This team was one game short of the state title but with a record of 35 wins and 12 losses they can truly be


proud for years to come.





While this is possibly the most fun

and carefree time of the year, it is also the most dangerous.

I'd like to take this time to remind all the parents to go over the safety rules for your home. During the summer months children are often left home alone during the day while the parents are working. We often assume that the children know what they can and can't do and what they should do in an emergency. Some areas to cover are:

- 1. What appliances they are allowed to use when they are home alone.
- 2. What they are allowed to cook.
- 3. If they are allowed to use outside equipment such as weed-eaters and lawn mowers.
- 4. Pool safety
- 5. Who to call in an emergency.

For parents with small children, make sure you have all lighters and matches out of reach along with all poisonous chemicals and cleaning solutions. A Step Back in Time By Bobbie Sue Shelton-Lonas

In 1940 when a group of Eagleville community children, were preparing for the first grade at Eagleville School, the world was in a very disconcerting condition. Recently experiencing the Great Depression, United States was on the edge of World War II with the beginning of draft registration of approximately 16 million men. Franklin D. Roosevelt defeated his Republican challenger, Wendell Wilkie and became the United States first and only third-term president. Even with the war and politics being the news headlines that year for the parents, a group of five and six year olds, had other things on their mind; the new experience of leaving familiar surroundings of home, meeting their first school teacher, and making a lot of new friends. On the brighter side of 1940, these students got their first look at newly released Walt Disney's animated films, Pinocchio and Fantasia. Also the cartoon characters, Tom and Jerry made their debut.

Miss Frances Dement (Elmore), their first grade teacher, and Mr. J. W. Wheeler, the principal, greeted these students on the first day of school. In 1946 Mr. U. R. Elmore, former principal of Forrest High School in Chapel Hill, became their new principal and remained principal at Eagleville High School until his death in

As the teachers and class-roll changed through the years, it was 1952 and a class of 16 students, was in their last year of high school. The class roster included; Raymond Batts, Nancy Sue Crosslin, Rachel Dalton, Gordon Foster, Richard Grubbs, Gordon Layne, Hazel Manier, Sara Manier, Jo Ann Morris, Betty Jo Puckett, Johnnie Pugh, Cecil Ryan, Joe Shelton, Alma Taylor, Emery Vincion and Mary White.

Hazel Manier was class president; Emery Vincion was vice-president; Johnnie Pugh was secretary and Joe Shelton, treasurer.

In 1952, the Eagleville High School faculty, and subjects they taught included; U. R. Elmore, Principal, English and History; Mrs. W. E. Pate, Mathematics and American History; Mrs. W. T. Pittard, Typing and English; Carroll Smith, Coach and 8th Grade, Marvin Shanks, Vocational Agriculture; Miss Rebecca Spahr, Vocational Home Economics, General Science; Mrs. John Dyer, 7th Grade; Mr. D. L. Manier, 5th and 6th Grade; Mrs. Crawford Crowe, 4th and 5th Grade; Miss Sally Ezell, 3rd and 4th Grade, Mrs. Virginia Jackson, 2nd and 3rd Grade; Mrs. Martha Elmore, 1st Grade; Miss Ethel Elmore, Music. For several years, due to enrollment, there were split grades in the elementary grades.

Several students of the "Class of 1952", was very active in extracurricular activities; basketball, cheerleading, Future Homemakers of America, Future Farmers of America, Four-H Club and Music. In the spring each year, the Juniors and Seniors enjoyed the tradition of traveling to Chattanooga for the Junior and Senior class trip. Another anticipated event each year was the "Senior Play, directed by Mrs. U. R. Elmore. It took many hours of practice and on the big night, the auditorium would be filled with family and friends. (See inserted picture of the Senior Play Program).

During the senior year, classmates were also busy working on the school annual "Lone Eagle". The annual staff for the school year, 1951-52 were; Mary White, Activity Editor; Johnnie Pugh, Secretary; Nancy Crosslin, Editor-in-Chief; Hazel Manier, Art Editor; Joe Shelton, Business Manager; Jo Ann Morris, Class Editor. This class also carried on the tradition of having a class will in the "Lone Eagle";

Class Will---We, the Senior Class of EHS in the year of 1952 supposedly being of sound mind and memory, are aware, that after long years of work and play, that our school days have come to an end. Therefore we do hereby declare this to be our last will and testament.

To our Alma Mater, our beloved school, we leave our heartfelt gratitude for education, fellowship and fun.

To Mr. Shanks, we will all our 4-H emblems, pins and

good record books.

To Mr. Smith, we will all our perfectly good wads of chewing gum.

To Mrs. Pittard, we will all our unfinished typing assignments.

To Mrs. Pate, we will all of Jo Ann's curls. "What few she does not already have."

To Mr. Elmore, we will all the scrap paper in our desk. Joe Shelton leaves his likeness for basketball to Merkle Rigsby and Jerry Foster.

Mary White leaves her cheerleading ability to Betty Jane Holder.

Nancy Sue Crosslin will her ball suit and worn out tennis shoes to Alma Leathers.

Emery Vincion will his name "Pretty Boy" to Buddy







A Beautiful Garden Starts Now

Get out the shovel and trowels – Memorial Day weekend has just past and that means gardening for many. Spend a bit more time getting your garden off to a good start and reap the benefits all season long. Proper planting and post planting care means less maintenance, fewer pests and more produce and beautiful flowers in your landscape.

Start by selecting healthy plants free of insect and disease problems. There's no need to spend money on problems. And keep in mind that bigger is not always better. Instead look for compact plants with sturdy stems. The leaves should be deep green or the proper color for that variety. Avoid plants that show signs of stress such as spots, brown leaf edges, and holes. And when all things are equal, purchase the perennials with multiple stems.

Keep your purchase properly watered before and after planting. Check transplants daily and twice a day when temperatures rise, watering as needed. Increase success and reduce the stress transplants often face. Apply a plant strengthener such as JAZ Spray to protect potted plants from drying out until you are able to plant. Or apply to transplants to get your plants off to a vigorous start. These organic products are not fertilizers but rather naturally occurring molecules that work like an immunization to help new and established plants better tolerate heat, drought, insects, disease, and other challenges plants face.

Prepare the soil before planting. Though not glamorous building a good foundation for your garden will pay off this season and beyond. Dig one or two inches of compost, peat moss or other organic matter and a low nitrogen slow release fertilizer into the top 12 inches of the soil.

Now slide, don't pull, the plants out of their containers to avoid damaging their roots and stems. If they resist, gently squeeze small flexible pots or roll larger pots on their sides over the ground. This loosens the roots, releasing the pot from the container.

Gently tease any roots that encircle (girdle) the root ball. Or use a knife to slice through girdling roots or the tangled mass that often develops at the bottom of the pot. This encourages the roots to explore the soil beyond the planting hole. And a bigger root system means healthier plants that are more productive and beautiful.

Set your plants at the same depth they were growing in their container. Tall leggy tomatoes are the exception. These can be planted deeper or in shallow trenches to encourage roots to form along the buried stem. Cover the roots with soil and gently tamp to insure good root to soil contact. Water new plantings thoroughly; moistening the rootball, planting hole, and beyond. Spread a thin layer of shredded leaves, evergreen needles or other mulch over the soil to conserve moisture, suppress weeds, and keep the roots cooler when hot weather moves in for the summer.


Check new plantings every other day and water thoroughly and often enough to keep the soil slightly moist. Gradually reduce the frequency until your plants only need to be watered once a week in heavy clay soils and twice a week in sandy soils. Of course you'll need to water more often in hot weather.

And don't forget about the rest of your landscape. Plant strengtheners can be applied to established plants to prepare them for the often stressful season ahead. Treated plants will be better able to tolerate heat and drought as well as attacks from insects and diseases.

So get out and start planting to make this the best gardening season yet.



Rosacea And A Princess

A few weeks ago, a nurse at work was experiencing a flare-up of rosacea. For the first time I saw

firsthand not only the physical pain—but the mental anguish and frustration she was experiencing from the lack of an effective and coherent plan of care to treat this common skin disease. My friend had been treated by several dermatologists using several treatment options all with varied success. She tried prescription medications, and changes in diet both with dismal results.

Rosacea is a common skin disease often beginning with a tendency to blush or flush more easily than others. Rosacea can cause more than redness and because of the number of signs and symptoms of rosacea they have broken it into four subtypes.

- 1. Erythematotelangiectatic rosacea: Redness, flushing, and visible broken blood vessels (spider veins), swollen skin, skin may be very sensitive and may sting and burn, dry skin with roughness or scaling
- 2. Papulopustular rosacea: Redness, swelling, and acne-like breakouts usually where the skin is very red and they tend to come and go, oily skin, spider veins, skin may be very sensitive and may sting and burn, raised patches of skin called plaques
- 3. Phymatous rosacea: Skin thickening with a bumpy texture especially common on the nose but can also thicken on the forehead, ears, cheeks, and chin, pores look large, and oily skin
- 4. Ocular rosacea: Irritated and red eyes often looking watery or bloodshot, gritty feeling like sand in the eyes, eyes burn and sting with itching and dryness, can be sensitive to light, blurry vision, eyelids can become swollen and may look like they have a sty

Beyond the physical symptoms there are mental aspects of the disease also affecting a person's quality of life. In a survey conducted by the National Rosacea Society, 41% said their rosacea caused them to avoid public contact or cancel social engagements. Many worry their rosacea will get worse and about possible side effects of the medicine they use to treat the disease. Obviously, the feelings of frustration and embarrassment can lead to low self-esteem, anxiety and depression, which can lead to missed days of work. In the same survey nearly 30% said

the same survey nearly 30% said rosacea had caused them to miss work.

However, there are treatment options and those who seek treatment are more likely to experience an improved quality of life than those who don't. Treatment includes: Medicine applied to the rosacea, sunscreen (applied daily may help prevent flare-ups), an emollient to help repair the skin, lasers and





NATHAN BEDFORD FORREST HOMECOMING AND SOUTHERN HERITAGE FESTIVAL


The Tenth Annual Nathan Bedford Forrest Homecoming and Southern Heritage Festival will take place at the former Forrest Home near Chapel Hill, Tennessee on June 16th, 9 a.m till 3 p.m. Sponsored by the Sons of Confederate Veterans, this fundraising event is an effort to raise funds to help restore and maintain the former home of Nathan Bedford Forrest. Located at 4435 Pyles Road, Chapel Hill, many activities are planned including, Cavalry Artillery & Infantry Re-enactors, Confederate Silent Auction, Historical Demonstrations, Musical Entertainment, Children's Games, Historical Lectures, Food and Drinks. Admission \$5.00.

Owned by the Sons of Confederate Veterans, work is in process to restore the home place to it's circa 1830 appearance, when the farm was occupied by the Forrest family. It will also illustrate the simple rural background which General Forrest shared with thousands of other Confederate soldiers and their families.

When the farm was purchased by the Forrest family, it contained one hundred and eighty acres. Due to the sale of acreage, over the years, the site of only forty-nine acres, on which the house and barn stood, was acquired by the Sons of the Confederate Veterans. Since their acquisition, eight more acres have been added to the property.

Nathan Bedford Forrest was born July 13, 1821 in Chapel Hill, Bedford County, Tn. At the time of his birth, Chapel Hill was in Bedford County. Marshall County was formed in 1936 from Bedford, Maury and Lincoln Counties.

Nathan was the eldest son of William and Mariam Beck Forrest. Bedford, as he was called, was given the named Nathan for his paternal grandfather Forrest and Bedford, for Bedford County. A monument stands

near his birthplace in Chapel Hill.

In 1830, when Forrest was nine years old, his family moved to the farm purchased from Mr. Mayfield, on Pyles Road. The family lived there until 1833 before moving to Mississippi. Nathan Forrest, grandfather of Nathan Bedford, had previously moved to Mississippi and encouraged his son, William, to move his large family to Mississippi.

At the onset of the civil war, Forrest enlisted as a private in a Tennessee regiment. He was active in the Confederate Army from 1861-1865. Lieutenant General Forrest was one of two officers, in military history, to enlist as a private and receive the highest position, Lieutenant General, by the end of the war. It is reported that he visited his home place on Pyles Road, Chapel Hill, two times during the war.

Plagued by illness, Forrest died at the home of his brother in Memphis, believed of diabetes, at the age of 57. Services were held at Court Avenue Presbyterian Church in Memphis, with an oration given by Jefferson Davis. A funeral procession formed at the church by thousands of marchers, who then proceeded to accompany the body to Elmwood Cemetery where it was interred. In 1905, he and his wife were reinterred and moved to downtown Memphis in which today is known as Forrest Park, located on Union Avenue.




