EAGLEVILLE CITY PARK...A REALITY IN PROGRESS

For many years, the people of Eagleville and surrounding area have talked about the need for a City Park. And now, thanks to the hard work and resources of a variety of people the City will have its park. Work began behind the scenes some three years ago and the labor at the site has been ongoing for the past 18 months. This effort has tapped into the wealth of resources the town of Eagleville has, both resources of items and resources of talented and dedicated peo-

ple.

Ronnie Hill and Jeff Mooneyham have demonstrated a strong commitment to this effort, both with their time and hard work. They have spent many hours developing the plans for the area, contacting various vendors at stages of construction, gathering quotes for the cost of phases of the Park, managing the schedule at the various stages of construction, and pushing for the completion of the projects. Behind the scenes these two have been instrumental in getting the Park to its current point.

As with any project the preparation is sometimes the longest phase of construction. The Park began as just a field and it has taken many hours and the resources of many people for the preparation work to be completed. David Crutcher donated his time and discounted his price for dozier work. John Edward Turner also donated his time for bulldozer work. Danny Coffee hauled dirt and discounted the normal cost. These efforts readied the ground area for the various projects and land usage in the Park boundaries.

Underwood and Sons Construction donated their contracting services and oversaw the construction of the Concession Stand building. Crosslin Supply donated \$1000.00 toward the cost of the lumber for the building. Block for this project was purchased at Alley-Cassetty who donated \$1100.00 for the Park. Other in-kind donations include a Gazebo donated by Ernie Berglund which will be located near the playground and ball fields. Joyce Jones has also worked diligently on the Park and assisted in getting the permit for the bathroom facility. Boy Scout Troop 123 planted trees at the Park as part of their service hours.

A MTEMC Round Up Grant was awarded to the City for use at the Park. This money directly goes to the construction costs of the many features that the Park will have including trails, recreation areas, and athletic fields. Monies have been donated in memory of the late Ralph Marshall, Jr. who served on the Park Committee. This money will be used to enhance the walking trail. Many people from the community have also pledged to donate Memorial Benches for the park area.

At this time, the ball fields are all but completed with fencing. Next on the agenda is the completion of the concession stand and installing the ball field lights. In addition access to the ball fields will be enhanced as grading is completed and the parking lot is finished. Everett Stone is donating his time and talents to wiring the concession stand building. Middle Tennessee Electric has inspected the site so the building is ready. In addition, S & W Electric will install the ball field lights as weather permits.

Plans for a playground area are progressing. The Park Committee spent time with Mid-South Recreation over the last week to discuss various options for play-



ground equipment. The committee will continue to gather information about the equipment options. The committee will make decisions about the overall plan of the playground area with equipment to challenge and delight the area youngsters.

The Park is becoming a REALITY and you can participate in making that happen. Your talents, time, resources and money are all welcome gifts to the Park Project. This Park will be a resource for our community for generations. Children will run across the grassy areas and play in the playgrounds, adults will take advantage of the walking trail, teams will make

good use of the athletic field, and everyone will enjoy their own special aspect of the Park To make that happen we need you. Now is your time to build your corner of the park by donating what you can.

A brochure will be available within a couple of months that will contain information on benches, memorial walkway bricks, etc. For more information, contact an Eagleville City Park Committee member.

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

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



Don Wilson never dreamed when he wandered into the City Café in Murfreesboro, TN in 1952 that he would meet and fall in love with the

prettiest girl he had ever seen. He was a soldier in the United States Air Force, stationed in Smyrna, Tennessee and a very long way away from his home in Spencer, South Dakota. Jane had only her mother to count on. Her father had passed away when she was only one year old. Over fifty years of marriage, ten children, twenty-six grandchildren and two great-grandchildren later, they have certainly left their mark on this world. The beauty of their love story as well as their unshakable faith in God has been the guide their children were given to find their way in life. They always followed the beliefs taught by their parents and always remained focused on family values.

Raising a family is never easy, and the Wilson family was no exception. Jane, who is known as "Mother" to her children and grandchildren, stayed home to monitor the every movement of each of her children. Don, "Daddy" worked sometimes three jobs to provide for his quickly growing family. Yet, somehow, they managed to impress their values and beliefs on all of their children. Moral values such as honesty and integrity were expected, not optional. When a rule came into question, Daddy referred to his own child rearing handbook, not Dr. Spock who was so popular. The Bible is where he got most of his answers in life. It was always a matter sticking to priorities that kept our family so close. God, family, work, and all the rest came after. These days that seems so hard to follow, but it wasn't easy then either.

The decision for Jane to stay home and raise the kids was one that Don and Jane both agreed upon from the beginning. It was a sacrifice, but not one that was ever regretted. Jane was an amazing mother. Jane had begun caring for her nieces when she was only nine years old. Every child was bathed, powdered and put to bed in clean, line-dried sheets every night. Jane baked daily, raising her family on fresh breads, home cooked meals and incredible desserts. Her biscuits are still something to get excited about. Not only was Jane an amazing cook, she read daily to the kids. Everyone got a library card as soon as they were old enough. We all know the story of The Little Red Hen by heart. Mother taught us games, fair play and how to get along with others. Mother bandaged boo-boos, soothed broken hearts and taught us to keep moving when we wanted to give up. Chef, nurse, psychologist, teacher and nanny, Mother always worked. Looking back, she was definitely under paid!

Don stayed in the Air Force until 1956. They moved to Aberdeen, South Dakota where Don found work (much to Mother's dismay). They moved to Council Bluffs, Iowa in 1962 where Don began working for Tip Top in Omaha. While not Tennessee, it was a *little* farther south. Finally, in 1973, they managed to move back to Tennessee where it had all started. Dorothy Bennett, Mother's oldest sister, referred Don to Bob Lowe to find a large enough house for what was then nine children. The Scales house on Rocky Glade Road became home to the Wilson family in May of 1973. Each of the kids have a special memory of that house, whether it was exploring the crawl spaces beneath the house for the younger kids, or meeting a future husband as Donna Rigsby did.

The move to Eagleville made perfect sense and fit very well with the life Don and Jane wanted for their children. Don hoped to start his own tool and die company soon and it was a great place to raise a family. Eagleville was just what they were looking for. A closely-knit community with a K-12 school was a much better place to teach their values than a busy city. Nine of the ten Wilson kids graduated from Eagleville High School. Only the oldest, Dennis graduated in Iowa. Like moral values, education was also not optional. Everyone was expected to graduate with the best education possible. College was an option for each child. Once the commitment to the community was made, the Wilsons quickly grew to love their new home. While not all of the kids live in Eagleville now, no one is further than forty minutes away. It would seem that it is *still* a great place to raise a family.

Don Wilson served as vice-mayor of Eagleville from 1982 until 1990. He served on the Eagleville City Council from 1981 until 1990. Don also served on the Planning Commission until 2005. Appointed by Nancy Allen, he continues to serve on the board for Horton Utilities for approximately twelve years. His continued service to our community is something his family is very proud of.

Tru-Line Tool and Manufacturing was started in what had once been Eagleville Florist and Gift. Don still worked full time as a tool and die maker while his company grew. We still aren't certain exactly when he slept, but he never seemed to run out of energy or ideas. The company is now located a little further up highway 41-A, and is very different from that first small shop. Don's idea for a family owned business has grown by following his original plan of providing quality products and dealing honestly with all of his clients.

Each of the ten children found a career and began their own families. Dennis, the oldest moved to Eagleville permanently in 1980. He became a vice-president with UTAB in Nashville. He built a home in Christiana



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

A Step Back in Time

On Saturday, December 31, 2005, a historic tradition of 157 years was held at the Flat Creek Community Center in Williamson County. The Owen Hill Lodge No. 172 F & A. M. (Free & Accepted Masons) held their annual St. Johns Day dinner. This annual event, first held in December 1848 on the first Saturday following Christmas, is held in honor of (2) St. Johns; St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist to whom modern day masons dedicate their lodges.

The dinner menu, unchanged since the first dinner, consists of country ham, roast turkey, corn bread dressing, green beans, giblet gravy, oyster stew and cranberry sauce. This year's dinner was attended by lodge members,

their families and friends. The speaker for the event was John Palmer, Grand Secretary of Masons for Tennessee.

The Grand Lodge of Tennessee granted a charter to the Owen Hill Lodge No. 172 in October 1849. The membership which organized in 1848 was mostly from the College Grove, Allisona, Eagleville, Arno and Flat Creek areas.

The first known lodge building was a 2-story brick structure on Owen Hill that was sold by George C. Kinnard to James S. Oglivie, C. M. Comstock and J. B. Wilson all of Owen Hill Lodge No. 172 F & A M and to Rev. Wm. Burns, W. N. Haley, James P. Allison, E. L. Jordan, J. B. Wilson and Johnson Jordan; all trustees of the Owen Hill Female Academy. The Owen Hill masons used the upper floor as their meeting place and the ground floor served as the female academy. (A road- side historical marker currently marks this spot.) This meeting place served the membership until 1885 when the Owen Hill Lodge membership bought a 2-story building known as the Jordan-Swaim Store in Allisona located next to the Allisona Mill Co. What happened to the original brick lodge-academy building is unknown at this time since the minutes of meetings and other records were burned when their building in Allisona was destroyed by fire in the 1955.

The Allisona Mill Co. and Owen Hill Lodge building, which burned, was located in what is now Rigsby's store-garage parking lot, and the building fronted on Arno Road. After the fire in 1955, meetings were held in Chapel Hill for a short time. After a new site was selected and a block building was constructed, College Grove became the home of the Owen Hill Lodge No. 172, where it continues as an active lodge today.

The membership of the Owen Hill Lodge included some very prominent men through the years. One of those was the well-known and respected Methodist circuit rider, Reverend Jeremiah Cullom. In his journal, he mentions attending the lodge meetings and he records that on April 6, 1906, there were 13 present for the meeting and he was elected treasurer. On December 17, 1906 he also recorded; "by request took the cars to Christiana and installed officers of the Masonic Lodge. I have been a Mason for 53 years and never saw anything bad in it". Reverend Cullom died in 1915 at the age of 87.

Clifford Ralston, an Eagleville resident and member of Owen Hill Lodge, was made a Master Mason on April 11, 1930. Exactly 50 years later on April 11, 1980, Clifford passed away.

Finis E. Tucker, another Eagleville resident and ancestor of several Eagleville citizens was also a member. His mason guide, *Richardson's Monitor of the Free Mason* by Jabez Richardson, A.M. of New York and published by Lawrence Fitzgerald currently remains in the Tucker family.

Over the years several members have attained a 50-year membership. At the present, there are three members, Aubrey Ghee, Buddy Cromer and Pollard Crick, who have reached that mark. One outstanding record of the lodge belonged to the late Will C. Lanier with a 78-year membership record. Mr. Lanier died at the age of 99. Presently, there are 53 Owen Hill Lodge members.







Drink Enough Water: Not drinking enough water during the day causes fatigue, high blood pressure and headaches. Keep water everywhere — so you can drink your necessary amount.

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
