CITIZEN OF THE MONTH Earl Carlton

Eighty-one year old, Earl Carlton, born in Rover, is a gentle-spoken man with a broad smile and playful humor. He got his start in the grocery/hardware/drygood business when he was just 11 years old, peddling wagon loads of supplies from his daddy's store in Jungletown. Peddling from door to door when those doors could be miles apart. When Earl Carlton was about 13, he drove an old truck all around Jungletown. "Everywhere I went, there was always a woman at home," he remembers of those long ago days before women stormed the workforce. He could count on them to buy eggs or something.

Carlton served with the Army Corps of Engineers in World War II, returning a D-Day hero in time to help his father, Clayton Carlton, sell the Jungletown store and then in 1946, opened the new business in Rover.

In 1963, when his father retired, Carlton started relying on the invaluable assistance of his wife, Lavada, in keeping the store. Married for 56 years, the couple have two children, Steve Carlton and Donna Belew. On May 14'

2001, Earl Carlton received his high school diploma form Central High School in Bedford County.

Carlton's General Store's long-time slogan, "We Sell Most Anything". Merchandise covers all but a few feet of wall space throughout the

General Store. Some of the inventory appears to have been there since the store opened in 1946. Most of the merchandise is still in the box it arrived in, pushed into a convenient spot where only Earl or Lavada knows. Carlton will confess that he and his wife waste no time worrying about the operation of their business. If he chooses to take a mid-day break from the store for a quick nap, he figures he's earned the break and Lavada is happy to relieve him.

A "general conference room" is located on the side of the store where folks come by to work over the world's situation, watch TV, whittle and talk.

Last October a wind storm took the

roof off the store but it wasn't long before Carlton was back in business.

An English Christmas

Christmas is my favorite time of the year and I have some happy memories of Christmas past spent on our family farm in Rocky Glade. We were a large clan and there was much visiting and interfamily activity at this time.

Christmas in England is celebrated in much the same way except for some of the customs, which go back into the mist of time. Our major event is the family dinner held on the weekend before Christmas Day in the Cotswolds. A beautiful area, which extends from the outer reaches of Greater London to Oxford and beyond. The landscape is similar to middle Tennessee with rolling hills and plenty of woodland.

It is dotted with typical English villages with names such as Duns Trew, Begbroke and Stow-on-the-Wold. My son Anthony lives in the area and he chooses and books one of the characterful pubs in one of the villages. On meeting we can relax in front of a roaring log fire and catch up on family news.

The Wassail Cup, a special Christmas punch is served which greatly enhances the art of gentle conversation! The best of English Pub Cuisine is enjoyed whilst listening to the carols, performed by a local group who donate their proceeds to charity. At some point the mummers arrive to perform a short play, usually in mime, as this ancient tradition is the forerunner to the modern day Pantomime. The modern day pantomimes are usually very lavish productions with stunning costumes and sometimes death defying stunts. They take place in all the major cities, with well-known actors and actresses playing the heroes and heroines, in stories like Cinderella, Peter Pan, and Jack and the Bean Stalk. You have to book well in advance to be able to get tickets for the productions. There are also many local Pantomimes performed by armature dramatic groups. After the festivities, presents are exchanged to be opened on Christmas Day.

We always put our Christmas decorations up in our house just before Thanksgiving, as we have all

the children and their families out one by one before Christmas and without the decorations it would be like any family meal, instead of a Christmas dinner with all the trimmings including the Christmas crackers at the side of your plate. Most of the grandchildren can't wait to crack the crackers and get their gifts from inside, read the funny joke and wear their Christmas paper hat.

Our proper Christmas starts at 11:30 pm Christmas Eve, when we attend Midnight Mass at our local Parish Church, St. Peter's. The Waltham Abbey Monks built the Church in 1180. This is accompanied by Candlelit carols performed by the choir.

After the service, which lasts about 1½ hours it is home for a Christmas snack and maybe a glass of mulled wine (the wine is warmed and herbs are added to it and simmered for 15 minutes) to insure sound sleep, only interrupted by the arrival of St. Nicholas or if said very fast over and over "Santa Claus"!

The traditional Christmas dish use to be roast beef or goose but now days most people have turkey. We are having goose this year and turkey on Boxing Day, when my son and his family are coming to celebrate the festivities for the day and night. With the beef or turkey, we have Yorkshire pudding, a pastry rather like a soufflé. In Yorkshire it is served as a first course. It is a tradition to have brussell sprouts as one of your vegetables. I don't know why! Christmas pudding follows the main dish, and if you're lucky, you may find a sixpence in it! There are plenty of mince pies. In days gone by they were filled with meat but now they are sweet, filled with mixed fruit and suet.

After Christmas dinner there is just enough time for a quick nap before the Queen's Speech at three o'clock. This is filmed from either Buckingham Palace or Windsor Castle a few weeks before Christmas; it is of brief duration during which the Queen wishes her subjects a very merry Christmas and a Happy New Year. She relates one or two high points of the past year and expresses her hopes for the coming

ear.

The day after Christmas, the Feast of St. Stephen's, the first Christian Martyr is known as Boxing Day. It is a public holiday and the term derives from the opening of the Church poor boxes and the money being distributed to the poor on that day. Today, some people still adhere to Boxing Day by giving a gift of money to those who provide a service throughout the year. We give a Christmas Box to our dustmen who collect our rubbish each week and our post woman.

Christmas, the festival of Christ, is a wonderful time and is celebrated throughout the World. A time for reconciliation, a time

of appreciation, of our family, our communities and the many blessings bestowed upon us.

So, wherever you are, enjoy Christmas and be merry! It is a time to rejoice!

In the summer of 2001, my husband Fred and I along with Ms. Judy and Katie Cook went to Lebanon, Tennessee to do pony rides for Empower Me Day Camp. We were all blessed with unique kids taking turns riding ponies. As one of the riders, who had cerebral palsy finished her turn, she asked, "Did they see me do it? Our hearts were tremendously touched that day. We soon started making plans for the center.

"Did they see me do it?" Center is located at 341 Floyd Road, here in Eagleville. The facility consist of a seven stall barn with an indoor and outdoor arena. The center has 5 ponies and 1 horse that are in the process of being trained to respect the challenging task of therapeutic riding students.

DTSMDI? Center has applied for 501[c]3. The center will be financed by donations and fund raising events. On December the 12th and 13th a yard sale will be held at the center from 8 am to 3 pm each day to help with start up cost. Any items that anyone would like to donate can be dropped off at the center or can be picked up by request.

Our goal at the DTSMDI?C is to make a difference in children's daily lives that are physically, mentally or emotionally challenged, by providing them with recreational riding, independence, and self esteem.

Volunteers are very crucial to our program. Some of the jobs that volunteers are needed for are in administration such as fund raising, volunteer management, health professionals and

newsletters. Other choices are leading a horse during a lesson, side walking with a student, floaters, barn buddies (junior volunteers, ages 12 and up for assistance in cleaning stalls and grooming before a lesson starts, and to ride ponies once a week) stable management, grounds and maintenance or becoming a certified instructor.

By volunteering you can help support the center in making a difference in a child's life.






After a tiring day, the Troop cooked their favorite meal of steak and baked potato and finished the evening






