EAGLEVILLE SAILPLANE—OFFERS A BIRDS EYE VIEW

If you look towards the horizon at Bedford County, Rutherford County line on a sunny Saturday or Sunday afternoon, you can see what looks like "follow the leader" in the sky. A closer look reveals that actually the illusion is a tow plane with a glider following, climbing higher in the sky. Against the blue sky with the sun shining, the planes are a peaceful picture. And from their birds eye view in the cockpit, Glider Pilots enjoy the serenity of non-motorized flight and the views they capture.

Eagleville SailPlane has been operated by Bill and Kathy McFarlane since 1984. Located on Highway 41, at Russell Puckett Field, the facility includes an office, hangers for the planes and gliders, and a grass runway, perfect for smooth

take offs and soft landings for the gliders. The gliders or sailplanes themselves are made from a combination of carbon composites, fiberglass, aluminum, wood and special fabric stretched over steel tubing. Gliders can seat one person and weigh as little as 250 lbs, or accommodate up to three people and weigh as much as 1000 lbs. Wing spans can vary from just under 40 feet to over 90 feet from tip to tip. While some people chose to purchase a manufactured glider there are also kits available for the "do it yourself" types.

Rather than using an engine, glider planes flown in Tennessee utilize what is known as thermals

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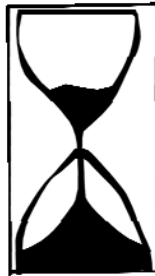

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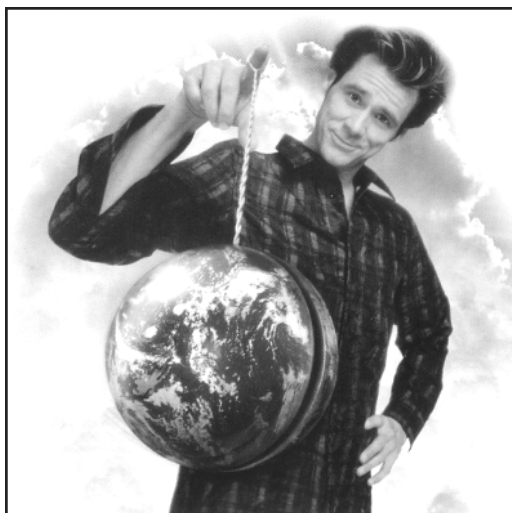

Terry Zumbro received 86 votes, and was elected to a second term on the council. Newly elected, M.A. Smitty, a local barber, received 82 votes.

The officials will be sworn into office of the Council on Tuesday, May 4, 2004.

to remain aloft. A small engine tow plane takes the glider to the sky. Once the plane reaches optimal height, the tow cable is disconnected and the glider is on its own, gliding. By steering the glider and catching the strong warm air that rises from the earth known as thermals, the gliders can stay aloft for hours. One flight Kathy McFarlane recorded lasted 8 ½ hours. Gliders can soar to 40,000 feet but the average height of local gliders is 1 mile high.

Flying a glider is a learned skill. In order to safely stay aloft and safely land, the pilot must understand aerodynamics and learn to control the glider. It takes approximately 24 lessons to be proficient in knowledge and

skill to “solo”. Lliam McFarlane, Bill and Kathy’s son soloed at age 14.

Eagleville Sailplane offers Glider excursions for those who want to fly as the birds do, but with someone else on the controls. The cost for a ride in the glider is \$50.00. Lessons are also available for those who are hooked on the sport and want to eventually solo. These cost \$56.00. A Saturday afternoon trip to Eagleville - By Woodrow Luttrell

This is an e-mail by Woodrow Luttrell to his Maryland grandson, Darren Crowe. Woodrow is the husband of Gladys Carlton Luttrell, who grew up in Eagleville and died recently. She was in the Eagleville High School class of 1935, and a member of the championship girls basketball teams.

Darren,

An obituary of Gladys was printed in the March issue of The Eagleville Times and our longtime friend, Linda Marable on Rocky Glade Road, mailed me a copy. Immediately I read the frontpage story about the big Chittlin Supper to be on Saturday, March 13. That motivated me to go see the Town and to the Community Club House to eat Chittlins - for the first time in my life.

In the event you "know not" what chittlins are, consult Webster. I believe the correct spelling might be "chitterlins or chitterlings. I took them fried rather than boiled, for fear the boiled ones would slide down before being chewed. It was good to have Louisiana Hot Sauce readily available on each table. The white beans, "freedom" fries, slaw, & fried hoecakes (fried cornbread) all tasted real good. My eyes were closed and taste buds turned off when I ate the chittlins. Missing on tables was Alka-Seltzer.

So, Saturday was a "Now When" Luttrell History time, rather than a "Back When" experience as 4-H Club and County Agent, 1946, 47 & 48. But the Back When part came - which was seeing my four

Rutherford County former 4-H (or YF&H) Dismukes boys (brothers from the Leana Community) who were there, and active in my Rutherford County Back When days. Former 4-Her Ed Jordan, Leana, still on his farm for which I have heard, he has refused to sell for a big pot of money, was with them. He's now a big wheel on the local County School Board. Former 4-Her, Dan Mitchell & wife, still living in the family farmhouse in which he was born, in the Christiana Community, sat at my table. And I got to see former 4-Her, John Ed Turner, who now may be considered one of the most important & influential "wheelers" in Eagleville. So, it was kind of a pleasant reunion for me.

She was Jo Anne Morris, who married Joe Shelton, basketball coach/principle in her day. Joe was sitting in the car, still recovering from heart surgery, but remembered Gladys and me. Jo Anne's mother taught school at Possum Trot (really Patterson, but everyone called it Possum Trot), with Georgia Lee Marable Tate, sister to Goffrey Marable, and the one who kept Goffrey in her home the last months of his life. Goffrey, the well-liked barber in the Murfreesboro Tip Top Barber Shop, married

Gladys' Aunt Ola, twin to Ora. Gladys and I were married in their house on North Maple over 62 years ago. Ora & Ola Carlton - another set of Eagleville twins. (Is it something in the swamp water in Eagleville causing twins?).

Chittlin Supper serving started at 4 PM and there must have been 100 in line at that time, with at least that many already seated in the Club House dining room. Ahead of the big feed I toured Eagleville. The town appeared a bit dead except for the Chittlin Supper, and the one grocery store, Henry's & Al's super market. Henry Ghee's wife now operates a Day Care in Gladys' old home-place right across from the school that is well preserved. The Eagleville High School is spread out - covering a big territory. They even have a football team and a band. Many nice new dwellings are now all around Eagleville in all directions. So, Eagleville is really alive and growing.

And that's enough Back When rambling by me for this time.

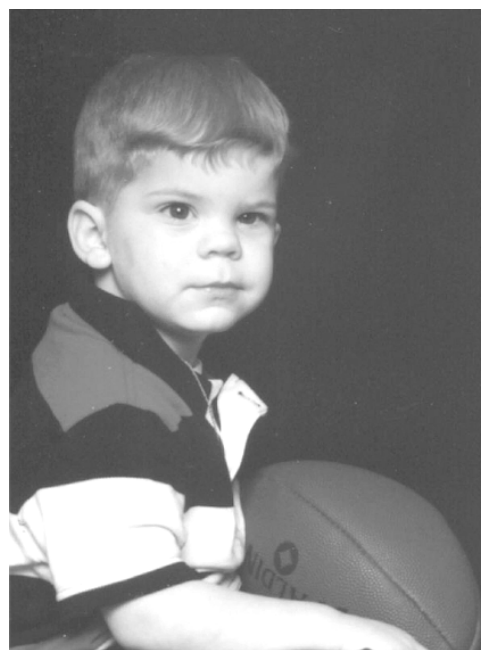

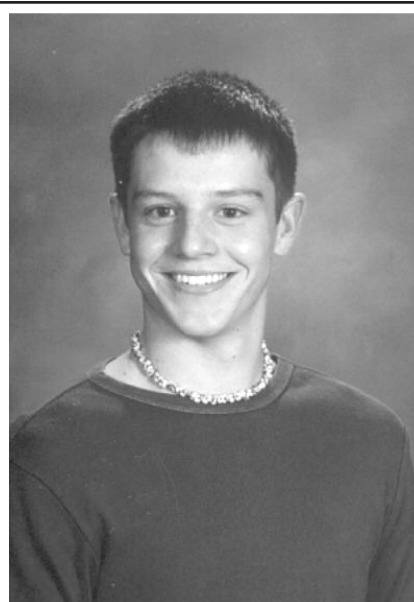
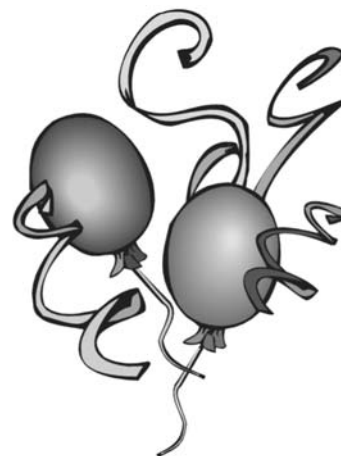

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Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke. Now doctors say any bystander can recognize a stroke asking three simple questions:

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- ask him or her to raise both arms.
- ask the person to speak a simple sentence.

If he or she has trouble with any of these tasks, call 9-1-1 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher. After discovering that a group of non-medical volunteers could identify facial weakness, arm weakness and speech problems, researchers urged the general public to learn the three questions. They presented their conclusions at the American Stroke Association's annual meeting last February. Widespread use of this test could result in prompt diagnosis and treatment of the stroke and prevent brain damage.

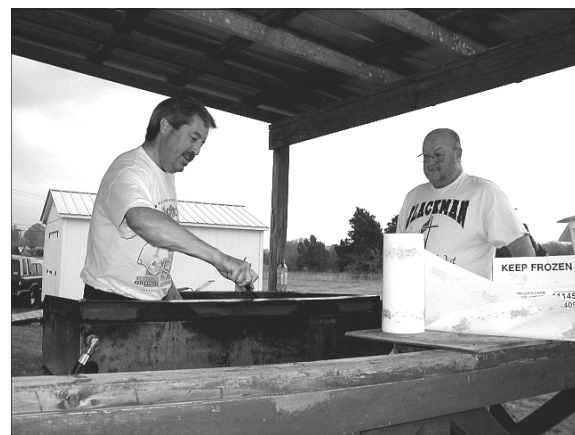

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Mary Euroller Graves Powell

Mary Euroller Graves Powell was born January 12, 1909 in a house that was located behind her present residence on the Bedford-Rutherford County line. The land was part of a plantation dating back to before Tennessee was a state. She is the 4th generation to live on the 100 acre farm her great grandfather, Stephen Wood purchased in 1846. Her father, Robert Neal Graves was a Primitive Baptist preacher for over 50 years. Her mother was Bessie Hyde Wood Graves. She had a brother, David Franklin Graves born July 27, 1911 and a sister, Ruby Neal Graves born July 8, 1915. Mary was named for her grandmother, Idora Euroller Toombs Graves which could explain why her older friends call her M.E.

Her early memories as a child were of taking care of the farm animals, milking cows, gathering eggs and attending church meetings

with dinner on the ground. Preachers in those days were the host to visitors who attended their church, offering food and lodging in their own home. Many times so many people spent the night that straw with sheets over it was used as extra beds for the men in the barn. Her brother, David and some visiting boys decided to climb the walnut tree and shake the limbs that were hanging over the barn. It was quite a rude awakening for those who were trying to sleep in the barn. (Energy has always been wasted on the youth!) Bessie, Ruby and M.E. were too busy cooking on a hot wood-burning stove to be very amused by the boys' antics. It was a hard job cooking for that many people.

She remembers riding to church in a horse drawn buggy trying to get over Giles County hills. (For those unfamiliar with Giles County, it's like going to the Smokey Mountains.) The dirt road was so steep that her father was walking beside the horses pulling them up the hill. Three teenagers jumped on the back of the buggy rather than walk. Her mother dressed for church complete with a hat and hatpin to hold it on decided, enough was enough. She took matters in her own hands and pulled the hatpin from her hat and used it as a weapon to dislodge one of the boys. Needless to say, a sharp prick in his rear made him jump from the back of the buggy and the others immediately followed not really sure what had happened from behind.

M.E. always had a great enthusiasm for sewing. She will tell you that she loves to sew. Her mother and sister were also accomplished seamstresses. She pieced her first quilt even before starting to school.

Her formal schooling began in Rover where she walked to school. She attended school there until the 5th grade. The school burned, and she went to Eagleville until she graduated with honors in 1929. She helped build the house she resides in that same year. She did not go to college because of the "Depression". Times were hard. Eggs were bringing .03 a dozen in trade. The price of a cow dropped to \$5.00. It was not a time to think about the future. The hopes of becoming a dress designer and college graduate turned into the need for survival. She continued to sew which made a little money. The family continued to milk the cows and eat a lot of eggs. Her father continued to preach and sometime was rewarded by a gift of a chicken for his services. Somehow they survived.

She met Earlie James Powell in Giles County and they were married December 24,

1937. He moved to the county line where they continued to farm and milk cows. She continued to sew not only for the neighbors but for the Natalee Company of New York. She received \$1.00 a garment. She made the bridesmaid dresses for the Dupont - Ford wedding.

Ten years after their marriage on April 27, 1947, a daughter, Mary Ann Powell was born. M.E. always wanted a girl. Her friends told her it was a good thing because she would have made a boy too "sissy" with all those fancy clothes. Her daughter proudly wore those home made clothes through college and most of her teaching career.

M.E. continued to work on the farm as well as 16 years at Model Sportswear and White Stag Garment factories.

Her husband, Earlie, died in September, 1998. They would have been married 61 years the following December.

Congestive heart failure, emphysema, arthritis and other age related problems have limited most of her activities. She still misses her daily telephone conversations with Virginia Comstock and Louise Bennett. Mrs. Virginia Jackson, a schoolmate and lifelong friend remain close. They celebrate their January birthdays together and communicate on the phone almost daily. Myrtle Hobbs, Elaine Freeman and Alma Scott have also been good telephone buddies. Estel Beasley stays with M.E. whenever her daughter has an appointment. We certainly could not do without her.

For the last two years, outings have been limited to attending monthly Senior Citizens Day and the doctor's appointment. Old age turned into both a blessing and a curse. She credits her long life to hard work. She always believed people would rust out quicker than they would wear out. 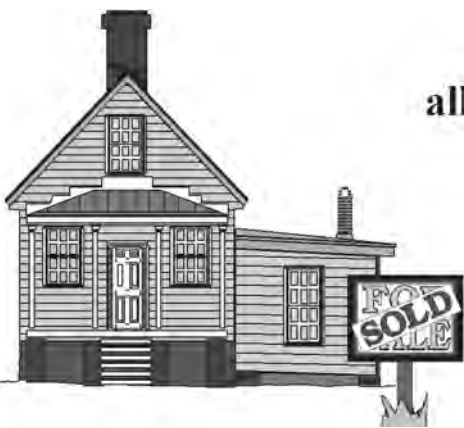

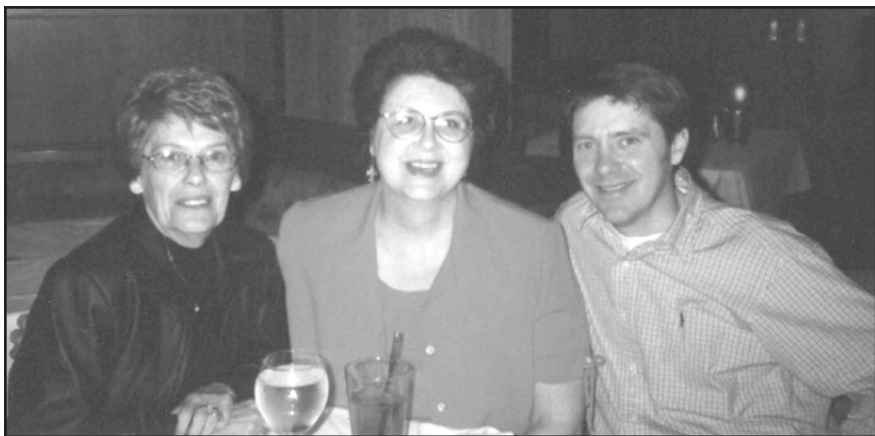

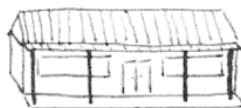

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History of Mother's Day



The earliest Mother's Day celebrations can be traced back to the spring celebrations of ancient Greece in honor of Rhea, the Mother of the Gods. During the 1600's, England celebrated a day called "Mothering Sunday". Celebrated on the 4th Sunday of Lent. "Mothering Sunday" honored the mothers of England.

During this time many of the England's poor worked as servants for the wealthy. As most jobs were located far from their homes, the servants would live at the houses of their employers. On Mothering Sunday the servants would have the day off and were encouraged to return home and spend the day with their mothers. A special cake, called the mothering cake, was often brought along to provide a festive touch.

As Christianity spread throughout Europe the celebration changed to honor the "Mother Church" - the spiritual power that gave them life and protected them from harm. Over time the church festival blended with the Mothering Sunday celebration . People began honoring their mothers as well as the church.

In the United States Mother's Day was first suggested in 1872 by Julia Ward Howe (who wrote the words to the Battle hymn of the Republic) as a day dedicated to peace. Ms. Howe would hold organized Mother's Day meetings in Boston, Mass ever year.

In 1907 Ana Jarvis, from Philadelphia, began a campaign to establish a national Mother's Day. Ms. Jarvis persuaded her mother's church in Grafton, West Virginia to celebrate Mother's Day on the second anniversary of her mother's death, the 2nd Sunday of May. By the next year Mother's Day was also celebrated in Philadelphia.

Ms. Jarvis and her supporters began to write to ministers, businessman, and politicians in their quest to establish a national Mother's Day. It was successful as by 1911 Mother's Day was celebrated in almost every state. President Woodrow Wilson, in 1914, made the official announcement proclaiming Mother's Day as a national holiday that was to be held each year on the 2nd Sunday of May.

While many countries of the world celebrate their own Mother's Day at different times throughout the year, there are some countries such as Denmark, Finland, Italy, Turkey, Australia, and Belgium which also celebrate Mother's Day on the second Sunday of May.

The carnation, which has become a familiar part of Mother's Day, was introduced and supplied at the first church service held by Ana Jarvis. Carnations were chosen by Ms. Jarvis because of her mother's fondness for them. The flowers were immediately accepted as appropriate for the occasion. In time, red carnations became the symbol of a living mother, while white ones were worn as a sign that one's mother had died.

Mother's Day is the second most popular floral holiday behind Christmas/ Chanukah. Flowers continue to be an ideal expression of love and appreciation for Moms, wives, grandmothers, daughters, sisters and friends for this holiday. Cut flowers, outdoor bedding and garden plants, and flowering houseplants are among the most popular gifts.

Continuing from the previous month's discussion on the Zoning and with the Assistance of our City Planner, Bryan Collins, here are some ideas relating to Zoning to share with you:

- Zoning helps protect property values by establishing predictable development patterns.
- Zoning helps promote compatibility among various activities by minimizing offensive or incompatible land use activities.
- Zoning helps protect the public health by assuring development patterns that assist in safe disposal of sanitary waste.
- Zoning allows local citizens have a voice in restricting possible intrusions of operations such as landfills, prisons, etc.
- Zoning helps protect and stabilize the tax base thereby minimizing rapid increases in local taxation.
- Zoning provides for local review of development proposals which impact upon water systems, road, and schools.
- Zoning helps promote economic development by identifying suitable areas for such use and encouraging wise

investment of public funds.

- Zoning helps to minimize public expense for road repairs and improvements by assuring adequate initial construction and availability of rights of way for future expansion.
- Zoning contributes to protection of agricultural activities and agriculturally based communities by minimizing activities which intrude and compete for space.
- Zoning provides a local forum for citizens to express their concerns and make suggestions concerning the future direction of their communities.

The Recreation / Park ad hoc committee has really been busy collecting data and donations for the new park. Other important information is being organized by City Hall. The grant information will be submitted before the deadline of May 7th. Then, we wait for several weeks.

Congratulations to **Ronnie Hill** and **Terry Zumbro**, who were re-elected to the Eagleville City Council, and to newly elected **M. A. Smitty**. They will be sworn in at a special City Council meeting at 4:00 p.m., Tuesday, May 4, 2004.

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A Step Back in Time - EARLY SCHOOLS

POSSUM TROT SCHOOL

The first Possum Trot School existed from 1878 to 1896. It was located in the western part of Rutherford County on a dirt road about 1½ miles south of the old dirt Franklin Road and west of the present Coleman Hill Road. The school was a one-room log building about twenty by twenty-four feet. The seats were eight feet long benches. Equally long slant-top desks about 3 ½ feet high faced the benches. The tops of the desks could be raised and the ink and copybooks could be stored inside the desk. There was usually a writing period just before noon when pupils stood and had their writing lesson. The nearest well was about ½ mile away and the building was surrounded with cedars with no other building in sight.

In 1882 Thomas Morgan Patterson came to Possum Trot to clerk in the country store and to teach in the one-room school. Sometime later he wrote to Washington, requesting a post office and suggesting a name. Because the name he proposed had already been given to a post office in Tennessee, the government gave the community the name of Patterson in 1888.

When a new road was built, the old road on which the school was located became almost abandoned. In 1896, a new school was erected west of the old Possum Trot School. This school was called Patterson School.

PATTERSON SCHOOL

Patterson School established in 1896 and disband in 1953, was first located on the south side of the present Coleman Hill Road about ½ mile east of the Patterson Road and Coleman Hill intersection. On October 31, 1896, R. L., W. G., and Evie Pate signed a deed for two acres for a school in the 47th District of Rutherford County to J. I. Dyer, W. I. Pate and T. J. Wary, Jr., school directors. This was a one-room building with a bell tower. In 1911 or 1912, the school building was moved to its second site near the southeast corner of the intersection on land owned by W. I. Pate.

Moving the school building to its new location caused excitement in the community. Mr. Grey of Murfreesboro pulled the schoolhouse down the road with a mule. Former students remembered that nothing could deter the teacher, Mai White from teaching her classes in the school while it was being moved. By 1917 a room had been added.

In 1929 Jimmie D. Vaughan erected a modern two-room building with a kitchen. Florence Maxwell was the first cook when hot lunches began being served. Louise Maxwell also was the cook at one time. The students had to bring their own plate, cup, knife and fork to school each day. Water was drawn from an outside well, carried inside and poured into a water cooler. The school built in 1929 was converted into a home and is still used as a residence.

Patterson School had several teachers over the years. Maggie Floyd was the teacher in 1907; Minnie Floyd, in 1908; Abbey Floyd Beasley, in 1909; Mai White in about 1911. Others were Lula Tolbert, Annie Ashley, Daisy Adams Wray, Bessie Tolbert Holden, Pauline Scales, Ray Donnell, Miss Tilford, Ophelia Elam, Margaret Brandon, Georgia Lee Marable Pate, Christine Couch, Vera Maxwell, Vera Covington, Louise Beasley, Mary Carlton, Wilma Bean, Virginia Cobb, Miss Gardner and Myra McCrory Morris. Many of the teachers boarded at the homes of Molly Pate Snell and Eulalia Vaughn Patterson.

Ray Donnell, a teacher at his first school, was the basketball coach. During tournaments, the teams would played all day until, at the final game of the night, a champion was announced.

Mrs. Myra McCrory Morris, a former student returned to teach at the Patterson School soon after her graduation from State Teachers College in Murfreesboro in 1931 and stayed until the school was closed in 1953 Miss McCrory, a single lady at the time, boarded with the Robert Patterson family when she began her teaching career at Patterson. Mrs. Morris was a respected disciplinarian by her former students. One former student, Buddy Pate, principal of Eagleville School, remembers one day during the last year at Patterson School, the students all agreed that the next day, they would dress as cowboys and bring their cap guns to

school. Mrs. Morris confiscated all their play guns and didn't let them have them back till the end of the school year. After the school closed at the end of the 1952-53 school year, Mrs. Morris taught the following year at Middleton School. In 1954, she came to Eagleville School, replacing Mr. D. L. Manier, who had retired. Mrs. Morris retired from Eagleville School in 1970. Mrs. Morris was the mother of Joann Shelton of Eagleville.

In the early school years some of the children often rode ponies to school and kept them in a barn on the property. They would bring corn from home to feed their ponies at noon. Many of the students walked several miles to school. A lot of the students had chores to do before they even came to school in the mornings.

Some of the early family names of students were; Watson, Snell, Morris, Hill, Pate, Patterson, Windrow, Jordan, Maxwell, Heaton, Neal, Frost, White, Wilson, Lamb, Dyer, Barnes, Ghee, and Wray.

The last class in 1952-53 had thirteen students, six grades and one teacher. Most of the students transferred to Eagleville School. The last students were: Annette Ralston (Chick), Edwina Anderson (Cundiff), Ronald Ralston, David Ralston, Butch Hewitt, Patty Deford, Tommy Scruggs, Charles Scruggs, Sammie Scruggs, Buddy Pate, Mary Ann Pate (Langley), Marvin King, and Roy Mears (?).

On July 9, 1955 the Rutherford County School Commission deeded to R. H. Patterson the two acres of school property.

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Nashville Artist Paints for U.S. Capitol



Nashville Portrait Artist, Michael Shane Neal, son of Eagleville residents Wayne and Donna Neal, has been selected by the United States Senate to paint Senator Arthur Vandenberg's portrait for the United States Capitol; the first such commission of its kind in nearly 50 years.

Neal's portrait of Senator Vandenberg will be added to "The Famous

Five," a series of portraits gracing the Senate Reception Room of the U.S. Capitol. The room, designed by 19th Century Italian artist Constantino Brumidi, contains eleven ovals which are to be filled throughout the history of the United States. Senators are considered who, for acts of statesmanship transcended party and state lines and exemplified leadership in national thought, constitutional interpretation, and legislation. Currently, portraits of Henry Clay (KY), John C. Calhoun (SC), Daniel Webster (MA), Robert Taft (OH), and Robert La Follette, Sr. (WI) are included in medallions throughout the room.

Selected as a role model for future Americans by the U.S. Senate, Senator Arthur Vandenberg (1884-1951) was chosen from approximately 1500 senators whose service has ended prior to 1979. Vandenberg, of Michigan, delivered a celebrated "speech heard around the world" in the Senate chamber on January 10, 1945, announcing his conversion from isolationism to internationalism. As Republican Chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, he forged bipartisan support for the Truman Doctrine, the Marshall Plan, and NATO. His

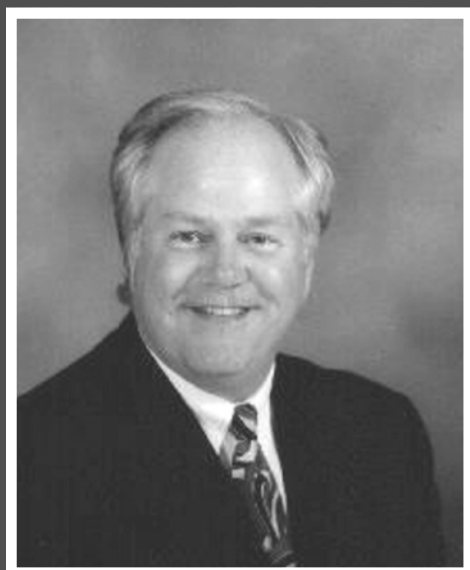
Senate career stands as a monument to the benefits of bipartisanship in American foreign policy.

Michael Shane Neal has been painting portraits since 1990. He received the prestigious Grand Prize Award at the 2001 Portrait Society of America's International Portrait Competition. His work is included in private, corporate, and institutional collections throughout the country. Other recent portraits include former Secretary of the Navy and presidential advisor Paul Nitze for Johns Hopkins University and former Secretary of State Christian Herter for Johns Hopkins University. Neal is a member of the National Arts Club of New York City, the Allied Artists of America, the Artist's Fellowship of New York, the Portrait Society of America, and the Cumberland Society of Painters. His studio is located in the historic Hillsboro Village district of downtown Nashville, Tennessee.

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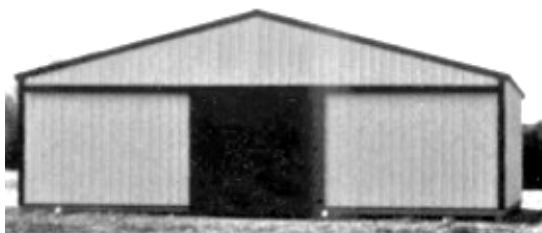
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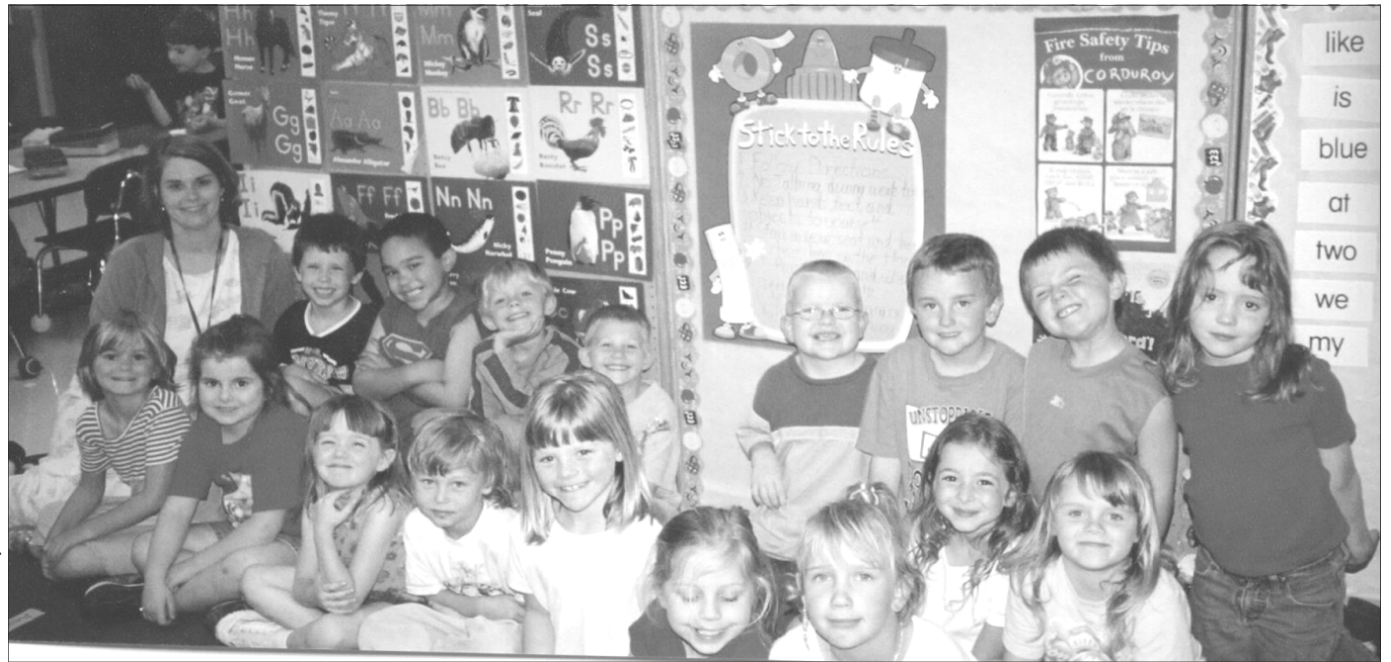
MORE THAN A MESSAGE IN A BOTTLE

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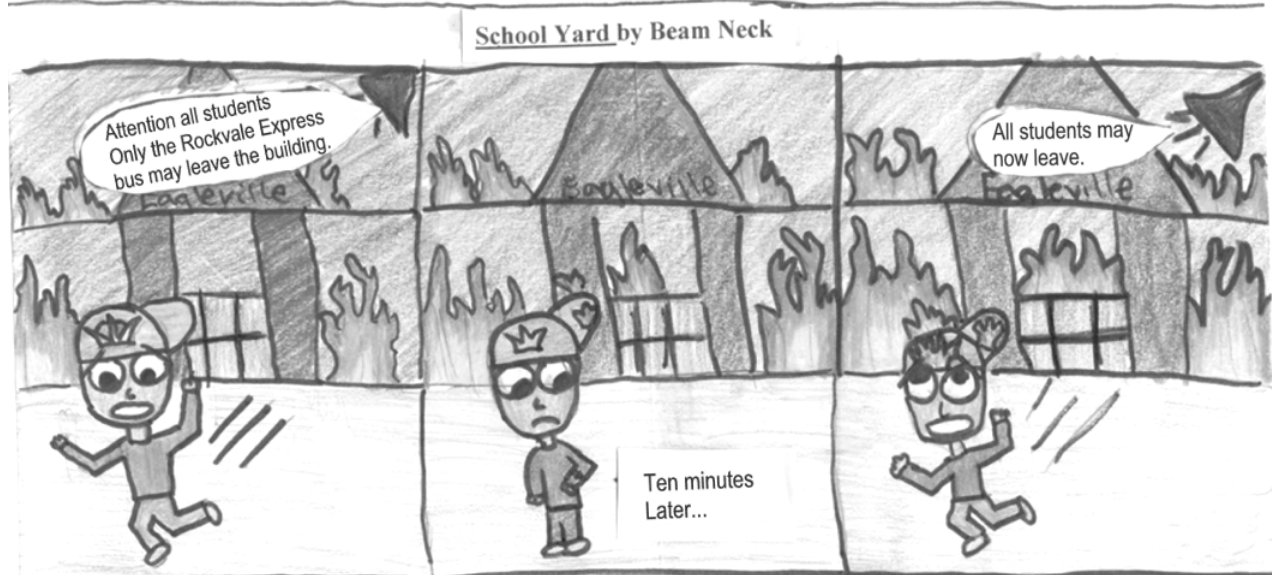

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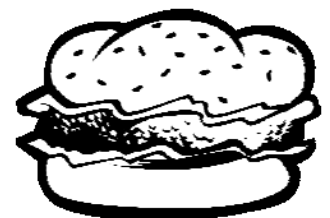


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
