#### **Eagleville Lions Club Horseshow Moves to New Location**

On Saturday June 19, the Eagleville Lions Club Walking Horseshow was held on the TVPPA/ Tractor Club property on Highway 99, Chapel Hill Highway. This was a new location for the show, which is the oldest, one night walking horseshow in middle Tennessee. With much preparation and hard work by Lions Club members and volunteers, the Show was a great success. The new facility offered a wonderful venue for participants and spectators alike. Refurbished bleachers provided seating for some and many people elected to bring lawn chairs and even blankets, making a picnic of the event.

The new show grounds offered a beautiful view from the hill, a gravel track in the show ring for the competitors as well as plenty of room to relax for the horses, riders and spectators. Without the convenience of an established concessions building, volunteers were creative and used a generator for electricity and propane grills to provide a variety of dinner choices. Visitors enjoyed Bar-B-Que sandwiches, hamburgers, hot dogs, nachos and the crowd favorite and tradition, country ham. The Eagleville Homemakers Club sold homemade pie and tubs of ice kept soft drinks and water cool.

Thankfully, the weather cooperated and the show ring was an endless parade of magnificent walking horses with their riders, showing and "showing off" for the judge. Some 25 classes competed that evening with over 169 total entries in the Show. An exhi-

David made the complete 26.2 miles in 4:01:34, thanks to training with TNT and the great support of his friends.

ing programs, organized to help raise funds for cancer research. The program began in 1988. This year more than 30,000 TNT runners, walkers, cyclists and triathletes will participate in the world's major marathons and triathlons.

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
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The Jeremy Jones FFA Memorial Scholarship was initiated in 2000 as a continuing memorial to the memory of Eagleville graduate and former FFA member and FFA officer Jeremy Jones. Jeremy attended Eagleville high school graduating in 1998. Following graduation he attended National Guard basic training, having joined as a junior, worked full time and was attending vocational school in Murfreesboro. He also was a volunteer fire fighter for the Christiana community. Jeremy had a strong network of friends, a close family and commitment to God and his church.

Tragically on September 1, 1999, he was involved in a fatal motorcycle accident. His immediate family, parents Gayla and Kyle Jones, and sister Tiffany Jones, his larger extended family, and his family of friends from school and church mourned his loss. Kyle and Gayla determined that a continuing memorial to Jeremy in the form of a college scholarship was an excellent way to honor him and the many friends and family who wanted his memory to continue in their hearts and in the hearts of others.

The Jeremy Jones Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a senior member of the Eagleville FFA. The member must have shown leadership, service, and commitment to the local FFA chapter throughout high school. He or she must also submit an essay to the scholarship committee that emphasizes what the money is needed for and how the student will use the money. The first scholarship was awarded to Lynne Taylor. Other recipients include

The scholarship committee was pleased to present the 2004 scholarship award to Jesse Emery. Jesse was a four year member of FFA, participated in Camp Clements leadership camp, held leadership offices his junior and senior years, and participated in various competitions including opening and closing team, soil judging team, and skills team. His essay, which Gayla read at the banquet is printed below, with permission.

#### Supplying my Tool Kit By Jesse Emery

When approaching any job, you need the right tools, you need a tool kit. You need knowledge, skills, materials, time and assistance to accomplish a task whether it is changing a tire on a tractor, competing in plumbing skills test, or leading an FFA chapter. When I think about college I realize I need a tool kit for that as well. High school has provided me with most of the tools for my kit.

This has been a busy year following a busy 3 years. I am fortunate to have had a great high school experience. Through Boy Scouts, FFA, Student Council, Spanish club and varsity sports I have learned leadership skills, teamwork, and commitment to a goal. Through a strong academic schedule I have acquired knowledge, practiced good study habits, and learned how to learn. Through my personal relationship

with God, I have established a strong faith and

a positive lifestyle.

All of these I am putting in my "tool kit" to take with me to the University of Kentucky. I chose UK for a number of reasons but the primary reason was that the school offers a degree in Landscape Architecture, which is what I have wanted to pursue since I learned about the profession. Attending school out of state at a large state university is an experience filled with challenges which I will face with confidence because I have a well equipped tool kit. It is also an expensive experience due to housing and tuition costs.





# Community Care Rx Discount Card for Medicare Beneficiaries

Medicare beneficiaries are not the only ones faced with the daunting task of choosing a Medicare-endorsed discount card. Wayne and Benita Carpenter of Eagleville Drug Center in Eagleville, Tennessee were faced with the same challenge.

"Right after the first of the year, we were inundated with contracts from companies offering these cards. We had to sort through the plans and make decisions about which cards to accept in our pharmacy, and which card, if any, to promote to our patients. We have done our homework and we are ready to assist our patients who are looking for help in selecting a Medicare endorsed discount card," Pharmacist Wayne Carpenter said.

While Eagleville Drug Center accepts many Medicare-endorsed discount cards, when patients ask, they recommend the Community Care Rx Discount Card

"After reviewing the different plans, we decided that we would support the Community Care Rx Discount Card for a number of reasons," Pharmacist Benita Carpenter said. "Most important is that this is the only card that passes 100 percent of the negotiated Medicare discounts from the drug manufacturers through to the patient at the point of sale."

Under the Medicare discount card program, card

sponsors negotiate discounts on prescription drugs from the manufacturers. Community Care Rx has negotiated discounts with major drug manufacturers, including Merck, Lilly, and Johnson & Johnson. These manufacturers are also making their patient assistant programs available through the Community Care Rx Card.

Beneficiaries who meet certain income requirements will receive even deeper discounts on their medications through programs provided by participating manufacturers. For instance, qualifying beneficiaries can purchase Lilly drugs for a flat \$12 fee with the Community Care Rx Card. Merck and J & J will also provide very substantial discounts for patients once they have exhausted their \$600 credit, resulting in discounts to these beneficiaries of close to 80 percent.

"We also found the prices offered through the Community Care Rx Program to be the same or better than most other plans," the Carpenters said.

The Community Care Rx Program allows patients to receive a three-month supply of medicine from their local pharmacy, and does not have a mail order component.


"We really like the fact that the Community Care Rx Program does not promote mail order. First of all,

mail order cannot provide the level of personal service and consultation to patients that we can face to face. We like the fact that we know our patients and their medical histories. We know their physicians. Good pharmacy practice revolves around personal relationships, primarily the patient-physician-pharmacist relationship. You can't have those relationships when your pharmacist is 3,000 miles away. Also, by not promoting mail order, Community Care Rx is helping to keep business in our community, which benefits our local economy," Wayne Carpenter said.

Community Care Rx is a Medicare-endorsed discount card program offered by the National Community Pharmacists Association, MemberHealth, Computer Sciences Corporation, and the Senior Care Pharmacy Alliance. For more information on the card, visit www.communitycarerx.com.

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



Garrett Lawrence started his career in the funeral business in 1941. He traveled from Chapel Hill to Nashville every day to attend Gupton-Jones Mortuary School. He was only required to attend for six months before he was allowed to

take the state board exam and obtain his license. After graduating, he worked for Cotton Funeral Home, in Franklin.

In 1940, Lawrence Funeral Home was rebuilt, after being destroyed by fire on the sight where Horton Highway Utility District is now located. Garrett joined his brother, Thomas, at Lawrence Funeral Home in 1942, while he still helped Mr. Cotton when he was needed. The brothers worked together to build the business before Thomas was called to serve our country in World War II. Since Garrett was

turned down for medical reasons, he ran the funeral home alone until Thomas returned in 1945. In 1953, they relocated once again to a new, modern building at the present sight.

Prior to the formation of County Ambulance Service, Thomas and Garrett ran an ambulance service for the surrounding counties. They not only responded to



accidents and emergencies, but also brought several babies home from the hospital.

It was about this time that electricity came to be in our part of the country. Garrett, being the more mechanically inclined of the two, saw an opportunity to expand their services. Garrett

purchased a general electric refrigerator, and after working at the funeral home all day, took it out to show potential customers. 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


#### TAKING ONE FOR THE TEAM



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



Vegetable oil -- for frying 1/4 cup butter 1/4 cup Louisiana Hot Sauce dash ground pepper dash garlic powder 1/2 cup all-purpose flour 1/4 teas. paprika 1/4 teas. cayenne pepper 1/4 teas. salt 10 chicken wing pieces

Heat oil in a deep fryer to 375. You want just enough oil to cover the wings entirely -- an inch or so deep at

Combine the butter, hot sauce, ground pepper, and garlic powder in a small saucepan over low heat. Heat until the butter is melted and the ingredients are well-

Combine the flour, paprika, cayenne powder, and salt in a small bowl.

If the wings are frozen, be sure to defrost and dry them. Put the wings in a large bowl and sprinkle the flour mixture over them, coating each wing evenly. Put the wings in the refrigerator 60-90 minutes. This will help the breading to stick to the wings when fried.

Put all the wings in the hot oil and fry 10 to 15 minutes or until some parts of the wings begin to turn dark brown. Remove from the oil to a paper towel to drain. Don't let them sit too long, because you want to serve them hot. Quickly put the wings in a large bowl. Add the hot sauce and stir, coating all of the wings evenly.



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
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#### CITY HALL

Continuing from last month: Zoning / Legal Basis

➤ Have advance notification of the location and extent of the construction or authorization of any public street, building, park, ground, open space, or utility, whether publicly or privately owned, for the purpose of planning commission review and approval (TCA 13-4-104);

This broad power to review and comment on any public project is sometimes referred to as mandatory referral. The Tennessee Code states unequivocally that the planning commission shall be consulted prior to the construction or authorization of any project, and this includes private utilities. The law provides that all state, county, and local agencies and officials having jurisdiction over such projects must comply with the referral requirement. The purpose of this referral is to assure that public projects and their locations are in compliance with the general plan, and further, to assure coordination between various agencies of different levels of government. Compliance with the planning commission's recommendations is not mandatory since the legislative body (City Council) or other responsible authority (i.e., a school board) can override the planning commission. However, it does guarantee that the commission has the opportunity to comment. Failure to comply with this provision could, in case of a court challenge, delay a project or even jeopardize some all together.

Prepare and adopt an official general plan

(TCA 13-4-201);

It shall be the function and duty of the planning commission to make and adopt a general (comprehensive) plan for the physical development of the municipality including any area outside its boundaries which bears a relationship to the planning of the municipality. The plan, as described in the legislation, is to show the planning commission's recommendations for the physical development of the area. The plan may include the general location, character and extent of the streets, bridges, waterways, parks, airports, public utilities, whether public or privately owned, and other purposes. In short, the general plan may cover any service the municipality might provide, as well as direction for many private activities. While the plan is not a legal instrument, the municipality does have ample power to implement it through a variety of means.



#### A Step Back in Time - Pleasant Hill School

Pleasant Hill School, sometimes called "Chigger Ridge" and "Pumpkin Center," was located on Rocky Glade Road about four miles north of Highway 99. It was on the south side of the road just east of the intersection with Taylor Road. It was established in 1923 with 45-50 students attending and was built with lumber from the torn down Little Rock School. It was a two-room white weather boarded building for grades first thru eighth. According to the late Harrison Mosley who attended Pleasant Hill School and graduated from the eighth grade, there was a

stage at one end of the room where chapel was held each morning for 5 or 10 minutes. When Harrison attended school, there were about 30 - 35 students enrolled most of the school years. The male students would take turns making the fire in the stove (for heat) in the winter months and also sweeping the floors. They were paid 5 cents a day. In the fall school would close for about 3 weeks for the families to get their cotton picked. He also remembered boys were often playing pranks. They would lay a crayon on the stove or mark on the side of the

stove and as it melted there would be a strong smell and smoke. At other times the boys would take a pin and stick the girls that sat in front of them by sticking the pin through the crack of the seat.

The first teachers were principal Georgia Lee Marable Pate who served four years, 1923 – 1927, and Elise Robinson. Others who taught there were Anna Campbell Morgan, Mary B. Prater Marable, Nannie Kelley Vaughan and Mary Frank Auberry. In 1931-32, Vera Covington began her teaching career there with Nannie Kelly Vaughan as principal. When Nannie Vaughan retired to raise a family, Vera Covington became principal and Frances McLain became the second teacher.

Because of consolidation of schools and the consequent decrease in small schools, by 1936 there were only 18 males enrolled in the fall with one teacher, Vera Covington. These students were: Grady Rowland; Alton, Robert and Clyde Clark; Alfred, Eugene, Charles and Fay Clark; Hayes and Johnny McDaniel; Pitts, Edward, Allen and Gene Morgan; Thomas Burns; Harrison, J. W. and Henry Mosley.

The Pleasant Hill School was consolidated with Rock-vale and Eagleville Schools in 1938-39. On March 1, 1941, the County Board Of Education deeded to Mrs. H. V. Hall the one-acre of school property. The old school building is now rental property for a family dwelling and is presently owned by Mr. Harold Hall.


