Quality Water Supply For Eagleville Residents

Much progress has been made on a new water system project that will primarily supply water to residents living in the areas south and west of Eagleville.

"Our goal is to serve areas that the old system can't serve and also provide services to the rural areas of the western part of Rutherford County and the southeastern part of Williamson County," said Larry McElroy, general manager of the Rutherford County Consolidated Utility District (CUD).

Over the last several years the CUD has received requests for water service from residents on Floyd, Greenwood, Bunker Hill, Highway 41-A and other roads because of either poor water quality or no water at all.

"It is our board's policy to try and get potable water to all residents in our service area who want our service," McElroy said.

The CUD has already built a new pump station on Highway 41-A on the south side of Eagleville in front of Tru-Line Tools for the new system. The pump station has two 10 horsepower pumps that can be exchanged for larger pumps if needed in the future.

"We can expand the capacity of the system without having to upgrade the pump station," McElroy said.

The new system operates at 30 pounds per square (psi) higher than the old city system and thus cannot be connected to the old system. The old system serves 293 customers within the Eagleville city limits. Currently the new system has about 125 taps installed.

The utility district has already laid about 14 miles of pipe for the new system. A 12-inch line feeds water to the new pump station on Highway 41-A with eight and 10-inch distribution lines taking the water away from the pump station. The CUD's water comes from Percy Priest Lake. The utility district treats the water and chlorinates it



and adds fluoride.

From the new pump station in Eagleville, the lines go south on Highway 41-A to the Bedford County line and lead on the property near the cell tower, but off 41-A onto Highway 99 toward Chapel we were fearful of interfering with the Hill to the Marshall County line.

The Rutherford County CUD has an interconnection with the Bedford and Marshall county water systems which allows during emergencies.

The new line also goes down Floyd Road to Highway 31-A and turns north on 31-A. Currently the line stops at about Charles Williams' house but future plans Highway 31-A and Allisona Road then east on Allisona Road to Elmore Road. The new system would have to supply customers in the Elmore Road and Webb Lane area instead of the old system because the extra pressure would be needed to take the water to the higher elevations.

"There is a lot of planning that needs to be done before this work takes place," McElroy said.

The water lines in the new system also extend down some other roads, including elevation higher than 1060 feet, which is Rigsby and Greenwood roads.

The CUD is also looking at building a ground level water tank on the hill on the east side of Cheatham Springs Road near on Cheatham Springs Road that are highthe cell phone tower. "We looked at putting the new tank lease held by the property owner," McElroy said. ""We intend to be near the cell tower, just at another location."

The size of the proposed water tank the exchange of a limited amount of water has not yet been determined, but McElroy estimates it would be at least 500,000 gallons. He said the water tank will not be built unless there is sufficient consumption to warrant the expenditure.

The city of Eagleville's original water system dates back to November 1961. and let the Snail Shell Cave Road pump when it was officially accepted by Mayor W. H. Dyer. The city later built a 250,000-gallon water tank on Wallace Hill on the south side of Allisona Road.

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

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
Nominees For Board of Supervisors of the Rutherford County Soil Conservation District

Landowners holding legal title to lands within the Rutherford County Soil Conservation District are eligible to vote.





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
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
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Clyde & Susie Bennett



About 4 years ago, my grandson Blake and I decided, from the encouragement of the late Harrison Mosley, to ride over to College Grove on a Friday night and check out the Bluegrass Music and Dance. I had heard about music in the Grove but had no idea that there was also dancing. Soon after arriving, the music started and several couples began to dance. I noticed one couple in particular, who was on the floor almost as soon as the music started. I could tell by the visiting and fellowship with others that this couple was not newcomers to this weekly event. They seemed to know everyone present and they were really enjoying themselves. I soon learned they were the Bennett's, Mr. Clyde and Mrs. Susie.

The Bennett's are loyal supporters of the County – Bluegrass Music night at College Grove and helped to make a success of it. They estimate in the 12+ years they haven't missed more than 5 times. They have held several different positions in the College Grove event. From helping in the organization to clean-up duty, they are always willing to do what is needed.

When their permanent seats, left side second row, are empty for the night, it's very noticeable. In 1994 when the Blue Grass Association was organized, dancing the two-step was new to Clyde. He had attended square dancing events but never thought he would be dancing the two-step. In earlier days, Susie would often drive her parents and attend community dances but Clyde didn't think that was his "cup of tea". Each week their seats may look empty most of the night but when you look closely at the dancers, you'll see them moving across the floor. Clyde seems to prefer the faster music and Susie has no trouble keeping up.




Susie Florence Garner Bennett was born October 13, 1928. Her parents were

Susie and Clyde married November 29, 1945 in Huntsville Alabama. Clyde has been a farmer all his life, helping his father tend crops and later along with working public






Clyde "Ricky" drives a truck for Williamson County.

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Chelsea's Chatter





Kindness Repaid

I recently heard of a kindness that set of an avalanche of kindness. The cars were lined up at the fast food restaurant. The man in front, out of the kindness of his heart, decided to pay for the person's food behind him. That one act of kindness resulted in 33 other people paying for the next person's food. It's unfathomable and impossible to define the perimeters of even one positive action on another person's life.

Don Martin was a man known for one particular act of kindness. His wife, Jackie, tells how for more than 20 years her husband made pear preserves and gave them away. He often drove around town surprising friends and brightening their day by leaving a jar of preserves in their cars.

Jackie said, "After he retired from the IGA Market in Shelbyville, he needed something to do. He was always doing something for other people, especially widows. Sometimes he would mow their yards. Then my mother gave him the idea and the recipe for making the preserves. I would come home and my kitchen would be full of pears. He peeled the pears and made the preserves himself. Sugar was dumped over the pears where they were left overnight before Don cooked them the next day in their own juice."

Although Don Martin was known as the pear man, he never owned a pear tree. Most of his pears were given to him by the English and Caperton families.

Sadly, Mr. Martin died of cancer in September 1998. When the family was making his funeral arrangements, they considered planting a pear tree over his grave. However, they were pleasantly surprised to find the Willow Mount Cemetery had already planted ornamental Bradford pear trees near most of the graves. The Martin family chose a place where a new tree had been planted.

Five years passed. Don Martin was not forgotten. But, no one could have predicted how he would be remembered. In 2003, the Bradford pear tree bore fruit! And, it has produced fruit every year since. Dr. Anthony Halterlein, of Middle Tennessee State University's College of Agribusiness said "it's not unheard of, but it is rare that a Bradford pear tree produces fruit."

None of the other trees in the cemetery have produced fruit. Perhaps it's only fitting that finally Don Martin has his own pear tree, repaying him for his kindness that he showed for so many years to others by giving away his pear preserves.

Cake Decorating 101 – The Prep Work

Decorating a cake can be as simple as applying a store bought icing, pouring a glaze or dusting it with powdered sugar. It can be as complex as piping intricate designs with a pastry bag, topped with pulled sugar or detailed with fondant. Cake decorating is a fun art to learn but it does take a lot of patience and practice.

I have always loved cake decorating. I have been decorating cakes since the 80's. You would think I would have it down pat but now but I don't! I took a class when I was in 7th grade and I was hooked! My first masterpiece was a round white cake with a basket of flowers on top. We had to decorate it during Home Economics class. The cake didn't make it very far though. I rode the bus home with approximately 40 hungry children. I don't believe I have to explain any further.

I see cake decorating as a labor of love, no matter how it turns out! The cake doesn't have to be perfect and you can always scrape the icing off and start over! The hardest part is avoiding the temptation of partaking of the icing off of your finger, your knife, bowl, etc. (smile)

I would like to start by sharing four tips that might be helpful to you when you decide to prepare a cake and a batch of icing. I learned these lessons the hard way and would like save you the time and stress. I hope they will help. The tips are as follows:

- 1. Learn to Bake a Cake A good cake makes it much easier when decorating. A good cake is one that is smooth, has a light, golden brown surface with very few crumbs. It should have a level top and bottom. This comes with PRACTICE. To reduce the crumbs, I put my baked cakes in the freezer and freeze them before decorating. Make sure you wrap them well in a plastic wrap. The cake will taste just a fresh as when you baked it. Don't overcook your cake as it makes the outside tough and chewy.
- 2. Leveling the Layers If your cake has a rounded top simply wait approximately an hour for the cake to cool completely and then trim the top off with a serrated knife (very important). Don't throw that top portion away; it makes a wonder snack for the cook! A cake with a flat top is much easier to decorate.
- 3. Filling the Layers and Icing There are so many tips and recipes for frostings and fillings. I am going to share the recipe that I use to decorate my cakes. I also make a Buttercream version but it will melt when exposed to heat or humidity. After you work with these icings you will develop your own preference as far as taste and consistency. You can use food coloring in a gel or liquid form to tint the icing. Start by mixing the color a few shades lighter. A little food coloring goes a LONG way! Tip: It is rather difficult to mix and achieve a true red and the color black. It takes a lot of food coloring. Make sure you make enough of a color because it is near impossible to go back and mix another "batch" and make it match perfectly. I ALWAYS use a hand mixer to make my icing. It's difficult to use a whisk and achieve a smooth icing. If you find your icing is too stiff simply add more milk in teaspoon increments. If it seems too runny add more powdered sugar.
- 4. Smoothing the Icing and Preparing the Surface Icing your cake to a smooth finish is one of the most important parts of cake decorating. This is not always easy to do. I don't like to get my cake board or platter messed up with icing. I place a few pieces of wax paper down and apply my icing. I then "slide" these messy pieces out and my cake board is clean. I usually put a small dollop of icing on the platter or cake board before placing my bottom layer down. Why? It keeps the cake from sliding. You can make your own base for your cake by cutting a piece of cardboard and covering it with aluminum or metallic wrapping paper. As I said before, it is really helpful to ice your cake while it is FROZEN. I place a LARGE dollop of frosting on the top of my cake and work downwards. I find it is easier to work the icing to the sides of the top and then down the side of the cake. No matter how many times you continue to spread your icing you will probably see "lines". The way to smooth these out is to fill a glass with very warm water. Dip your knife in the water and make one swoop smoothing out the icing. You then wipe your knife off on a paper towel, place it in the warm water and repeat. Your cake will smooth out wonderfully because the heat of the knife smoothes the butter, margarine or shortening that's in the icing.

Finally, you are ready to create your decorated masterpiece! This is a whole lesson in itself! I will share my experiences, joys and catastrophes with you in the next edition. I will have tips and suggestions for decorating that "perfect cake" you can share with your friends and family. Did I

Garden Thyme With Tee

General

- Put a plastic cup over transplants before putting compost around plants. Remove the plastic cup when finished.
- Put compost in the hole for transplants and/or fertilize with a good root-starting fertilizer.

Shrub and Vine Plans

- Knock the bottom out of a clay pot and place the pot around newly planted clematis.
- Don't plant vines after they are leafed out.
- Prune spring blooming vines and shrubs after they finish blooming.

Fruit Activities

- Fertilize fruit trees with 15-15-15 at 1/2 pound per year of tree age. Maximum of 15 pounds on apples and pears and 5 pounds of peaches, nectarines, and plums (once a year).
- · Spray for insects as flower buds begin to show color.

Flower Plans

- · Leave bulbs foliage to grow for about 12 weeks after flowering.
- March 18 (St Patrick's Day) plant sweet peas if no snow or ice on ground. Plant in a 6-inch deep row. Cover only a small part and add rich dirt as they grow.
- Divide all clumping plants especially hostas.
- Sow in garden now: Shirley poppies, cornflowers, Love-in-a-mist, larkspur, corn poppies.

Vegetable Activities

• Fertilize with 15-15-15 as you plant. One pound per 10 foot row.

Wildflower Plans

 Plant wildflower seeds in soil cultivated only 1 inch deep. Scatter compost or hay on top. Keep moist.

Houseplant Activities

- Repot, keeping surface of soil an inch below the lip of the pot.
- · Give Osmocote when repotting.

Decorator Icing

INGREDIENTS:


- 1 cup solid vegetable shortening
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 4 cups sifted confectioners' sugar (approximately 1 lb)
- 2 tablespoons milk**

Cream butter and shortening with electric mixer. Add vanilla. Gradually add sugar, one cup at a time, beating well on medium speed. Scrape sides and bottom of bowl often. When all sugar has been mixed in, icing will appear dry. Add milk and beat at medium speed until light and fluffy. Keep icing covered with a damp cloth until ready to use as it will start to crust over. For best results, keep icing bowl in refrigerator when not in use. This icing can be placed in an airtight container and refrigerated for two weeks. Rewhip before you use it. Makes 3 cups (I make several batches per cake!)

**Add 2 tablespoons of light corn syrup per recipe to thin for icing cake.

You can replace 1 cup solid shortening with $\frac{1}{2}$ shortening and $\frac{1}{2}$ butter or margarine to make a Buttercream Icing but this is not a good consistency to use as a stiff decorator icing for flowers, borders, etc...It does taste great as the base icing on the cake.





Lady Bug Match Game

Make ladybugs from red and black construction paper. Draw spots on the ladybugs so that you have two cards with the same pattern on each. Let the children help you match up the ones that look the same.

Lady Bug Cake

Prepare your packaged cake mix per the box instructions except use a 2 quart round glass casserole dish and decrease the oven temperature to 300 degrees. Bake your cake until a wooden toothpick inserted in center

comes out clean. This is usually 1 hour 5 minutes to 1 hour 15 minutes, depending on your oven. Place cake, top side down, onto serving plate or tray. (Ise store bought white/vanilla frosting or prepare your homemade frosting and frost cake. Make face on side of cake, using wafer cookies for eyes, red gumdrop slice for nose, and black shoestring licorice for eyebrows and antennae. Sprinkle red sugar over cake to within 2 inches from curved edge of face. Place black gum drop slices on cake for spots.

Lady Bugs On A Stick

Recipe Ingredients:

Red Grapes Strawberries Mini Chocolate Chips Honeydew Melon

For each one, push half of a red grape onto a trimmed wooden skewer for the head. Next, push on a hulled strawberry body and score the back to create wings. For spots, use a toothpick to gentle press mini chocolate chips, tips down, into the fruit. Arrange the skewers for a honeydew melon half. These can be served in individual portions too!
