Ongoing City Investigation Under The Direction Of District Attorney

An investigation is continuing into the altering of a page in Eagleville's personnel policy manual that prohibits the city from paying unused sick leave when employees resign.

Rutherford County District Attorney Bill Whitesell confirmed Monday that the probe into the issue is ongoing under the direction of his office.

"I have asked the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) to look into the matter also," he said.

Vice Mayor Ronnie Hill, who took the concerns about the possible alteration to the district attorney the day before the last council meeting, said Tuesday that the investigation is "well underway" but said he could not make any more comments.

A source, who asked not to be identified, did confirm that TBI personnel took the city computer Monday night to make a copy of the hard drive. They returned the computer to city hall on Tuesday.

They also took written statements from Hill, new City Recorder Colleen Adams and Fire Chief David Martin, the source said.

The officially signed personnel policy adopted in December 2006 says the city "shall not" pay for unused sick leave when an employee leaves the job while the suspected altered copy says "shall" pay.

A check of the city computer's past activity indicates the sick pay page was last modified Dec. 17 at 8:06 p.m., about a year after the personnel policy was officially approved. In the modified file, the word "not" was missing.

Questions arose concerning the issue after Mayor Nolan Barham paid former city recorder Michelle Bennett \$1,945.17 for unused sick pay when she left her job Oct. 31. The check was signed by Barham and Bennett, according to Hill.

City policy requires checks to be signed by two of three people. Besides Barham and Bennett, Hill is also authorized to sign checks.

Bennett told the Eagleville Times in a telephone interview Tuesday morning that she did not alter the personnel policy page.

She said she was at her daughter's



middle school basketball game at Eagleville School and stayed on for the boy's game the night the file appears to have been modified. She said she has witnesses who saw her at the games. Even Councilman Harold Vincion was there, she said.

Discussion of who all had access to the city computer took place at the last council meeting.

At that meeting, Hill asked city recorder Adams to search the computer to find when the file had been modified.

Hill said the district attorney had asked him to have someone search the computer at that meeting to try to find out who "was looking into that computer."

At that meeting, Adams said the mayor did not have the password when she came in to help him the Saturday before, and she could not get into the computer.

Adams said Barham gave her the password on the following Wednesday, which was her first official day on the job.

She said she had no idea of where Barham got the password but Bennett said he had called her and gotten it that morning.

Both Barham and Martin said they did not know the password.

But Bennett says that from the time she left in October until January the computer has not been password protected and a password was not needed.

"When I left city hall, I took the pass-

word out so that Nolan and David could request made by the Eagleville Times. have access if they needed to see what the account balance was and to make deposits and things like that," she said.

Martin said after the last council meeting that he would "get on" the accounting program Quickbooks to look at the fire department's bottom line.

"All I had to do was turn the computer on and click on Quickbooks," he said. "I did nothing else to get in there."

Bennett said she put the password back on about the first or second week of January when she came in to help Martin do the fire department payroll. She said she put the password back because there were "many people in and out of there" and said there was evidence others had been at the computer.

Martin said Bennett continued to do the fire department's finances after she left the city job because she was still with the volunteer fire department.

"We allowed her to come in and print out the checks and bills that we needed paid," he said.

Bennett said she had no key to city hall and could not get in unless Barham or Martin let her in.

"I was never in there unless David or Nolan was in there with me," she said.

The conflicting sick leave policy page surfaced Jan. 14 when the mayor sent copies of it in response to a Dec. 7 open records

In his response, Barham confirmed the \$1,945.71 check had been for sick pay. He also enclosed a copy of the conflicting page from the personnel policy manual that said the unused sick pay "shall" be paid and sent copies to the other council members.

Barham said he got his copy of the page that said "shall" be paid from the ordinance book that sits behind the computer.

On Dec. 13, former city attorney Travis Lampley gave Councilman Greg Buchanan an opinion saying that if Bennett had been paid for unused sick leave, that "this was would have been in error."

In his opinion, Lampley quoted the original document that said "that upon termination or resignation any unused sick leave shall not be cashed in for compensation."

Barham said at the last council meeting that he had sent Lampley the copy of the page, from which Lamplev quoted the "shall not." He said he had also gotten that page from the ordinance book that was behind the computer.





Road Construction - Believe It!

Many local residents still say they will "believe it when they see it" when talking about the prospects of the new Highway 99 being built into Eagleville, but signs are already evident that work on the long-awaited road will begin soon.

Stakes surrounded by red surveyor tape most likely mark where some utilities will be moved before the road construction gets underway, according to a Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) spokesman.

TDOT officials plan to meet with the utility companies this week to discuss coordination, time frames and other topics before the road work starts, B.J. Doughty, community relations officer, said.

Also, flyers saying construction will soon begin have been circulated to residents along Highway 99 to notify them that some blasting may be necessary during the construction period.

The actual road work will begin after the TDOT construction division receives a work order, which is expected to be issued within the next few weeks, Doughty said.

"This lag time is a normal part of the process," she said. "I think the fact that this job was let a week before Christmas probably did not help speed things along."

TDOT has accepted the \$10.4 million bid from Lebanon-based Lojac Enterprises for building the 4.6 mile project.

A Lojac official indicated last week that his company is just waiting on the state to give the go ahead to begin the work. The deadline for the project to be completed is Aug. 31, 2010.

The road work includes widening and

some straightening of the current Highway 99 from the Concord area to Swamp Road. A totally new roadway will be built across the fields between Swamp Road and Highway 41A.

The new roadway will intersect Highway 41A on the south side of Eagleville just south of Holt Specialty and Equipment Co.

The old Highway 99 into downtown Eagleville will remain the same and a spur section will connect the current Highway 99 to the new section of the road near Swamp Road.

The upgraded section of Highway 99 will have two 12-foot lanes with eight-foot shoulders. Six feet of the shoulders will be paved.

Turning lanes will be built at Swamp Road, Claxton Road, Mount Vernon Road, North Lane, Mount Pleasant Road and Ditch Lane.

The flyer about the potential blasting was sent to inform residents that Lojac has hired VCE of Nashville to perform preconstruction surveys on specific homes and businesses surrounding the construction project. The survey, which is done at no cost to residents, will provide a benchmark if any changes in the condition of a home or other structure occurs, according to the flyer.

The preconstruction survey consists of documenting the current condition and exterior of a home or business prior to blasting, using still photographs and diagrams or video tapes. Residents have the right to refuse the inspection.



Book Fair customers may help the school build classroom libraries and improve children's reading skills by purchasing books through the Classroom Wish List and One for Books programs.







Fund Set Up For Fire Victims

An account has been set up at Regions Bank in Eagleville for a local family who lost most of their possessions in a house fire on Martin Luther King Day.

The account is under the name of the Mayo Family Recovery fund, according to Eagleville Fire Chief David Martin.

Part of the family home, which sits on Highway 99 in the Concord area, is still standing but the early morning blazed gutted the inside of the structure.

"There was a 100 percent loss inside the home from the blaze and from the smoke and fire damage," Assistant Fire Chief Chris Wood said

Seven people who were inside the home at the time escaped, but the family's cat died in the fire. Among the family's valuables that were lost were Braille Bibles and books that belonged to a 16-year-old daughter, who is blind

"We got as many of the books out as we could, but I'm sure they lost a lot of the daughter's material," Wood said.

The firefighting effort was lead by the Rockvale Volunteer Fire Department because the house was in that district.

Martin said five departments, including Eagleville, responded.

Nicholson, the mother, said she is thankful for all of the community help that has been received already.

"We have had such great support, and we now have a place to live," she said. "Every one has just been wonderful."

And she is especially thankful that her family, including herself, her husband Laymon Mayo, two daughters, son, stepson and his fiancé, were able to escape from the burning structure.

Nicholson said she discovered the fire about 7 a.m. when she awoke and "had a sense about something."

As she walked through the living room, she smelled smoke. She then found black smoke pouring from her daughter's closed bedroom door.

"So I did what you are supposed to not do – I opened it," she said. "Flames were on the wall and over where her bookshelves were."

Fortunately her daughter had slept in her mother's room that night.

By that time her stepson, who was sleeping in an upstairs bedroom, was up and starting waking others while Nicholson dialed 911.

"We all got out but all they tell you about fires is true," Nicholson said. "From the moment I saw it to the moment we got to the door, the house was totally filled with smoke."

The family escaped with only the clothes they were sleeping in. Nicholson remembers it was so cold that night that someone salted or put sand on the road in front of her house where the water from the fire trucks had frozen.

Nicholson said she and her daughters went next door to neighbor Debra Clark's house, while her son, stepson and husband stayed outside as firefighters fought the blaze. Clark had gathered clothes for the family to put on.

Nicholson believes the fire started in her daughter's bedroom where there was an electric wall heater.

"We were not using the heater, but I understand as long as the heater has any kind of electricity going to it, it can come on," she said.

Churches, schools, community groups, businesses and individuals have already come to the family's aid.

Friends have also assisted. On Monday, a group of friends were going through the smoke and water damaged rubble to see what they could salvage for the family.

Nicholson said she has not been able to make herself go back to the burned house, which the family was renting.

"I have to go by it to take my son to school, but that is as much as I can do," she said.

Shredded cocoanut (optional)

- 1. Beat cream cheese until smooth.
- 2. Gradually add sugar, beating until well-blended
- Add melted chocolate chips and vanilla and mix well.
- 4. Refrigerate about one hour.
- 5. Shape into one-inch balls. Roll in cocoa, walnuts and coconut.
- 6. Store in refrigerator.




