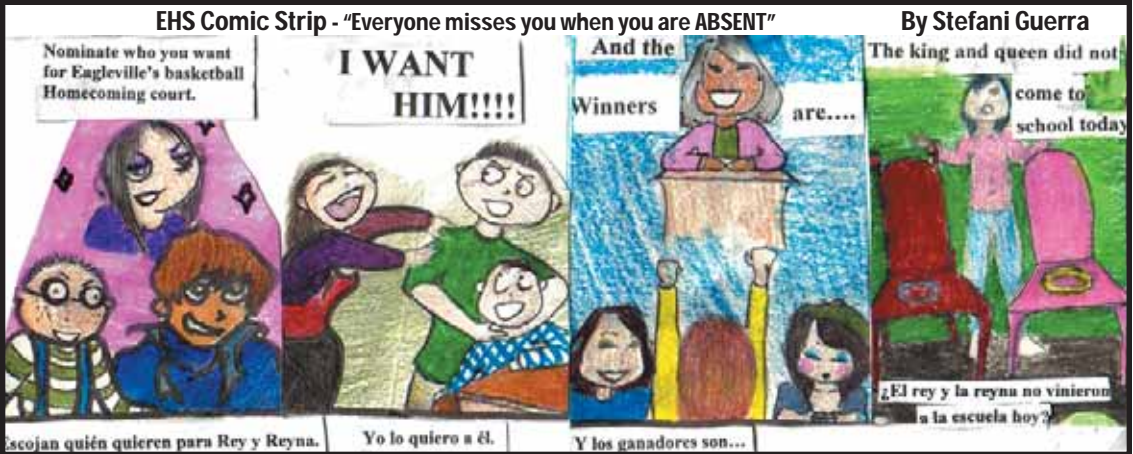

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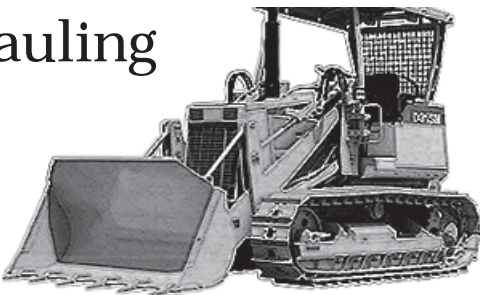

A Step Back in Time By Bobbie Sue Shelton-Lonas

HISTORY OF COLLEGE GROVE

Carolyn Smotherman, a College Grove resident, who is a participant of a very valuable project, writing the History of College Grove, submitted the following information. A group of individuals, who are interested in preserving the history of the community, have been working on this project for several years and are in the final phase of completion. This is a very important, but a time consuming project, that will be a benefit to generations to come.

Several neighboring community has already had their history preserved and others are in the process. Interested individuals in the Longview Community, Bedford County, are also working on their community history as well. COLLEGE GROVE HISTORY BOOK

When was College Grove established? Who were the earliest settlers? Were the land Revolutionary War land grants? Where are the records kept? Was there a Civil War battle at College Grove? What were and are the major businesses in College Grove? What are the boundaries of College Grove?

These are the kinds of questions that led to the writing of the College Grove History book. Without exception it seems the answer to each question is, "Well, there is not just one answer." For instance, it appears that land was granted in the area, which is now College Grove not later than 1784. These land grants were on the Harpeth River or on Grove Creek. Grove Creek is the waterway that passes east of Horton Highway and somewhat parallel to the highway and which creek has a sign at the bridge, which identifies it as Overall Creek. When Elizabeth Battle realized that it was misidentified and began to try to get it changed, it turned out the location of the bridge was in Rutherford County and the change has not yet been accomplished.

In spite of the fact that people began obtaining deeds to the land in the College Grove area soon after the end of the Revolutionary War, it does not appear that settlers came until almost 1800. And while the people were here and the land was fast filling up with settlers between 1800 and 1820, there was no town where College Grove is today until after 1850.

James Patton Allison, who lived at Unionville in Bedford County until after 1840, by 1857 had acquired and had given, in two separate deeds, land for a church and a school in the same location where College Grove High School and the College Grove Presbyterian Church were located for more than 100 years after that. When he wrote the deed for the church, he indicated the building already existed, so perhaps the first building that inaugurated the community was about 1854.

There were no stores, nor mills, nor blacksmith shop and it was not called College Grove. The first indication that the town began as Poplar Grove is a July 1859 advertisement for the "Poplar Grove Male Academy" which was published in the *Western Weekly Review* (which later became the *Review-Appeal*). The earliest records for the Presbyterian Church also indicate that it was called Poplar

Grove Presbyterian Church. The oft told story of how College Grove got its name is that in 1861 a post office was authorized, but those seeking the office were told that there was another Poplar Grove in Tennessee and a different name would have to be chosen. College Grove was selected in honor of the male academy, and a female academy at the present location of the Methodist parsonage.

About 2001 a group began working on a history of College Grove at Fifty Forward (Senior Citizens at that time), housed in the former College Grove Elementary School building. We let people know, to the best of our ability, primarily through newspaper articles, the Senior Citizen newsletter, word of mouth, an internet site and internet mailing lists, that we were collecting material to write the history and would include family articles, school and church information, and old photographs. There was a lot of interest from the community and many people wrote about their families, loaned us pictures to copy, and sometimes came to meet with our committee.

By the fall of 2004 we had an impressive collection and began to compile it into a book. At the November presidential election, we sat up a table to advertise the



book and to collect deposits against the unknown price of the future book. More than 70 people had enough faith in our ability to produce a book to give us \$20. At that time we thought we should be able to have the books by November 2005 and that they would contain about 250 pages and perhaps 400 photographs.



The College Grove Depot was built soon after the Louisville and Nashville tracks were laid in 1914. It served as the passenger and freight terminal, telegraph office, and was the means of getting mail to and from College Grove. It was also the shipping point for cattle and other locally produced goods. In later years, it housed the local health clinic. The depot was dismantled in 1980. Salvageable lumber was used in the construction of a local home.

The intervening years seem almost like a dream; whenever anyone inquired about the progress on the book and when it would be finished, we always said it was almost finished and we believed it when we said it. Each year we would begin the year with a plan to have the books by Christmas. We were continually receiving

but the material is in the hands of the publisher and the books will be delivered some time in early 2011. Now our estimate is 500 pages and 800 photographs.

Many people have worked on the book; the major long-time contributors include Elizabeth Ogilvie Battle, Pauline Heaton Covington Arnold, Beverly Burke Collins, Arline Windrow Sudberry, Glenda Crick Dyer, Frances Greathouse, Betty Blue Windrow Dye, and Carolyn Smotherman. Rick Warwick of the Williamson County Historical Society and the Heritage Foundation scanned all the photographs and contributed material for the book. Louise Lynch, Director of the Williamson County Archives, gave us articles and suggestions, and made our work easier with her many indices and notebooks of organized materials. So many people and organizations were helpful to us that we could not hope to name everyone, but we are grateful to each one and those who enjoy the book should know we could not have accomplished such a great result without the support of the community.

We are trying to reach as many people who feel a connection to College Grove as possible while we are still able to offer the book at a discounted price. Once the actual printing begins, we have to lock in a number of books ordered and we have to borrow money to pay for the ones, which have not been pre-paid. This means there will be few extra books and they will cost more. Please order your book now—it will be a great help to us—and please let your friends and kin who no longer live in the Williamson County or Eagleville area know about the book.

TVPPA NEWS - Joe Elmore and PowerBlock TV

Jesse Geasley of the Tennessee Valley Pioneer Power Association didn't expect to get a phone call from a local television icon, but that's exactly what happened.

In November, the production crew for PowerBlock TV, a cable show featuring Joe Elmore of local show Tennessee Crossroads, called with a unique request. Elmore's cable show promotes the latest in performance engine technology, and Elmore was asking permission to use the track at the tractor show grounds in Eagleville. What for?

"Well, that's the funny part," Geasley says. "They wanted to pull a sled down the pull track with a Dodge Charger."

You read that right. A Dodge Charger. To be specific, a modified Charger with pumped up performance gear from BULLYDOG Technologies. And, the production team did come in mid-November to showcase their product, the Triple Dog GT, an electronic tuning device intended to maximize horsepower and torque.

The event drew a crowd of curious spectators who were more than a little doubtful about the Charger's chances of pulling down the track. But the BULLYDOG team is used to doubters. In fact, they drove all the way from Idaho to win over the skeptics. And that's one reason Jesse said, "Yes," when Elmore suggested such an over-the-top idea.

"I just had to see if the Charger could do it," Geasley adds.

The BULLYDOG team explained that the tuning device allows the motorist to make adjustments to the drive train, such as transmission settings. The Triple Dog GT is compatible with Dodge, Ford, GM, and Nissan vehicles. The unit can be easily transferred within a matter of minutes and boasts increased fuel mileage under appropriate driving.

BULLYDOG demonstrated the GT's power boost by pulling a brand new Ford F 1-50 and the modified Dodge Charger.

BULLYDOG Marketing Manager Mike DeFord adds, "While pulling a sled with a car is something that most people have never seen before, we put it together to show all aspects of the GT product, that it provides big power increases, the adjustability to provide maximum performance and then (can) be swapped from our Charger to a new Ford F150. In both cases we are very happy with the outcome. Both vehicles pulled the sled much further with our Triple Dog GT installed. Many thought we were crazy to do this with a Charger.

But Geasley says the Charger had no trouble pulling the sled or the Ford F-150, and he was impressed with the production staff and the BULLYDOG team.

If you want to catch this episode of PowerBlock TV, you'll have to wait until the new 2011 season starts. If you do see the show, you might recognize Andrew Kieffer and his restored Allis Chalmers. And next September, you might see Joe Elmore and his Tennessee Crossroads crew coming through the gates to check out the action at the Annual Pioneer Power Days.

He lives on and operates a working family farm in Smith and DeKalb counties of Tennessee that has been in operation since 1790. In addition to farming, Mr. Rose is a principal of Smith Fork Ventures, Inc., an investment firm with interests in the media and information technology learning markets. He is president of Boson Software, LLC an information technology training software company based in Nashville, with offices in Tampa, Fla. Rose serves on the board of Main Street Media, LLC, a Lebanon-based media and printing company that publishes local newspapers in Williamson, Wilson, and Sumner counties in Tennessee as well as five senior lifestyle newspapers on Florida’s west coast.

He holds a B.S. degree in Agribusiness Economics from Tennessee Technological University, where he graduated Summa Cum Laude. He also holds a master’s degree in Agricultural Economics from Purdue University and a juris doctorate from Vanderbilt University.

In 2010, Mr. Rose helped to form the Tennessee State Fair Association, an organization dedicated to preserving the 104-year-old tradition of the Tennessee State Fair. He currently serves as chairman of the board.

Mr. Rose served as Tennessee’s 33rd Commissioner of Agriculture under Gov. Don Sundquist. As commissioner, Mr. Rose also served on the Tennessee Board of Regents, The University of Tennessee Board of Trustees and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Commission. 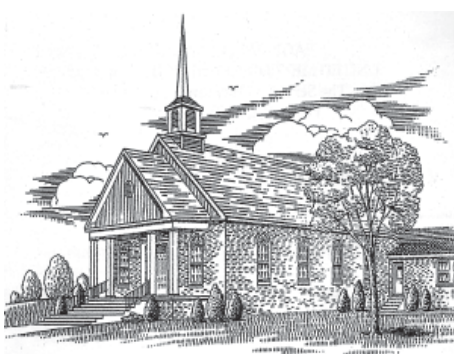

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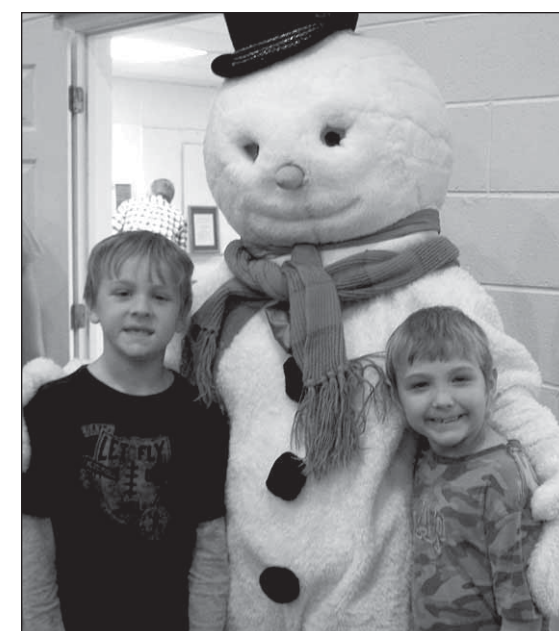
Rockvale Church of God ~ Breakfast With Santa

Just Because You Can!

I disagree. My mantra to my children has always been "Just because you can, doesn't mean you should." This assumes that one has some sort of moral code.

Our right to free speech protects even those who choose to let loose a volley of four-letter words upon a playground full of preschoolers. Just because you can, doesn't mean you should.

It also protects those who would stand in a town square under a white mask of cowardice and spew racial hatred into the ears of passersby. Just because you can, doesn't mean you should.

Our laws allow one to smoke until you die, as long as you aren't doing it in a public building, and you can get as drunk as you want as long as you aren't operating a vehicle. But - just because you can, doesn't mean you should.

In a perfect world, one would not need laws at all to keep its citizens from causing harm to themselves or one another. However, many adults are like their children and cannot discipline themselves. Therefore, we need laws to protect everyone.

We have citizens who seem to think that the universal laws of civility and common decency do not apply to them; that they are in some way exempt from good behavior. This is why our government is busily making up new laws everyday to cover that which should be common sense. We are apparently unable to discipline ourselves or our children and, therefore, we must be told what we can and cannot do. This is why, slowly but surely, every freedom we have will eventually be so constricted that the definition of the word "freedom" will have to be rewritten.

We have so many more laws, now, that protect the criminal rather than the victim. In the scenario where someone breaks into a man's home and threatens his family and his property, the man should be able to defend himself, his family and his property, with any means available to him, without being sent to jail or fined if he happens to hurt or kill the intruder. A Gluten-free Start To The Year

What is gluten and why are we seeing "gluten-free" on packaging more these days? Gluten is the protein found in wheat, rye, barley and oats (because oats are processed in the same buildings as these other grains). We're hearing more about gluten because more people are being diagnosed with Celiac Disease and gluten/wheat intolerance—and it didn't hurt that Chelsea Clinton had an eleven-tier gluten-free chocolate cake at her wedding reception.

Since 2006 when I began eating a gluten-free diet, my mother (the usual writer of this column) has made gluten-free food for me every time I visit from Germany. Lactose-intolerant herself, she understands the problems even "good" foods can cause. For a person with CD, the dinner table can be a danger zone. Gluten-free cooking is, however, easier than you might think.

Unprocessed foods that do not contain wheat, rye, barley or oats are naturally gluten-free. The following foods rarely pose a problem: a green salad with olive oil and balsamic vinegar; fruit and vegetables, potatoes and rice, cheese, eggs and meat (as long as it is not marinated in a bottled product).

If one of your family members or dinner guests has CD, this person cannot eat wheat bread or flour, cake, pasta or anything containing a bottled sauce (unless you see on the container that the product is "gluten-free"). Soya sauce, canned soups, stock and brown sauces are almost

always a problem. Check the ingredients before using any of these products in your recipes. If the product contains a thickener or "natural flavoring," check with the supermarket's product service line before you use it. Xanthan Gum, a thickener in many dressings, is gluten-free.

Large supermarkets will have a gluten-free section where you can buy corn meal to make cornbread and perfectly crunchy fried okra and squash—so everyone can eat it. You'll also find loaves of bread and gluten-free flour for cakes and cookies. My mother found a Betty Crocker gluten-free brownie mix at Kroger, which is why I'm two pounds heavier than I was this time last year. In the gluten-free section, you'll also find corn and rice pasta and mixes to make a brown sauce for meats. If you need recipes, www.celiac.com can help with hundreds.

With one in 133 Americans estimated to have CD, according to a 2003 study, the chances are pretty good that someone you know with the disease is coming to dinner this year. They may not even know they have it. I didn't know I had it until I moved to Munich, Germany where I started eating tons of "good" bread and pretzels.

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Martin Luther King, Jr. Day
Monday, January 17th

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is a United States federal holiday marking the birthday of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. It is observed on the third Monday of January each year, which is around the time of King’s birthday, January 15. King was the chief spokesman for nonviolent activism in the civil rights movement, which successfully protested racial discrimination in federal and state law. He was assassinated by a prison escapee in 1968 on the balcony of a hotel as he went to get some fresh air before making a speech.

The campaign for a federal holiday in King’s honor began soon after his assassination. Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law in 1983, and it was first observed in 1986. At first, some states resisted observing the holiday as such, giving it alternative names or combining it with other holidays. It was officially observed in all 50 states for the first time in 2000.



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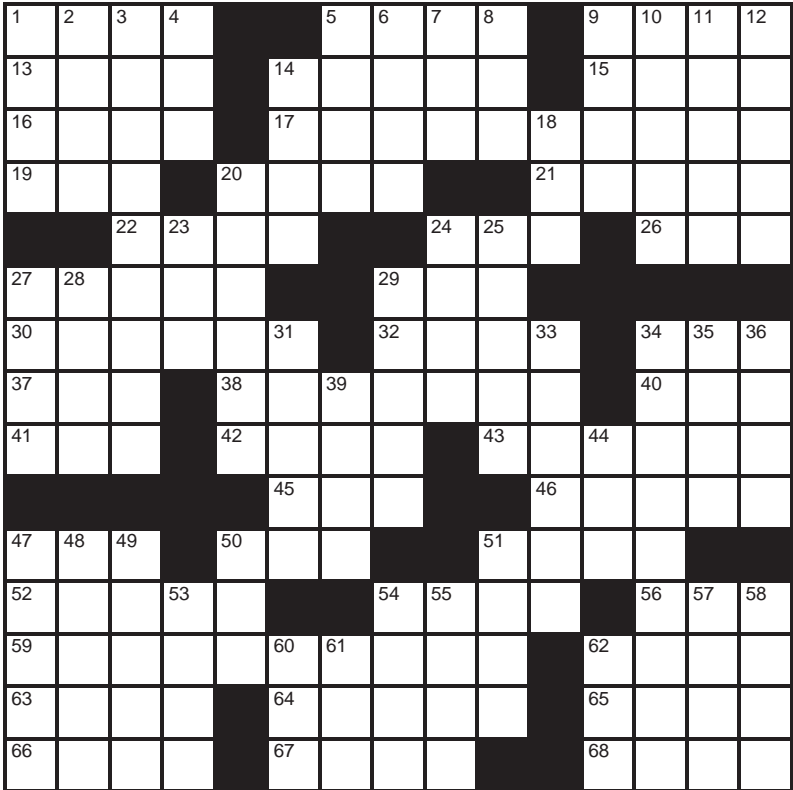

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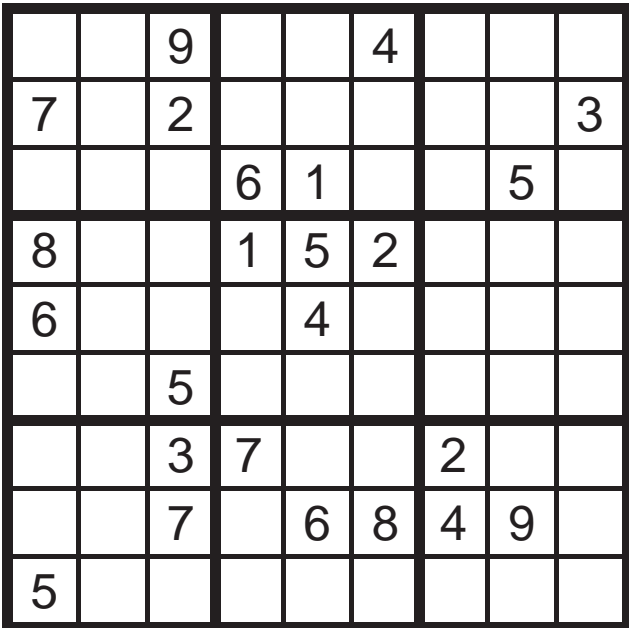

Celebrity Deaths of 2010

Denise Borino-Quinn - The actress, best known as mob boss Johnny Sack’s wife Ginny Sacramoni on The Sopranos, died of cancer. She was 46.

Barbara Billingsley - The actress, affectionately known for her iconic role as Leave it to Beaver’s quintessential 1950s mom June Cleaver, died at 94.

Gary Coleman - Diff’rent Strokes’ breakout star (and future troubled child actor) succumbed to a brain hemorrhage May 28 at the age of 42. Coleman languished for two days before life support was terminated with family and friends by his side. Even in death, problems plagued him as people questioned whether his ex-wife had permission to pull the plug.

Corey Haim - The Lost Boys star and 1980s teen heartthrob was found unconscious in his apartment early on March 10. While the 38-year-old showed flu-like symptoms at the time of his death, speculation of an accidental overdose on pills looms, at least until the results of a toxicology test are announced.

Caroline McWilliams - The 64-year-old actress, best known for her roles on Benson, Soap and the original Beverly Hills, 90210, died on Feb. 11 at her home in Los Angeles from complications of multiple myeloma.

Justin Mentell - The 27-year-old Boston Legal star and friend of Apolo Ohno was pronounced dead on the scene of his car wreck on Feb. 1.

Erich Segal - Love Story earned the scribe a Golden Globe for best screenplay, but the tale ended for the prolific author when he suffered a heart attack in his London home on Jan. 17. He was 72.

Teddy Pendergrass - The velvet-voiced crooner, who’d been paralyzed since a 1982 car accident, died on Jan. 13 following a “difficult” eight-month recovery from surgery for colon cancer. He was 59.

Jean Simmons - The two-time Oscar nominee (The Happy Ending and Hamlet) and Emmy winner (for The Thorn Birds) died of lung cancer at her Santa Monica home at the age of 80.

James Mitchell - The actor who spent three decades as patriarch Palmer Cortland on All My Children succumbed to pneumonia on Jan. 22 following a years-long battle with heart disease. He was 89.

Frances Reid - The soap opera community was in mourning in early February, as the original Days of Our Lives castmember died at age 95. She played Alice Horton from 1965 until 2007 and received a lifetime achievement award at the Daytime Emmys in 2004.

Merlin Olsen - The NFL Hall of Famer turned Little House on the Prairie star died on March 11 of complications of mesothelioma, which he was diagnosed with in 2009. He was 69.

Peter Graves - The 83-year-old Mission: Impossible and Airplane! star died of apparent natural causes on March 14.

Blake Edwards - The writer-director best known for helming such classic films as Breakfast at Tiffany’s and The Pink Panther died at the age of 88 of complications from pneumonia. Wife Julie Andrews was said to have been at his side when he passed away.

Leslie Nielsen - The Airplane! star, 84, passed away due to complications from pneumonia at a hospital near his Fort Lauderdale, Fla., home over Thanksgiving weekend.

James MacArthur - Best known for being on the receiving end of one of the tube’s most famous catchphrases, “Book ‘em Danno,” the actor played Detective Danny “Danno” Williams opposite Jack Lords’ Steve McGarrett in the original Hawaii Five-O. MacArthur passed away at his Florida home of natural causes. He was 72.

Tom Bosley - The veteran actor, best known for playing Mr. Cunningham on Happy Days, passed away from heart failure at the age of 83. Bosley also starred on Father Dowling Mysteries and had a recurring role on Murder, She Wrote.

Tony Curtis - The movie legend, whose films included such classics as Some Like It Hot, The Defiant Ones and The Sweet Smell of Success, died of cardiac arrest. He was 85.

Gloria Stuart - The actress, who began her career back in the 1930s, but was best known for her role as the older version of Kate Winslet’s character Rose in 1997’s Titanic, died at the age of 100. The performance earned her an Oscar nomination and the distinction of being the oldest acting nominee ever.

Eddie Fisher - The 1950s-era hitmaker, whose smooth voice sold millions of records, died at 82 of complications following hip surgery. He was married five times, most notably to Debbie Reynolds, Elizabeth Taylor and Connie Stevens. Survivors include his actress daughters, Carrie and Joely Fisher.

Kevin McCarthy - Nominated for a Best Supporting Actor Oscar in 1951 for Death of a Salesman, the actor’s real legacy falls to his role in the sci-fi classic Invasion of the Body Snatchers. He passed away at the age of 96.

Rue McClanahan - The Golden Girls star, best known for her man-crazed retiree role as Blanche Devereaux on the beloved sitcom, suffered a “massive stroke” June 3; she was 76. Said her manager, “She had her family with her. She went in peace.”

Dennis Hopper - The legendary actor and Hollywood rebel died May 29 at his home in Venice, Calif., after a lengthy battle with prostate cancer. He was 74.

Lynn Redgrave - The stage and screen actress, who rose to fame as the titular Georgy Girl in the 1960s, passed away May 2 after a battle with breast cancer. She was 67. “The endless memories she created as a mother, grandmother, writer, actor and friend will sustain us for the rest of our lives,” said, in part, a statement from her family.

Dixie Carter - The beloved southern belle, best known as Julia Sugarbaker on Designing Women, passed away April 10 at age 70. Her husband, Hal Holbrook, said in a statement, “This has been a terrible blow to our family.”

John Forsythe - The dashing Dynasty patriarch who also voiced the enigmatic Charlie in Charlie’s Angels died of complications from pneumonia on April 2 after a year-long battle with cancer. He was 92.
