EASY RED VELVET CAKE

1 pkg. (18 1/4 ozs) fudge marble cake mix

1 teaspoon baking soda

2 eggs

1 ½ cups buttermilk

1 bottle (1 oz) red food coloring

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

FROSTING

5 tablespoons all-purpose flour


1 cup milk

1 cup butter or margarine, softened


1 cup sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

In a mixing bowl, combine contents of cakes mix and baking soda. Add eggs, buttermilk, food coloring and vanilla; blend on low until moistened. Beat on high speed for 2 minutes. Pour into two greased and floured 9-in. round cake pans. Bake at 350° for 30-35 minutes or until a toothpick inserted near the center comes out clean. Cool for 10 minutes; remove from pans to a wire rack to cool completely. For frosting, whisk flour and milk in a saucepan until smooth. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened. Cover and refrigerate. In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add chilled milk mixture; beat for 10 minutes or until fluffy. Stir in vanilla. Frost between layers and top and sides of cake. **Yield**: 12 servings.

Citizen of the Month

Edward Lee Manier has been a lifelong resident of Eagleville. Most people remember him as the Manager of Eagleville Co-Op for over 37 years. He is also known in Eagleville for his dedication and activity in the Eagleville United Methodist church for the past 52 years. The Manier's are among the oldest families that have been residing in Eagleville since the early 1800's.

Edward Lee was born November 9, 1929; just eighteen days after the stock market crashed. This was known as the "Great Depression" years and times were hard, jobs were few and money was scarce. He was born in Jacksonville, Alabama where his mother and father were both teachers at the State College. The State of Alabama went bankrupt and could not afford to pay the teachers, so his parents packed up all their belongings and moved back to Eagleville on his Grandmother's farm. At age three, he still remembers that long journey to Eagleville, wedged in the car between pots and pans and all of their belongings.

His Grandmother had a big farmhouse on North

Edward in the 1950's in the henhouse.

Lane where they all lived. His parents had three other children, plus Edward, which pretty much filled up the whole house. He remembers his parents owning a Dodge car that had to stay parked in a shed for three to five years in the early thirties. They had no money to buy gas, so they traveled by horse and buggy when they needed to go to town.

At the age of ten, Edward Lee became a Christian at Mt Pleasant Baptist Church. He has spent his whole life serving the Lord in his words and actions. He has always strived to make Jesus the number one priority in his life, which is reflected by his integrity and character.

Growing up, he remembers the biggest events in Eagleville as when the "Traveling Medicine Shows" came to town, entertaining and selling their medicines. When the Traveling Circus came to town was another cause for excitement. They set up big tents and had elephants, zebras and camels and it was a fun-filled and fascinating. He also remembers the Goat Man. He was a man who came through town every three or four years with three or four goats pulling him in an old wagon, with lots of other goats surrounding them.

Edward's childhood was filled with adventures and he loved the great outdoors. He spent many days riding bikes, fishing and swimming. Nighttime was for frog gigging, star gazing and camping on the creek bank with neighborhood friends, eating meals of fried hog jowl, eggs and hot water cornbread.

When he was twelve years old, he raised peanuts and melons to sell at a roadside stand he made. He had many customers around that would frequent his stand. He also grew popcorn to sell at the Eagleville Basketball games.

Edward Lee lived "Down in the Swamps"

until he was fourteen years old and then they moved to the "Cedars" on Mt Vernon Road. In 1946, he became a partner with his dad starting a Grade A Dairy and did this for 22 years. He milked 35 cows a day, getting up at 4:00 am every morning. They also raised hogs and sheep and farmed the land. He continued the Dairy Farm with



his dad until 1968, then switched over to beef cattle.

He attended Eagleville School and graduated in 1947 with 14 others in his class. He served as the President of the Eagleville Senior Boys 4-H club involved with beef, cattle and sheep projects. During the second World War, Edward Lee's father was a school teacher at Eagleville and was also a School Bus Driver, delivering 25 children. Edward Lee substituted driving the bus many times even before he was 15 years old. He rebuilt the bus motor when he was 14 years old and continued to use it for six more years.

In the 1950's, he and his father operated a henhouse with 1,000 laying hens. His father went to Nashville and peddled the eggs door-to-door, house-to-house for .60 a dozen. Working with the chickens was time consuming but profitable and they did this for 12 to 15 years.

After graduating from high school, he attended college at MTSU. Tuition was \$35 a quarter and you could get a college degree for around \$1,000.

We were busy, but Ed was not so busy that he couldn't be an instrument of grace and comfort to someone who needed reassuring. Pastor Trey says: "When the history books are written, the writers will probably be in a scramble amid the chaos. The world is a busy place, you know. Someone might not get around to saying it, so I want to say it now: Edward Lee Manier is one of the best human beings that you will ever meet. I am thankful that I have had the opportunity."



EAGLEVILLE HIGH SCHOOL - Part 2

In the early 1900's Eagleville was very fortunate to have an excellent education opportunity for the children in the area. In Eagleville School, known as the Savage School, enrollment was increasing as well as in the several smaller schools in the area. The Rutherford County High School Board began making plans for the future. In 1912 the Board purchased approximately 5 acres of land on the Eagleville and Salem Pike (same location as the present school) for future planning to build a new school. At this time the members of the Rutherford County High School Board were: A. L. Todd, J. D. Jacobs, M. A. Sanders, J. C. Ransom, J. P. Leathers, H. C. Taylor and H. W. Burk. The land was purchased from J. E. and Emma Sullivan, J. D. Sullivan, Robert Sullivan and H. W. Sullivan. The price paid was \$1000.00. A portion of the deed stated: The above described parcel of land is to be used by said High School Board upon which to erect a school building for the education of the white children of Eagleville and the immediate vicinity, the money to erect said building having been subscribed by the people of Eagleville, and it is agreed that, in the event the above described land and building, or the proceeds, in the event the same should be sold, should ever cease to be used for school purposes at Eagleville, then said property or the proceeds thereof, shall revert to the donors of said fund, or their representatives. The deed was signed 22 July 1912.

In 1914 the consolidation with area schools: Simmons, Greenwood, Mt. Vernon and Little Rock, all one-teacher schools, the Rutherford County High School Board saw the need for a new building and proceeded with their plans.

The new Eagleville High School, a two-story concrete and stucco building was completed in 1915. Classrooms were on the main floor. The Smith-Hughes Act provided teachers for the home economics and agriculture classes, which met in the basement. The home economics room had a kitchen with

tables that the students used for eating their lunches that was brought from home. When the weather was bad, the students also would have playtime in the home economics room. Mrs. May Taylor of Eagleville started to school in this school building and remembers one of their favorite outside games to play was scrub. It was played with a ball and bat and the game was similar to baseball or softball, but all students who wanted to play could until they were gotten out. The students weren't divided into teams but played individually. She remembers having a lot of fun playing this game.

The children from closed schools were transported by wagon and then by bus to Eagleville. The first drivers were R. W. Carlton, Hessie Bennett and Will Cole. Mr. Bennett continued driving for thirty-nine years.

Principals in this building were:
Johnie Lou John D. Wiseman, later an attorney in F. (Bill) Shel Nashville, J. D. McFarlin, Frank Jarrell,
Kenneth Warren, Frank Hines, Clyde Richards and J. J. Northcott. Among the teachers was W. L. Foster,
Mary Owen, Mrs. Scott (Lady Mary) Williams, Mary Dudley Williams, Mary Murphy and Maye Leming who taught home economics.

Pupils continued to graduate from the tenth grade until a third year of high school was added in 1920. The school became a four-year high school in 1921. That year there were two graduates.

In 1921 Dr. E. L. Williams was Board Member, A. P. Elmore and Jim Taylor were the magistrates and Neal Elrod was County

School Superintendent.

In August 1923, on Tuesday night, two days after the




Bottle From School Makes it Overseas

Community School is so very active and there is so much to tell. However, this month we will highlight on one very special story to share with you. As some of you may recall, last year 2003 somewhere around April I beleive we wrote a story labeled " MORE THAN A MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE". It was all about one little boy named Randy Nolan who wanted to share his idea of putting a message in a bottle in the ocean for someone to find. Three classes total took part in the project and lots of tiny little bottles were made up. The bottles were split up and half were sent to his Great Grandparents Dave and Helen Staples of Sprucehead Maine and the other half sent to his Great Aunt Debi and Great Uncle Paul of Land O Lakes Florida. The bottles sent to Maine made it to the ocean with the help of a Sterman (thats a lobstermans helper) by the name of Mr. Cortney and some visiting kids at a local lighthouse at Breakwater point. Over the summer a few post cards were received where someone had found a bottle. One was found by a little girl from Rockport Maine named Jenifer Karod. She also sent the school a post card picture of the area. Unfortunately, due to local environmental issues, the bottles could not be put in the ocean in Florida. But the bottle message did make an incredible journey across seas. How did one little bottle make that journey? Through Great Uncle Paul Theriault is how. Over the summer he contacted his son who is with an MP K9 unit serving in Iraq. Thus a new and exciting project evolved from this message being delivered. News traveled back to

Mrs. Casey Murphree at the school and to Randy's mom and a new project called "OPERATION: MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE" began. The students and teachers partisipating in the Operation have been busy writing letters to the soldiers and collecting items to go in care packages. The first letters and packages are already on there way to soldiers stationed in Iraq and in Faluga. The name of the soldier who helped get this amazing Operation off the






ground is Sergeant Chad Theriault who is with the MP K9 unit. He was deployed from Germany after being there almost three years and has been in Iraq for several months. His narcotic MP K9 dog's name is Bak, a black German Shepard. Bak's job is to keep watch over the detention centers in Camp Bucca. " It was named Camp Bucca after the last name of the

father of an Army soldier who was killed in the World Trade Center attacks" Said Theriault in a previeous interveiw in Florida. Sergeant Chad got a long overdue visit with his father recently sometime in September before having to return to overseas duties. It has been alot of work organizing the Operation. It started out having each class partispiating to decorate a 2 or 3 liter soda bottle to collect change to go towards items for the care packages and for postage to mail everything. Mrs. Susan Nolan and Mrs. Kim Mack set out to calling diferent busniesses for help and picking up donations. Mrs. Casey Murphree helped oraganize the Teachers and get things rolling at the school so that they could try and send the first mail out by the end of October. Happy to say that even though most places could only donate small items or gift cards etc. they only got a few no's out of all the phone calls made. Everyone wether they beleived in the war or not or wether they were Democrat or Republican wanted to help the kids with the OPERATION: MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE" . But you may want to get a kleenex for this,, The kids brought in over 95 % of the change in the bottles for the project and 100% of the items for the care packages. The kids even remembered the K9 dogs when bringing in items. They brought in so much stuff and were so excited about it that it took Mrs. Murphree, Mrs. Mack and Mrs. Nolan all three, 3 days to put the packages together and to mail them off from the post office. "The boxes were heavy, but we carried them in and piled them up at the Unionville Post Office and cheered when they were all stamped, la-







beled and sent on there way" says Mrs. Kim Mack. A special shipment of boxes were sent to a Chaplain serving at the 86th combat support hospital. Mrs. Murphree's class adopted the unit and worked extra hard to collect extra items to send. Some of the soldiers are SPC Austin Read, SGT. Chuck Fuller, PFC. Regina Stinemetz, SPC Alen Hamlin, PFC. Ben Herbest, SPC. Joshua Bowles, PFC. Bradley Magee, PFC. Jeremy McPhee, SSG. Gunnar Pedersen, and Chaplain David Snyder. Gunner Sakich 6 yrs old says he is having fun doing the soldier project and he wants to see the soldiers. Courtney Mack 5 yrs old says" I love the project, we sent them cookies and toothebrushes and we drew them a picture so they can smile. And they have backpacks like we do." Jonathon Griffin 5 yrs old says" I like the soldiers and I want to see them too and we got 10 100 50 monies and I write to them to make them happy." U.S. Marine Reserves Corporal Timothy Butler who just returned from Iraq came to the school to give some of the students encouragement and to talk to them about what a great thing they were doing by writing to the soldiers. Not only has this Operation made the students more aware of things around the world but they have used the Operation to work on there writing skills as well, how to properly address a letter etc. They have all ask some great questions and have worked really hard on decorating the collection bottles and there letters. Some classes even made pictures for the soldiers and one class even made a big poster with hand prints on it for them to share with other soldiers. If you would like to help the students with there "Operation Message in a Bottle", you can make donations at Union Planters Bank in Eagleville where a bottle is set up. Or you can contact the school. Congratulations to Brianna Schemahorn 5th grade, Mr. Myrick's class for finding the mispelled word for last month. A correction to an earlier story, the 25 \$ room fee is used for several items, but not for school lunches. If you have any further questions concerning this matter you should contact your local school board or child's school. Hope this clears that matter for those questioning. Please remember to come out to the basketball games and support your school. Community school wants to thank WSMV Snowbird for coming to the school to read books to the title 1 group. 

College Grove Senior Enrichment Center Honors Mr. and Ms. Senior of 2004










