Also in the line up was a 1930 Model A Ford driven by Gary Reed and a 1939 Chevrolet driven by Tim Quigly.

A crowd favorite were the motorcycles from the Baptist Men Riding Group, Murfreesboro Hog Chapter, Bumpus Harley Davidson and Rolling Thunder, who shared the road that day, some honoring MIA and POW's. Some

Slower moving traffic included groups of Horse Back Riders out for an afternoon ride through the festivities with riders young and old. The horses sported their own outfits of red and green, some with poinsettia accent. One horse even had red sparkling hooves in the front and green hind ones.

American farmers and ranchers literally help feed the world by producing a bounty of agricultural products. To do this, we must rely on essential partnerships with urban and suburban communities to supply, sell and deliver finished products across the country and around the globe.

Recently, the Rutherford County Farm Bureau Women's Leadership Committee began an initiative to enlarge our territory and work together to spread the good news about agriculture through our local schools. A Farm City Week event was sponsored at the Farm Bureau Building at 818 South Church Street to form partnerships through local school administrators and teachers. All principals or their representatives were invited to attend and receive information through demonstrations, handouts, displays and personal interactions. Our organization provides a lending library, demonstrations, programs, handouts and hands-on education for all ages. Subjects are diverse and include planting of seeds, beekeeping, soil and water environmental concerns and gardening which are tailored to the age group involved.

Ag in the Classroom activities and grants can also be obtained through the local Farm Bureau. Our partner organizations also offer individualized programs on milk, beef, pork, chickens and horse care. candy hearts along with crayon messages of what nurses mean to him. During those times, I understand what nursing is and the impact we have on another life during moments of weakness when one's chin quivers under the weight of his world. I will never forget that somber day as I watched a little boy walk hand in hand with his father after their lives were changed forevermore. My drive home that day was filled with dark images flashing through my mind as I had become silent and numb in search of the Joy of Christmas.

I realize that happiness and joy does not come elaborately wrapped and placed under a tree, but instead, comes from the heart and in a moment when we connect with what is really important in life. The gift of health is so fragile and precious, and yet most people take it for granted. The loss of health doesn't affect just the afflicted; it stirs many emotions and impacts many lives for generations to come. For me, the meaning of Christmas is about a smile, a chuckle in one's heart, the warmth of family, and being healthy. Take the time this holiday season to be kind to one another, to smile, to laugh, and to exchange good tidings.

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BEATING THE HOLIDAY BLUES

TIPS FOR MAKING THE SEASON BRIGHTER

For many people, the holiday season is a time for visiting friends, exchanging gifts and simply enjoying the hustle and bustle of shopping malls and seasonal festivities. But for others, the season is not so blissful, especially during tough economic times. It is not uncommon for people to feel down, low, and without energy, suffering from a condition labeled the "holiday blues."

Unlike other forms of depression, the "holiday blues" last only a brief period of time, usually surfacing around Thanksgiving and continuing through New Year's Day. Three main factors contribute to the onset of holiday depression:

Relationships. People often feel alone or isolated during the holidays for different reasons including separation from loved ones or a loss of family members or friends. Family issues can often intensify during the holiday season, often times bringing on unwanted conflict. These relationship triggers can also be accompanied by unresolved grief or anger. Also, as people age, they may start feeling more alone as they look back and remember past holidays shared with family and friends.

Finances. Purchasing gifts, traveling and attending holiday parties may put a larger dent in the pocket book during the holidays than at other times of the year. During the holiday season, these increased financial expectations may cause individuals to feel unwanted stress. Economic conditions, including the state of the real estate market and high unemployment rates, are added concerns.

Physical Demands. Physical stress may be increased by events such as shopping

at crowded malls, preparing large dinners, and attending multiple holiday events. People often ignore their healthy lifestyle habits this time of year by indulging in high-calorie holiday foods, neglecting their normal exercise routine, and not attending to personal needs for rest and sleep.

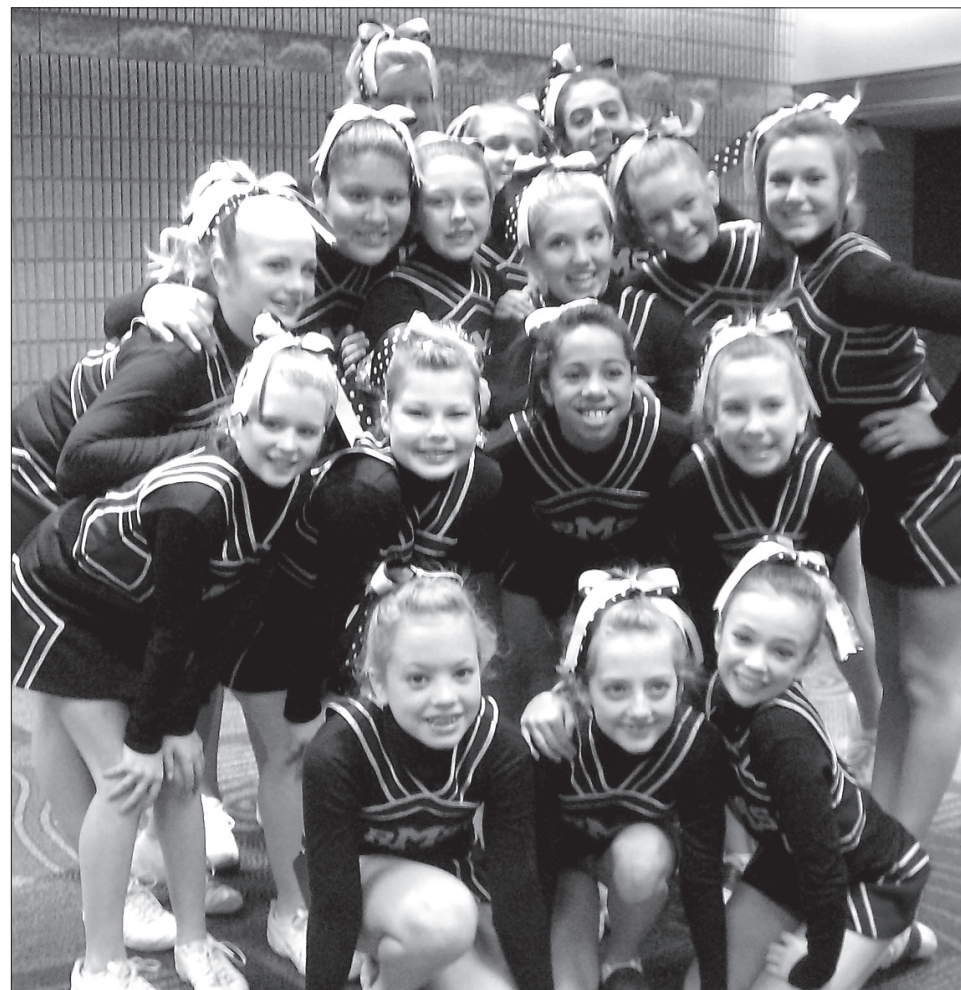
Here are some useful tips to more healthfully cope with the holiday as the season begins to unfold:

- Eat a healthy diet and, if drinking alcohol, do so only in moderation.
- Exercise and get plenty of rest.
- Implement a budget that is reasonable and preplanned.
- Ask for the support of friends and family, or seek community and volunteer opportunities.
- Relax and let others share some of the responsibilities for holiday tasks.

"One key thing to remember is that, if feelings of the blues, sadness, or anxiety persist past the holiday season, please consider contacting a mental health expert or agency as soon as possible as you may be dealing with a more serious condition that should be addressed," stated Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities Commissioner Virginia Trotter Betts. "This year is especially tough for so many people due to the downturn of the economy. It is so important not to overspend, to set a budget, and chose only gifts within your means. The gift of yourself and spending time with others is really what is meaningful for all."

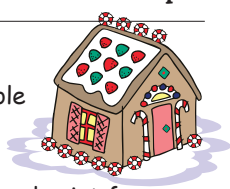
