, Baptist preacher, farmer, Rutherford County Trustee and oversaw the County Farm or more commonly called the "poor house". He married first Louisa Haynes and had 14 children and second to Lucinday Williams Kreuger and had 7 children, and third married Julia A Lamb, but had no more children. Lucinday Williams had one child, Caroline Kreuger with her first husband. The children of John Abner Carlton married into the local families of Rutledge, Williams, Hale, Drye, Burns, Shoemaker, Walden, Scales, Holton, Bennett, Morgan, Little, Boyce, Covington, White, Vaughn, and Simmons.

Carlton's have been known as fair-skinned, blue-eyed, usually blond and short to medium in stature, good-natured, affectionate, involved in their

communities and churches, and love to sing. It is a big extended family of descendants from the original two grandsons, Benajah and Thomas H, many of which maintain ties to Middle Tennessee. Through casual connections and research new connections to children of Richard Carlton b 1720, have led to many states and other original children descendant lines. Florida's governor in the 1920's, Doyle Elam Carlton, is one such connection found in the last several years.

The family of John Abner Carlton gathered often during his lifetime and upon his death in 1911 continued these gatherings. This year we mark the 100th anniversary of his passing as we gather for our family "Reunion" to remember loved ones and share news. We gather to celebrate our oldest relative and our newest member of this extended family on the Saturday before Labor Day each year.

Doctor, Doctor

I often find myself drifting into deep thought as I listen to people talk about how many doctors

they have and the number of prescription medications they are taking. Electronic medical records in theory will allow healthcare providers to view all the medications you have been prescribed, who prescribed them, and where and when you had them filled. My question is—do we want to relinquish our right to privacy to this degree? Relationships with a healthcare provider is privileged and private and patients should decide who has access to their records and when. In the coming months I will write an entire segment on electronic medical records and how government mandates will affect healthcare providers as well as patients.

Heath Ledger's performance as the Joker in *The Dark Knight* brought the Joker to a new level. His dedication and interpretation of the character was brilliant. Heath Ledger died on January 22, 2008, of an acute intoxication of prescription and over-the-counter medications including oxycodone, hydrocodone, diazepam, temazepam, alprazolam, and doxylamine. I often think of Ledger's case when I see patients with long list of medications and multiple doctors.

The other day I took care of a patient who had accidentally overdosed on a prescription pain medication. As I listened to the patient discuss the circumstances surrounding the overdose one thing mentioned haunted me, "The medication was prescribed by my doctor, I thought it

was safe." The patient's story caused me to think deeply about drug safety and how we seek medication to cure what ails us. This reminds me of a Chinese Proverb—"It is easy to get a thousand prescriptions but hard to get one single remedy."

How safe are prescription medications? The answer may surprise you. According to the American Pilots Association, the airline industry boast that a passenger would have to fly 438 years 24 hours a day to be involved in a fatal airline crash. Automobile accidents in the United States claimed 42,642 lives in 2006 (U. S. Census Bureau). In the same year (2006) 72,080 deaths involving prescription medications were reported by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. In comparison, in 1999 there were 46,523 deaths nationally involving prescription medication. These statistics highlight the need for community education to heighten awareness of the risk prescription and over-the-counter medications pose to community health.

Limiting the number of healthcare providers and pharmacies can help minimize the number of medications you are taking and possible harmful combinations. Discuss over-the-counter medications with your pharmacist or healthcare provider before adding any medication—regardless of how safe it may seem. Keep your healthcare provider in the loop by discussing plans for second opinions. Maintaining open communications with your healthcare provider is the safest way to protect your health.

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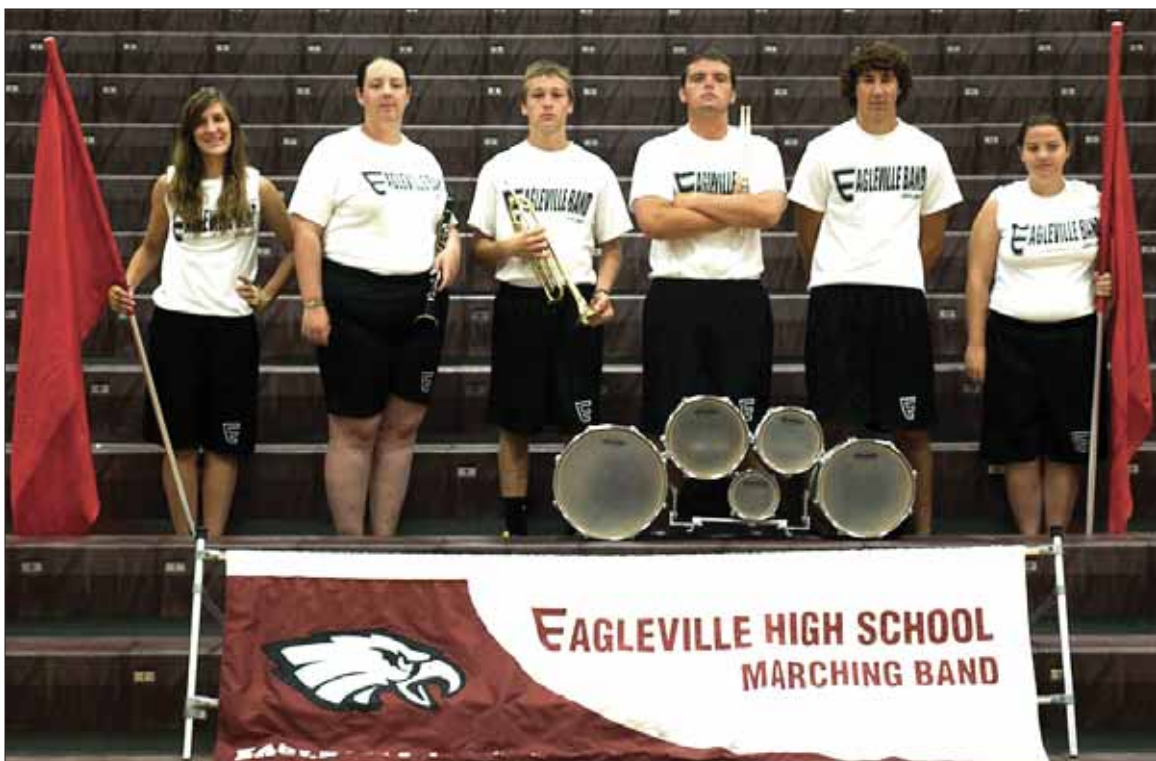
SUMMER BAND CAMP

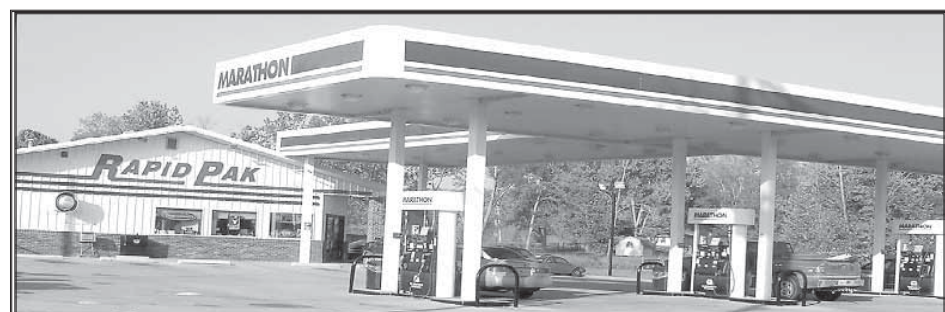

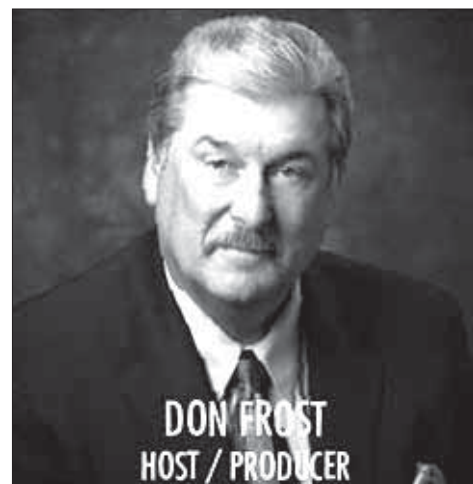

Murfreesboro Social Security Office to Begin Closing at 3:00 pm Daily

Congressional Budget Cuts Force Reduced Public Hours

Effective August 15, 2011, the Murfreesboro Social Security office will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. – a reduction of 30 minutes each weekday.

While agency employees will continue to work their regular hours, this shorter public window will allow them to complete face-to-face service with the visiting public without incurring the cost of overtime. Congress provided Social Security with nearly \$1 billion less than the President requested for the budget this fiscal year, which makes it impossible for the agency to provide the amount of overtime needed to handle service to the public as we have in the past.

Most Social Security services do not require a visit to an office. For example, anyone wishing to apply for benefits, sign up for direct deposit, replace a Medicare card, obtain a proof of income letter or inform us of a change of address or telephone number may do so at www.socialsecurity.gov or by dialing our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call our TTY number, 1-800-325-0778.

He could tell us when the first full moon would be, what the probability is of an airplane from Dulles flying over our island anytime in the next four years (zero), and the concentration of sulfur in our drinking water. We would have to curb his zealotry.

That was clearly my youngest son's job.) I have also been known to accidentally set my kitchen on fire; a skill which could come in handy when trying to alert passing ships of our presence.

When I awoke this morning, I decided that, in spite of our dubious survival skills, I would prefer not having to test them... ever. The prudent thing to do would be to avoid ships of any kind.

Teachers Who Make A Difference

When you were a child did a teacher do something that has helped shape your entire life? Mine did.

When I was in seventh grade my schoolmates and I had one teacher for grades six through eight. One day my teacher, Mrs. Anne Majors, gave me a sealed envelope and asked me to take it to my parents. My mother read the note and handed it to me. It said, "Make sure this child goes to college." I could tell from my mother's expression that she could not see beyond our poverty. If it happened, it would be up to me. So I resolved to go to college.

At that point in my life I knew no one who was in college. Not even all of my teachers had college degrees. I knew no person in my rural community who had attended college. In fact, most of my neighbors had not completed high school.

My parents were very poor. In the summer I did not have shoes. My underclothing and some of my shirts were homemade out of feed sacks. At school I bartered hen eggs for my lunch. So when my parents considered the note they were a bit dismayed.

Regardless of my poverty I was determined. I began working to earn money for college. My cousin gave me a job in a rock quarry. I cut locust trees and split them into fence post and sold them to farmers. I'm sure one farmer bought post

he didn't need and I will never forget him. I worked at a tannery and finally as a senior I worked at a factory where I helped make Naval practice bombs. I attended classes from 8:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. and worked in the factory from 4:30 p.m. until 1:00 a.m. Because I never forgot the encouragement from Mrs. Majors, I never lost sight of my goal. The most important thing she taught me was to simply overcome my heritage of poverty.

The encouragement from my teacher caused me to realize I could be a college graduate regardless of poverty. When I was ordained as a deacon, Mrs. Majors came to the ordination service. Shortly before her death I visited her in the hospital. I wondered how many lives she influenced. It is clear to me—she changed the course of my life.

Although most of the children in my elementary school had a heritage of poverty, none of us used drugs, had to contend with gangs or the violence that seems to be prevalent in so many schools today. None of us came from broken homes. Our parents were responsible adults. Most boys carried a pocket knife of some sort and knew how to shoot a gun, but we didn't take our guns to school. We respected our teachers.

Today teachers in our public school systems have a very difficult 'row to hoe.' They need our support and encouragement. Teachers who envision what children can overcome and what they can become are some of our nation's most valuable assets.

Immunizations Protect Children and Help Schools Remain Healthy

Believe it or not, it's already back to school time in Tennessee. An important part of all parents' preparation is making sure children's shot records are up to date. Children entering Kindergarten and 7th grade must get certain immunizations to attend classes, and the shots' record has to be an official state immunization certificate. Immunization certificates can be completed by a licensed Tennessee physician, advanced practice nurse, physician assistant or the local health department.

In 2010, the Tennessee Department of Health introduced a new immunization certificate and updated requirements for the first time in a decade. These changes brought Tennessee's requirements current and replaced four different forms with a single, multi-purpose certificate usable for childcare, preschool, and school age children.

Why does a child need to be immunized? Vaccines protect the vaccinated child and those who cannot be vaccinated. Students who are not immunized because of certain medical conditions or religious convictions rely on the protection of their classmates to shield them from these serious diseases. Vaccines required for school attendance are selected from among the vaccines recommended for all children to protect against serious diseases a child could encounter in a school or child care center.

When does a child need an immunization certificate? The youngest are children enrolled in child care centers or preschool. Generally, infants and toddlers have to be up to date on immunizations when they enroll. All children 18 months and older must have all the vaccinations needed for child care or

preschool. All new Kindergarten students and students new to Tennessee schools in other grades need one to enroll in school for the first time. When students transfer schools in Tennessee, the certificate follows in their student files.

All students about to start 7th grade also need a new immunization certificate because one new vaccine is required for them: Tdap. This tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis booster can prevent the spread of the very contagious cough illness, pertussis, after the vaccines of early childhood have worn off. New 7th graders also need a review of their immunity to chickenpox. These students must have had chickenpox illness or have had two doses of vaccine against it, since we now know some children are not protected by just one dose.

New full-time college students also must meet state immunization requirements, though they don't have to use the official state certificate. The requirements are intended to protect young adults from diseases that spread through the air in classrooms or dorms. Those born after 1956 must have had two doses of measles, mumps and rubella vaccine, and those born after 1979 must now provide their school with documentation of immunity to chickenpox-either a history of the disease or two doses of vaccine.

If your kids need an immunization certificate, consider it a good excuse for scheduling a comprehensive well child exam at the same time. Many older children, especially preteens and teens, miss out on complete annual physicals during those critical years. These exams are covered by TennCare and most insurance programs. 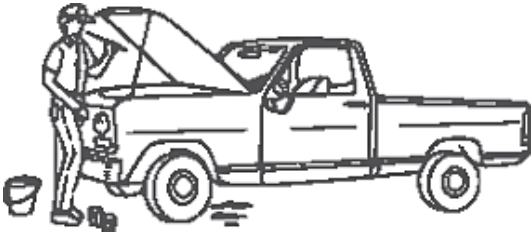

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Recipe Of The Week

Smoked BBQ Chicken Breasts on Creamy Spring Pasta

WHAT YOU NEED

1 cup KRAFT Original Barbecue Sauce
1/2 cup cider vinegar
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
2 Tbsp. soy sauce
8 small skinless chicken breast halves
8 oz. fettuccine, uncooked
1 pkg. (10 oz.) refrigerated Alfredo sauce (1 cup)
8 oz. fresh asparagus spears, tips removed, steamed
1/2 cup chopped roasted red peppers
1/4 cup thinly sliced fresh basil leaves
2 Tbsp. Shredded Parmesan Cheese

MAKE IT

MIX barbecue sauce, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce and soy sauce. Pour over chicken in resealable plastic bag; seal bag. Refrigerate 2 hours to marinate.

REMOVE chicken from marinade; discard bag and marinade. Cook chicken in smoker with a combination of apple, hickory and oak woods at 225°F for 30 to 45 min. or until chicken is cooked through (165°F). Remove chicken from smoker; cover. Let stand 50 min.

MEANWHILE, cook pasta as directed on package and heat sauce in large saucepan as directed on package. Stir asparagus, peppers and basil into sauce. Add pasta; toss to coat. Place pasta mixture on serving platter. Cut chicken into thin slices; place on top of pasta. Arrange asparagus tips around chicken; sprinkle with Parmesan cheese.

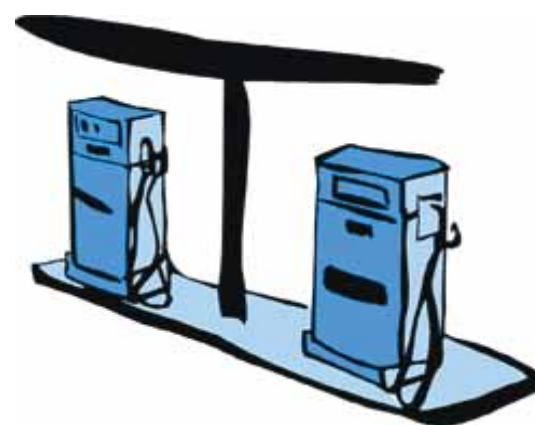
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
