

clude Senior Citizens, Scouts, and Tractor Club. In addition, families use it often for reunions and large family celebrations, showers, teas, birthday parties, and ball club parties. It has served as a Wedding Chapel, reception hall and a regular place of worship for Churches who have lost their building. The Library is a strong resource for children and adults in the community. An annual summer reading program guarantees it is used 12 months a year.

This Chittlin supper is a special event. Mary Alice and Gordon Lamb say it is there last. They are retiring after 27 years of organizing and working over 35 Chittlin suppers. This promises to be the biggest supper yet as volunteers are cleaning and preparing 2,000 lbs of Chittlins in the weeks before the supper. A large group will meet early Saturday morning to complete preparations and last minute details in anticipation of the crowd. They hope to see all of you in line, hungry for this southern tradition.



CITIZENS OF THE MONTH Margaret Elizabeth and Marjorie Ann Redmon

Margaret Elizabeth and Marjorie Ann Redmon, born April 29, 1928, are the daughters of Leon Hughes "Lynn" and Mary Tucker Redmon. They were the youngest of eight children and were born in Eagleville in the second house on the right on Allisona Road. This house was later owned and occupied by Mr. & Mrs. Scott Williams. At the time of their birth, twins were not expected and were a very big surprise to the family. Their sibling were Sammie, Leon Hughes "Jake", Russell, Roy, Leon Jr. "Junior" and Katherine. The day Margaret and Marjorie was born Katherine, who was about seven years old, ran across the road to their neighbors, Rob and Mae Shelton. Katherine told them to come and see the new baby girls, not just one baby but two baby girls. She was really excited. As they grew older, Katherine helped care for the twins, and the excitement of having twin sisters soon faded as they became a nuisance to her. Margaret and Marjorie were pretty spoiled by their older brothers. Their brother Junior would often say he wished there had been 3 of them instead of only 2. When Margaret and Marjorie were four or five years old they hid in a cabinet in their kitchen. Their mother wasn't able to find them and soon everyone in Eagleville was looking for the girls. This was a scary time for the family but had a happy ending, when they decided to re-appear. Another incident they remember well; their mother sent them to Arnold's Store, presently the location of the Eagleville Drug Center to get a jar of pickles. On the way back home they dropped the jar of pickles on the road near the service station on the corner of Allisona Road and Main Street. Their mother made them go back and pick up all the glass and pickles from the road. They weren't punished but they felt the embarrassment of picking up pickles and glass from the road was punishment enough. Their older brother Roy and his family lived across the road in front of their house. One day they decided to cross the road for a visit. The road had recently been sprayed with tar and they were barefooted. When they returned home with tar all over their feet, they were in trouble again.

Their father, Lynn Redmon, milked cows while they lived at this location on Allisona Road. Twice a day after the milking, he would drive the cows from behind his house, thru Eagleville to the creek on the south end of Eagleville to be watered and then back home. Margaret and Marjorie often walked with him helping to keep the cows all together.

Margaret and Marjorie attended Eagleville School, walking to school when the weather permitted. Their first grade teacher was Miss Grace Fann. They also took singing from Miss Ethel Elmore. Growing up in Eagleville they spent a lot of time with friends and having fun at the gathering place, home of Jane Stephenson Simpson. Some of the friends remembered were; Katherine Little, Mary Jean Hay, Dorothy Gillespie, Lucille Pope, Junior Bellenfant, Urban Little, James Fagan and Jane Stephenson. During this time they were always playing tricks on Halloween. Almost every year their front gate to the house would go missing before dark. They remember one year, Mr. Green Hay's outdoor toilet was moved to the roof of Bud Walker's barbershop, which was located near the present fire hall.

When the twins were at the age of 13, the Redmon family moved from Eagleville to John Windrow Road on a farm that is still home to Marjorie and her family. Marjorie married Earlen Freemond Patterson, son of Robert Lee and Alice Vaughn Patterson. They have four children: Fred Lee, Don Lynn, Ron Lytle and Pamela Bridget. Her sons, Don Lynn and Ron Lytle are twins with different birthdays. Don was born February 16, 1956, and Ron was born February 17, 1956. Fred is married to Patricia Ann Hester Crowell. He has two daughters: Tami Brooke and Brittany Ann Patterson and stepson, Coby Russell Crowell. Don married Kim Morgan and has a daughter, Kalyn Lee. Ron married Nancy Jane Morton and they have two children: Carrie Ann and Evan Grant. Bridgett married (div.) Don Miller and has two children: Brandon Chance and Shelby Lee.

Margaret married Walfred Alvin Pate, son of Henry Herman and Winnie Blanche Patterson Pate. They have four children: Walfred Alvin Jr., Mary Ann, Sandra Lynn and Melissa. Walfred "Buddy", principal of Eagleville High School is married to Bernice Scott. He has a son, Drew Ashley Pate and a granddaughter, Lily. Mary Ann married Robert Langley and has two children: John Pate Langley and Lindsey Clair Langley. Sandra married Charles Edward Reed and has a son, Andrew Pate Reed. With her medical problems her leg would not heal. She had to rely on a wheelchair and this made it impossible for her to get out of her home. She could not walk down even a few steps. This is where the members of the Rocky Glade Cumberland Presbyterian Church came out to share a helping hand. They reconstructed the existing small porch and made it stronger. Next, there was a lot of digging to be able to build a wheelchair ramp. At the end of the ramp there was concrete that had to be mixed and poured. Celebration of St. Patrick's Day



St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on March 17, his religious feast day and the anniversary of his death in the fifth century. The Irish have observed this day as a religious holiday for thousands of years. On St. Patrick's Day, which falls during the Christian season of Lent, Irish families would traditionally attend church in the morning and celebrate in the afternoon. Lenten prohibitions against the consumption of meat were waived and people would dance, drink, and feast—on the traditional meal of Irish bacon and cabbage.

The first St. Patrick's Day parade took place not in Ireland, but in the United States. Irish soldiers serving in the English military marched through New York City on March 17, 1762. Along with their music, the parade helped the soldiers to reconnect with their Irish roots, as well as fellow Irishmen serving in the English army. Over the next thirty-five years, Irish patriotism among American immigrants flourished, prompting the rise of so-called "Irish Aid" societies, like the Friendly Sons of Saint Patrick and the Hibernian Society. Each group would hold annual parades featuring bagpipes (which actually first became popular in the Scottish and British armies) and drums.

Up until the mid-nineteenth century, most Irish immigrants in America were members of the Protestant middle class. When the Great Potato Famine hit Ireland in 1845, close to a million poor, uneducated, Catholic Irish began to pour into America to escape starvation.

Despised for their religious beliefs and funny accents by the American Protestant majority, the immigrants had trouble finding even menial jobs. When Irish Americans in the country 's cities took to the streets on St. Patrick's Day to celebrate their heritage, newspapers portrayed them in cartoons as drunk, violent monkeys.

However, the Irish soon began to realize that their great numbers endowed them with a political power that had yet to be exploited. They started to organize, and their voting block, known as the "green machine," became an important swing vote for political hopefuls. Suddenly, annual St. Patrick's Day parades became a show of strength for Irish Americans, as well as a must-attend event for a slew of political candidates. In 1948, President Truman attended New York City 's St. Patrick's Day parade, a proud moment for the many Irish whose ancestors had to fight stereotypes and racial prejudice to find acceptance in America.

Today, St. Patrick's Day is celebrated by people of all backgrounds in the United States, Canada, and Australia. Although North America is home to the largest productions, St. Patrick's Day has been celebrated in other locations far from Ireland, including Japan, Singapore, and Russia.

In modern-day Ireland, St. Patrick's Day has traditionally been a religious occasion. In fact, up until the 1970s, Irish laws mandated that pubs be closed on March 17. Beginning in 1995, however, the Irish government began a national campaign to use St. Patrick's Day as an opportunity to drive tourism and showcase Ireland to the rest of the world. Last year, close to one million people took part in Ireland 's St. Patrick's Festival in Dublin, a multi-day celebration featuring parades, concerts, outdoor theater productions, and fireworks shows.

PORK CHOPS

4 Pork Chops

3/4 teaspoon salt divided

½ teaspoon pepper

3 tablespoons flour, all-purpose

1 tablespoon oil

3 medium potatoes (cut in 1" cubes)

4 large carrots, cut into pieces

1 small onion, chopped

1 can chicken broth

Sprinkle pork chops with ½ teaspoon salt and ¼ teaspoon pepper. Dreg in flour. Brown pork chops in oil, medium heat. Drain. Put pork chops back into skillet, add potatoes, onion and carrots. Sprinkle with remaining salt. Pour broth over all and cook covered on med-low heat until done (approximately 30-40 minutes). Done when pork chops and vegetables are tender.

A Step Back in Time

It has been almost 215 years since the first inhabitants moved into Eagleville. Eagleville was first named Manchester, but four years later, when the city obtained a post office, the name had to be changed since there was already a Manchester, Tennessee. While in the process of brainstorming for an idea for a name, an unusually large eagle was killed in the hills behind the city so the name Eagleville was came about. The name was officially adopted on August 16, 1836.

Until March 24, 1877, Eagleville was part of Williamson County. Williamson County refused to pay for a road to be built from the city of Franklin to Eagleville so Rutherford County offered to pay for it if Eagleville would become part of their county. That road was Hwy. 99 and ever since, Eagleville has been part of Rutherford County.

Families of Eagleville - The original inhabitants of Eagleville prior to 1850 were: Marshall, McClaran, McCord, Bennett, Manier, Clark, Williams, Russell, Hughes, Ogilvie, King, Nunn, Morgan, Williamson, Owen, Floyd, Phillips, Gentry, Crick, Kelly, Johnson, Bellefant, Bowman, Hemphill, Downing, McDowell, Puckett, Ralston, Mason, Chambers, Logan, and Henderson. Many of these families' descendants still reside here today.

Important People - Chesley Williams was born on July 22, 1809. He established a General Store in Eagleville in about 1832. He and his descendants sold goods there until 1972. He owned a majority of the land in Eagleville, was the principal stockholder of the Eagleville-Unionville Turnpike Company, and was the second postmaster. He provided a great deal for the city of Eagleville.

George M. Savage was born on February 5, 1849. He married Fannie Williams, daughter of Chesley Williams. They moved to Eagleville in 1884 and George founded the Savage School in the Female and Male Academy where the Eagleville Baptist Church is now located. The class ranged from first grade, to seniors in college. Dr. Savage resigned in 1890 but the school remained until 1904.

The Gravedigger of Eagleville - Around 1894 or 1895, a physician by the name of Dr. C.B. Heimark came to Eagleville. He had a good practice for awhile until some people noticed that he was making midnight trips to Nashville in a wagon with a mysterious bundle, and returning before daylight the next morning. This was his usual trip almost every night for three or four years. The people of Eagleville didn't think much of it at first until his patients who weren't seriously ill began to die immediately after he had diagnosed them. Shortly after, there was the discovery of two empty graves. Mr. Charles P. Gillespie says that he remembers his grandchildren saying that it looked like there was a sinkhole in their grandfather's grave. When they went to investigate, they found that the ground had been tampered with and when the grave was dug up, the coffin was empty. The only thing the grave robber had left was the clothes. The cases of only two more bodies were discovered but seeing that the mysterious midnight journeys to Nashville occurred over the course of three or four years, it was thought that there might be quite a few empty graves in Eagleville. Dr. Heimark was arrested and indicted by the grand jury in February 1898. He was fined only \$150 and sentenced to six months in prison. All of the bodies were brought back to Eagleville by train and returned to their proper gravesites.

Business in Eagleville - In the late 1800's and the early 1900's, a lot of schools and tobacco plants sprang up in Eagleville and the closely surrounding areas. There was one near Mt. Vernon, one where the present Community Center is located, and one near Henry and Al's Grocery. These were owned and operated by the Owen family. There was a saw mill, a flour mill, a tile mill, a few blacksmith shops, and seven grocery stores.

The first car dealership for Jackson brothers Chevrolet in Murfreesboro was started in Eagleville. James Jackson owned the tile mill in Eagleville and his sons owned the Jackson Chevrolet Dealership.

In October of 1933, Joe and Frank Crosslin opened a small store in Eagleville and named it Eagleville Produce Company. In 1940, the store was moved a few blocks up the street to the present location of Crosslin Supply Company. Frank made a building to house his feed, seed, grocery, and produce business. A restaurant was also operated from this location. Rolling stores called "peddling wagons" wheeled around the country roads selling coffee, fruit, and other grocery items in exchange for cash, chickens, and other locally produced items.

There was a tobacco manufacturing company on Cheatham Springs Rd. owned by A.P. Elmore. He moved to Eagleville and ran Rowena Flour Mill from 1892 until 1929 when it burned down.

In about 1943, Howard Marshall moved to Eagle-ville from Nashville and opened a grocery store next to the present location of the Eagleville Post Office. He ran the store until he died in 1984. On May 3, 1971, the store burnt down.

Fires in Eagleville - On July 11, 1952, about \$100,000 worth of property was burnt. Herbert Williams poolroom and café, (where the fire started) burnt. The fire spread from there to W.T. Lowe's hardware store and Puckett's Grocery store. These buildings were located where the dairy bar and city hall are now located. At the time there was no fire engine in Eagleville which is why there was so much damage done. None of the businesses rebuilt.

There were also a handful of other fires. The Eagle-ville Baptist Church burnt somewhere between 1864-1865. The hotel across the street from the Savage school where some of the students lived burnt on

March 28, 1890. Redmon's Restaurant burnt on August 24, 1960. Marshall's Grocery burnt on May 3, 1971.

Time Travel: Eagleville School - The very first Eagleville School was built in 1903. There were many other schools in the area and they were soon closed down with their students being moved to Eagleville School. In 1923, the school burned for the first time. Classes were moved to a local church until the school was rebuilt in 1924. Another fire destroyed the school in the 1980's and it was again rebuilt. It burned a third time in the summer of 1994 and was rebuilt into the Eagleville School that we know today.

The Fire of 1994 - News stations from all over the county rushed to get the coverage as the school burned on a Monday in the summer of '94. An investigation concluded that the fire started at around 5 am. There were many speculations as to how the fire had started; however, the police concluded that the fire was undetermined. They investigated everything from

a possible lightning strike to arson. The case is still undetermined to this day.

In the 1994-1995 school year, when the new school was



being built, there were rumors that Eagleville would lose the new high school. The people of the community fought with the commissioners and on March 13, 1995 it was voted, 19-2 the Eagleville would have a new high school built.

On June 6, 1995, at 10 am, a handful of people met for the Annual Groundbreaking Ceremony at the site of the new Eagleville High School.

Today Eagleville School is flourishing with roughly 1000 students, faculty, and staff.

CITY HALL

The City Council continues to study and work on improving our City. Since being elected as your Mayor, my emphasis has been to improve the quality of life for Eagleville citizens. The City Council has embraced this concept as well and is trying to do what is best for Eagleville. The adoption of the new ordinances is certainly a step in the right direction. My resolve is to maintain our historical heritage, yet, realize what the future may dictate to us and plan accordingly. The amount of time devoted to bring about a better life for Eagleville is much appreciated. So, when you see these Council members - Ronnie Hill, Bobby Turner, Terry Zumbro, Debbie Ryan, Harold Vincion and David Rigsby - and their family members, please tell them "thank you" for the time and effort given.

Once again, the Beautification Committee recommended and the Council approved the purchase of two entrance signs into Eagleville on the North and South ends of Highway 41-A. At a later date there will be signs for the other three entrances into Eagleville. In addition to the Council Members and their families, also tell the members of this committee of and their families a big "thank you": Gloria Hill, Janie Zumbro, Carolyn Barham, Debbie Ryan, Michelle Bennett, Melissa Buchanan, and Kim Baehr

Our two new city employees are Executive Secretary, Michelle Bennett and Librarian, Debbie Turner. Come by and say "hello" to these outstanding young ladies. They are going to be an asset to our City.

With the assistance of Bryan Collins, City Planner, the following is the second installment of zoning and it's importance:

The City of Eagleville, in coordination with the Eagleville Municipal Planning Commission, will be submitting subsequent articles that are designed to involve the citizens of Eagleville in community development and inspire citizens to contribute to planning and future development of their community. The City believes that success in planning and community development lies with how informed the citizen is, and recruiting the citizen's interest.

Local planning and land use regulation rest on powers granted to cities and counties by the state constitution and by the *Tennessee Code*. One of those powers is the authority to prepare and adopt a zoning ordinance. The *Tennessee Code* empowers the chief legislative body to adopt a zoning ordinance and also specifies the broad areas which may be regulated by zoning. However, before the legislative body may exercise these powers, the Planning Commission must make and certify to the legislative body a zoning ordinance and a zoning map.

Zoning is defied as a police power measure in which the community is divided into districts or zones by the legislative regulations which specify allowable uses for real property, size restrictions for buildings and lots, placement, and other development standards within these areas. Zoning operates as a program that imple-

ments the policies of the General Plan for the community. The zoning code (or zoning ordinance) is an ordinance enacted by the legislative body pursuant to state law that sets forth regulations and standards relating to the nature and extent of uses of land and structures, which includes a zoning map, and complies with the provisions of state law.
