## Adams Named New City Recorder

Eagleville councilmen have named local resident Colleen Adams as the town's new city recorder.

The action took place at a called meeting held Saturday morning. Former longtime Eagleville city recorder Linda Vincion presented the recommendation from the selection committee. She and Mayor Nolan Barham conducted the interviews, with five candidates being interviewed, Barham said.

"It was a hard job," Vincion said. "We had some very good applications. It came down to the interview process, and it came down to Colleen."

"I am glad to be the person chosen, and I am really excited about it," Adams told councilmen Saturday morning.

Adams is a native of Michigan. She moved to Tennessee in 1981 while still

> Barham said Adams will take the course work to become a certified city recorder.

> The mayor pointed out that new employees have a 90-day probation period. Also, the city recorder has to be bonded, so a background check on Adams will be done in conjunction with the bonding process, Councilman M.A. Smitty said.

> All the city councilmen present voted for hiring Adams, except Smitty, who abstained from voting. Councilman Greg Buchanan was absent.

> Smitty said he was not for hiring an Eagleville resident for the city recorder job because he thought "an outside person would have a better life."

> "Being on the city council, there are 500 and some odd people in this town, and I would guess around 300 adults," he said. "They all know who we are."

> Smitty told Adams he hopes she has a thick skin because "there will be many things to live with, and your life will no longer be inside your little yard and your little house."

> He added that he wanted Adams to know what she was getting into before she took the job.

> "There are many wonderful people in the area as you know, but there are tough people also and it is a tough way to go and we have learned to live with it," he said, adding that he asked for the office and was not complaining.

replaced Greg Reed, who had served years.

Lampley's apparent last legal action for the city of Eagleville before his Dec. 14 resignation letter was an email to Councilman Greg Buchanan the night of Dec. 13 that outlined information he had put together concerning the city paying outgoing city recorder Michelle Bennett for accrued sick pay.

The city ordinance that details the as Eagleville's city attorney for 12 personnel policy states that upon termination or resignation, any unused sick leave shall not be cashed in for compensation.

> "Accordingly, if she was paid for unused sick leave this would have been in error," Lampley wrote.

> Based on information that Lampley had gathered, it appears that Bennett was paid \$1,945 for unused sick leave when she left the city job.



## Haikus Submitted by Rockvale Elementary, Mary Patterson's Third Grade Class

What is Haiku? - Haiku is one of the most important form of traditional Japanese poetry. Haiku is, today, a 17-syllable verse form consisting of three metrical units of 5, 7, and 5 syllables. Since early days, there has been confusion between the three related terms Haiku, Hokku and Haikai. The term hokku literally means "starting verse", and was the first starting link of a much longer chain of verses known as haika. Because the hokku set the tone for the rest of the poetic chain, it enjoyed a privileged position in haikai poetry, and it was not uncommon for a poet to compose a hokku by itself without following up with the rest of the chain.

# **Eagles Fall Short In Christmas Classic**




the previous night. The battle was hard fought from both sides trying to hone in on their skills and prepare



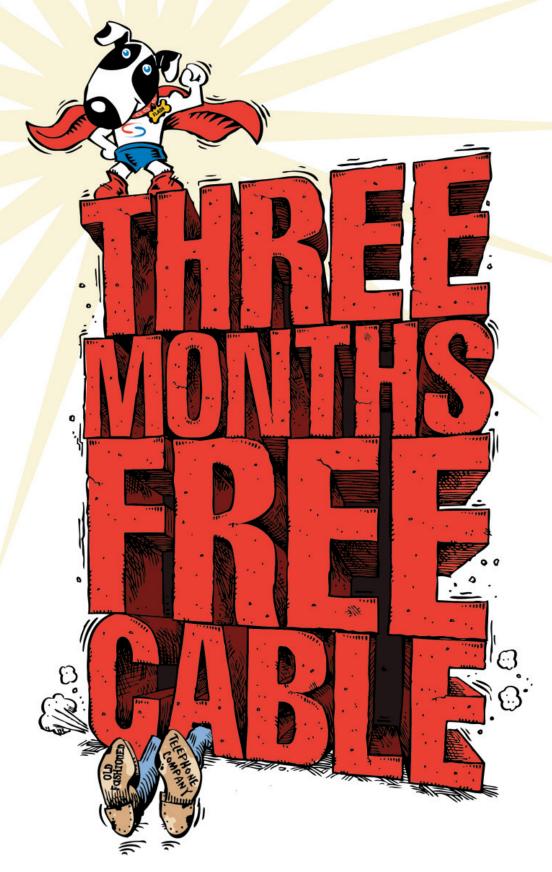

# WEATHER IN ROVER DURING THE 12 DAYS OF CHRISTMAS – 1862

Newton Foote Neal, who was a resident of the Rover area, wrote the following weather recording for the 12 days of Christmas. Mr. Neal was born in 1791 and died in 1874 and was a soldier in the War of 1812. He married Elizabeth Jane Moore, and they were the great grandparents of the late Mai Katherine Neal Smotherman, who lived near Eagleville.

  - 26 2nd Day Warm and rain commenced 9| o'clock in the night and rained nearly all night

  - 29 5 Day Fair and Warm and warm wind
  - 30 6 Day Cloudy and rainy in the morning Cold in the evening
  - 31 7 Day Cold and windy The day of the Murferber Battle \*

- \* The Battle of Stones River was fought from December 31, 1862 to January 2, 1863 at Murfreesboro, Tennessee.

\*\* The writer apparently duplicated Day 8 on January 2nd. Thus he recorded actually recorded the weather for 13 days. The Twelve Days of Christmas and the associated evenings of those twelve days (Twelve-tide) are the festive days beginning the evening of Christmas Day (December 25th) through the morning of Epiphany (January 6th). The associated evenings of the twelve days begin on the evening before the specified day. Thus, the first night of Christmas is December 25-26, and the twelfth night is January 5-6. This period is also known as Christmastide.

same area also grows a green plant that Mother gave me when we moved here in 1971.









#### Cornhusk Dolls

Cornhusk dolls have been made by Northeastern Native Americans probably since the beginning of the corn agriculture more than a thousand years ago. Native Americans used cornhusks to make spiritual messenger dolls. Early settlers in the Colonies painted faces on cornhusk dolls and made them into toys. In addition to their use for amusement, some cornhusk dolls were used in sacred healing ceremonies. A type of


Iroquois cornhusk doll was made in response to a dream. The doll was made after the dream and then discarded, put back to the earth to carry away the evil of the dream.

Brittle dried cornhusks became soft if soaked in water and produced finished sturdy dolls. The cornhusks were soaked in warm water to make them easier to handle. They can be dyed for colors. Both boy and girl dolls were made using the corn silk tassel for hair. The feet and body were stuffed with leaves and tied while the arms and legs were made from braided or rolled husks. Sometimes a face was drawn but more often than not the doll's face was left blank. The dolls were often dressed in cornhusks, animal hide or cloth but some where left with no clothes. Personal equipment was produced for many dolls, and this helped children practice to prepare the things needed for everyday life. Girl

dolls would have been given cradle boards, hoes, sewing kids or other women's things while boys would have been provided with bows, arrows, canoe paddles and warrior

There is a legend of why the cornhusk doll was created without a face. The story tells us that the Iroquois people had what they called the three sisters, the "sustainers of life." Many, many years ago, the corn, of the Three Sisters, wanted to make something different. She made the moccasins and the saltboxes, the mats, and the face. She wanted to do something different so the Great Spirit gave her permission. So she made the little people out of cornhusk and they were to roam the earth so that they would bring brotherhood and contentment to the Iroquois tribe. But she made one that was very, very beautiful. The beautiful corn person went into he woods and saw herself in a pool. She saw how beautiful she was and she became vain and naughty. That began to make the people very unhappy and so the Great Spirit decided that wasn't what she was to do. She didn't pay attention to the warning, so the last time the messenger came and told her that she was going to have her punishment. Her punishment would be that she'd have no face; she would not converse with the birds or the animals. She'd roam the earth forever, looking for something to do to gain her face back again. So that's why we don't put any faces on the husk dolls.

Whether the cornhusk doll has a face or not, clothes or no clothes, it is a very fascinating historical toy many people create to this day. There are many websites that give distinct, precise instructions on how to make your own cornhusk doll. Try it out for yourself. You can even a purchase a completed cornhusk doll if you so desire. I hope you enjoy the walk through history and until next time, Happy Crafting!
