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### THE BUZZ AROUND CO-OP



#### SUMMER CARE FOR HORSES

As summer warms up, so do the needs of your horses. Horse owners should consider 4 management factors when the temperature starts to rise. These factors are ventilation, water consumption, rations and condition.

Sweating is the primary cooling mechanism in the horse. Turn out with shade is very important to help keep your horses cool. If stalled, barn doors and windows should be open, and each stall may require a fan on to increase good air flow.

A good water source is essential for good health in a horse. The adult horse consumes a minimum of 12 gallons of water a day and of course much more if doing any kind of work. Salt blocks or loose salt in a feeder should be provided for the horse at all times.

Protein can generate extra body heat in the digestion process. Rations should be taken into consideration during the heat. Working adult horses should not exceed 12-14% protein and mature idle horses should be at about 10-11% protein rations.

Even a well-conditioned horse can be easily stressed in increased temperature. Infrequently used pleasure horses should not be ridden hard, in case of either heat stroke or heat exhaustion, a veterinarian needs to be called.

### Tennessee Economy Claims Key Nationwide Rankings

In recent weeks, media outlets and news organizations across the country have placed Tennessee at the top of several top economic rankings. Awards for the most recent round of rankings for Tennessee include:

- •Being named the 4th best state in the nation for business by Chief Executive Magazine;
- •Placing as the 3rd best-managed state in the country by Barron's Magazine;
- Ranking 4th in the country for

transportation/road quality and 2nd in cost of living by CNBC;

• And being named the #1 state in the nation for retirement by Bankrate.com.

In addition to these honors, Site Selection magazine ranked Tennessee 8th in the U.S. for total number of new capital investment projects in the annual Governor's Cup Awards. The organization also named Tennessee the eighth best state in the nation for business climate for the second year in a row. These highly regarded annual rankings are based on a state's strong record of attracting new company investment deals, an analysis of statewide tax burden, and a survey of corporate site selectors.

Tennessee ranked seventh overall in Area Development magazine's 'Top States for Doing Business' list — up one spot compared to the previous year's survey results. Tennessee also scored the #1 ranking for overall global and infrastructure access, and beat out its competitors in ranking first in the nation for distribution/logistics hub access.

There is no doubt that in Tennessee, things are moving in the right direction. Through a strong partnership of the General Assembly and Governor Bill Haslam, state government has been successful in coming together to attract job-creators, inspire entrepreneurs, and put Tennesseans back to work. While Washington and other states around the country are broken, Tennessee is truly doing things right.

### Multiple Tennessee Laws Set To Go Into Effect On July 1

With the first half of the 2013 legislative session having concluded at the end of April, multiple laws passed during the first four months of the year are set to become effective on July 1. These new statutes include a wide array of subjects, ranging from education and taxes to healthcare, election laws, and public safety.

Various highlights of these bills include:

- •House Bill 193 Lowers the state sales tax on food from 5.25% to a flat 5.00 percent rate, putting an additional \$25 million back in the pockets of Tennessee taxpayers.
- House Bill 25 Requires the Department of Safety to waive the driving test for active duty and honorably discharged service members who apply for commercial driver licenses, if such person has already passed the test while in service.
- •House Bill 196 Enhances penalties for offenses committed by gang members and gang affiliated groups.
- •House Bill 288 Enacts the 'Jacob Nunley Act', which requires immunizations against meningococcal disease for incoming college students who live on campus.

- •House Bill 1294 Defines and creates enhanced penalties for prescription drug fraud.
- House Bill 999 Stops the exponential growth of Tennessee's beer tax by changing our outdated beer tax structure from price based to volume based, as is done in 48 other states.
- •House Bill 681 Requires any person convicted of a felony and sentenced to a local jail or workhouse to also be sentenced to participate in the jail's work program.
- •House Bill 222 Gives home schooled students an opportunity to try out for local school sports teams if they meet the same health, academic, and conduct standards required of other participants.
- House Bill 520 Increases penalties for promoting the prostitution of a minor from a Class E felony to a Class A felony.




### A Step Back in Time

### EAGLEVILLE CELEBRATIONS 1976-1977

**Eagleville Bicentennial Festival - 1976** 



On July 3, 1976, citizens of Eagleville, Tennessee celebrated America's 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary, with a Bicentennial Celebration and Festival; a two-day event, organized by a Bicentennial Committee of Eagleville.

On Friday night, June 2<sup>nd</sup>, a tractor pull was held on the school grounds. On Saturday morning, at 10 o'clock a parade began at the Bob Lowe Farm north of Eagleville and traveled to the Eagleville School. Pat Riley of

WLAC Radio was the grand marshal of the parade, which included floats, covered wagons, buggies, antique cars and numerous red, white and blue, decorated vehicles.

The festival, a fund-raising event for a proposed Bicentennial Public Library to be built in Eagleville, was held at the school, with numerous arts and crafts, contest and entertainment that included square dancers and music provided by The Stem Family, Johnny Frost, The Southern Comforts and The Red-White and Blue Revue from MTSU.

Enough funds were raised from this festival, to purchase land for the library, a very important project, sponsored by clubs and groups of the Eagleville community. Land, which was the site of the old tobacco factory and later a mill and warehouse, on Highway 99, was purchased on May 5th, 1977 by the Trustees of the Eagleville Community Center and Library Association.

### \* \* \* \* \* \* \* Heritage Day Celebration - 1977

July 16<sup>th</sup>, 1977 was an extremely hot day in Eagleville, but that didn't deter the large crowd that gathered on the streets of our small community, to view the Second Annual Heritage Day parade. The parade assembled near River Road, north of Eagleville on Highway 41A and traveled into downtown and to the Eagleville School, on Highway 99 where the parade dissembled.

Bob Clement, Public Service Commissioner, served as the Grand Marshal of the parade. Spectators along the route enjoyed floats, designed and built by local churches, businesses and civic organizations, horse drawn wagons and buggies, and other decorated entries.

As the previous year, as the parade ended at the school;

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Open Saturday & Sunday (615) 896-4568 Main Street in Eagleville the festivities, with a country carnival theme began. Activities included a country store, which sold hand-made items, dunking machine, fish pond, bingo, cake walks, and old fashioned games such as the three-legged race and sack race. Entertainment was provided by Eddie King and Country

Comfort, The Stem Family, Johnny Frost

and Keith Brent. In the evening, the men


of the city staged a womanless wedding.

All the proceeds of this celebration and other fund-raisers throughout the next few years went towards building the Bicentennial Library and Community Center. Ground breaking for the new building was held in December, 1983.





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

### No regrets for Craig Campbell

There's a lot to like about little Eagleville (population 610), plenty enough to remind country singer-songwriter Craig Campbell about his hometown of Lyons, Ga. (population 4,000).

It's likely coincidence, but one of the tunes on Campbell's new album Never Regret, which released May 7, is titled "That's Why God Made a Front Porch," while the motto on Eagleville's Web site reads "Where front porch rockers aren't just for show."

Campbell, 33, and his wife Mindy Ellis Campbell moved to this rural community in southwest Rutherford County almost seven years ago, and this is the place where they're raising their young daughters.

"This is very reminiscent of where I grew up, a really, really small town. Lyons, Ga., is bigger than this, but I actually lived on the outskirts of Lyons, which is very much like this: one caution light, one little convenience store. It reminded me of being home. I'm not a city guy. This is awesome," said Campbell during a mid-April interview inside Eagleville's Main Street Café.

The singer's single, "Outta My Head," currently plays on country radio stations. His songs "Family Man" and "Fish," from his first album, sold more than a halfmillion downloads. Campbell played keyboards in the bands of Luke Bryan and Tracy Byrd, and since signing with the Bigger Picture label, he has opened shows for Alan Jackson, Lady Antebellum and Martina McBride.

Campbell co-wrote six of the 12 songs on his new album, and says, "I try to write real songs that people can close their eyes and put themselves in my story. My family's a big inspiration. I write a lot of songs about my little girls, just life, stuff that I've done, experiences. Random ideas pop into my head. ... Inspiration is everywhere."

As for the album title of Never Regret, he says it refers to divine intervention.


"I just feel like that my road right here today, from the time I moved here [Nashville] back in '02, every decision I've made, every gut feeling that has led me to make choices, or stuff I've prayed about or stuff that me and my wife have talked about, are all decisions that I'll never regret. I'm here.

"That's where I think everybody should be. Once you think about something, and you decide to do something, and you do it, don't hesitate. Don't regret it. Just jump in."

Back in 2002, Campbell led a Georgia country group named Out of the Blue. When a guitar player quit the band, he decided it was the time to test Nashville.

"I believe in things happening for a reason: divine intervention. Not long after I decided that, a buddy called from Nashville, saying, 'I'm getting a divorce. I need a roommate.'

"I drove up on a Thursday, had an interview on Friday and got hired that day. I turned

around, drove home and got my stuff and came right back," recalled Campbell.

Soon he was playing keyboards for Tracy Byrd and Luke Bryan and getting an education to boot.

"Those guys are really good at what they do. So you just sit back and watch and soak it in. I wanted it worse than anything. I'd stand by the piano and deep down that's what I wanted. I wanted to be out front by the front microphone," Campbell said about his dream.

His big break came after playing The Stage honky-tonk every Tuesday night for five years on Nashville's Lower Broadway.

"There was a guy coming down to see me named Michael Powers. ... He'd come and see me off and on for years and finally one night he said, 'Hey, me and [hit songwriter and producer] Keith Stegall are putting together this company called Bigger Picture, We want you to be a part of it. Can I bring him here to see you?' I said 'Yeah.' It was in August of '08, and we been together ever since."

Amazingly, Campbell had never been a songwriter before he hit Music City U.S.A.

"It was Luke Bryan that pretty much told me that I needed to be writing songs. I told him, 'Man, what can I do? I feel like I'm spinning my wheels.' And he said, 'I can't tell you the right or wrong way to do it, but just write songs. Write every day and write with different people.' That was some of the best advice I ever got."

One of his co-writers is wife Mindy, who, along with tunesmith Blair Daly, shares credit on his song "Topless." Campbell met Mindy when she hired him to play piano for her. They had been acquaintances.

"She was always dating somebody. Eventually she was not dating somebody, and I pursued her, and she turned me down. Then a few weeks later she called and asked me if I wanted to play piano for her in Greenland. I said sure, and we started hanging out."

Among the songs on his new album, Campbell says "When She Grows Up" is most special as he wrote it for his daughters,

some brief vocals from Preslee, which Campbell taped two years ago.

"They inspire me. They think that daddy hung the moon. That's the way I want them to see me when they're my age and I'm an old man. I want them to still think that I'm Superman," he said.

Campbell began playing piano as a youth and pretty much picked it up naturally, only taking a few lessons. From the age of 10 to 18 he played the piano three times a week at his home congregation of Providence Baptist Church. (He notes that Eagleville Baptist Church was "pretty much a carbon copy of the church I grew up in.")

At 15, he captured first place in the local True Value Hardware talent contest, winning \$200 and a guitar. At 20 he started his own band, Out of the Blue.

"I had worked at the department of corrections a couple of years [in two state prisons]. I had enough. I was ready to play music. I knew I could do it and make money and pay my bills. I thought nothing could be cooler than that."

As for his musical influences, he said, "I grew up with the best era of all times: Travis Tritt, Alan Jackson, Tracy Lawrence, Shenandoah, Clint Black, Brooks & Dunn, the whole early '90s wave, the best of the best."

Incidentally, Campbell performed his first show close to his old hometown two weeks ago when he opened for Charlie Daniels at the Vidalia Onion Festival just a few miles from Lyons, Ga.

As a performer, Campbell has created a reputation for being a natty dresser, a habit he picked up on the advice of the man who made his cowboy hats (he owns an assortment of six).

"He told me one time that he went to a show, and he was dressed better than everybody on stage. He said that he thought that was disrespectful. That always stuck with me. I owe it to my fans to take it serious and look nice. I don't want to be the guy that blends in. I want to look like I should be on stage," said Campbell.

As for the cowboy hats, he says, "I've been wearing a hat for a long time. When I moved to Nashville it was something I wanted to do. I just think it looks good. I think it represents country music. I'm not a cowboy. I am a country boy, but I just think it looks good. It's just country music."

June 4th Campbell played host on the Nashville public square to the inaugural Celebrity Cornhole Challenge to benefit the TJ Martell Foundation's colon cancer research efforts.

"This tournament was a benefit colon cancer awareness and research, which I am very passionate about," said Campbell. "My father passed away at the age of 36 from the disease, and what better event to benefit colon cancer care than a cornhole tournament."

Joining him in the fun was country artists and celebrity friends Chase Rice, The Farm, Gloriana, Greg Bates, Jerrod Niemann, LoCash Cowboys, Love and Theft, Rachel Bradshaw, Australian duo Baylou, GAC's Suzanne Alexander and Titans kicker Rob Bironas

In the meantime, Campbell enjoys the hometown view that the front porches of Eagleville offer to its inhabitants.

### When Women Come Marching Home

Yes, I borrowed the title from a recent movie depicting the contemporary military woman. However, countless

women have come marching home who have served our country from The American Revolution up until the present conflicts. The following shows some of the ways women have served throughout history:

1775-1783 The American Revolution: Women served on the battlefield as nurses, water bearers, cooks, laundresses and saboteurs. And, there were also women who served in the regular fighting forces disguised as men.

<u>1812 The War of 1812</u>: Women served as nurses.

1846-1848 Mexican War: Elizabeth Newcom enlists as Bill Newcom and marched 600 miles before her identity was discovered.

1861-1865 The Civil War: Women also served in disguise. However, Dr. Mary Walker served openly and distinguished herself by receiving our nation's highest military honor—The Medal of Honor.

1898 Spanish-American War: 1,500 female nurses contracted to serve. Dr. Anita McGee became the first woman Assistant Surgeon General.

<u>1901-1908</u> The Army and Navy Nurse Corps was established.

1917-1918 21,480 Army nurses served, 18 were African-American women.

1920 Nurses were given the status of officer.

1939-1945 World War II 60,000 Army nurses and 150,000 WACS served. The Women's Air force Service Pilots were organized.

<u>1949</u> First African-American women enlist in Marine Corps.

<u>1950-1953 Korean War</u>: Female nurses were killed in the line of duty.

1961 The first woman marine was promoted to Sergeant Major.

1965-1975 Vietnam War: Eight women die in the line of duty.

1970 First woman is promoted to Brigadier General.

1972 ROTC opens to women.

1976 Women are admitted to the service academies and in 1984 the top graduate was a woman.

1978 A woman was promoted to Two Star General

<u>1989</u> 770 women were deployed to Panama. Two women commanded Army Companies.

1990-1991 The Persian Gulf War: 40,000 women were deployed and congress allowed women to fly combat missions.

1996 A woman was promoted to Three Star General.

1999 An African American woman commanded a Navy Ship.

2001 An Asian-Pacific-American woman was promoted to Brigadier General.

 $\underline{2003}$  A Native-American woman was killed in battle.

2005 14 women receive Silver Stars for combat action.

 $\underline{2007}$  The last World War I woman veteran dies.

 $\underline{2008}$  A woman was promoted to Four Star General





### 56<sup>th</sup> Reunion For Members Of World War II 483<sup>rd</sup> AAA (Anti-Aircraft Artillery) Automatic Weapons Battalion

Fri, Sat, Sun, June 21-23, 2013

Mr. Clifford Aycock was a member of the Army's WWII 483rd AAA (Anti-Aircraft Artillery) Automatic Weapons Battalion that was attached to the Marines when they landed at Iwo Jima. The 483rd manned large guns that were set up around the air strip to secure it for American planes to land on their way to Japan. After leaving the US, they had served on: Hawaii, Guadalcanal, Ulithi, Palu, Guam, Siapan, Tinann (Enola Gay left from here), and Iwo Jima.

Many of the men were from central Tennessee and northern Alabama & some had remained in contact after the war. In May, 1958, Clifford Aycock and his wife invited 3-4 of the men & their families to meet at our house Sunday afternoon. There were 17 men & their families came with a total of 54 people. They decided to make it an annual event & started locating as many of the men as they could. In 1960, just 2 years later, they had 94 men attend with families for a total of 248 people. They have had as many as 119 men attend with families for a total of over 300 people. Generally they met at parks in Tuscumbia AL, Columbia TN, Milledgeville GA, Columbus MS & Shelbyville TN. Since 1977, they have met at Henry Horton State Park, Chapel Hill TN.

Numbers have declined in recent years. We expect 10-15 of the men & their families to attend this year's reunion. Many of them are about 89-90. This is a special opportunity to talk with the men who were directly involved in WWII. Because of their declining numbers, we're not sure how many more years the reunion will continue.




