

#### **EAGLEVILLE HIGH SCHOOL - GRADUATION 2004**




May 21, 2004 the graduating class of 2004 gathered, some tearful, some nervous and others excited to dress in maroon cap and gown in preparation of the Big Event, the 2004 commencement exercises. This class is not the first and is not the last to graduate from Eagleville School but for each child and their family and friends it is a special night made

even more special as it was Principal Buddy Pate's last graduation exercises as an active principal.

The school year ended with senior week, breakfast, picnic in the park, graduation practice, Baccalaureate on May 16<sup>th</sup>, senior slide show and senior video. During the senior video, which everyone enjoyed, the seniors honored their parents by individually giving them a rose and many hugs. #### **Lynne Taylor Graduates UT With Honors**



#### Citizen of the Month - Ann Ralston Chrisman



Ann Ralston Chrisman was born Annie Lizzie Haynes in Triune, Tennessee in 1921. She attended College Grove School. She worked hard on the family farm along side her three brothers: Jody, Frank, and Jack, and her sister, Mary Alice (Lamb). In 1942, she married Charles Ralston, the youngest son of Mr. Jim Dub and Mrs. Carrie Ralston. Soon after the marriage Charles left to serve in World War II for five years while Ann worked in a sewing factory and waited for his return. She also worked at McClellan's Department Store and rode an urban bus to Nashville from Franklin.

In 1948, the couple built their home in Eagleville from salvaged lumber

from the Camp Stewart Army Base. The new subdivision was called "New Town" on Old Highway 41A, where Ms. Ann still lives today. They raised four children: Faye, Charles, Nancy and Rachel. Ms. Ann is my mother, and I am proud to celebrate her as a good citizen and an "Everyday Angel". To my mother, neighbors were just an extension of family. In the old fashion sense, she was just about the best neighbor a person could have.

Ms. Ann was well known as an excellent seamstress and a good cook. These talents were shared with every neighbor, friend, or relative we ever had. One of her best friends when I was young was Mrs. Rachel Floyd, wife of Ted Floyd. Mrs. Floyd was a teacher at Eagleville. She died while still a young woman, and

I will never forget the compassion my mother felt for her as a friend, and the sympathy she expressed through her actions and words. Over the years, "Mama" must have baked hundreds of cakes or casseroles and made hundreds of dresses and costumes for people in the Eagleville community. She also extended her generosity to our classmates and friends. Our house was always open and always full. I remember my brother bringing his friends home for the weekend so often that my mom had to say "Boys, you are eating me out of house and home. You'll have to stop coming every weekend." Well, the next weekend the same boys came again, but this time they brought their own groceries

Mama always made sure we were at Eagleville Methodist Church on Sunday, and we attended every Vacation Bible School in town during the summer. She began working at Eagleville School in 1959 as a cook. She didn't drive, so she rode the bus to school with us in the morning. Mr. Jordon Redmon was our neighbor and our bus driver. We never got by with anything at school. She was a lot harder on us than any teacher. Her work ethic was unquestionable. A favorite expression was, "If it is worth doing, it is worth doing right." She served Eagleville School for 30 years, and retired in 1989. Bless her heart, I sent my daughter to live with "Mama" during her first year at MTSU. Just as I had anticipated, my mother never let her miss a class. My daughter laughs when she tells how grandma would wake her and have her on campus hours before class began.

Through the years, she managed to continue to be a caretaker for many in their time of sickness. In Mama's retirement she was still a very vital and energetic person. She received a plaque for her service to the College Grove Senior Citizens program. It always seemed that "Mama" never met a stranger, or was never at a loss for words.

Our Dad died in 1979, but Mama handled every situation with strength. She became a grandmother six times and enjoyed that role very much. She has passed her strength to her children and grandchildren as we have struggled to create our own lives (our brother in Murfreesboro and the girls in Chattanooga).

In 1995 she became reacquainted with a childhood sweetheart, Dave Chrisman, which she had not been in touch with for 56 years. They married in 1996 and unfortunately, 6 months later she suffered a stroke, which for the first time in her life, required her to slow-down. She still smiles with her eyes whenever she encounters an old friend, and we still see some of that friskiness in her personality that makes her unique.


There is a best selling book currently being read by many. It is <u>The Purpose</u>


#### FFA TEAM WINS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP



#### FLAG DAY in AMERICA

Flag Day in American is celebrated to commemorate the day in 1777 when American adopted the Stars and Stripes flag to be her official flag.

We celebrate Flag Day on June 14th each year. Individuals and businesses hang flags outside. You will see flag poles all over the nation flying the Stars and Stripes. Some patriotic organizations will also honor the flag by having a parade or other Flag Day celebrations.

Congress first asked all public buildings to fly the flag on June 14, 1877, to commemorate the 100th year anniversary of selecting the Stars and Stripes as our flag. William T. Kerr of Pittsburg and Bernard J. Cigrand of Waubeka, Wis., were early leaders who held campaigns to celebrate Flag Day. The governor of New York pro-claimed Flag Day an official celebration for the first time in 1897. President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation in 1916 to establish Flag Day as a annual national celebration. President Harry S. Truman signed the National Flag Day bill in 1949, thereby recognizing June 14 as the official Flag Day in America.

#### CHOCOLATE SAUERKRAUT CAKE

2 1/4 cup Flour; Sifted 1/2 cup Cocoa; Baking 1 tsp Baking Powder 1 tsp Baking Soda 2/3 cup Butter or Margarine 1/4 tsp Salt 3 Large Eggs 1 1/2 cup Sugar 1 tsp Vanilla 1 cup Water

2/3 cup Sauerkraut - Sauerkraut should be rinsed and drained thoroughly and then chopped coarsely.

Sift together the flour, cocoa, baking powder, baking soda and salt; set aside. Cream together the butter and sugar in a bowl until light and fluffy, using an electric mixer set at medium speed. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in vanilla. Add dry ingredients alternately with water to creamed mixture. beating well after each addition.

Stir in sauerkraut. Spread batter in greased 13 x 9 x 2inch baking pan. Bake in a preheated 350 degree F. oven for 35 minutes or until cake tests done. Cool in pan on rack. Frost with Creamy Chocolate Frosting. Cut into squares.

NOTE: This is one of those dishes that sound absolutely horrible, but tastes great! It is also one of those recipes that is a classic but you can never find in most cookbooks. Everyone thinks that the sauerkraut is coconut. So be sure to rinse and drain the sauerkraut several times when you make this recipe.

#### CREAMY CHOCOLATE FROSTING

1 oz Semisweet Chocolate 1 c Confectioners' Sugar 3 oz Cream Cheese; Soft

1/8 tsp Salt

1/2 tsp Vanilla extract

Melt chocolate in a custard cup in hot water. Cool slightly. Combine chocolate, cream cheese, milk, confectioners' sugar, salt, and vanilla in a bowl. Beat with an electric mixer at high speed until smooth and creamy.

#### **Legal Basis for Planning**

The City of Eagleville, in coordination with the Eagleville Municipal Planning Commission, will be submitting subsequent articles that are designed to involve the citizens of Eagleville in community development and inspire citizens to contribute to planning and future development of their community. The City believes that success in planning and community development lies with how informed the citizen is, and recruiting the citizen's interest.

Local planning and land use regulation rest on powers granted to cities and counties by the state constitution, but state legislation shapes the manner in which these powers are exercised. Basically, cities and counties draw upon two broad categories of legal powers in their planning programs: corporate powers and police powers. Corporate power is the authority to collect money through bonds, taxes, fees, and assessments, and to spend it to provide services and facilities, such as streets, water, sewage disposal facilities, parks, recreation, and the like. Police power, reserved to the states by the federal Constitution and delegated to cities and counties by the state, is the authority to regulate a citizen's behavior, including the use of private property, to promote the health, safety, welfare, and morals of the public. The police power is elastic, evolving to accommodate changing community values, but its use is constrained by constitutional principles of equal protection and due process, including unlawful taking or damaging of property. Land use planning, zoning, subdivision regulation, and building regulation are all exercises of police power. 1

The City of Eagleville has a municipal planning commission. The municipal planning commission's police powers is authorized by Title 13 of the *Tennessee Code Annotated*. They are as follows:

Make advisory reports and recommendations to all public officials and agencies regarding the general plan and development of the area (TCA 13-4-

103);

This gives the local planning commission the power to make advisory reports and recommendations that relate to the plan, to any public official or agency, whether local or not, utility company, civic, educational, or professional organization. In addition, all such public officials are required to furnish the commission with any information which may be needed for its work. There is also a statement that the planning commission shall have such powers as may be necessary to enable it to perform its purposes and promote municipal planning. These powers are advisory only. However, it does mean that the commission may advise any body, public or private, whether a project or activity is in agreement with the general plan and use its powers of persuasion or information dissemination to affect the course of action. The planning commission may also request and obtain information from such agencies as a school board, power board, industrial development board, housing authority, etc., to determine whether their activities are in compliance with the plan.

Next month, more about this topic will continue.

In April I submitted my 11th City Budget to the City Council. As was true for the previous 10 City Budgets, there is a no tax increase accompanying this proposal. Much progress has been / and continues to be accomplished by securing grant money in a very competitive market. It does require study, visits to government officials, and preparation of documents, which equates to a time-consuming endeavor. Yet, this process is worth all the effort because this citizens of Eagleville benefit. My goal is to continue this approach. Hiring a grant facilitator to assist / lead is another positive step. Three of four grants submitted recently are the result of this partnership with Alan Farley. Without trying or making an effort, there is no success. Please understand that with matching grants comes a commitment from the City and its citizens. All of us are excited and there are more possibilities for an improved Eagleville in our future. This is a wonderful place to live.

The newly elected City Councilmen were sworn in on Tuesday, May 4<sup>th</sup>, at 4:00 p.m. at City Hall. Welcome to returning Councilmen Ronnie Hill and Terry Zumbro, and to newly elected Councilman M. A. Smitty.





#### A Step Back in Time - LITTLE ROCK SCHOOL

Little Rock School was located on Little Rock Road about three and ½ miles northeast of Eagleville on land owned by James E. Jackson, great grandfather of Johnny Taylor of Eagleville. The school building was directly across the road from the Jackson home (later home of Rush Sr. and Audrey Taylor). This school was established about 1884. The two-room building was weather boarded with shutters hinged on the outside for the windows. The play area was large enough for ball games. Water was carried in buckets from the Jackson home to the school. Located nearby in an adjoining field was the Tiling Factory, (where clay water drainage pipes was made). The property on which the school and tiling factory was previously located is now owned by Johnny Taylor. A store was also located in the same area at the intersection of Little Rock Road and North Lane. The original building burned and was rebuilt in the same location. The re-built store with additions is presently a farm implement business owned and operated by Ronnie and Steve McDaniel. In the early 1900's the store was a local gathering place for the men of the community at night. They would set on the porch and catch up on all the news of the day.

Lizzie Garrett Dyer taught in the Little Rock School about 1890. In 1902 the teachers were Tom Floyd and Susie Stegall Lewis. Others who taught about 1900 were Wate Lowe, Leonard Landis (about 1905), Lottie Ralston and Minnie Myrtle Ralston Owens. Others who taught later were: Bessie Buchanan, Era Steele, Kate Love Collier, and Jimmie Manier. Georgia Lee Marable (Pate) was teacher for the 1921-22 school year. Mary McKnight Manley was the last teacher at this school. At the time that Bessie Jackson Buchanan taught, about 1911, she was the only teacher and she had so many students she had to teach during recess to get all the classes taught. When Jimmie Manier was scheduled to be hired in about 1916, as a second teacher, the enrollment lacked one student to meet the requirement to warrant another teacher so Margaret Scott, age 5 at the time, stayed with her aunt Jimmie Manier to attend the Little Rock School for that year. She made the extra student needed for the school to have two teachers.

When the Little Rock School was closed in 1923, the building was torn down and the lumber was moved and used to build the Pleasant Hill School.

The late Mary Sue "Mammy" Maupin Perrell, a life long resident of the Eagleville area attended Little Rock School while growing up. She and the late Mrs.

Audrey Jackson Taylor were best of school-friends and that friendship carried over to their adult years. Several years before Mammy Perrell's death, her children recorded some of her memories, which included her school days at Little Rock and surrounding community. The following were her comments:

Question: How old were you? Answer: I don't know. Oh five years old I guess. I started to school when I was five years old. Mr. Manier went to school up there.

Question: Where? Answer: Little Rock. That's up here where Rush Taylor, you know Audrey Taylor lives. There use to be an old store there. When the store burnt up they built a new store and then a lot of the old men, they wanted to skate. They put the skates on Mr. Joe Jackson and Mr. Ralph Jackson, both of um was big and fat and couldn't stand up. They was all down in the floor. Pappy (her father, George W. Maupin) used to go out there at the store, like men will for a while at night and there was an old man, his name was Jackie Alcorn and they kept a barrel of red pepper. This old man didn't have no teeth and Pappy said he'd eat stick candy or anything anybody would give me. Pappy got some stick candy and rubbed it all in that red pepper and give it to him. Pappy said he just licked and slobbered. He was about a hundred years old.

Question: Who was your teacher? Answer: Aw, there was two rooms there and for a while they had two teachers and finally they just got down and had one teacher, Miss Kate. Aw Mr. Landers was my first teacher and then I had Miss Kate Love and then Mr. Manier's sister was my last teacher that I had up there you know at Little Rock.

Question: What did you study in school? Answer: Aw, we just had arithmetic. We first was on the chart like a calendar, hanging up on the wall and they had a big stick. The teacher did and he'd turn this over you know and he'd point out you know and all of us young'uns would stand around him you know and tell him what it was, and then after we got down off the chart we went into a primmer and then from the primmer you see, then we went into the first grade and then the second grade and you know on down like that.

Question: What is some of the things the young'uns used to do? Answer: Lord, I don't know. We use to get up there at Little Rock, get up and we'd pull little old cedar trees down and then one of us would get up in the top of um and they'd turn us loose and man we'd ride on down that cedar tree.

Question: How did you get back and forth from school? Answer: We walked. The bell would rang sometime before we got there and man we would nearly run ourself to death. One time I had my dinner in a little bucket and I fell down. I had some pickled peaches in it and here went my peaches just a rolling in the dust. One time we's at the school house and saw Pap a coming with a little bucket you know about 10:30 and ah, so dreckly Pap knocked, and the teacher went to the door and she said "Mary Sue your daddy wants to speak to you" and I went to the door and Pap said, "Get that bucket yall brought up here" said "that's a bucket of cracklins, yall didn't get your dinner bucket" and said "I was a plowing and Bet come to the field", poor old thang he had done walked two or three miles you know to bring our bucket up there with our dinner in it.

Question: Did you go to school all year or how long did you go? Answer: Naw, we just got to go you know just kinda in the fall or pretty weather and thru the winter and all we didn't hardly get to go to school cause it was too far to walk when it was cold and muddy and bad.

Question: What did you wear? Answer: Well just anything we could get to put on.

Question: A bonnet? Answer: Naw if it was cold weather, we had an old something tied on our head or an old cap or some'm another I reckon you know to put on.

Mammy Perrell has several children, grandchildren and great grandchildren presently living in the Eagleville area. They are so fortunate to have these and many other memories recorded. Mammy (b. 1900 d. 1994) and her husband Rosco (b. 1898 d. 1973) were parents of 12 children and friends of all who knew them.



#### WALKING TALL AGAIN

In December of 2000, Jim Benton walked into my life. Keep in mind that this is a guy that won't take "no" for an answer. After he wore down my initial hesitancy, we began dating and shortly after he asked me to marry him. When we reached the planning stages, we knew exactly where the wedding would be. We worked for months out in the country clearing rocks, cleaning out brush and repairing the horse barn.

On a gorgeous sunny day, after months of hard work and preparation, we were married on June 23, 2001 under the big oak tree on our farm.

Our first major purchase as a couple was a Tennessee Walking horse and her three-monthold colt. Jim had two ponies and it had been years since I had my own horse so we were by no means experts on raising horses. That didn't

stop us. Both of us love horses so we spent every available moment with these wonderful animals and gave it everything we had.

On April 7<sup>th</sup>, 2002, less then ten months of marriage had passed when Jim fell from the then yearling colt. He didn't fall far, but when I got to him I was devastated. I looked down at my new husband and saw that his foot was no longer attached to his leg. Of course I freaked out, as well as Jim's 11-year-old daughter, Maleigha, who was with us. Jim, being his calm and strong self, told me to just put him in the back of the truck and take him to the hospital. I was already on the phone to 911 and was afraid of injuring him worse.

Somehow we arrived at the hospital and were fortunate enough to get Dr. Ronald Derr, the orthopedic doctor on call. Jim was taken to surgery and Dr. Derr told me that Jim would be okay and not to worry. After the surgery I was told Jim was fine and would recover soon. Unfortunately things didn't continue that way. A few days passed and Jim became very ill. His leg was so infected that Dr. Derr had to remove all the met-

al he had placed in Jim's leg. Jim ended up in the hospital for almost three weeks in what was to become the first of many visits there. Needless to say we spent our first anniversary in the hospital.

What I'll never forget is Jim's positive attitude and his faith in God. Jim went on to have 14 more operations as they tried everything they could to get rid of the infection. Nothing would work. Through it all Jim's attitude never changed. He was the strongest person I had ever met in my life. He had gone through so much, yet he could still smile and was never down about his condition. He made the best of every day and kept a positive attitude. Many people asked him if he was going to get rid of the horse. He would firmly say "No! It wasn't the horse's fault."

Finally the day came when Jim and Dr. Derr had to discuss his options although they weren't very good. One option was to go through numerous operations with no guarantees. Jim chose option two -- letting them amputate his leg. He had already endured 22 months of grueling pain and wasn't willing to spend any more of his time sitting in a chair doing nothing. Jim and Dr. Derr had become very close through all the days and months since the accident so Jim couldn't bear the thought of Dr. Derr performing this one last operation. He had Dr. Derr refer him to another surgeon.

On February 2, 2004 Jim's leg was amputated below the knee. Again his strength and courage took over. Even after 15 surgeries and the loss of his leg, his attitude prevailed. He would always say, "Just look down the road and you'll find somebody else that's got it worse than I do." He never let this get him down.

On March 5, 2004, Jim took his first steps on his new prosthetic leg and hasn't stopped walking since.

Although our married life has seen very tough times, I believe it has brought us closer together. We share a bond that many couples will never know. Jim and I will be married three years on June 23<sup>rd</sup>. I'm so very fortunate to have Jim by my side. Jim is the strongest person I have ever known and an inspiration to all. So happy anniversary -- to my hero, my husband, Jim.

Kelly, who attends Eagleville High School, was nominated for this national award by Mrs. Olga Pace.


