#### Eagleville City Charter Stalls Out In State Legislature

A bill that would have rewritten the Eagleville city charter failed to be approved because it did not make it through the state Senate before the General Assembly adjourned on May 21.

The House version of the bill, House Bill 4271, was approved unanimously on May 20, and the Senate version, Senate Bill 4279, had passed on the second of three considerations in the Senate by May 13.

After the bill was approved by the House, it was to go to the office of the chief engrossing clerk to be "retyped without error or erasures" and then transmitted to the Senate. Sen. Bill Ketron said that the bill never made it to the Senate after it was engrossed.

"It passed the House and was being engrossed to send on a message calendar to the Senate for passage," Ketron said. "It never got forwarded from the House to the Senate for us to pass it before we declared sine die."

#### Another Business Wants To Locate On Cheatham Springs Road

Another company is seeking to locate on a 3.6-acre parcel of land on Cheatham Springs Road west of Clark Street.

The company, Superior Traffic Control-Memphis Inc. (STC), wants to relocate its existing Middle Tennessee branch office in LaVergne to Eagleville, according to a proposal presented by branch manager Steve Harrelson.

Harrelson spoke at Monday night's planning commission meeting.

STC specializes in providing safety services and materials for roadway construction. The family-owned company has been in business for 10 years with the main office located in Cordova just outside Memphis.

Company officials are proposing building a 4,000 square foot metal building warehouse on the property on Cheatham Springs Road immediately and then will build a 1,500 to 2,000 square foot detached office space within the next two to three years.

Along with the building, the company would like to fence some storage outside with a privacy fence, Harrelson said. Various pieces of equipment would be stored at the site, such as arrowboards, message boards, drums, posts, signs and so forth.

The plan is enter the 3.6-acre property from the unimproved Bobby Turner Drive right of way off Clark Lane. The company may install a secondary entrance off Cheatham Springs Road in the future, according to STC's proposal, but Harrelson said he did not think the company would need a second entrance at this time.

The branch would employ about six full time workers, Harrelson said. Typically the employees would come in and get their assignments in the morning and go out in the field. Regular office hours would be from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday to Friday but some workers may use the facilities after hours or on weekends occasionally, according to the proposal.

Harrelson said the type trucks used at the location would be the size of F350s with flatbeds. According to the written proposal, materials may occasionally be delivered by tractor trailer trucks with average loads being one to two trucks per month.

Types of work the company does include installation of warning signs for work zones, lane closures and detours; installation of permanent signage for roadways, subdivisions and other road guidance applications; light fabrication of sheet aluminum signs; rental of traffic control devices to general contractors, and resale of traffic control devices such as drums, signs, cones and other devices.

Bo Logan, Eagleville's city planner, said the city needed to address the proposed use first to determine whether it fits in the existing commercial C-2 zone for the property. Logan noted that the city had recently denied a heavy trucking company use for the Cheatham Springs Road property, and the city would have to be consistent in the uses that are allowed.

Logan also noted that there had been some mention about amending the zoning ordinance.

Logan said he would put his suggestions in writing by June 16 concerning the proposed use. No further discussion was had on the proposal.

In other business, Mayor Nolan Barham said planning commission chairman Nick Duke's term was expiring and recommended Duke for another three-year term. Barham said the recommendation would be brought before the next council meeting for consideration.

Commissioners discussed a proposed schedule concerning how far ahead applicants should submit proposals to the planning commission before the proposals are heard. Being considered is having proposals submitted about 30 to 35 days ahead of time.

Commissioners also discussed setting a 10 business day period before consideration of one or two-lot subdivisions. Commissioners decided to have Logan prepare a calendar as discussed for the upcoming year.

about the charter by the last hectic day of the session.

"We were dealing with the \$28 billion budget and things were getting added on over in the House on bills that we had never looked at before, and things were going back and forth on message calendars," he said. "We started at 8:30 that morning and I got home at 1 o'clock Thursday night."

Ketron said he probably would call Mayor Nolan Barham to apologize but said the bill not passing was "nothing of my doing."

"It just didn't make it back on the message calendar after it was inscribed by the clerk in the House to get sent to the Senate clerk's desk to be put onto a calendar for us to vote on," he said.

Rep. Curt Cobb said a lot of bills did not make it all the way through the Legislature because of time.

The proposed charter rewrite was similar to what most towns have now and the only controversial part of it appeared to be changing the residency requirements for city council candidates, he said. The revised charter, however, would not have affected the 2008 election, he said.

Whoever is on the council for the next General Assembly session, which begins in January 2009, can decide if they want to proceed with changing the charter and "can change it anyway they want to change it," Cobb said.

The city of Eagleville did not send the proposed charter rewrite to the state until less than two months before the two-year legislative session was to end. Mayor No-

Ketron said he was not even thinking lan Barham said earlier that he forwarded the proposed charter rewrite to the state soon after the councilmen approved it at their March 27 meeting.

> Both Ketron and Cobb had the legislative legal staff review the proposal before it was filed for introduction in the Senate on May 7 and in the House on May 6.

> "When there is just a section of a charter changed, it is pretty simple," Cobb said earlier. "But when it is a whole charter change, they have to look at the old charter and the new charter and go through them item by item and that takes a long time."

> A number of citizens had protested the proposed charter change, primarily because of the change in the candidate residency requirements. Some also suggested adding a recall provision and a nepotism policy, and they wanted to put in the revised charter a petition and referendum provision that is in the current charter.

> The revised charter would have required city council candidates to have lived in the city limits for a year while the current charter also allows those who live in the Eagleville precinct but who own property in the city to be a candidate.

> Petitions containing signatures of more than 60 city residents were presented to Ketron and Cobb asking them to not sponsor the legislation concerning the proposed city charter rewrite.

> The petition said that the 1977 charter needs to be revised but that the action should not be done until the current Tennessee Bureau of Investigation probe is over and until after the November election.

#### **City Receives State Enhancement Grant Funds**

The city of Eagleville received \$15,000 in state enhancement grant money at the May council meeting.

State Rep. Curt Cobb presented a \$10,000 check to go toward the Eagleville Bicentennial Library and a \$5,000 check for the city park. Cobb complimented the progress that has been made on the park.

"I don't know any small town that has a park as nice and as well kept as that park is," he said. "It tells a lot about the community where you have a place that and enjoy themselves."

Vice Mayor Ronnie Hill, who is over the park committee, said the \$5,000 will go toward the walking trail, which is expected to cost about \$30,000. The park group also has a car show set for June 7 to help raise funds for the trail.



#### **Prospective City Candidates Pick Up Petitions**

#### BY GLENDA DYER

As of Monday afternoon three prospective candidates had picked up nominating petitions, which is the first step toward qualifying for the Nov. 4 Eagleville city council election.

The prospective candidates include William (Wes) Fitzgerald, a dentist, and businessmen Alan Ball and David Turner. Local businessman Sam Tune is also expected to run for a council seat but had not picked up a petition by Monday afternoon.

Fitzgerald, Ball and Tune would be first-time Eagleville council candidates, but Turner ran against Mayor Nolan Barham in 2006. Barham beat Turner by a narrow margin.

Three full four-year council seats will be up for election on Nov. 4, which are those Nov. 4 city election is Oct. 6. Early votof Vice Mayor Ronnie Hill and Councilmen M.A. Smitty and Terry Zumbro.

Also, candidates may run for the twoyear unexpired term of former Councilman Greg Buchanan, who resigned Feb. 4 because he moved outside the city limits and did not own property in the city.

Hill said he plans to seek another term, and Zumbro said he is undecided. Smitty told the Daily News Journal he does not plan to run again.

Fitzgerald is expected to run for Buchanan's two-year unexpired term, and Ball, Tune and Turner are expected to run for the four-year terms. Hill said he does not know if he will run for the two-year term or another four-year term.

Councilmen seats are at-large, meaning the top three vote-getters for the threeunexpired terms will be the winners. The person who receives the most votes for

the two-year term will be the winner of Buchanan's unexpired council seat.

Those wanting to run in the Nov. 4 city election have until Aug. 21 at noon to file completed nominating petitions at the **Rutherford County Election Commission** office. The petitions must be signed by at least 25 voters who are registered in the candidates' district.

The petitions must be picked up at the election commission office by the prospective candidates themselves. The office is located on the south side of the square in Murfreesboro, and the telephone number is 898-7743.

Candidates must either live in the city limits or own property in the city and live in the Eagleville precinct.

The last day to register to vote in the ing will be held Oct. 15-30.

Results posted on the election commission's website show that Vice Mayor Ronnie Hill received 95 votes in the April 2004 municipal election. Councilman M.A. Smitty received 82; candidate Bobby Turner received 56, and Councilman Terry Zumbro received 86.

Eagleville elections have traditionally been held in April instead of November. But city councilmen voted in May 2006 to change the election date from April to November to coincide with the federal and state general elections in order to save the city money. City elections are held every two years.

The seats of Mayor Nolan Barham and Councilmen Harold Vincion, David Rigsby and whoever wins Greg Buchanan's seat will be up for election in November 2010.



#### **Federal Grant Funds Available For** Eligible Eagleville Residents

Income-eligible Eagleville residents have until June 15 to apply for federal grant funds to repair their homes.

The city has more than \$400,000 left in its \$500,000 three-year HOME grant, which ends on June 30, 2009. The goal of the program is to help maintain decent, safe and affordable housing, according to Cindy Raymond, housing coordinator with the Greater Nashville Regional Council (GNRC), which assists with the program.

The HOME program is funded under an agreement with the Tennessee Housing Development Agency through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

To qualify for funding, residents must own their home or have a 99-year lease on it and must have lived in it at least one year.

They also must have a total income of less than \$34,500 a year for a one-person gram to not assume they do not qualify for it. household. The income limit increases for each additional person in a household.

The cap on annual income for a two-person household is \$39,450; for a three person, \$44,350; for a four-person, \$49,300; for a five-person, \$53,250, and on up.

The HOME funds are available to pay for work needed to rehabilitate a home to bring it up to accepted housing standards determine the home cannot be rehabilito rebuild the home.

Raymond said the home does not have to be paid for to qualify but the agency would the recommendation is to rebuild the home.

Those who receive a grant for rehabili-

tation will get the money free as long as they do not sell the improved home for at least five years after the work is done.

Those whose home is rebuilt will also get the money free as long as they do not sell the house for 15 years. If the home is sold sooner than 15 years after the construction is completed, the homeowner will have to pay back a portion of the grant funds depending on the years remaining in the agreement.

Raymond said that about \$60,000 has been allocated so far in Eagleville for work on two homes in this grant period, and she has received one other application.

Application forms for the HOME program are available at Eagleville City Hall during normal business hours through City Recorder Colleen Adams.



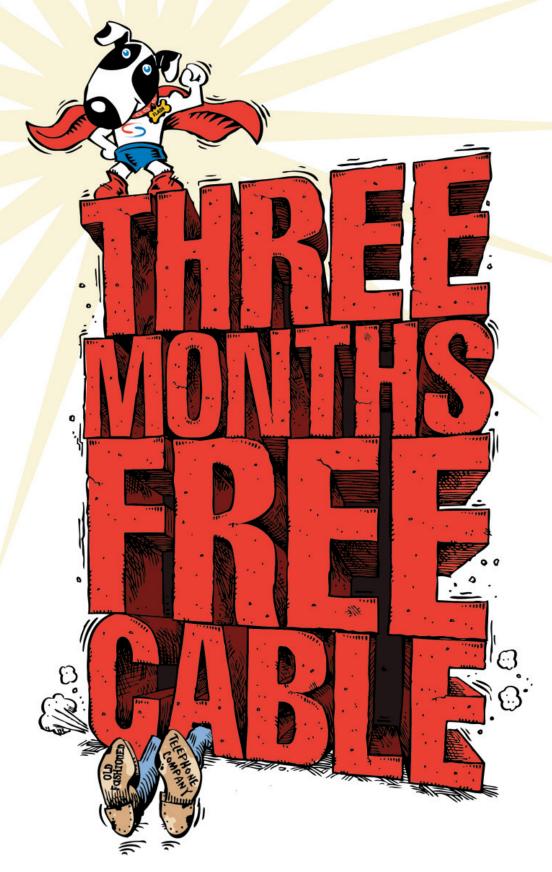

#### FARM SERVICE AGENCY ANNOUNCES DEADLINE FOR 2005-2007 LCP AND LIP SIGN-UP and New Farm Bill

County Executive Director Eyvonne L. Haynes announced that livestock producers have until July 18, 2008 to enroll in the 2005-2007 Livestock Compensation Program (LCP) and the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). These two programs provide for aid to producers who suffered an eligible livestock loss or livestock feed losses between January 1, 2005 and December 30, 2007 because of a natural disaster. Rutherford County was declared a disaster county due to the drought and excessive heat of 2007. On-going sign-ups have been conducted since last September, but are now coming to a close. Anyone who has not already completed this application should do so as soon as possible before the deadline.

A new Farm Bill was presented to the President for his signature two weeks ago. However, the president vetoed the Farm Bill and it was then sent back to Congress where the veto was overridden. However, a snafu caused a portion of the bill to be unsigned, but at this time all but one document has been enacted and signed that puts everything into law. Congress is currently correcting the missing portion and it will become law shortly. The Farm Service Agency will be sending notification to all producers this summer about sign-ups for crop-based and conservation programs as provided for in the new farm bill.

#### BURN BAN LIFTED

Eagleville Fire Chief David Martin announced recently that the ban on outdoor burning for the area has been lifted.

Martin reminded residents, however, that all burns still have to be tended.

"You can't just set a fire and walk off and leave it," he said. "Also we still have people burning illegally such items as tires and other man-made materials that you can't do in the state of Tennessee, so we have been having to run around putting out people's illegal burns."

Those burning tires could face a fine of up to \$500 a tire.

The burn ban could be reinstated if drought conditions occur with several weeks of dry weather, he said.

Martin announced at the May 22 council meeting that the Eagleville fire department had been training a lot but had no fire calls in 21 days.






## KIRKVIEW FARM

#### By Bobbie Sue Shelton-Lonas

While driving by roadside markets, and at times stopping and buying some flowers, fruit or vegetables, have you ever thought about where the items you purchased may have been grown? I'm guilty of just buying the items I want and never giving a thought of where and how much work it takes to have the beautiful flowers, fresh vegetables and fruit available for purchase.

Just recently I was talking with a friend, Wendell Warf, about the Kirkview Farm, where he "helps out," whenever he's needed, especially at planting time. Kirkview Farm, located north of Kirkland, is own by Carl and Teresa Thoni and has been in operation since 1991. The market is open from April till November each year. Located close to the market is several green houses where their flowers and bedding plants are grown and housed until ready for the opening of the market and the planting seasons. Carl Thoni stated approximately 200 acres of land is used for growing vegetables. Five to six acres of tomatoes, ten to twelve acres of peppers, ten acres of squash and cucumbers, and ten thousand cabbage plants are all included in the early setting. Thousands of plants are set out at different time at different locations during the growing season. Approximately twenty-five to thirty acres of sweet corn and sixty acres of pumpkins are also planted each year. In additional to the above, several acres of strawberries and about an acre of blackberries produce an early harvest for their roadside market.

The Kirkview Farm is a busy place, almost the entire year. In additional to growing





and getting plants set out in early spring, and the later settings, much work goes into the cultivation and conditioning of the land, adding plastic for moisture and weed control and drip lines for irrigating the plants, to name only a few of the chores. Approximately 60 rolls (40,000 feet per roll) of plastic are used each year along with about 30 rolls of drip line (7200 hundred feet

per roll). For an acre of land, two rolls of plastic and one roll of drip line is needed. Wendell stated it takes approximately 100 gallons of water to set out an average double row of plants. Tractors, setters and other special equipment are used for the above task.

In a few weeks, after all the hard work, getting the vegetables planted, reaping begins. Extra workers are employed at this time to gather the produce from the fields. In addition

> to the fresh fruit and vegetables you'll find at the Kirkview Farm, there are also many varieties of bedding plants, potted plants and hanging baskets available.

The next time I stop by the Kirkview Farm to buy some fresh vegetables, I'll remember these extra large "gardens" of 50,000 pepper plants, 10,000 cabbage plants, rows and rows of tomatoes plants and various other vegetables and the hard work that makes it possible for us to just stop and shop at the market. Thanks, Carl, Teresa, Wendell and everyone else at Kirkview Farm for their hard work, making fresh fruit, vegetables and flowers available to our community and the surrounding area. Thanks Wendell for the tour of the farm.



# Margaret's Helpful Hints

Remove stains from plasticware- Soak for 20 minutes in a gallon of warm water plus 1 cup of bleach. Wipe dry and then wash normally.

#### Beef Kabobs With Mixed A Favorite Recipe **Vegetables On The Grill**

1/3 cup A.1. Original Steak Sauce

1/4 cup pesto

2 Tbsp. lemon juice

1 boneless beef sirloin steak (1 lb.), cut into bite-size pieces

1 small zucchini, cut crosswise into 8 chunks

1 small yellow squash, cut crosswise into 8 chunks

1 large red pepper, cut into 8 pieces

1 medium red onion, cut into 8 wedges

Soak eight 12-inch wooden skewers in water 30 minutes. Meanwhile, mix steak sauce, pesto and lemon juice until well blended; set aside.

Preheat grill to medium heat. Thread steak and vegetables alternately onto skewers. Remove 1/4 cup of the steak sauce mixture; brush evenly onto kabobs. Grill 8 to 10 minutes or until steak is cooked through and vegetables are crisp-tender, turning and brushing frequently with the remaining steak sauce mixture.


