
Eli Sadler - Impressive Jumper

Eli is one of the Valedictorians of Eagleville High School. He has received several scholarships and will be attending Middle Tennessee State University in the fall. He


is undecided about his future career plans.

Highway 99 - Start Date Uncertain

The proposed 4.6-mile segment of Highway 99 from Concord to Eagleville is in the state's current funding plan but a construction start date for the project is still not certain.

Highway officials are awaiting receipt of wetland water quality permits before taking bids for the project, according to a Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) spokesperson.

"We don't schedule a bid letting for any project until we have all the permits to begin construction," B.J. Doughty, TDOT community relations officer, said. "As far as we know it will be full steam ahead once these permits are issued."

TDOT has been working with the vari-

ous agencies on the wetlands issue for about a year now and hopes to have the necessary permits by the end of the year, Charles Graves, a member of the transportation department's project planning division, said.

Construction of the 4.6-mile segment will take about two summers, Graves said. He estimates the cost to build such a road could amount to about \$3 million a mile.

The proposed roadway will follow the existing Highway 99 alignment from the Concord area to about Swamp Road with some curves being straightened out along the way.

The road will turn south near Swamp Road on a totally new roadbed and will

run across the fields and pass Eagleville School on the south side. The new section will tie into U.S. 41-A just south of Holt Specialty Equipment Co.

Bradford Huebner, a developer from Toledo, Ohio, owns the land on both sides of the new road section between Swamp Road and 41-A, according to the 2001 TDOT right of way map.

The old Highway 99 into downtown Eagleville will remain the same and a ramp will be built west of Swamp Road to tie the new section into the current road

The proposed road will have two 12-foot lanes and eight-foot shoulders with 6 feet of the shoulders being paved. Turning lanes will be provided at Swamp


Road, Claxton Road, Mount Vernon Road, North Lane, Mount Pleasant Road and Ditch Lane, according to Joe Carpenter, TDOT design manager.

All the right of way has been bought for the new roadwork which amounted to 57 different tracts that totaled 28.13 acres, Graves said. The total right of way costs, including the land, relocations, appraisals and other items, came to almost \$2 million.

The right of way acquisition involved seven residential relocations and no businesses.

The roadwork will affect about 4.23 acres of wetlands that are located in six different areas and vary in size from .145

to 2.27 acres, Graves said. The wetland areas are mostly adjacent to the part of the road that follows the existing route.

"These areas accumulate water and have the plants that are associated with wetlands and we have to address them as such," Graves said.

The Harpeth Wetland Mitigation Bank contains enough acreage available for the state to use to replace the wetlands the highway project is taking, Graves said.

"We probably have to replace that on a 2 to 1 ratio," he said. This means two acres of wetlands would be needed for each acre disturbed.

The agencies involved in determining the wetland and the replacement areas include the Tennessee Department of Conservation and Environment, U.S. Wildlife Office, Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency, Environmental Protection Agency and the Corps of Engineers.

"They have to determine what ratio and the degree of replacement we have to do," Graves said.

The Highway 99 upgrade from Murfreesboro to Eagleville has been in the works for about 14 or 15 years. The part from Murfreesboro to Concord was completed about a decade ago.

In the early planning phases a couple of alternate routes were discussed, including following the current highway path into downtown Eagleville. But the closeness of the school and homes along the road as it approaches Eagleville caused dilemmas.

The amount of work needed to address turn lanes, signals and capacity problems at the 99/41-A intersection "would just about wear out the downtown area," Graves said.

"There is on the street parking there through the business section, and all that would just be a terrible situation for the business owners," he said.

The other option discussed was to build the new section of the road to come out on U.S. 41-A near where west Highway 99 that goes to Chapel Hill intersects 41-A. But as a result of community planning meetings, the current plan was decided to be the one that would best serve the community, Graves said.

Friends, long-time customers and employees met at the Samary Plantation on Allisona Road recently for a reception in honor of the Crosslin Supply Co. and the family which owned and operated it.

The area-wide hardware and building supply business, which began in Eagleville in 1933, was purchased by ProBuild Holdings Inc. last month. The Crosslin Store in Eagleville closed on May 7 but the ones in Franklin and Smyrna remain open.

Selling the store was a hard decision, Nancy Crosslin Davis said at the reception. Davis is the oldest daughter of founders Frank and Mary Esther Crosslin.

"But we felt like in the long run it might be better off for our employees because of all the benefits they will be able to have with the new company," she said.

Davis said the family had a suspicion that the Eagleville store might not be what the new company was looking for.

"That made it a very hard decision but it is just one of those things that had to be and we have to move on," she said.

The Crosslins still own the store buildings in Eagleville and "hopefully something good will be coming along there," Davis said. Davis worked in the Crosslin store in Franklin for 29 years after she and her husband relocated to open that location. She retired from the store about three years ago.

"My husband was working in the Chicago area at the time, and my father came up and said he was ready for us to come home," she said. "Henry (her husband) decided to come back so we came on July 1, and we opened the Franklin location at the end of November in 1973."

The middle daughter, Martha Kay Crosslin Brisby, said she worked in the Eagleville store as a child for 50 cents a day during the summers.

"I would read every book in the Rutherford County rolling library while I was supposed to be working," she said, but noted that she did manage to dust and do other similar chores.

The youngest daughter, Esther Crosslin Victory, never worked in the store.

"I just played there and probably worried everybody to death," she said.

The sisters reminisced about the store's early days.


"I remember playing in the streets of Eagleville, especially when it was a grocery store," Brisby said. "The Saturday night when they would have the drawing for the basket of groceries there would

be so many people and it would be so much fun."

Davis remembers loading the store's peddling truck and weighing sugar, coffee and beans in small brown sacks with a string tied around them. The family would load the peddling trucks at night in order to get an early start.

"They would trade coffee and sugar and things like that for eggs, chickens and other things that people had to trade," she said.

Some members of the Crosslin family will remain with the Franklin and Smyrna stores, with Greg Davis, Nancy's son, managing the Franklin store. Eddie Crosslin, son of the late Frank Crosslin Jr. and Marjorie Crosslin, will manage the Smyrna store.

Among the employees at the reception was Thomas Rowland, who drove a truck for the company in 1956 and 1957, when Frank Crosslin Sr. ran the business.

"Mr. Frank was a good man to work for," he remembered. "He was just easy to get along with and happy go lucky."

Jo Ann Shelton started working for the Crosslins in 1958 and still remains an employee in Eagleville.

"I am not going to one of the other stores but am going to do some part-time office work at the local store," she said, noting that she will work until "everything is wound up." Most other employees went to either the Smyrna store or Franklin.

Shelton said customers, who do not know the Eagleville store has closed, still come to the location.

"It's hard to turn people away," she said. "I am going to miss our customers and I hate the inconvenience that it is going to cause them to have to go somewhere else from Eagleville."

The sisters also expressed their sentiments about the customers.

"We have had lots of wonderful customers, and we have appreciated all their support," Davis said.

"So many of them feel like family to us because we had grown up with them," Brisby said.



died in childbirth when her sixth child was born. Mr. Smart, who was a Civil War veteran, was left to raise the newborn and his other five children by himself on a rural farm in the eastern part of Washington state. When Sonora became an adult, she realized the strength and courage her father had shown as a single parent and the parental sacrifices he lovingly made all those years.

She wanted him to know how special he was to her and inasmuch as he was born in June, she chose to hold the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane, Washington on June 19, 1910.

In 1924 President Calvin Coolidge supported the idea of a national Father's Day, but it wasn't until 1966 that President Lyndon Johnson signed the proclamation declaring the 3rd Sunday of June Father's Day officially in the United States. Even then, the first Presidential Proclamation in 1966 was only for one year. It wasn't until April 24, 1972 that Father's Day was assured annual recognition by Presidential Proclamation.

There will be pony rides for the kids along with a couple of moon walk bouncies and other kid related activities.



Here's my favorite photo--my paternal grandfather, Cooper Russell, and me approximately three years old, standing in front of the big vegetable garden that he and Grandma planted every year. Grandpa was born January 13, 1900, which made it easy to figure out how old he was each year when his birthday rolled around. I still think of him on that day even though he went to his heavenly home in 1988.

Grandpa was alway gentle, kind and mild-mannered. I never heard him raise his voice or get angry with anyone or about anything. I never heard him say a bad word about anyone, and it seemed that everyone loved him as well. Most people called him "Mr. Coop", but he was just "Grandpa" to us grandkids. He never spoke the words "I love you" to me, but I knew that he did just by his actions. I was always welcome to come and stay as long as I wanted at his house, knowing he and Grandma would get out the balogna and crackers or teacakes in the corner cabinet bear cookie jar, as well as the honey from Grandpa's beehives. As an adult, I never went to his house without him offering me some refreshment and something to take home with me from the garden.

Grandpa always had Spearmint and Juicy Friut chewing gum available, and he'd often take me and my brother Bill in his old black car to Bub Parson's store at Poplin's Crossroads to get a little treat such as a candy bar or Coca Cola that came in those glass bottles back in the 50's.

Grandpa listened more that he talked, and he didn't offer a lot of advise but when he did speak, you knew it was going to be words of wisdom from the experiences he'd learned in life. Generally, Grandpa wore overalls, as he was a farmer, but on Sunday mornings he would get all dressed up in his suit and tie and I would go with him and Grandma to the Zion's Hill Methodist Church around the corner from their house. I think Grandpa was a very "liberated" man for his time, as he always helped Grandma make up the bed every morning.

The screen door and fans were the source of air conditioning in the summer, and in the winter, a heater in the

living room, so it was a standard joke with us grandkids about how bad we dreaded going to the bathroom where it was icy cold. But the bathroom always smelled good with apples stored in the chilly bathroom

Grandpa took good care of his family, including "Mammy Russell", his mother, who lived in his house until she died and was laid in a coffin in the spare bedroom.

He finally had to sell the farm as he got older, but he still kept a smaller version of that vegetable garden growing in his new place.

The way Grandpa lived his life still continues to make a big impression on me even today, and I want to honor him on this upcoming Father's Day.








Frugal Father

Grady Frank Tittle, Sr. worked for the railroad in and around Knoxville, Tennessee as a rail car repairman

for 51 years. He often talked about the 296 things that could go wrong with a rail car. The John Sevier yards in Knoxville had five miles of excess track and all the trains that passed those parts had to go through his yard.

Frank, Jr., who was born in 1936, remembers how his father worked and saved. He even took a week-end job to save money for retirement. brother and father picked the five gallons of blackberries again before leaving for home.

Frank said his father never ceased being his father even after he was 36 years old and had been in the Army. Frank and his father were out fishing in their boat. While speaking with his father, Frank, Jr. used profanity. Frank, Sr. turned off the boat motor and proceeded to give his son a thirty minute lecture on the use of foul language. His father's "bad words" were "foot fire, Tom Walker, They Gentlemen and Upon My Swear."

Frank, Sr. often played tricks on people in order to teach them a lesson and you could hear him laughing and clapping his hands as he said, "They Gentlemen."

Grady Frank Tittle, Sr. was like the farmer who made his boy plow the corn. A neighbor came by and said, "You sure are raising some mighty fine corn." The old farmer replied, "I'm not trying to raise fine corn, I'm trying to raise a fine son."

Although, he raised a fine son, Frank, Sr. also raised fine vegetables along the railroad tracks. He said the soil was better there because it contained more nitrogen.

Frank, Jr. remembers he could ride the train free because his father worked for the railroad. Going up Saluda Mountain the train had to be pushed. Frank, Jr. watched out the window as the train strained to reach the top. The conductor got off the train to buy peaches. When he returned he shared them with Frank, Jr. Frank, Jr. said, "I was treated special, because the conductor knew my daddy."






Enough is ENOUGH! Let's play fair. The city absolutely needs to hire someone living in the city to handle this paperwork at a REASONABLE salary.

Garden Thyme With Tee

Plans for last two weeks of June:

Flower Plans

- Fill empty spaces with ageratum, begonia, coleus, geranium, impatiens and salvia.
- Plant hot-weather perennials like astilbe, shasta daisy, purple coneflowers, and rudbeckia.
- Deadhead Impatiens, Begonias and Salvia
- Prune snapdragons back severely to keep them blooming.
- Cut back foliage of daffodils, hyacinths, and tulips after they yellow.
- · Continue pinching back chrysanthemums.
- Put aluminum sulfate around azaleas, rhododendrons and hydrangeas to lower the ph.
- · Cut back tall perennials to keep in shape.
- Cut zinnias, cleome, and petunias to a young shoot and sprinkle about 1 teaspoon of 5-10-10.
- · Plant zinnias in vacant spots.
- Fertilize Christmas cactus 15-15-15

Houseplant Activities:

- · Repot any time needed
- Remove off-color leaves.
- Fertilize with water-soluble fertilizer every time you water or use spikes or Osmocote.
- Fertilize Christmas Cactus 15-15-15
- Spray with insecticidal soap for spider mites, scale and mealybugs. Take outside and get the leaf undersides and dirt also.
- Check for dry soil if tips of leaves or edges are burned looking.

Herb Garden Activities:

- Cut and dry leaves of Oregano when it is six inches high.
- · Cutting herbs makes them grow better.
- · Pinch basil constantly.

Fruit Activities:

- Hang bug buckets in each tree. Fill gallon milk carton one-half full of water.
 Add one banana peel, one cup vinegar and one cup of sugar.
- Tie Zest Soap in mesh bags around the trees to repel deer.
- Remove all canes of semi-bush fruits like blackberries when they finish fruiting.



Depression Glass: Something Pretty During a Dreary Day

The encyclopedia defines Depression glass as clear or colored translucent glassware that was distributed for free, or at a low cost, in the United States around the time of the Great Depression.

The Quaker Oats Company, and other food manufactures and distributors, put a piece of glassware in the boxes of food such as oats or in a detergent box as an incentive to purchase their product. The dime store was also a common place to obtain this inexpensive glassware. You could also get a free punch bowl and cups with an oil change at the gas station. A couple could obtain a piece of the glassware with a ticket purchase at the movie theater. A frugal shopper could buy a loaf of bread for about a nickel and purchase a piece of Depression glass for about the same price. The glassware was of relatively poor quality but it brought liveliness into some very dreary days.

More then twenty companies made more then 100 patterns. Some of the more common colors were clear, pink, pale blue, green and amber. Less common colors included yellow, jadeite (opaque pale green), delphite (opaque pale blue), cobalt blue, red, black, and white.

Depression glass has become a very popular collectible. There is a book published called, The Collector's Encyclopedia of Depression Glass, and it serves as a great reference to these beautiful pieces. This book is updated every couple of years. There are also a couple of online sources, JustGlass.com and GlassShow.com that may be of assistance. It's also important to know that for many years Depression glass patterns were being reissued. It is a very good idea to buy from a reputable dealer.

Lastly, finding Depression glass that is not scratched, chipped or cracked is sometimes impossible. You have to remember that these items were used on a daily basis. I have been told that you should run your finger around all the edges and rims to check for chips. You can hold each piece to the light to make the cracks, if any, more visible. You should also avoid pieces that have been scratched by knives or other utensils. "Sick" glass, or glass that has been permanently etched by automatic dishwashers, should be avoided also.

I hope these tips can help you in your endeavor to find those beautiful pieces of Depression glass. I'm sure many of you own these pieces and have the knowledge and expertise I lack. I have learned a little myself while doing researching for this article and I intend on finding my "own" little piece of glass for my home.
