City Of Eagleville Council Meeting December 4, 2008

Here are Some Highlights of December's City Council Meeting:

- A motion was made to suspend the rules in regard to adoption of the new agenda after Councilman Wes Fitzgerald added new business to the council's agenda; suggesting that an Employee Oversight Committee be formed.
- An Employee Oversight Committee was passed upon suspension of the rules. The new committee will be comprised of 2 council members who will begin work on a written personnel policy and procedures manual for all city of Eagleville employees. This committee will also assess employee performance for any bonuses, raises, etc. and will make its recommendations to the City Council.
- Council members Sam Tune and Alan Ball will be making up the Employee Oversight Committee. These members
 will serve on this committee until end of office, unless otherwise voted out by the city council.
- The City Council appointed Ronnie Hill to serve as Vice-Mayor
- Resolution 08-06 Codification of Ordinances was passed, which created much discussion later in the meeting surrounding the whereabouts of the current ordinance book for the city of Eagleville. The hard copy (original) ordinances seem to still be in possession of the TBI, leading Councilman Sam Tune to ask: "How is the city • of Eagleville to operate business and keep ourselves out of trouble if we don't know what the ordinances are?" Mayor Barham assured everyone that the city will get the ordinances back and, "so far, nothing has come up that we can't handle". Meanwhile, Councilman Harold Vincion will try and retrieve the ordinances that were placed on the old city website in order to give each council member a hard copy for reference. City Recorder Colleen Adams will be contacting the TBI for an inventory of what exactly they took

- during the investigation, since she had only been on the job 3 days when the investigation arose. Codification of the ordinances can be a very lengthy process, with the waiting list being 6 months alone. The city of Eagleville will be responsible for half of the money (\$1,500) up front and Mayor Barham is hopeful that since Eagleville is a smaller city, things may be expedited more quickly.
- Vice-Mayor Ronnie Hill requested that he take over talks with Sheriff Truman Jones regarding the placement of a potential Rutherford County Sheriff's Department substation in the Eagleville branch of Regions Bank. Vice-Mayor Hill hopes to have an update to share with the council in January.
- Mayor Barham will be conducting an inventory of files at City Hall and will have a report at the January meeting
- Mayor Barham stated the only update he had regarding the investigation of the former City Recorder was that the next scheduled court date is December 18th, 2008. Vice-Mayor Hill added that he had been in contact with Eagleville City Attorney Adam Dodd and explained that no deals would be made prior to the city of Eagleville hearing back from the nearly \$40,000 claim submitted to Traveler's Insurance.
- The Verizon Wireless contract for the City of Eagleville has been renegotiated, resulting in an \$80 drop in the monthly bill, which is currently around \$197.00. City employees/officials Mayor Barham, City Recorder Colleen Adams, and Fire Chief David Martin currently utilize phones under the present Verizon plan. The bill also includes a wireless card for Fire Chief David Martin's laptop. Park Director Jeff Mooneyham also utilizes a citymaintained cell phone, which is not part of the Verizon service plan.

City Council Meetings are scheduled the 4th Thursday of each month at 7:00 pm at City Hall. The next meeting is scheduled for January 22nd.

Planning Commission Meetings are scheduled the 1st Monday of each month at 6:30 pm at City Hall. The next meeting is scheduled for December 18th.



After the sale of some property on the north end of Eagleville where a Dollar General Store being is under construction, a lot of interest arose about the lands' previous owners.

McCord property borders this section of land on the north, highway 41A "Main Street" on the east, Puckett property (burned grocery store) on the south and Eagleville Baptist Church and McCord property on the west.

In 1868 this property, was part of 196.5 acres of land given as a wedding present to Dr. William Harrison and Sarah Macon Williams McCord by Sarah's parents, James Chesley and Elizabeth Jordan Williams.

Dr. McCord graduated from the University of Louisiana and did graduate work at the College of Surgeons in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He was a surgeon for F&S 13th Calvary, CSA and was a private in Captain Jackson's Tennessee Calvary. One day he fell behind his company when having some boots made. As he rode to rejoin his troops, the Yankees captured him. His bodyguard, a loyal slave who served him throughout the war, accompanied him. He presented his credentials as a doctor and surgeon and was told by his capturers that they could use him, and would see that no harm came to him if he would give them his new boots and go with them to the hospital. Needless to say, he gave no opposition.

In 1882 Dr. McCord built his family home, which is presently the home Don and Ray Anne McCord, 475 N. Main Street, Eagleville. Don is a great grandson of Dr. and Mrs. William Harrison McCord.

Dr. and Mrs. McCord had five children: Elizabeth, William Edward, John Harrison "Tip", Emmette Allen and Annie V.

On the property recently acquired by Montgomery G. Turner, of Nashville, Dr. McCord had built a flourmill and sawmill in the late 1880's or early 1890's. After the death of Dr. McCord, in 1896, Joshua M. Johnson acquired the "Mill Lot" property. About this time, Alfred Pinkney, "A. P." Elmore moved to Eagleville and began operating the flourmill and sawmill, renting the businesses from Mr. Johnson for several years, acquiring ownership in 1914. Several brands of flour were made – White Rose Flour, Magnolia Flour and Choice Bolted Flour. Custom grinding was also done. In a 1904 advertisement - A. P. Elmore, Proprietor Rowena Mills. High-grade roller flour "Straight" "XXX" and 'White Rose". Custom sawing solicited; am prepared to dress and finish for use flooring, ceiling and siding on short notice. A. P. Elmore also operated a feed store and was also a Magistrate, holding court in the feed store. He also operated A. P. Elmore's Creamery, buying milk and cream from area farmers. His home was located in the area of the Candle Shop, between Eagleville Drug Store and the Crosslin Supply building. A. P. Elmore married first, Mary Anna Owen and had three children: Jessie Virginia Elmore, Alfred Pinkney Elmore Jr. and Urbane Robertson Elmore. His second wife was Lou Ida Clardy who died in 1931 and his third wife was Ida Buck.

In 1917, part of the "Mill Lot" property again sold to a new owner, J. E. Jackson, who began operating the Flour Mill. Jerry Jackson said that the first flour his dad ground landed on the floor as no sack had been put in place to catch the flour. It's un-

known if others operated the mill before it was destroyed by fire in 1929.

In December 1919, Mr. J. E. Jackson sold a small lot and house on the north end of the "Mill Lot" to Charlie Little and his wife Mary Ann. Mr. Charlie was a man of small statue, who seemed to always have a cigar in his mouth. He was a livestock trader and worked for Frank Crosslin at one time. Mrs. Little was one of the charter members of the Eagleville Methodist Church. They had three children; Vantrese, Helen and Urban.

Vantrese Little graduated from Eagleville High School in 1932 and attended the State Teachers College in Murfreesboro. She taught at the Tennes-

see Industrial School in Nashville. She married James Scott Russell and made her home in Florida. Vantrese opened her home as a non-profit institute for brain damaged children and received the Child Advocate of the year award from the National Caring Institute Award in Washington D. C. Vantrese and James were parents of seven children.

Nancy Helen Little graduated from Eagleville High School in 1937 and attended Nashville Business College. She married Albert Carmack Howell and lived in Jasper, Alabama and later in Columbia Tennessee where she retired from Maury Regional Hospital. Helen and her husband had two sons, A. C. Howell Jr. and Greg Howell.

Urban Little, born 1923, attended high school at Eagleville. He joined the Navy and after retirement, he worked for the Police Dept in Nashville. He had two children, a son and daughter.


Mrs. Little died in 1956 and in 1957, Mr. Charlie sold his home and property to Howard Marshall. During the Marshall ownership, the house was rental property. Mr. Charlie lived with his sisters, Nettie, Eugenia and Maude in the Little home place on Church Street. The house later burned. Mr. Charlie later lived in Florida with his

daughter, Vantrese. He died in 1965 and is buried in the Russell Cemetery in the Little family plot.

In 1960 Howard Marshall sold the "Little" property to Jess McElhaney who planned to build a service station at this location. Soon after acquiring this property, another service station operator on the south end of Eagleville, Eddie Blanton, decided to sell

out and move his auto supply business to Murfreesboro. McElhaney purthis chased property and in 1964, sold "Little" property Powell D. Taliaferro and his wife, Blanche.

In about 1940, Miss Mary Sue Clardy, who was born in

1880, daughter of Henry and Martha J. Edmonds Clardy, built a small frame house on part of the "Mill Lot" property, next to the" Charlie Little" property. She had lived alone on the family farm on Floyd Road until she was robbed and became afraid to live there. It was rumored that she kept large amounts of money on the premises. Miss Mary Sue, who never married, was well known for the dark bonnets she wore. Her sister, Lou Ida "Tiny" was the second wife of A. P. Elmore, one of the owners of the Eagleville Flour Mill. After the death of Miss Mary Sue in 1953, Urban Elmore, son of A. P. and Mary Anna Owen, inherited her home and lot. The house was later moved to a location on Allisona Road and the property was sold to Powell Taliaferro.

There was also a house that was located




on a small lot next to the Eagleville Baptist Church that was part of the original "Mill Lot". This property also changed ownership several times and was also rental property before the house was destroyed by fire. It was also acquired by the Taliaferros.

Although, the original "Mill Lot" was di-

vided, and each piece of land sold several times, it was brought back together by Powell and Blanche Taliaferro. Mr. Montgomery Turner acquired the original "Mill Lot" from John Powell Taliaferro, son of Powell and Blanch Taliaferro. In old records and deeds, this property will always be known

as the "Mill Lot" but in future years will probably be referred to as the "Dollar General Store" property.

(Some of the deeds from land transfers of the above property could not be located in county records in order to verify all the owners and length of ownership)

For those of you unable to attend this year's event, here's a "little glimpse" inside each home:

The residence of Meredith Cunningham was truly where Eagleville met the North Pole, as Possible Dream and Jim Shore Santas could be found throughout the home. An impressive collection of whimsical artwork by P. Buckley Moss, adorned many of the walls in the home, most of which, were holiday themed.

The Lockard residence featured 2 beautiful antique statues in the parlor, rescued from the childhood home of Russ's mother during a WWII bombing of London, England. Amazingly, the statues were 2 of the only things that were not destroyed from the attack, and now find their home in Eagleville after making the long trek from England.

An amazing place to visit and rich in local history, was the Old Rover School House, residence of Wendall and Judy Rowland. Many family heirlooms and keepsakes that made for great conversation could be found throughout this expansive home. Mr. Rowland was even able to show guests where his desk used to be, (right under the current location of their cedar Christmas tree), when he attended school there in the 3rd grade. Old marbles, lost years ago in the schoolyard, and then uncovered during renovations, were also on display.

The Morrell residence, a historic antebellum built in 1827 on a Revolutionary War grant, had antique furnishings throughout, including an Empire couch, thought to be an original out of the Carnton House in Franklin, TN. Original mantles and banister were flanked with live greenery, keeping in the holiday tradition of its original time period.

The Carey residence, a beautifully restored farmhouse built originally as a log home structure in the 1820's, was decorated in an old-fashioned theme, using live greenery throughout. Pieces of the original home were strategically recycled throughout, including the family room fireplace reconstructed with rocks original to the farm, and mantle from old ceiling timbers. An apartment over the garage houses Milk Barn Pottery, owner Rhonda Carey's pottery studio, complete with displayed holiday pieces



Getting Ready for Santa

Stockings Were Hung by the Chimney with Care

Easy Sugar Cookies

2 ½ cups all-purpose flour 1-teaspoon baking soda ½ teaspoon baking powder 1½ cups white sugar 1-teaspoon vanilla extract

1 cup butter, room temperature and softened

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a small bowl stir together flour, baking soda, and baking powder. Set aside. In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugar until smooth. Beat in egg and vanilla. Gradually blend in the dry ingredients. Roll rounded teaspoonfuls of dough into balls, and place onto greased cookies sheets. Bake 8 to 10 minutes in preheated oven, or until golden. Let stand on cookies sheet two minutes before removing to cool on wire racks. Decorate with icing, sprinkles, jimmies, etc.
