Eagleville Ready For A New Year

As we close the decade no one is quite sure what to call the years between 2000 and 2009 but regardless it is worth a look back at these past years..

As with any place, Eagleville had many joys to celebrate and things to grieve. The closing of Crosslin Lumber Store in Eagleville was a defining mark. This local company that had expanded in the middle Tennessee area was still our "neighborhood store". With Joanne and Marlin at the counter, Kelly in his office, and his dog stretched out in the store, a trip to Crosslin's was good for the soul.

And none of us can forget when our Puckett's Grocery Store burned. Although it had gone through 2 name changes as different owners bought the "business", for many of us it would always remain Puckett's. For those who gathered on the sidewalks to watch the evening it burned, not a few tears were shed. For many of us Puckett's gave us jobs, full time and after school jobs, was a place that opened every day 7 to 7 except Christmas, would order any grocery item you requested, and was a place to meet and talk with neighbors and friends. From curb to curb service, they would open the door, help you grocery shop, load your groceries, help you back out of the parking space and send you on your way. At times, they would even deliver groceries to your door.

We celebrate the ongoing work done at the Eagleville Park and the many activities that take place there. A walking trail is completed, the three ball fields are well maintained, and the pavilion is a great place for family gatherings and a barbque or fish fry. Softball, coach pitch and baseball leagues keep the activity level high with both spring and fall schedules. And Eagleville School has made great use of the facilities with reward field trips for students.

While Eagl ville school has grown with the addition of

football, a softball field, and horticulture program over the last decade, activities that use to be located at the school, have moved to the Tractor Show Grounds on Highway 99. Now this facility is home to the Lion's Club Walking Horse Show held each June, the Country Horse show which was a held in August, and various other tractor and mule pulling events. And of course the land is crowded each September with the TVPPA Tractor Show and Pull, a long time tradition for Eagleville.

This year saw the Eagleville Street Festival that was fun for everyone who attended and vendors lined the streets with many items for sale. Our Bread and Jam has become a favorite place to purchase pastries and snacks and a great hang out on Saturday Writer's Nights who entertain the crowd.

The Dollar General opening in Eagleville was such an event that the 2nd graders at Eagleville School took a field trip and walked there. Once again we have a place to buy our necessaries, and a place to bump into people and catch up.

And the traditions that never change remain—local churches offering Vacation Bible School, Ice Cream Suppers, Dancing and Food on Saturday nights at the Community Center, the summer reading program at the Library, sticky faces at the ball field from ice cream treats, Fireworks and picnics each 4th of July, "bundling up" during our spring softball and baseball seasons and "sweating" through the beginning of our football season each August. The excitement of graduation each May as students in maroon gowns march into the gym, ready to receive their diploma and the excitement of children with new backpacks and supplies as first day of school begins again each August. Halloween trick or treating, the Fall festival at the school, and then the countdown to Christmas again.

Eagleville Home Invasion

Floyd Road is a quiet, curvy road that connects Highway 99 with Highway 31 and Cheatham Springs road. There is little activity among the scattered houses many tucked off the road amidst the trees. But on December 28th, the road was full of police vehicles, ambulances and later local television stations as the details of a Home Invasion robbery began surfacing.

The Home Invasion happened around 10:00 p.m. on Sunday December 27th. Although the home is behind a security gate, two assailants entered the property and knocked on the door. Mr. Story, a WW II and Korean War veteran, opened the door thinking a neighbor needed help. When Mr. Story opened it he was immediately assaulted on the face and head. Mr. Story age 86 lost consciousness during the attack. His wife, Edna, age 93 and weighing only 60 lbs was also assaulted by the assailants. Both victims were tied up

with a rough nylon rope that caused injuries to Mrs. Story's wrists and ankles. The robbers then searched for cash to steal, ultimately taking \$100.00 from Mr. Story's wallet.

Some 15 minutes after the two men left, Mrs. Story was able to free herself and call 911 for assistance. She and Mr. Story described the robbers as around 20 years of age, male, Caucasian, and wearing orange hunting jackets. Due to the facial injuries both of them suffered and the damage Mrs. Story's eyeglasses sustained in the attack, she was unable to provide a more detailed description.

Mr. Story was treated for facial bone fractures at Vanderbilt University Medical Center. Neighbors of the couple and people in the area are saddened and angered by this event. The question "Why..." seems to be on everyone's mind. Why did happen in our small community and to such nice people, all for \$100.00.

State Rep. Marsh Reports On Upcoming Issues



The second session of the 106^{th} General Assembly is now less than three weeks away. Though session receives a lot of the attention, the past couple of months have been extremely an important time in

helping residents of the district. People are in need and their problems span a wide range of issues from healthcare to construction. They have contacted me because they are having problems with their TennCare coverage or because more work must be done on the roads near their homes. I have worked hard on each issue brought to my attention and with the help of state departments and others have been able to resolve them.

Over the past several weeks there has been encouraging discussions from companies wanting to invest in the 62nd District. The Newell Rubbermaid Packaging Operations Center opened earlier this month on Railroad Avenue in Shelbyville. This could really not come at a better time. Many people in Bedford County are hungry to get back to work having been absent from the workforce for several months. Now that this plant is open, I, along with my fellow legislators and local leaders, are committed to accommodating their future growth.

In order to accomplish this, certain infrastructural needs must be met. The roads surrounding the 133,000 square foot facility need to be improved. This would increase accessibility as well as safety for people and trucks entering and exiting the plant.

Another topic which I am very excited about

is the proposed solar farm in Lincoln County. Standard Solar located in Gaithersburg, Maryland is one of the area's largest providers of both commercial and residential solar systems. This proposal is good news for two reasons. First, it would provide residents the same energy they currently receive from TVA and Fayetteville Public Utilities but from a green and renewable source. Second, approximately 200 jobs would be created in the area.

Standard Solar would work in conjunction with TVA through a power purchase agreement and would have the opportunity to proliferate into more of the TVA region. Jobs would be created at the solar farm, distribution facility, and a research and development facility. In addition to all of these benefits, there would be no capital outlay from the city or county.

Along with working to bring industry to Lincoln County, I am on the Industrial Park Board of Bedford County. Our mission is to encourage more companies like Newell to build in our area by creating an industrial park to service their needs. If we want companies to come to Bedford, Lincoln, and Rutherford counties we must work to make their decision to come here an easy one.

Last week I was assigned to the Joint Select Committee on Business Tax. Our next meeting is not scheduled until after session starts on January 12th. The Transportation Committee is in the process of drafting legislation pertaining to traffic cameras. For me, preventing traffic accidents and saving lives is the underlying theme during this debate; however, we must make sure that the camera systems are not being used simply because they are a source of revenue.

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



Rockvale Church of God Held Its 1st Annual Breakfast With Santa on Dec.12th



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Duck Hunting--- A winter Sport?

If you love the cold... If you love harsh conditions... Getting up at 3:00 a.m....Tromping through flooded fields or navigating a boat through swollen creeks... dressed in camouflage with decoys carefully placed to balance the load... you just might be a dedicated duck hunter...

Duck Hunting is a challenge but well worth the effort according to those who engage in this yearly tradition. Beginning sometime in November, depending on where you hunt and the federal and state guidelines that change each year, Duck Hunting is a relatively short hunting season ending in late January. And with hunting fees both on the state and federal level and enforced limits on birds each day, the sport is well regulated for the health of the birds and for the environments they inhabit.

When blizzard conditions and cold arctic winds blow across the plains and Midwest, varies species of ducks make flight plans on the "migratory bird flyway" bringing them through parts of Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Alabama searching for warming feeding



grounds. And that is when Duck Hunting season is at its prime in the southeast.

Eagleville, College Grove, Chapel Hill, and Rockvale have a number of people, men and women, young and old, who enjoy the activity of the duck hunt in West Tennessee, Reel Foot Lake area, and areas near the Mississippi. Some travel to southeastern Arkansas and take advantage of flooded farm land to hunt or utilize the vast public lands available.

With duck calls around their necks, guns loaded, and decoys placed, these hunters see some spectacular sunrises as the cold mist lifts from lakes and ponds. There is nothing quite like seeing groups of birds fill the sky as they search for open water to feed and rest on their voyage south. With the call of the ducks answered by the calls of the hunters, the quiet dawn air quickly fills with a racket that will wake even the sleepiest hunter.



Watching the birds as they "lock their wings" and prepare to land can distract even the most dedicated hunter from

aiming the gun until the last moment when they remember the reason for their morning trek and weeks of preparation. With guns aimed, a single shot brings down a duck quickly retrieved by well trained dogs. For those without retrievers, luck of the draw determines who in the hunting party will wade into the water to retrieve the quarry.

And the hunters reload their guns, crouch down in the blind or tuck behind a tree, eyes skyward watching for the next group to fill the sky. Even as feet grow numb and hands are raw from being wet in the cold winds, the Duck Hunter remains until shooting hours end and then returns the next day to hunt again.

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Little Stories About You & Me Soup By Nancy Allen

What can be better on a cold winter day than a hot, steaming, soothing bowl of soup?

Soup is most always low in saturated fat and the "slow cook" method for preparing soups conserves more of the natural nutrients and vitamins. We've all heard about the benefits of chicken soup. It has anti-inflammatory effects and can lessen the symptoms of a cold. It

actually contains Neosynephrine—a drug that helps relieve congestion. One of the great benefits of soup is that it restores the fluid balance in our bodies which in turn keeps our blood pressure and salt content under control. Soups made from soy products may help lower the risk of breast cancer. A recent Japanese study showed their level of breast cancer is about ten times lower than in the West. Soups can also be good for weight loss. Soup makes you feel warm and full while adding few calories.

While there is little doubt homemade soups are the best, there is a wide variety of low-fat, low-sodium soups on the market today.

Terri, a woman at my church, never fails to have soup ready for a sick friend. She says when she makes soup she usually makes four different kinds at once. She puts four huge pots on the stove and when the soups begin to simmer her house is saturated with the essence of nutrition. When the soup is ready to eat, she serves it up to her family, gives some away and freezes the rest. When someone in the community is sick and needs some TLC her soup is ready to pull out of the freezer and deliver. Here is one of her favorite recipes. Enjoy!

Potato Soup

5 lbs. potatoes
½ lb. bacon cut in pieces
1 large onion, diced
2 or 3 carrots chopped
¼ finely diced red bell pepper
1¼ finely diced green bell pepper
4 to 6 cups chicken broth
fresh ground black pepper
2 cups fat free half and half
1 cup grated cheddar cheese

Vegan Alternative

1 12 oz. Pkg. vegan sausage + ¼ cup Earth Balance Buttery Spread

4 to 6 cups vegetable broth

2 cups soy or rice milk+ 1 TBS. nutritional yeast flakes
1 cup grated soy cheddar flavored cheese chives for garnish

Peel and dice potatoes, cutting about ¼ of them in quite small pieces, leaving the remainder in slightly larger pieces. Dice carrots, onions and peppers. Saute bacon pieces (or Vegan Sausage and Earth Balance) until crisp, then remove pieces of meat for later use. Saute carrots, onions, peppers and smaller pieces of potatoes in bacon grease until tender. Transfer vegetables to soup kettle, add remaining potatoes and cover with broth. Simmer until larger pieces of potato are tender. Mash or blend about 2 cups of mixture as thickening. Remove soup from heat and slowly add half and half or soy milk. Return to low heat and heat thoroughly. Add grated cheese and bacon pieces. Garnish with fresh chives. Great served in a bread bowl!



Make Rice Krispie treats and follow the manufacturers recommended instructions except use sprinkles for "confetti".


Use white grape juice with lemon lime soda or ginger ale for a child's version of champagne.



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
