Eagleville 2nd Annual Christmas Parade

The weather was picture perfect, a hint of winter in the air but plenty of sunshine to warm participants and spectators alike. The 2nd Annual Eagleville Christmas Parade was well attended and great fun for all. The theme "A Country Christmas" was fully evident in the over 40 entries in the parade. Grand Marshalls Pete and Margaret Tucker started the procession at Eagleville School and floats sponsored by area businesses, churches, and civic groups/clubs quickly fell in the slow moving line. The sheriffs office provided a horse mounted patrol and others on personal horseback also paraded. Vehicles decorated according to the theme, golf carts, antique vehicles, motorcycles, 4-wheelers, and children's jeeps also enjoyed "parading" through Eagleville. Boy Scout Troop 123 rode atop the Eagleville Fire Truck and College Grove Fire Department was also represented in the parade.

The Eagleville School Marching Band provided a steady beat of music to keep the parade moving along its route down Highway 99, past the Eagleville United Methodist Church and the Community Center, through

town past the "business" district of Eagleville to the neighborhood across from the COOP. Spectators enjoyed seeing the many floats, grabbing the candy thrown by float riders, and trying to guess who was "dressed up" and riding the floats. One that stumped almost everyone was the TVVPPA, Tractor Club float where Belinda Woodson dressed in old time clothes complete with a "granny" hat was hard to recognize. Other notable entries were from Crosslin's lumber supply, Farm Sales and Service, and Huckleberries. Henry's Food Value employees enjoyed a break from the register and enjoyed riding down the parade route.

Many area churches were well represented in the parade and many of them displayed their image of the Nativity Scene with a stable, and Mary, Joseph, Shepherds, Wisemen and Angels. Rockvale Church of Christ had a strong group of youth smiling, waving and handing out candy. Eagleville United Methodist and Rocky Glade Presbyterian participated as did Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church and others. The win-

WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO BUILD A COMMUNITY PARK?



It takes a money, effort, and hard work; in brief it takes a community. And since a park is to be used by the community it is only fitting that the community build and then maintain the park. Eagleville is without a community park and while we have been

blessed to use many of the facilities at the public K - 12 school, it is becoming increasingly important that our community have its own park. Eagleville is on its way to making the dream of a community park a reality and you can participate in this venture.

In October 2004, the City of Eagleville was awarded a \$300,000.00 federal grant for park and recreation use. The City has 3 years to use the money and it must be matched 50-50. While fund raising efforts are well under way to create the matching funds, donations from individuals and

groups are also needed. The federal money is awarded but in order to make full use of all of it, the City must provide the matching portion.

The Park will have recreation facilities including a walking trail, playground areas, picnic areas and sports fields, in short, something for everyone. Initial work has begun and is progressing on the Park property, primarily in the preparation phase. The ground for three ball fields is being raised and prepared and additional dirt is being added for a parking area. The target for completing the ball fields is Spring 2006. Additional plans for the Park include a paved walking trail that will encircle the park area, a pavilion for picnics, playground areas, and soccer fields and basketball courts.

There are many ways that anyone and everyone can participate in building our Park by donating funds. All donated funds will be used as matching funds required by the federal grant. Money can be donated to build a sports field in memory or honor of a family member, to purchase park benches or playground equipment in memory or honor of someone, to offset the

costs of lighting and bleachers in memory or honor of someone, to pay for improvements and bricks on a memory trail, or to fund the construction of pavilions in memory or honor of someone. Your gifts allow the City of Eagleville to create and maintain a Park and the much needed facilities and activities it will provide. Without you, Eagleville cannot build the Park.

All of us are sure to enjoy all that the Park will provide for individuals and families but for now we need to work to make the dream a reality. Please consider making a donation to the Park in memory of someone or in honor of someone or just as a gift to the commu-

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nity. Together, our community can make the dream of a Park a reality. For more information, visit the City of Eagleville website. A brochure will be available in February with complete information either at City Hall or through the website.

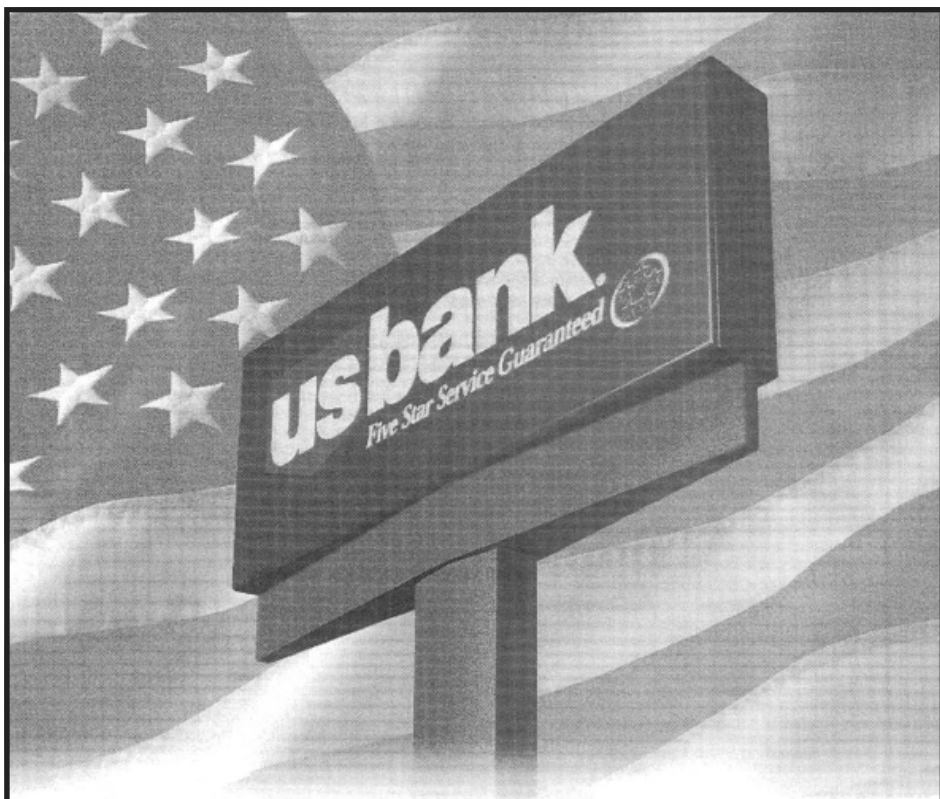

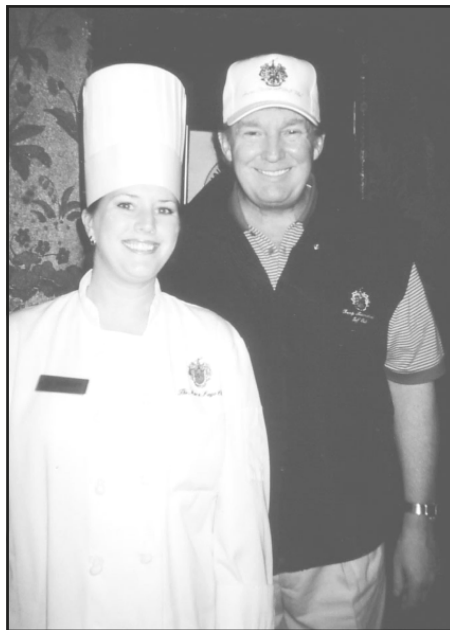

All-in-all Eagleville's own Bridget Williams had a lovely memorable time.



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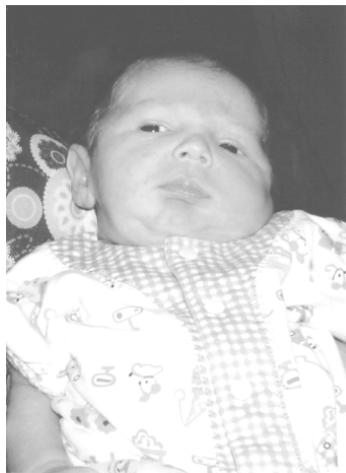

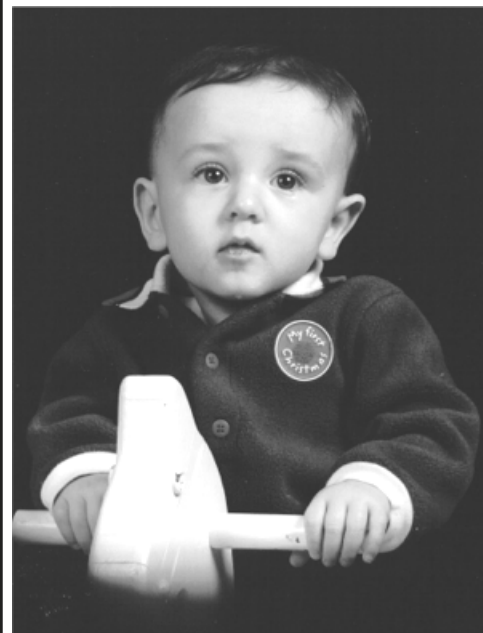


Paxtin Xander Stingley

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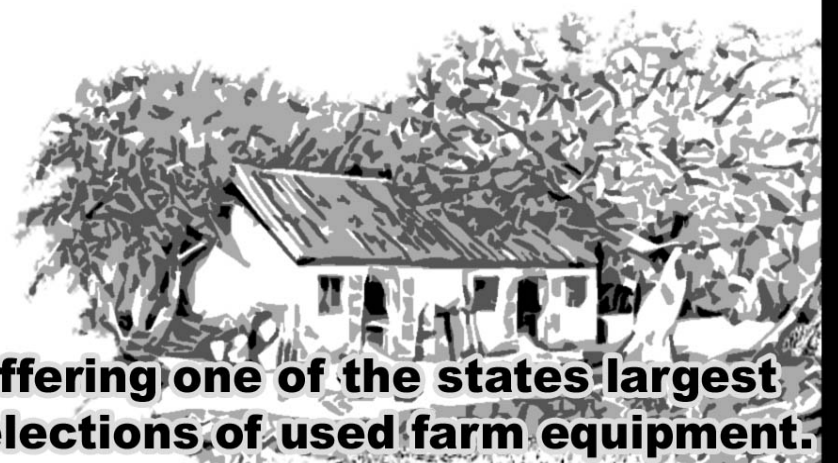
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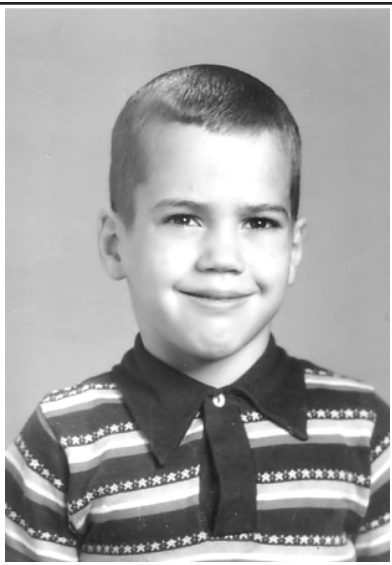
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Eagleville United Methodist Church Brings the Story of Christmas through Music.

This year, those who attended were treated to *Come to Bethlehem*, the story of the birth of the Savior as told through song and drama. The performance included the special flavor which a rural church in a small town adds.

On that evening, the choir, church members and children of the church presented the birth story with songs, narratives, scripture, and a living Nativity scene. With a medley of songs, the performance traced the birth story from the promise given to Joseph, through the young couple's journey to Bethlehem, to the worshipping of the Baby King by shepherds and wise men. Sheila Binkley, Gretchen Thompson, Erika Stuard and Mary Katherine Bogle added solo performances to the full choir's presentation of songs that celebrate the birth of a Savior. Songs included *Come to Bethlehem*, *The Birthday of the King*, *Go Tell It on the Mountain*, *Angels from the Realms of Glory*, *We Three Kings*, *Who Will Come To Bethlehem*, *Come to Bethlehem*.

In addition to the music, the story was told

through narration and drama. Teresa Vaughn provided scripture readings that relate the birth story and Mike Monroe added dramatic readings told from the perspective of the key characters in the drama, Joseph, the innkeeper, the Shepherds, the Wise Men. Children added to the presentation with their portrayal of a live Nativity scene. Hayden Newcomb played the part of Joseph and Mary was played by Anna Hayes. Wise Men from the east were portrayed by Nolan Monroe, Taylor Simpson, and Joe Pendergrass. Shepherds were portrayed by Brenden Shelkey and Zachary Greenwood. With the shepherds, the baby Jesus was worshipped by two very cute sheep, Lizzie Thompson and Bobby Snell. Many were heard to remark that it was the first time they had ever seen a sheep with a pacifier. The "stable" was filled with angels and as the choir sang *The Friendly Beast* the youngest children used masks to portray the animals present in the stable that first Christmas. The Angels who included Brooklyn Snell, Karah Snell, Samantha Beard, Courtney Marlin, Savannah Marlin, Brandie Shelkey, Sara Grace Bogle, Elizabeth Goad, McKenzie Greenwood, and Kennedy Greenwood also sang *Away in a Manger*. 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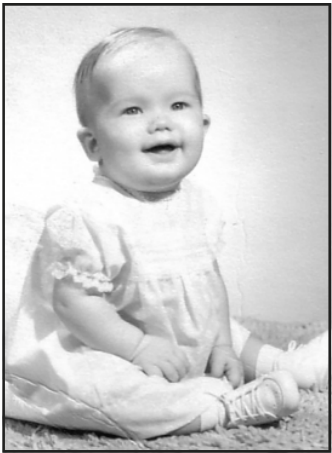

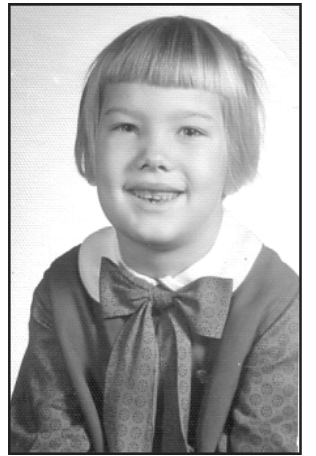

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A Step Back in Time

EAGLEVILLE SCHOOL (Part 3)

(I want to apologize for the error in last month's paper. Due to my error, the article that ran was a duplication to the month before. The following article is the one that goes with the ball team pictures printed in December's paper.)

After the school fire in August 1923 a new school building was built in the same location and was ready for students to attend in 1924. The new brick building contained twelve classrooms at a cost of \$18,750. The Eagleville School was one of the most modern and well-equipped buildings in this part of the state and by state officials recognized as one of the best schools in Tennessee. In 1929 there were only five schools in Tennessee that was given a higher rating than Eagleville. Those rated higher had larger enrollments in their high school departments.

Sports have always played a big part of school life in Eagleville. The students were playing basketball outside so a need for a gymnasium was evident. The people of Eagleville community built the first Eagleville School gymnasium in 1926-27. It was the third one built in the county. The late Mr. Horace Mosley hewed the logs that were used as pillars of the building. Students of the school also helped with the construction of the gym. The first ballgame was played in the gym on December 24th, 1927 against College Grove. All that day work was being done to complete the building for the ballgame that night. The late Mr. Fred Taylor, a senior, was one of the students who help complete the floors that day and played ball that night. College Grove won the game by two or three points. Mr. Fred once stated that they probably got beat because the Eagleville players were so tired from working all day. Everyone in the community who helped build the gym was invited to the first ballgame. Mr. Horace Mosley attended that game which was the first and only game he ever attended. He said it was too much noise for him. In 1948 dressing rooms was added to the gym. In 1976 a new gymnasium was built and in 1988 this much-loved Eagleville school landmark was torn down.

The 1927 boys basketball team members, first team to play in the Eagleville gymnasium, were: Grady Elmore, Herman Jackson, Fred Taylor, Ben Redmon, Eurban Elmore, Howard Windrow, Robert Covington and Irving Marable. Dearborn Hayes was coach.

In 1929 according to the first "Lone Eagleville" school annual, there were 18 graduates: Harry Hazel, Lucille White (Salutatorian), Ruth Brown, Roy Hughes, Edna Ralston, Annie Ruth Ayres (Valedictorian), Ruby Davis, Virginia Taylor, Maye Cothran, James Zumbro, Sarah Edmonds, Lula Farmer, Lillian Floyd, Mary E. Graves, Margaret Scott, Gertrude Taylor, Evelyn Ward, and Herbert Davis. The faculty consisted of Mr. C. M. Pickler, principal; Mr. H. B. Smith, assistant principal; Mr. David Calahan, principal of grade school; Miss Dorothy Staley, Home Economics; Mrs. Henry Moon Holmes, History and Kindergarten; Miss Mary T. Jones, fifth and sixth grades; Miss Grace Fann, third and fourth grades; Miss Reita Ayres, primary and Miss Ethel Elmore, music and voice. Several members of this faculty also taught other high school classes that were offered to students at this time. Some of the students also participated in the Music Club, Home Economics Club, Wilson Literary Society, Franklin Literary Society, Burke Literary Society and the Webster Literary Society. A highlight of the school year was always the Junior-Senior Prom along with other social events.

Over the years Eagleville School has produced some outstanding basketball teams. In the 1928-29 school year the Eagleville girl's basketball team won four out of eight scheduled games and played in the semi-finals in the county tournament. Team members were: Margaret Scott, Johnnie Lou Floyd, Audrey Jones, Maye Cothran, Maggie Bell Ralston, Elaine Cothran, Louise Redmon, Maye Bennett and Sarah Jones. Coach was Mary T. Jones. The Eagleville boys did not seem to get started well until late in the season losing their first 8 eight games. Out of eighteen games, they won only six but were the Rutherford County Tournament champions. In the district tournament the team who eventually won the state tournament defeated them. Team members were: Marion Stem, Freeland Bennett, Rollie Woods, Roy Hughes, Herman Bullock, Powell Taliferro, Herbert Davis and Jack Vaughn. Coach was Mr. David Calahan, the grade school principal.

In 1930 there were 12 graduates at Eagleville School; Gifford Kelly, Eunice Holton, Nathan Lowe, Mary Esther Taliaferro, Marion O. Stem, Sara Jones, Herman Bullock, Maye Bennett, Powell Taliferro, O'Fallon Staley, Ruth Marable and Alene Bennett. Mary Esther Taliaferro (Crosslin) was Queen of The Lone Eagle. The faculty had some changes from the previous year. Mr. H. B.

Smith had moved up to principal, Mr. W. F. Shelton, assistant principal and Mr. Charles Grisby, grade principal. The faculty included Miss Christine Owen, mathematics, Mrs. W. D. Potter, home economics, Miss Ethel Elmore, music and voice, Miss Erline Carlton, second grade, Mrs. Martha Moon Holmes, first grade, Miss Grace Fann third and fourth grades and Miss Mary T. Jones, fifth and sixth grades.

Also in 1930 the Eagleville girls and boys basketball team were county champions playing some of the best teams in Tennessee. The girl's team won twenty out of twenty-four games. Along with being county champions they were runners-up in the district tournament and consolation winners at the Middle Tennessee state tournament at Manchester. They were beaten only by one point in the district and regional tournaments. Mrs. Maye Taylor, a lifelong citizen of Eagleville, played basketball all thru school and was the captain of this champion team. The Eagleville girls played; Cornersville, Unionville, Kittrell, Smyrna, Lascassas, College Grove, Rockvale, Hampshire, Chapel Hill, Liberty, Christiana, Mt. Juliet, Manchester, Linden, Ashland City, and Dupont. The boys, also county champs won eighteen out of 24 games. Their competition included Christiana, Cornersville, Unionville, Kittrell, Smyrna, Lascassas, Chapel Hill, Liberty, Brighton, College Grove, Rockvale, Hampshire, Woodbury, and Morrison. 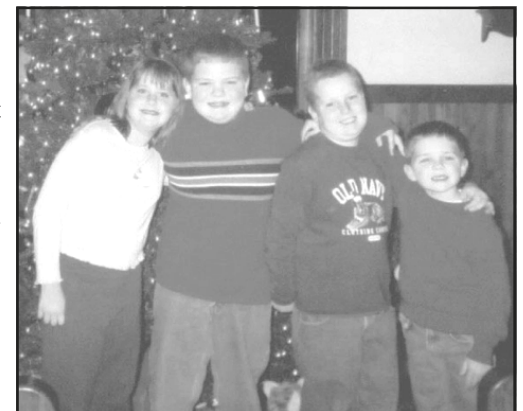

Indoor and Outdoor Gardening Tips for this winter season:

It's winter, and gardening may not be foremost on your mind. Still, there's work to be done to keep your plants and landscape looking their best. Here are some timely tips for indoor and outdoor gardening enthusiasts:

Check houseplants frequently to see if they need water. Dry heated air can cause them to lose moisture more rapidly than they do in the spring and summer when indoor air is more humid. However, if you keep your home on the cool side, houseplants may need less frequent watering in the winter months.

Reduce or eliminate houseplant fertilizing during short winter days unless your plants continue to grow actively. Most plants grow more slowly now because there are so few hours of bright light each day.

Wash your plants with lukewarm water with a few drops of mild dishwashing liquid added. Dust and grime not only look bad on the leaves, they filter what limited light we have this time of year. They also invite insect pests.

Inspect houseplant leaves -- especially the undersides -- for the fine webbing and pinprick yellow discoloration. These are signs of spider mite infestation. Spider mites are common pests that thrive in warm, dry, indoor conditions. They are very difficult to see without magnification.

As long as the ground is not frozen, you can plant trees and shrubs in your landscape. Be sure to keep transplants well watered.

This is a good time to prune non-flowering trees and shrubs because the plants are dormant and you can see the branching framework of deciduous species.

From an environmental standpoint, spreading sand is the best way to deal with icy sidewalks, steps and driveways. If you prefer to use a de-icer, try urea nitrogen fertilizer. It can burn plants if heavily concentrated, but used with restraint it actually helps fertilize grass and shrubs adjacent to treated areas.

This is a good month to start thinking about landscape improvements for next season. There's more time to talk to experts and to look through books for ideas when you don't have a list of garden chores. Many landscape designers and landscape architects are also less rushed this time of year.

Don't forget to feed the birds. Their natural food sources have pretty much dried up by this time of year.

Drain your hoses and put them away so they don't freeze and burst.

When you have finished your last mowing of the year, make sure that your mower is properly stored. Run it until it is out of fuel. Old gas can turn to varnish, and severely damage the engine.

Clean and oil your garden tools for winter storage. Place some sand and oil in a large bucket, then slide your garden tools in and out of the sand. This will do an excellent job of cleaning them, as well as applying a light coat of oil that will prevent rusting.

Winter is a time to replace garden tools that have seen better days. Prices are generally lower this time of year.

Margaret's Helpful Hints



When baking a pie, if you find your crust is browning too fast, wrap strips of tin foil around the edge of the pie to slow down the browning.

To render more juice from a lemon, warm it in the microwave for 30 seconds on high power.

Don't salt fresh corn during cooking; salt will toughen it. Salt the corn to taste after it's cooked.

To clean a toilet: Pour a can of Coca-Cola into the toilet bowl. Let the "real thing" sit for one hour, then flush clean. The citric acid in Coke removes stains from china.

My Favorite Recipe

Old Fashioned Potato Soup

8 medium potatoes, cubed

1 quart milk

2 tablespoons salt

1 tablespoon sugar

Dash of pepper

1 cup mild cheddar cheese, shredded

1 medium onion, chopped

½ cup flour

1 tablespoon butter

1 egg, well beaten

3 tablespoons milk

Cook potatoes and onion in boiling water until tender; drain. Add 1-quart milk to potatoes and heat. Blend in salt and pepper. Cut butter into flour; blend in milk, using only enough to make mixture thin enough to drop into the hot soup. Drop by teaspoon into hot soup. Cover and cook about 10 minutes. Stir cheese into soup just before serving. Serves 6 to 8

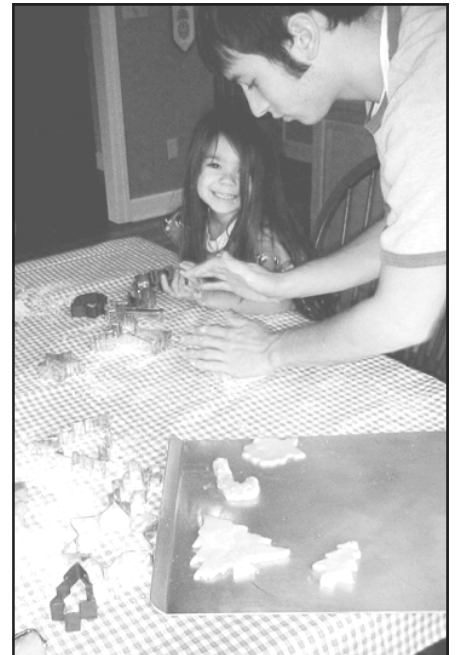

Set mini-goals, and work on small parts of your resolutions at a time. Reward yourself along the way, no matter how small your achievements.

5. You keep waiting for the perfect time to start.

There's no better time to start than the present. If you wait to begin working on your resolutions until the perfect moment, you'll never get started. Determine what you need to start, and just begin. Before you know it, you'll be celebrating all of your accomplishments!

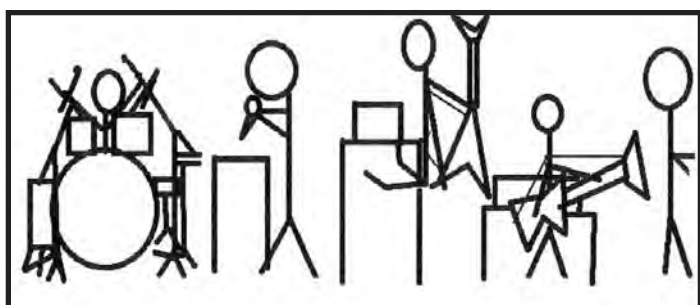

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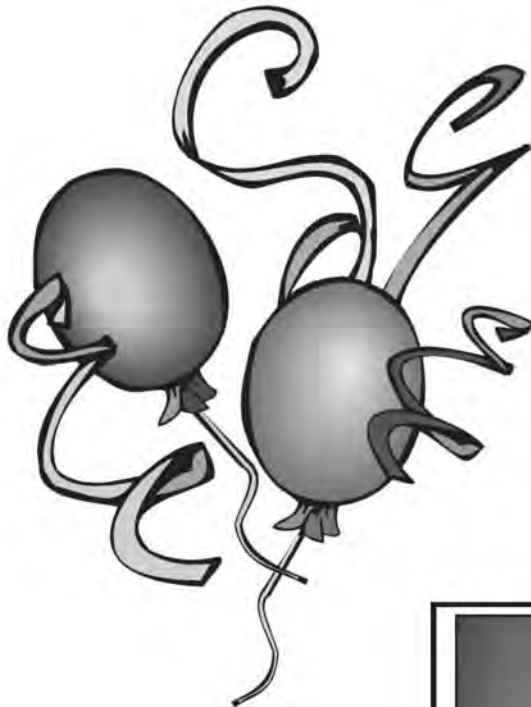

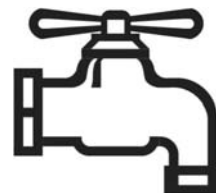
