## March Takes Us Outdoors - In The Country



March is a busy month. Winter exits as spring enters officially on March 20<sup>th</sup>. March weather can be unpredictable as middle Tennessee has seen snow and ice storms, tornados, and days pushing 80 degrees during this month of extremes. Spectator to outdoor spring sports do well to pack sleeping bags, blankets, sweat-shirts and long underwear as they prepare to watch their favorite softball and baseball teams.

St. Patrick's Day is celebrated March 17<sup>th</sup> by the traditional wearing of the GREEN and toasting the "Luck of the Irish". Many myths and legends surround St. Patrick most notable is that he drove all the snakes from Ireland. Actually, St. Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland and a well known historical Christian figure. St. Patrick lived in the fifth century and was the strongest evangelist to ever minister in Ireland. He taught the people there the Christian faith and almost the entire nation converted to Christianity. He adopted pagan symbols they were already comfortable with to teach this new faith including the shamrock to teach the concept of the trinity, using the image of the sun on the Celtic crosses, and using bonfires to celebrate the Easter season.

March also is the time that many of us begin to ready our gardens for seeding using tillers to work fertilizer in the soil. Some gardeners use March to grow plants from seeds using special "grow lights" or cold frames. This time of year allows for transplanting of trees and shrubs and nurseries and other stores selling plants begin to see an increase in trade. It is important to keep vulnerable plants protected from late season frosts and to make sure they have plenty of water.

March 25 through April 2, Rutherford County school children and teachers will enjoy Spring Break. Many families take advantage of the time off from school to camp in nearby parks or travel to the Smokey Mountains. Others may take day trips to special places in Nashville or other nearby towns. Some adventurous families travel out west for snow skiing. And some families choose the traditional trek to the warm gulf waters off the Florida coast.

In 2005 the Easter Season is in March. Palm Sunday is on March 20<sup>th</sup> and begins Holy Week. Many churches sponsor family events and Easter egg hunts during this season. Palm Sunday commemorates the day when Jesus entered Jerusalem amidst a cheering crowd and waving palms. Maundy Thursday is remembered as the Last Supper Christ had with his disciples in the Upper Room prior to his trials and death. This event is memorialized by churches as they celebrate Holy Communion and Maundy Thursday services in area churches recognize this special event. March 25<sup>th</sup> is Good Friday, the day set aside to remember the crucifixion of Christ. Area churches hold services during the day and evening to remember Christ's sacrifice.

Easter is Sunday March 27<sup>th</sup>



and area churches celebrate with joyous worship services, special music and special messages. In addition to worship services in the local churches, a community Sunrise Easter Service will be held at the school beginning at 6:00 a.m. This service which features music, prayer and a message provided by pastors and laypersons from area churches is followed by a country ham breakfast for those who want to attend.

# The Story of the White House Easter Egg Roll

The original site of the Easter Monday Egg Roll was the grounds of the United States Capitol. By the mid 1870s, the egg rolling activities on the West Terraces had gained notoriety as the children turned the Capitol grounds into their Easter Monday playground. The first egg rolls, largely family affairs, seem to have been held during the administration of President Andrew Johnson. Youngsters of the President's family dyed eggs on Sunday for the Monday rolling, which the First Lady would watch from the South Portico. A family member has attested to hearing the stories of such activity from Andrew Johnson Patterson, the President's grandson, who lived at the White House while his mother served as White House hostess on behalf of her invalid mother, First Lady Eliza Johnson. Although small groups of egg rollers were reported on the White House grounds under the presidency of General Ulysses S. Grant, the majority of egg rolling activity and all day picnics took place at the Capitol. The workers and tourists watched in fascination as the children rolled both their hard boiled eggs and themselves down the lush green hills.

The egg roll activity of 1876 took its toll on the grounds, a fact that did not go unnoticed by members of Congress. With an already inadequate budget to complete the landscaping and maintenance of the grounds, Congress passed a law forbidding the Capitol grounds to be used as a children's playground. The law was to be enforced in 1877. But that Easter Monday rain poured down, canceling any outdoor activities sending the egg rollers indoors to play.

On Easter Saturday of 1878, a small announcement in the local press informed the egg rollers the new law would be enforced. President Rutherford B. Hayes, taking his daily walk, was approached by a number of young egg rollers who inquired about the possibilities of egg rolling on the South Lawn of the White House. Unfamiliar with the activity [his first Easter Monday as President had been rained out the proceeding year] President Hayes, upon his return to the White House, inquired amongst his staff who briefed the attentive Chief Executive. The smiling President issued an official or-

der that should any children arrive to egg roll on Easter Monday, they were to be allowed to do so. That Monday, as children were being turned away from the Capitol grounds, word quickly spread to go to the White House!

President Hayes and his wife, Lucy, officially opened the White House grounds to the children of the area for egg rolling that Easter Monday. Successive Presidents continued the tradition, and the event has been held on the South Lawn ever since. The event has been canceled on occasion only because of poor weather conditions and during World War I and World War II. During the war years egg rollers were spotted on the grounds surrounding the Washington Monument, at the National Zoo, and even returning to the grounds surrounding the Capitol!

By the late 1800s such games as "Egg Picking," "Egg Ball," "Toss and Catch," and "Egg Croquet" were popular Easter Monday activities. The children attending the event take part in many newer activities, but rolling a hard-boiled egg across the lawn is still a highlight of the day. Presidents and First Ladies have personally greeted the egg rollers as have members of the Cabinet, athletes, musicians, celebrities from film, television, and theater and the official White House Easter Bunny. At the end of the day as egg rollers say goodbye, each receives a special presidential wooden egg complete with the signatures of the President and the First Lady and departs with fond memories of this happy tradition at the White House.

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# PATE PICKED FOR TSSAA HALL OF FAME

Walfred Alvin "Buddy" Pate has been honored as one of twelve inductees into the Secondary Schools Athletics Association Hall of Fame. The induction ceremonies will take place during a luncheon on Saturday, March 19, 2005. The luncheon honors current and all past inductees. "This is the ultimate honor for any coach or administrator involved with athletics. I am very excited. This is an honor for myself along with players and coaches who played and worked for me, respectively," said Pate.

Buddy is an Eagleville High School alumni graduating in 1963 and received his BS and MED degrees from Middle Tennessee State University in 1967 and 1971 respectively. After graduation, Buddy returned to his Alma Mater and began a successful 28-year coaching career. In nine years at Eagleville School, his girl's teams had 9 winning seasons and achieved a 187-54 records. His boys teams, going 10-36 his first two years achieved a 130-64 record for the next seven years, all winning seasons. In 1976 he became head coach of the Riverdale girls basketball team. Over his career, his high school teams won 7 District Championships, 2 County Championships, 1 Regional Championship and appeared in 2 Sub States and 1 State Championship game. He also coached Middle School basketball boys and girls and achieved a 153-61 record. His high school basketball teams had 555 wins and 314 losses. Buddy had 19 players to sign athletic scholarships and one player to play in the East West All-Star Game. He coached one High School All-American team.

Buddy became principal of Eagleville School in 1995 after a long successful coaching career. During his nine-year tenure as Principal he probably achieved and accomplished more athletically than any other principal at any other school in the history of the Tennessee Secondary Athletic Association. He started many new athletic programs at the school; middle school and high school football, high school cross country and girl's softball, middle school golf, baseball, girl's softball and volleyball. He started basketball camps for boys and girls and started booster clubs for all sports and football during his nine-year stint. He work very hard for the stadium for football, soccer, track, band, etc. and he's stated that the building of the multi-purpose stadium was his greatest accomplishment. Buddy retired as principal of Eagleville School in 2004.

In 1998-1999 and in 2002-2003 Eagleville School was awarded the A. F. Bridges State Award of Excellence. Also, during 2002-2003, the Tennessee Secondary Athletic Association presented Eagleville School with a National Award of Excellence Certificate.

In 2002, Buddy received Distinguished Service Recognition by the TSSAA.

In 1003-2004, he was awarded the A. F. Bridges Principal of the Year Award for athletics in District 4.

Buddy is the son of Alvin and Margaret Pate. He and his wife, Bernice, have been married for fourteen years and have one son and one granddaughter. They live in Murfreesboro.



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
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## Hill & Gaskill

Debbie is a 1980 graduate of Marshall County High School and is currently employed at the Marshall County High School in Lewisburg. She also contin-


ues her photography business of 13 years. Debbie is the daughter of Sybil Sanders and William E. Sanders of Lewisburg.

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

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A raised bed garden is ideal in areas where soil is primarily clay, rock, or sand. Some plants do not grow well in these harsh conditions. A raised bed is sometimes the best solution to the problem of poor soil, and a raised bed will improve drainage problems as well. According to the magazine "Gardening How To", published by The National Home Gardening Club, the article "Higher Ground", written by Paul Peterson, says that a raised bed garden is ready to plant earlier than a typical garden, because in the spring, the soil becomes warmer and drier more quickly than it would in a ground level garden. This can be a real advantage when planting slow growing plants. He also points out that gardening can be accomplished without having to step around plants. He goes on to say that plants can be protected from animals and garden pests easier than in a typical ground level garden. The suggested materials to place around your raised bed for animal control are plastic mesh, chicken wire, and hardware cloth. Insects can be thwarted by surrounding plants with garden fabric.

When choosing where to locate your raised bed, consider the type of plants you want to grow and the amount of sunlight the plants will require. The same article suggests the use of compost or other organic material to help hold moisture in sunny locations. It also recommends using lattice overhead if more shade is desired.

"Higher Ground" recommends the use of brick, stone, patio blocks, cinder blocks, wood, or plastic timbers for the frame of a raised bed garden. It warns against the use of railroad ties, since harmful contaminants can leach into the soil. The same article recommends designing a raised bed so the opposite side can easily be reached without having to get into the garden.

According to "Higher Ground", the soil should be loose so it can properly drain. Organic matter can be added to improve the quality and texture of the soil. Also recommended is the use of organic fertilizers. If your soil drains faster than it should, "Higher Ground" suggests mixing in peat moss, compost, or products that help soil retain water. The same article recommends using vermiculite, compost, or perlite if the soil is holding too much water.

Raised bed gardening can produce an abundance of beautiful flowers, plants, and vegetables in areas you never thought possible. It can also add beauty and value to your property. Some of the most spectacular and breathtaking plots are raised bed gardens.

## **Spring is the ideal time to plan and prepare your summer flowering annuals.**

Annuals are plants, which grow, flower, seed and die in the one-year. Their multitudes of colour brighten up existing gardens, or are spectacular in mass plantings, or even border, pots, hanging baskets.

## **Before you plant out your annual displays, a number of steps need to be followed:**

**Site** - where will your display be situated? Full sun, a lightly shaded area under a tree, rockery or perhaps a border lining a pathway. Before you make your plant selection, decide where the annuals will be planted so you can select seedlings according to their size, colour

and light requirements.

**Preparing the site** - Remove existing weeds before planting out. Annuals prefer a well-drained fertile soil. Adding organic matter such as well-rotted compost or manures will provide nutrients and improve soil structure. Peat will help retain moisture, and raising the beds will assist drainage.

**Display** - Work with colour and height. Select smaller annuals for borders and gradually step up in height with the taller plants being the backdrop. You may prefer a concentration in one particular colour, or alternatively a busy mass of many colours. Surrounding structures and existing plants should be considered, however, your own individual taste will determine your selection.

**Water** - water the area well before planting out annuals, and don't let the plants dry out in the punnets.

Now that your beds are ready, care needs to be taken when planting out. Try not to disturb the root system when separating the individual plants, and do not plant the annuals any deeper than they were in the punnet. Firm down each plant. Spacing is important and should be kept even. This will prevent awkward clumps, or sparse areas.

Each type of annual will have space requirements. For the best result, plant rows alternatively. Water well by hand after planting, a sprinkler may miss some of your new plants.

Although it may be a bit awkward, a light mulching around the plants will help hold in moisture and keep the weeds down.

**Maintenance** - Water regularly and do not let the plants dry out. A good thorough watering is better than a light sprinkle as the roots will remain near the surface instead of penetrating down into the soil.

'Pinch' prune new growth to promote a more dense plant, which will provide more flowers.

Liquid manures or chemical fertilizers can be applied when the buds are forming. This can promote a good healthy flowering period.

Weed regularly. Weeds will compete with your annuals for food, water and light. Be careful not to damage the annuals, particularly the root system.

To ensure maximum flowering period, remove the spent flower heads with a light prune. This will encourage a new flush of flowers.

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## TO NEW ORLEANS FOR A MARDI GRAS

Freeland and Sarah Maupin recently returned from a trip visiting friends in Houma, Louisiana where they attended a Mardi Gras. The Houma Mardi Gras has the largest number of Mardi Gras parades in the tri-parish area, which included Terrebonne, Lafourche and East St. Mary. Freeland had the opportunity, which was quite an experience, to ride a float during one of the parades. There was lots of music and people along the way dancing in the streets. From their float, tubs of beads were thrown out to the crowd of excited and noisy people. One of the parades they attended had

35 floats; some of them were 3-tier high. There was food everywhere, from roasted pig to "King" cakes, which looked like a big cinnamon roll with cinnamon or strawberry cream in the center. The icing was either gold, green or purple, Mardi Gras colors. In the King cakes a very small plastic baby doll is placed, a sign of good luck for the one who gets it. Freeland and his friends also entertained at the "Hercules Breakfast." The Krewe of Hercules has been around for 21 years and has the distinction of staging the parade that kicks off the Carnival season in the Tri-Parish area. With 650 members, it is also one of the largest societies. The Hercules Krewe was formed in 1984 as the only male night parade in Houma. The grand marshal for 2005 Krewe of Hercules Parade was Dan Haggerty—star of the 1970's television show "Grizzly Adams." This year's theme was "Hercules' Travels the World". King Hercules presided over the parade's 29 double-decker floats, as the riders dispensed beads, medallion float themed beads, cups, footballs and specialty beads. Nine marching bands provided high-stepping music. Each night of the Mardi Gras there are different types of parades. On Saturday night, the parade consists of an all-female Krewe of Aquarius. Six marching bands and 17 floats depict the theme "Children's Matinee". Riders threw Aquarius dolls, blue & silver beads and lighted items. They have over 300 members with the queen for the float chosen in a unique way. A king cake is cut and a number is placed on each slice. Members pull a number and receive their corresponding piece of cake. The member finding a gold crown in their piece of cake is the queen, with the member finding a mask in their piece, being the runner up.

Freeland and Sarah had the opportunity to attend a lot of entertainment functions with their friends, Rick and Dianne Folse. The Folse family is a well-known musical family in Louisiana. They have 4 different bands in their family and have recorded several CD's. Rick Folse lived in Murfreesboro several years ago. He and Freeland became friends and did a lot of entertainment shows for organizations and clubs in the Murfreesboro area. Rick is very talented musician, playing 13 different instruments. His father, Pott Folse also has recorded several CD's in different types of music including the "Swamp Pop" which has a different beat than the music from this area. It has been said that Pott Folse captures the true family values of Louisiana where music is as much a part of family life as food. This sure holds true for his family.

Mardi Gras comes from the French words meaning, "Fat Tuesday," combines religious tradition with a carnival or festival to welcome spring. In 1829 some young men returned to New Orleans, Louisiana, from a visit to Paris. Carrying

on a lively French custom, they dressed in costumes and masks and paraded through the narrow streets of the French Quarter of New Orleans. More people joined and followed them until they caught the attention of the ladies of the town, who leaned over their balconies and threw chocolates and kisses to them. From that time on, masked walking parades became fashionable in New Orleans in the springtime. The festivals became more organized and elaborate.

In 1857 a group of people calling themselves "The Mystick Krewe of Comus" made their way through the streets on floats pulled by horses. Later a person of true royal blood found his way into the festival. Alexis Alexandrovich Romanov, the brother of the heir to the Russian throne, visited New York and fell in love with an American actress named Lydia Thompson. He followed her to New Orleans, where the Mardi Gras was being planned. When the planners discovered that a royal person was attending the noisy festivities a float was added for a new king, "Rex". In 1872 the pattern was set for the boisterous fashion in which the Mardi Gras is celebrated today. Purple, green and gold became the official holiday colors. The Grand Duke Alexis was surprised and honored to sit on the float and play the role of Rex. Alexis and Lydia probably never even met but they began a tradition. Rex and his queen are chosen each year to ride on the largest float. They are masked and costume. Those around the royalty, called "maskers," "toss "throw-outs" which are, plastic beads, stuff animals and other trinkets.

The holiday had become a full carnival by the time Alexis participated. The word "carnival" comes from the Latin work meaning, "take away the meat". It is time of merry making and intense fun because "Fat Tuesday", the end of Mardi Gras is the last day that Catholics can eat meat before Lent. "Ash Wednesday" officially marks the beginning of Lent, the forty-day period of fasting before Easter.

Although some may consider Mardi Gras in New Orleans a minor version of a carnival in Latin countries, Americans are no less enthusiastic in having a good time and enjoying themselves to the fullest during the festivities.

## Jesse C. Tate



Jesse C. Tate is a fixture in Eagleville having lived here for a large part of his adult life. He was born September 21, 1933 in Cornersville, Marshall County. He attended elementary and middle school in Cornersville for 10 years and had perfect attendance. He finished school in 1952 when he graduated from Marshall County High School in Lewisburg. Jess's father was a general contractor in the Cornersville area and as Jess grew older he spent much time working with his father learning a great deal about the building trades. This early experience served him well later in life.

Jess served the United States in the Air Force beginning in 1955. He was stationed at Stewart Air Force base and then at bases in the north. He was a "weight and balance man" on air craft. This allowed him to fly all over the United States and overseas as well. While stationed in Greenland, his wife, Jean (Morris) Sinner who he married April 26, 1958 and her son Jimmy made their home in Massachusetts. It was simply to cold for the family to live with him near the base but Jess was able to spend considerable time with his family when military service allowed.

After his time in the service, the family moved to Ashville where he sold homes. Unhappy there, the family moved back to the Eagleville area in 1960 and Jess began a long career in the commercial building field. He started with remodeling homes and made cabinets for kitchens and bathrooms. He then began working in the commercial construction area. This business took him all over the southeast where he built for the Danner Corporation who owned Shoney's among other successful restaurants, various car dealerships, motels and hotels, and other commercial buildings. He and his father built the first portion of the hospital in Murfreesboro Tennessee and he also built the MedCor building in Williamson County.

After 35 years in the commercial building business, Jess retired. But not one to be inactive, he opened a shop in Eagleville. There he continued to work and did refrigeration and service for people and also made a quick name for himself as an excellent appliance repair person. He also was a part time auctioneer and a profession he enjoyed.

In addition to commercial construction, in 1979 Jess and his wife Jean successfully operated a restaurant in Eagleville, Momma Jane's. He owns the building where it was housed which now is home to Las Fiestas, the successful Mexican restaurant now open daily.

Jess has always lived an active life and he and Jean share a love of travel. With their travel camper, they have spent the winter months over the last few years in Florida. They enjoy people and have large circles of friends wherever they go.


On November 17, 1993 a tree fell on Jess severely injuring him. Jess suffered a broken collarbone and broken pelvis among other injuries.

These injuries limited his ability to walk, but Jess fought back and against the odds was walking and active before any of the doctors thought he would be able.

Jess and Jean both share a strong love and commitment to Eagleville United Methodist Church and faithfully attend on Sunday mornings. They have been active members for 45 years and in the past were adult leaders of the Methodist Youth Fellowship. He taught adult Sunday school for several years and served on the church's administrative board. Jess was also active in Eagleville Lions Club and was past president. Jess also served on the city council of Eagleville for 8 years.

In June 2004, Jess suffered a debilitating stroke at his home. Since then, he has worked hard in rehabilitation. # Scouts Certify for CRP Training



Tuesday night, Feb. 8, a group of 10 boy scouts and several adult leaders from Troop 123 participated in a CPR training class at the Eagleville Community Center. The course was given by 2nd Chance CPR, an organization run by EMT's from other counties, that trains and certifies people of all age groups in the important techniques involved to safely administer CPR. The participants were given thorough instructions and had hands on experience in administering CPR, as well as other life saving skills. By the end of the evening, all of the scouts had learned how to properly care for an individual that is choking, has stopped breathing, or has suffered cardiac arrest. "You can never plan an emergency," says John (Pic) LoPiccolo, the instructor for 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance CPR. "The best thing you can do is to be prepared for these kinds of situations so that you can remain calm and administer emergency CPR until help arrives." He went on to explain, "You may be the only chance a victim has to survive."

At the completion of the course, all participants will be given a certification card for CPR. The certification will last for 2 years before needing renewal. "I'm glad that I have some idea of what to do in an emergency," says 2<sup>nd</sup> class Boy scout Nathan Cron. "I feel better knowing I can help somebody out if they need my help."

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## FROM THE WIDE WORLD WEB - WWW

For those of you that don't have internet email, you tend to miss out on some pretty good statistics or jokes that get passed around the internet. For you, I decided each month to share some of this interesting fun.

\* Intended for fun only. No guarantees to authenticity.

- In George Washington's days, there were no cameras. One's image was either sculpted or painted. Some paintings of George Washington showed him standing behind a desk with one arm behind his back while others showed both legs and both arms. Prices charged by painters were not based on how many people were to be painted, but by how many limbs were to be painted. Arms and legs are "limbs," therefore painting them would cost the buyer more. Hence the expression, "Okay, but it'll cost you an arm and a leg."
- As incredible as it sounds, men and women took baths only twice a year (May and October)! Women kept their hair covered, while men shaved their heads, because of lice and bugs, and wore wigs. Wealthy men could afford good wigs made from wool. They couldn't wash the wigs; so to clean them they would carve out a loaf of bread, put the wig in the shell, and bake it for 30 minutes. The heat would make the wig big and fluffy, hence the term "big wig." Today we often use the term "here comes the Big Wig" because someone appears to be or is powerful and wealthy.
- In the late 1700s, many houses consisted of a large room with only one chair. Commonly, a long wide board folded down from the wall, and was used for dining! The "head of the household" always sat in the chair while everyone else ate sitting on the floor. Occasionally a guest, who was usually a man, would be invited to sit in this chair during a meal. To sit in the chair meant you were important and in charge. They called the one sitting in the chair the "chair man." Today in business, we use the expression or title "Chairman" or "Chairman of the Board."
- Personal hygiene left much room for improvement. As a result, many women and men had developed acne scars by adulthood. The women would spread bee's wax over their facial skin to smooth out their complexions. When they were speaking to each other, if a woman began to stare at another woman's face she was told, "mind your own bee's wax." Should the woman smile, the wax would crack, hence the term "crack a smile." In addition, when they sat too close to the fire, the wax would melt . . . therefore, the expression "losing face."
- Ladies wore corsets, which would lace up in the front. A proper and dignified woman. as in "straight laced". . . wore a tightly tied lace.
- Common entertainment included playing cards. However, there was a tax levied when purchasing playing cards but only applicable to the "Ace of

Spades." To avoid paying the tax, people would purchase 51 cards instead. Yet, since most games require 52 cards, these people were thought to be stupid or dumb because they weren't "playing with a full deck."

- Early politicians required feedback from the public to determine what the people considered important. Since there were no telephones, TV's or radios, the politicians sent their assistants to local taverns, pubs, and bars. They were told to "go sip some ale" and listen to people's conversations and political concerns. Many assistants were dispatched at different times. "You go sip here" and "You go sip there." The two words "go sip" were eventually combined when referring to the local opinion and, thus we have the term "gossip."
- At local taverns, pubs, and bars, people drank from pint and quart-sized containers. A bar maid's job was to keep an eye on the customers and keep the drinks coming. She had to pay close attention and remember who was drinking in "pints" and who was drinking in "quarts," hence the term "minding your "P's and Q's."
- One more: bet you! didn't know this! In the heyday of sailing ships, all war ships and many freighters carried iron cannons. Those cannons fired round iron cannon balls, it was necessary to keep a good supply near the cannon. However, how to prevent them from rolling about the deck? The best storage method devised was a square-based pyramid with one ball on top, resting on four resting on nine, which rested on sixteen. Thus, a supply of 30 cannon balls could be stacked in a small area right next to the cannon. There was only one problem...how to prevent the bottom layer from sliding or rolling from under the others. The solution was a metal plate called a "Monkey" with 16 round indentations. However, if this plate were made of iron, the iron balls would quickly rust to it. The solution to the rusting problem was to make "Brass Monkeys." Few landlubbers realize that brass contracts much more and much faster than iron when chilled. Consequently, when the temperature dropped too far, the brass indentations would shrink so much that the iron cannonballs would come right off the monkey. Thus, it was quite literally, "Cold enough to freeze the balls off a brass monkey." (All this time, you thought that was an improper expression, didn't you.)

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

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## Margaret's Helpful Hints



To deodorize plastic containers, wad up newspaper, place it in the container, cover, and let sit overnight.

Most foam, feather or down pillows and duvets can be washed in your washer on a cool, gentle wash setting, with a mild liquid soap. Foam pillows should be air-dried, while feather and down pillows can handle a tumbling in the drier, set on cool. Pop in a tennis ball or two to help fluff them up.

- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 Tbsp. Italian Dressing
- 1 can (10-1/2 oz.) condensed chicken broth
- 2 broth cans of water
- 4 cups chopped broccoli
- 1 cup fat free milk
- 1/2 cup Minute White Rice, uncooked
- 1 cup Sharp Cheddar Cheese



Cook onion in dressing in large saucepan until tender. Add broth, water and broccoli. Bring to boil; cook 8 to 10 min. or until broccoli is tender. Stir in milk and rice. Reduce heat to medium; cook 5 min. Pour into blender or food processor container in batches; cover. Blend until smooth. Return to saucepan; cook on low heat until heated through. Top each serving with shredded cheese.






