

Rash Of Burglaries

(Mon. Jan. 30, 2012)

Burglars are stealing jewelry, gold, electronics and guns during the day from homes in the southwestern part of Rutherford County and in nearby Williamson County, sheriff's detectives said.

Property was stolen during the past few weeks from eight homes located on John Windrow Road, Coleman Hill Road, Rehoboth Road, state Route 96 West (Franklin Road), Patterson Road, Swamp Road, Shoemaker Road and Panther Creek Road between Franklin Road and U.S. Highway 41 South near Eagleville. All the homes were located near the road.

Sheriff's Detective Richard Brinkley stopped by homes and businesses in the area Friday asking people for information about the suspects.

"We're trying to get people to be more

aware and more observant," Brinkley said.

Homeowners can help protect their homes by keeping the doors locked and making it appear someone is at home during the day.

Citizens can help by calling 911 if they see someone kicking in the door of a home or carrying out property. Do not approach the suspects. Citizens are asked to call the sheriff's office at 898-7770 if they see suspicious activity at a home. They are asked to obtain a description of the suspects and a vehicle and a license plate number if possible.



Love is in the air...or is it?

As a home school Dad, I love the month of February because it offers many great teaching prospects.

President's Day,

President's Day, Black History

month & Groundhog Day are great occasions for instruction. But the day that February is most famous for offers the greatest teaching opportunity of all-Valentine's Day! What a great chance to teach my boys the truth about love! When the 14th rolls around, folks hand out tokens of affection like candy, chocolate, & cards. Hallmark claims that in February, they will sell over 144 million cards to starry-eyed lovers. So, in the words of Tom Jones: Love is in the air...right! Or is it? With all of the cheap chocolate, romantic dinners, & catchy limericks, is it possible that we've missed the point about what love really is? Have we reduced love to once a year "wooing" of the wife? Husbands who can't muster the courage to tell their wives they love them will say things like, "She knows I love her"! Some claim to be sacrificial with statements like, "I would take a bullet for her!" But the same man refuses to turn off the TV for five minutes and engage in a meaningful conversation with his affection-starved spouse! But at least he took her to the Olive Garden on the 14th! What's going on?

Part of the problem is that we've allowed the culture to define love instead of God, who is love (I John 4:8). Hollywood has convinced us that love is just a feeling that "sweeps over us" when we meet that special someone. We have no control over it, but it controls us & usually makes us do stupid things! It is this concept of love that justifies divorce & even spousal abuse with statements like, "I just don't love him/her anymore" or "we fell out of love."

So what is true love? In 1st Century Greek (the century & language the New Testament was written in), there were three words that are translated in English as "love." The first was eros, which referred to erotic or sexual "love." This term is not in the Bible. Then there was *phileo* which refers to tender affection, particularly the kind that is felt towards a family member or friend. Philadelphia derives its name from this word (*phileo*, to love + *adelphos*, brother), thus, the city of brotherly love. This word is found often in the Bible, but it usually refers to a shallow kind of sentiment. One such example is where Jesus rebukes the Pharisees for their shallow, self-centered affection they had for man's approval (Matt. 6:5).

Then there is the Greek term *agapaō* which refers to the utmost in love. It is a superior love. It is the ultimate of love. It is always voluntary, unconditional, selfless & sacrificial. It is not a matter of feelings, but it is a willful decision to sacrificially

serve another. A good way to understand this kind of love (agapaō) is to see how it is used in the Scriptures.

It's the Kind of Love that God Dedicated to His Son

Jesus said, "For this reason, the Father loves me, because I lay down my life so that I may take it again. No one has taken it away from Me, but I lay it down on my own initiative" (John 10:17-18a). God the Father loved God the Son because Jesus willingly offered His own life as a Holy sacrifice to pay for your sins and mine. This selfless sacrifice is the utmost of love, for greater love has no one than this, that one lay down his life for his friends." (John 15:13) But there's more! God demands this same love from us towards Him & towards others!

It is the Kind of Love that God Demands of His Own

The Hebrew shema says, Hear, O Israel! The LORD is our God, the LORD is one! You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. (Deut. 6:4-5). Not only are we to love the Lord in such a way, but also, other followers of Jesus! Jesus said, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another even as I have loved you" (John 13:34). Here we see that love is more than a feeling because Jesus commands it. Sadly, it's a command that we all fall short of! Because of our sin nature, we not only don't love God with all of our heart, we can't (Rom. 3:23; 8:7). So what did God do about our predicament? What did He do about this sin that separates us form His love? In the greatest act of compassion the world has ever known, He sent His only begotten Son to die on the cross to pay for the sin-debt of all who would repent & believe!

It's the Kind of Love that God Demonstrated at the Cross

The Bible tells us that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten

Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life (John 3:16). The love of Jesus was demonstrated perfectly at Calvary-not because anyone deserved it or earned it (Eph. 2:8-9), but because of the grace of God. He did not base His love toward us on our performance towards Him (Romans 5:8), but He based it on His own compassion, mercy & grace.

It's the Kind of Love that God Demands from His Chosen People

God demands this kind of love from husbands. They are to *love* their *wives just* as *Christ also loved the Church and gave Himself up for her* (Eph. 5:25). Jesus died for His Church! So don't claim that you love your wife if you won't even sacrifice the remote control for her! Jesus also said that this kind of love would distinguish Christians from non-Christians (John 13:35). He also says that we should show this same love...hold on to your hats...to our *enemies* (Matt. 5:6).

The Bible clearly teaches that if this kind of love is not evident in your life, then you are not one of His. *The one who does not love does not know God, for God is love* (I John 4:8).

I pray that this opens your eyes to the truth about love. But please understand this: It is impossible to have this kind of love for anything other than yourself if you are not a born again Christian. If there has never been a time when you repented of your sins & turned to Jesus Christ by faith to forgive you & cleanse your soul of all unrighteousness, then you are incapable of this kind of love. Forsake your sins today & come to Him by faith! Cast all your cares upon Him!

PLANT GRASS SEED IN THE SNOW



Planting cool-season grasses like fescue, rye and clover while the snow is on the ground is actually recommended for late February and March. As the freezing temperatures create cracks in the ground that help the seeds make it deeper into the soil. As the snow melts, the seeds make their way down into the soil. When the ground begins to defrost, the grass will begin to grow. Sprinkle the grass seed onto the top of the snow, using a seeder or hand broadcast, spreading the seed out equally. You should be able to see the snow

between the seeds as they lay on top of the ground.

When purchasing seed, the amount is usually figured by the acre. Fescue seed should be sewn for over-seed at the rate of 10-15 pounds per acre and clover at 2-3 pounds per acre. Getting a jump start on your seeds growth will make it ready for spring fertilization. Stop in and see your Co-op professionals with any grass or pasture questions. They are here to serve you!









It gives you a sense of control: "Frustration is often borne out of the feeling that we are at the mercy of others – bosses, politicians, banks, etc., and have no say in our own lives. A fitness routine gives you the power over your own body and health, and that is a very empowering!"



It releases "feel-good" chemicals: "Feeling stressed out and unable to handle pressure also leads to pent-up frustration. Exercise produces endorphins and raises the body's levels of dopamine, seratonin, and norepinephrine —all of which are proven stress-busters and mood lifters."

It makes you more resilient: "When you exercise, you build up strength – not just physical one, but also the mental strength and confidence that provide an outlet for negative emotions and help you handle the curveballs life is throwing at you in a calmer and more rational manner."

"Remember, you don't have to be a boss in a work environment to benefit from physical fitness," Drayton adds. "Just be your own boss – exercise your way out of frustrating and stressful situations."





My Heartbeat Goes To The Dogs

As a nurse I am a strong proponent of organ donation, and I am an organ donor myself. When you see

organ recipients and their families, you are able to conceptualize the magnitude that organ donation has on both the donor and the recipient. From a donor's viewpoint you know that you have made someone else's life better, stronger, and have made the ultimate humanitarian gift – life. The recipient is often given a new freedom in life and is better able to enjoy the things most of us take for granted.

I usually do not write about animal health, but if we stop and think about health and the health of our pets they really do inter-relate. Our pets become part of our family, and according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention pets can help decrease blood pressure, cholesterol and triglyceride levels and feelings of loneliness. Dogs, cats and horses can also suffer from the same kinds of cardiac abnormalities similar to humans and exhibit identical symptoms such as fainting episodes and exercise intolerance.

When the idea of pacemaker donation from humans to man's best friend - dogs - was first discussed with me my mind reeled with ethical and moral questions on a professional level as well as on a personal level. Being an animal lover, I have a lot of difficulty thinking about animals suffering needlessly or at the hands of neglect. Since I am a proponent of organ donation, it didn't take long to get my head around the concept. I started thinking about all the people I knew and the patients I have cared for who have pacemakers. Since you cannot donate pacemakers from human to human, the benefits of donation from human to animal became clear. So why not keep the beat going in a beloved pet? It becomes easy to see there are a lot of pacemakers out there that could benefit another life and keep the joy and smiles in the hearts of many.

I think about the service dogs for the blind, military and community that are not easily replaced. A simple life- saving pacemaker could prolong their lives and the lives they serve. Pacemakers have been estimated to prolong a dog's life by as much as five years. Pacemakers cost around \$6,000 making them cost

prohibitive for most. It is estimated that 90% of dogs needing pacemakers don't get them. Manufacturers will donate pacemakers when their expiration dates are nearing; however, these devices are too few to serve all the needs.

Think about all the ways animals enrich our lives; they put smiles on faces old and young alike. Why not will your pacemaker, or donate a loved one's pacemaker, to extend the life of a beloved pet or service animal? Donating or willing a pacemaker is simple; ask the funeral home to remove the pacemaker and give it to you or a loved one. If they are being cremated the pacemaker has to be removed anyway so funeral homes are experienced in their removal.

Donated pacemakers can benefit horses, cats and dogs, and those who love them. You can make a difference in a defenseless life and the lives they touch.



No one wants to sit on the bench. Life is richer, fuller and better if you are a participant, not a spectator.


A team has only one starting quarterback. Not everyone can be the star; as you go through life you discover sometimes being the star is over-rated.




