Murfreesboro Social Security Office to Close to the Public a Half Hour Early Each Day and at Noon on Wednesdays

Effective November 19, 2012, the Murfreesboro Social Security office will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. – a reduction of 30 minutes each weekday. In addition, beginning January 2, 2013, the office will close to the public at noon every Wednesday.

While agency employees will continue to work their regular hours, this shorter public window will allow them to complete face-to-face interviews and process claims work without incurring the cost of overtime. The significantly reduced funding provided by Congress under the continuing resolution for the first six months of the fiscal year makes it impossible for the agency to provide the overtime needed to handle service to the public as it has done in the past.

Most Social Security services do not require a visit to a local office. Many services, including applying for retirement, disability or Medicare benefits, signing up for direct deposit, replacing a Medicare card, obtaining a proof of income letter or informing us of a change of address or telephone number are conveniently available a www. socialsecurity.gov or by dialing our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call our TTY number, 1-800-325-0778. Many of our online services also are available in Spanish at www.segurosocial.gov.



Article 1. Section 2. of the U.S. Constitution authorized the taking of a national census in the United States every 10 years to enumerate or count the population for apportioning representatives to the lower house of Congress. The first census was conducted in 1790 and included the 13 original states as well as the districts of Kentucky, Maine, Vermont, and the Southwest Territory (Tennessee). Over time the Federal census included more detailed questions that reflected the social, ethnic, financial, and occupational status of ordinary Americans.

By 1920, census enumerators asked twenty-nine questions of every head of household and almost as many questions of everyone else in the residence. Few, if any records reveal as many details about individuals and families as do the U.S.

censuses.

On April 2, 2012, after 72 years, the National Archives and Records Administration made the individual records from the 1940 Census available to the public for the first time. The 1940 Census was conducted during a momentous time in our nation's history, as the Great Depression was winding down and not long before our entry into World War II (although the war was already raging in Europe). It marked the only census conducted during the lengthy presidency of Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Many of the questions on the 1940 census are the standard ones: name, age, gender, and race, education, and place of birth. But the 1940 census also asks many new questions. The instructions ask the enumerator to enter an [a circled

x] after the name of the person furnishing the information about the family; whether the person worked for the CCC, WPA, or NYA the week of March 24-30, 1940; and income for the 12 months ending December 31, 1939. The 1940 also has supplemental questions for two names on each page. These questions included the place of birth of the person's father and mother; the person's usual occupation, not just what they were doing the week of March 24-30, 1940; and for all women who are or have been married, has this woman been married more than once and age at first marriage. Questions new to the 1940 census included

residence five years earlier, income, highest level of school completed and new, detailed questions on unemployment history. Many of these questions were added to measure the effects of the Great Depression.

The digital images of the 1940 census are accessible free of charge at NARA facilities (National Archives and Records Administration) nationwide through public access computers as well as on personal computers via the internet.

Included in this article, is an abbreviated copy of households # 1 - 158, of the 1940 US Census of the Eagleville area, the 8th District of Rutherford County; House number, Head of Household/names of other persons living in household, age, relationship to the head of household and type of work of employed members of household.

The remaining households of this area will be completed in the January Eagleville

Isaiah records, "The Lord Himself shall give you a sign; behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a Son, and shall call His Name Immanuel." Isaiah 7:14 gives us a very unique verse that is filled with wonder and truth. This is the traditional season for remembering the birth of Jesus Christ, the One Who came into the world long ago to save us from our sins. And there is probably no single statement that more clearly demonstrates the uniqueness of that birth than Isaiah 7:14. The world celebrates and honors the anniversaries of the greatest men and women of the past. But there is no other whose birth can be recalled with a statement written over seven hundred years in advance of the event!. It is true that this verse of often quoted, but it is none the less a miracle. Every time it appears on a Christmas card it witnesses to the supernatural birth of the Babe of Bethlehem, Jesus Christ. How sad that from the very beginning men had no room for Immanuel. How tragic that today there is still no room for Him. Let our Christmas prayer be for men and women everywhere to open their hearts to Immanuel, God with us!



I will never forget that somber day as I watched a little boy walk hand in hand with his father after their lives were changed forevermore. My drive home that day was filled with dark images flashing through my mind as I had become silent and numb in search of the Joy of Christmas.

I realize that happiness and joy does not come elaborately wrapped and placed under a tree, but instead, comes from the heart and in a moment when we connect with what is really important in life. The gift of health is so fragile and precious, and yet most people take it for granted. The loss of health doesn't affect just the afflicted; it stirs many emotions and impacts many lives for generations to come. For me, the meaning of Christmas is about a smile, a chuckle in one's heart, the warmth of family, and being healthy. Take the time this holiday season to be kind to one another, to smile, to laugh, and to exchange good tidings.





Application Deadline for NRCS Conservation Programs Fast Approaching

Eligible producers are encouraged to apply for assistance by December 21, 2012

November 16, 2012— For agricultural land and non-industrial private forestland producers interested in applying for farm bill conservation program financial assistance in Fiscal Year 2013, the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Tennessee has set Friday, December 21, 2012, as the signup cutoff date for first evaluation funding consideration. Pending the availability of funds, additional evaluation periods may occur and cutoff dates will be posted on the Tennessee website at http://www.tn.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/.

Conservation program financial assistance is contingent on passage of a new Farm Bill and ensuing Fiscal Year 2013 fund allocations to states. The application deadline applies to the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) and EQIP National Initiatives and the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program (WHIP) and WHIP National Initiatives.

Eligible producers with a conservation plan for their operation receive priority for financial assistance. NRCS staff is available to help producers create conservation plans. Only projects that are "ready to implement" will be ranked for funding. Applications can be submitted throughout the year.

NRCS's conservation programs address resource concerns such as soil erosion, soil health, irrigation efficiency, impaired water quality and fragmented wildlife habitat. EQIP, one of NRCS's largest conservation programs, helps eligible producers plan and implement conservation practices that provide opportunities to improve soil, water, plant, animal, energy, air and related resources on agricultural land and non-industrial private forestland.
