WINTER WONDERLAND HOMECOMING—A BUSY WEEK OF FUN

Homecoming is a tradition that builds throughout the week as faculty and students demonstrate school spirit and support for the boys and girls basketball teams. All week, students competed in various activities and games earning points in the week long competition. Each day included a dress up theme. Monday was PJ day, Tuesday was hat day, and Wednesday was 1950's *Grease* day. On Thursday the Freshman dressed as infants, the Sophomores as toddlers, the Juniors as career adults, and the Seniors as senior adults. Friday, the theme was traditional school colors which allowed everyone to show their school spirit.

The Adventures of Punxsutawney Phil, Wiarton Willie, and Pothole Pete



February 2 brings the mostwatched weather forecast of the year—and the only one led by a rodent. Legend has it that on this morning, if a groundhog can see its shadow, there will be six more weeks of win-

ter. If it cannot see its shadow, spring is on the way.

Why the Groundhog? Since a groundhog (or woodchuck or "whistle pig") hibernates for the winter, its coming out of the ground is a natural sign of spring. In Europe centuries ago, people watched for other hibernating animals, including badgers, bears, and hedgehogs, as signs of winter's end. Germans who immigrated to Pennsylvania in the mid-1800s began keeping an eye on the groundhog. The widespread population of the rodent made it a handy agent for this particular weather superstition.

And a superstition it is. But there's a grain of truth: the winter days when you can see your shadow clearly are often especially cold, because there are no clouds overhead to insulate the earth.

Why now? Early February is midway between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. Throughout history numerous holidays have marked this seasonal crossroads. Among these is Candlemas Day, February 2, a Christian holiday that celebrates Mary's ritual purification. Early Christians believed that if the sun came out on Candlemas Day, winter would last for six weeks more.

The ancient Romans observed a midseason festival on February 5, and the pagan Irish celebrated one around February 1. In many parts of Europe early February might herald the start of spring, when crops could be planted.

In the 1880s some friends in Punxsutawney, Penn., went into the woods on Candlemas Day to look for groundhogs. This outing became a tradition, and a local newspaper editor nicknamed the seekers "the Punxsutawney Groundhog Club." Starting in 1887 the search became an official event centered on a groundhog called Punxsutawney Phil. A ceremony still takes place every year.

Today Punxsutawney Phil lives in a climatecontrolled habitat adjoining the Punxsutawney Library. A local celebrity, he gained national fame in the 1993 movie *Groundhog Day* (which was shot in scenic Woodstock, Illinois). The weatherwatching rodent's predictions are recorded in the Congressional Records of our National Archive. So far, Phil has seen his shadow about 85% of the time.

Canada's Groundhog Day relies on the predictions of an albino groundhog named Wiarton Willie. Although Punxsutawney Phil gets the most attention, various American cities have their own special groundhogs; New York City's official groundhog is called "Pothole Pete."

the winning points. The boys team worked hard during each quarter to maintain a lead against the Raiders. At the conclusion of play, they had the victory.





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
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EHS Class Reunion





Citizens of the Month Allen & Laura Virginia Hudson



Allen Moore and Laura Virginia (L.V.) Hudson have lived at their home place in the Rover Community since 1947. Allen, born September 8, 1914 in the Bunker Hill Community, is the son of Mary and Lee Hudson. He was one of eight children growing up in the Eagleville- Rover- College Grove – Kirkland area. Allen and his siblings helped their parents in the field and with farm chores while growing up. He attended area schools of the communities they lived in.

Laura Virginia, better known as L.V. was born August 29, 1920 near Rover in Bedford County and was the daughter of Cleveland and Mahalia Potts Sanders. L.V. married Everett White, son of Leonard Strickland and Ora Emily Reed White of the Flat Creek Community in Williamson County. They had two daughters; Barbara Juanita White born July 17, 1936 and Virginia Ora Hallie Virginia White born August 5, 1939. Everett died May 20, 1940.

L.V. and Allen married on September 19, 1942 and Allen was inducted into the U.S. Army on December 31, 1942 at Ft. Oglethorpe, Georgia. When he left Ft. Oglethorpe, he was sent to Ft. Ord, California on a troop train. Ft. Ord was a major training post during World War II. From Ft. Ord, he was sent to Attu Island in Alaska where the weather was extremely cold with several feet of snow most of the time. The soldiers would dig out holes in the side of a mountain and sleep in sleeping bags. Sometime the holes would fill up with water and they would have to dig new holes. He worked on a ship unloading supplies for the troops, into small boats that would take them to shore. One day his leg was caught on a hook that was lifting supplies up in a net to dump them into a boat. He finally managed to kick out of the net and fell on to the ship. The fall crushed his knee and broke his leg. He stayed in Dutch Harbor Hospital for about 2 months and then returned to Attu Island. After his accident he was given a job in the motor pool. His job was to drive the Colonel everywhere he wanted to go. He continued to have trouble with his leg and was dismissed from the Army with a medical discharged in May 1945. He rode a train to Nashville and hitch hiked from Nashville to Chapel Hill, Tennessee where his family was living while he was in the service.

After returning home, Allen's family lived in the Unionville area and he started farming and trading

livestock. Their daughter, Janice Faye was born January 17, 1946 and they soon moved to Rover where he continued livestock trading until a few years ago when at the age of 86 he retired because of health problems. There aren't many farmers in this area that hasn't bought from or sold Allen livestock.

On September 19, 1992. Allen and L.V. celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary with their family and friends. Along with their three daughters; Barbara Juanita who married Jimmy D. Beasley (d. 1979), Virginia who married 1st Harold Spence (d. 1994) and 2nd John Thomas Taylor and Faye who is

married to Ronnie Sudberry; they have six grandchildren and eleven great grandchildren.

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A Step Back in Time

EAGLEVILLE SCHOOL—Part 4

Eagleville School from its beginning, when our ancestors attended, to the present day, is and has always been the foundation of the Eagleville community.

Even after three school fires, one in the early 1890's, one in 1923 which destroyed the new school approximately eight years old and one in June, 1994 that destroyed a large portion of the school, the community, parents, teachers, businesses, churches, clubs, local and county officials all came together and made sure that the Eagleville School student's education did not suffer.

Today the Eagleville School through the years of constant change and improvement is one, that the people of the community are very proud. Cooperation and work have been the essential factors in bringing the improvements about. Capable and conscientious school officials, including the board members and principals have had the major task of guiding the welfare of our school.

The following are some of the early changes and addition made to the school: In 1933, two new classrooms were added. 1948 an agriculture building was constructed out of army barracks that was moved on the school property, a cafeteria

and classroom was added separate and back of the main school building. In 1950 Mrs. Katherine Williams taught the 5th grade in that classroom. Also in

1948 dressing rooms were added to the gymnasium; 1959 a home economics building added and in 1961 a breezeway from the main school building to the cafeteria was constructed. By a deed signed October 28, 1963, W. Melvin Claxton and wife Elizabeth Sullivan Claxton sold an additional eight acres of land adjoining the school to the Rutherford County School Commission. These changes and additions are only a few that were added. Constant change and improvements over the years gave the students a much better learning environment.

From the late 1800's to the present, 2005, Eagleville School students have been fortunate to have an outstanding school to attend. Its curriculum is broad enough and basic enough to enable graduates to be accepted and graduate from any college or university. Eagleville alumni are represented in all fields and vocations – medical, legal, education, business owners, executives and others. Eagleville School has won many honors down through the years both in the liter-Continued— ary and physical education areas. Many awards won both in achievement and sportsmanship.

Over the years there have been a constant growth of students attending Eagle-

I'm sure that our ancestors that attended The Savage School, or the early Eagleville School were as proud of their school as the students are today. There have been many, many changes since I graduated from Eagleville High School in 1960. My senior class had twenty-one graduates, fourteen girls and seven boys. Most of our class started first grade together and graduated together. This formed a special bond that continues today. 

Valentine's Day Trivia and Legends



Valentine's Day, a special day of the year set aside to honor love of all kinds, and especially romantic love. But do you know who Valentine was? Why was this special day set aside to honor St. Valentine?

Here are a variety of stories and legends . . .

1. Valentine was a Roman priest during the time of Claudis around AD269, who was martyred, then buried on the Flamian Way. He helped Christians during a time of persecution, was caught, put in jail, became a Christian, then was clubbed to death for this on February 14th, 269.

While in prison, legend has it that he sent messages to friends saying "Remember your Valentine" and "I love you".

- 2. In another story, it is said that Valentine was a priest that secretly married couples, defying the Emperor Claudius who had temporary forbid marriages.
- 3. Valentine was jailed for refusing to worship pagan gods. Making friends with the Jailer's daughter, he is said to have cured her through prayer, and on the date of his execution (Feb. 14th), is said to have written her a note signed "Your Valentine".
- 4. Or this 4th story is that Valentine was a bishop of Terni martyred in Rome.

The 14th of February has been set apart as the special day to remember St.

Valentine. This was one day before the Roman Feast of Lupercalia, a pagan love festival. In 496 A.D. Pope Gelasius changed Lupercalia from the 15th to the 14th to try and stop the pagan festival. The church realized that there was nothing wrong with celebrating love, only the pagan elements were wrong. And so Valentine had become known as the patron of love.

Signing an "X" for a Kiss

Love letters throughout the year are often signed with a string of "X's" to represent kisses. Why? Our practice of using an "X" grew out of the Medieval practice of letting those who could not write, mark documents with an

"X" to represent their names. This was done in the presence of Witnesses and a kiss was given upon the "X:" to show sincerity. The "X" then became synonymous with the kiss in the minds of most people. There are two possible explanations why an "X" was chosen to represent one's name. One explanation is that the "X" shape was originally thought of as a cross. This "X" shaped cross was the symbol of St. Andrew. It may have been that people were making a pledge in the name of the Saint. The second expla-

nation is that it may have been a pledge in the name of Christ. The "X", or chi symbol is also a letter of the Greek alphabet, which has also been used to represent the name of Christ.





History of Black History Month



Americans have recognized black history annually since 1926, first as "Negro History Week" and later as "Black History Month." What you might not know is that black history had barely begun to be studied—or even documented—when the tradition originated. Although blacks have been in America at least as far back as colonial times, it was not until the 20th century that they gained a respectable presence in the history books.

Blacks Absent from History Books We owe the celebration of Black History Month, and more importantly, the study of black history, to Dr. Carter G. Woodson. Born to parents

who were former slaves, he spent his childhood working in the Kentucky coal mines and enrolled in high school at age twenty. He graduated within two years and later went on to earn a Ph.D. from Harvard. The scholar was disturbed to find in his studies that history books largely ignored the black American population—and when blacks did figure into the picture, it was generally in ways that reflected the inferior social position they were assigned at the time.

Established Journal of Negro History—Woodson, always one to act on his ambitions, decided to take on the challenge of writing black Americans into the nation's history. He established the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (now called the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History) in 1915, and a year later founded the widely respected Journal of Negro History. In 1926, he launched Negro History Week as an initiative to bring national attention to the contributions of black people throughout American history.

Woodson chose the second week of February for Negro History Week because



it marks the birthdays of two men who greatly influenced the black American population, Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln.



Margaret's Helpful Hints



When using muffin tins, if you find you don't have enough batter to fill all the cups, pour a little water into the empty ones. This will prevent the pan from scorching.

To slice a cheesecake without a lot of mess, use a piece a dental floss a few inches longer than the diameter of the cake. Wrap the floss around your fingers tightly and press down and through the cake. Release one end of the floss and pull through the cake. Repeat until the entire cake is sliced.

When sautéing, always heat your pan before putting in the fat. This will temper the pan and reduce sticking.

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My Favorite Recipe

Slow Cooked Pepper Steak

1 ½ to 2 pounds beef round steak

2 tablespoons cooking oil

1/4 cup soy sauce

1 cup chopped onion

1 garlic clove, minced

1 teaspoon sugar

½ teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

4 tomatoes, cut into eighths

or 1 can (16 ounces) tomatoes with liquid, cut up

2 large green peppers, cut into strips

½ cup cold water

1 tablespoon cornstarch

Cooked noodles or rice



Cut beef into 3x1 inch strips; brown in oil in a skillet. Transfer to a slow cooker. Combine the next seven ingredients; pour over beef. Cover and cook on low for 5-6 hours or until meat is tender. Add tomatoes and green peppers; cook on low for 1 hour longer. Combine the cold water and cornstarch to make a paste; stir into liquid in slow cooker and cook on high until thickened. Serve over noodles or rice.

Yield: 6-8 servings


With such a wonderful turnout and a great experience for everyone, we might just try to do this annually.



Meetings will be the first Thursday of the month.







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


