# GENERAL SIGN-UP FOR CRP IS SET FOR SPRING RE-ENROLLMENTS AND EXTENSIONS AUTHORIZED

The Farm Service Agency announced Jan. 31, 2006 that all Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) participants who have a contract due to expire in 2007 will be allowed to extend or re-enroll their contacts. All CRP participants who are eligible will be notified by letter.

Producers will also have the chance to enroll for the first time into CRP this spring. A general sign-up will be held from March 27th through April 14, 2006 at your local Farm Service Agency offices. Eligible producers for these contracts would be enrolled for ten years. Cost-share assistance to sow down the land would be available and then producers would receive an annual rental payment for the next ten years. Payments in Rutherford County usually fall within the range of \$45-\$50 per acre.

Eligibility requirements include: the land must have been cropped four out of the last six years and the land will be evaluated based on five environmental factors (wildlife, water, soil, air and enduring benefits) and cost.

If you have land that is on a slope, as erosion problems and has been cropped, you may be eligible for this program. Please come by the Rutherford County FSA Office at 315 John Rice Blvd during the specified sign-up dates to enroll in this program.



started teaching Raymond the guitar when he was about 12 years old. For the past 32 years he has played the base guitar with different bands in the area. Ray-

mond is retired and lives in Thompson Station with his wife Shirley. He often plays at different musical functions in the area.

William "Bo" Bohannon grew up near Red Bay, Alabama and as a child, loved music. Growing up he was in a small band and play in his hometown. He left Alabama, moving to Cleveland Ohio to work for Ford Motor Company. He later transferred to the Nashville division of Ford and retired in 1988. He played a little music while living in Ohio, but after he moved to Tennessee in 1966 his





musical activities increased. Bill, better known as Bo, sings country music and plays the rhythm guitar. He has been playing at the College Grove dance on Friday nights about 11 years. He along with other musicians often entertains senior citizen groups, fund-raisers, birthday and other celebrations in the area. He and his wife Nancy reside in Spring Hill Tennessee.

area. Later, he was Patsy Cline's first drummer several years in Virginia and moved to Nashville with her and her husband, Charlie Dick when she joined the Grand Old Opry. (Patsy's hometown was also Winchester, Virginia). Sonny returned to Virginia but came back to Nashville in 1970 and was the drummer for Ernest Tubb. He has played backup on numerous recordings and is presently a member of the Music Meister Band and plays at the Gerst Haus in Nashville. Sonny also plays with other individuals at local parties and music functions in the area. He retired from the City of

Brentwood Police Department in 1999 and is presently employed at Sam's in Cool Springs.

Freeland Maupin, a native of Eagleville presently lives in the Rockvale area with his wife Sara. He retired from Square D in Murfreesboro in 2003 and has renewed his interest in making furniture (antique reproductions). Freeland has had a love for dancing all his life but in 1973 his singing talent began to emerge and he started singing in church. Since about 1987 he has entertained all over Tennessee and several of the surrounding states. He and a group of musicians regularly entertain at a senior citizen apartment complex in Nashville and at other local activities.

As for Rose and Daisy, which by the way, turned out to be male cats, are happily living with mom and me. Just remember....Never say "Never".....



January 11, 2006. Bud, 95 and Willie Myrtle 88 spent their wedding anniversary with family members at their Antioch home.


