Eagleville JROTC Rifle Team

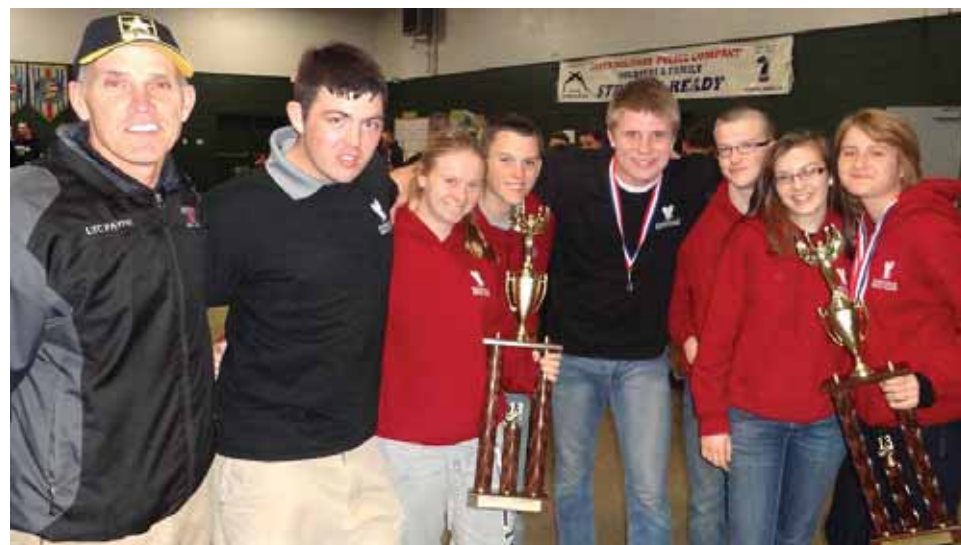

It has been an amazing year for the Eagleville High School Army JROTC Rifle Team. After finishing in last place in the Rutherford County JROTC Rifle League for years, this year's team turned everything around. There was no incremental improvement for this team; they won the Rutherford County League and Tournament, competed in the Civilian Marksmanship Program Service National Championships, Qualified for the Junior Olympic Regional Qualification Match and finished fourth in the TNSSA State Meet at

MBA just a few weeks ago in Nashville.

Three Position Air Rifle is an NCAA and Olympic Sport. It is a sport that requires extreme mental and physical discipline. Not only do most JROTC programs have teams at the high school level, but other schools like Montgomery Bell Academy (MBA), Hume Fog, Harpeth Hall, and even the Home School Association in Nashville have teams that compete in the TNSSA (Tennessee Sports Shooting Association) and in matches across the Country.

So how did we go from last to first in two short years? Well, like everything in life, mostly hard work, some better equipment, and . . . of course good fortune. In previous years we practiced after school in our classroom. This year we moved to a portable classroom so we had to move practice to the Old Gym, and much to our dismay, at 6:00 in the morning. But, dealing with adversity and change is the hallmark of a champion. One of our freshman team members had this to say; "Why on earth would I voluntarily be at school at 6 A.M.? There are very few things I would ever consider



worthy of that sacrifice, and Rifle Team is one of them . . . after the first few morning practices, it gets to be routine, and you even begin to enjoy it. Yes, enjoy it. I know for me it is a very relaxing and fun way to start the day. The deep breathing relaxes your muscles and you're forced to clear your mind and focus on the next shot."

Senior Cadet and Team Captain Colin Progar was just an average shooter as a freshman. But, through a lot of hard work and practice, he was the top Sporter Class Shooter this year in Rutherford County and has been selected to compete at the CMP Service

Nationals in Ohio and Alabama over the last two years. Colin Progar, who will enter the Navy this summer with a goal of one day becoming a Navy Seal, had this to say about his success as a marksman; "I was not a very good shooter as a freshman, but I really enjoyed the sport and learned

that it takes extreme discipline to command my body to hold steady over the course of a sixty-shot match. It has been an amazing year, and I know that when the our three seniors leave after this year our team is set up for success in years to come."

We were also fortunate to receive four new Crossman Air Rifles from an NRA grant. These are top of the line Sporter Class Air Rifles and helped our first team members improve their scores throughout this year. We also had parents that worked concessions at the Tennessee Titans games which enabled us to buy much needed equipment. So, it is paramount that we have the right equipment if we want to compete at a high

level as we did this year. Our goal, however, is to be able to advance at least one team to Precision Class and use the same type rifles and shooting suits that Olympic shooters have. This is very important if we want some of our shooters to have a chance in earning a scholarship at the NCAA level. To do this we will have to either do a lot of fundraising or find someone in the community to help support our team. The cost for fielding a Precision Team is anywhere from \$15,000. to \$20,000. and that does not include match entry fees and travel.

We also had the good fortune of a new student named Ally Barnhart showing up on our doorstep this fall. Ally moved to this area from Boston, MA this past summer

As you can see Eagleville has many dedicated people working very hard to ensure safe and quality of life to each and everyone of us. THANK YOU!

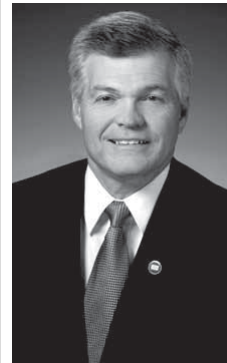

Tracy Talking Points Session Wrap-Up

April 29, 2013 - After a great deal of hard work and collaboration, this year's session of the 108th General Assembly finally came to a conclusion on April 19, 2013. Not only did the House and the Senate pass many pieces of important

legislation, but more importantly we passed a balanced budget for the State of Tennessee. This year's budget included many improvements that will provide \$43 million in tax cuts. Senate Bill 502 included a 4 - year plan to phase out the inheritance tax as well as an increase in funds to give senior citizens the opportunity to apply for Hall income tax relief. The will also lower the sales tax on food in Tennessee from 5.25% to 5%. This session we also worked together to take a good look at education reform. This budget incorporates funds that will increase teachers' pay and provide \$47 million to invest in low performing public schools. The budget also gives a \$350 million increase to assist with TennCare inflation and other expenses that relate to it. I also feel that it is important to acknowledge the \$3.9 million increase for mental health. After the various atrocities that have occurred in the United States this year, it is important that we engage in mental health research and provide sufficient services to those who need them in order to keep Tennessee safe.

Aside from the state budget, there were many vital pieces of legislation that were passed this week to promote a better Tennessee. Senate Bill 783 improves Tennessee's program for unemployment compensation. Along with other advancements, the bill requires the Department of Labor to increase the number of weekly audits that they perform to ensure that those who are receiving state funds during periods of unemployment are actively searching for a new job.

Another step that the legislature has taken towards promoting a safer Tennessee is in our schools. We passed a bill that will allow retired law enforcement officers to act as school security officers with the permission of the local director of schools and the school principle. This allows each school district and individual school to have the opportunity to decide whether or not allowing handguns on campus is right for them specifically. These officers will

also be required to complete an additional 40 hour course which includes training for crisis management and hostile situations in a school setting. This bill will also allow teachers, who have a background in law enforcement and a handgun carrying permit, to carry a gun with them on school property. The bill is intended to take precautionary measures in response to the tragedy that took place at Sandy Hook Elementary this past December. Governor Haslam has also included an additional \$34 million in this year's budget that may be used to hire security officers for schools that cannot already afford them.

I am very excited about two bills that passed this session and will promote technology schools in Tennessee. My bill, Senate Bill 643 changes "Tennessee Technology Centers" to "State Colleges of Applied Technology." Senate Bill 1330, which was sponsored by Senator Norris, creates LEAP (Labor Education Alignment Program) in Tennessee technology centers. This program will work similarly to a co-op program at a university by allowing students to obtain hands-on experience in their occupational field through working for a company and receiving financial compensation as well as school credit for their work. This bill is intended to provide Tennessee with more skilled workers who are ready to take on a job in their field once they have completed their technology program.

Lastly, Senate Bill 670 passed both the House and the Senate this session in an attempt to prevent drunk driving on Tennessee roads. This bill lowers the blood or breath alcohol content (BAC) from 0.15% to 0.08% to be grounds for a restricted driver license. Any convicted drunk driver will now be required to install an interlock device in their car which they will have to breathe into in before starting the car. The interlock devices will have to be equipped to take a photo of the individual as they breathe into it in order to insure that it is not someone else providing the sample.

It has been a pleasure representing each of you this session! Although this legislative session is over, we will continue working year-round to serve our constituents and to prepare legislation for next year. 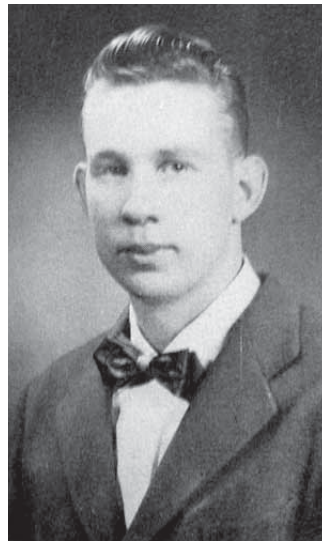

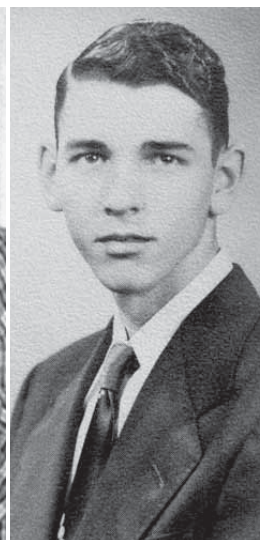

A Step Back In Time 1952-53 EHS Senior Class

It will soon be 60 years, since twenty seniors of the Class of 1953 of Eagleville High School, walked down the aisle in the old Eagleville High School auditorium and received their diplomas, completing their 12 years of school.

At the beginning of school year 1941-42, when a group of first graders entered the beginning of a twelve-year adventure, their parents, not only had apprehension about sending their young children to school for the first time, but their concern may have been intensified by the disturbances developing in foreign countries as well as the United States.

Although the first few years of these students school days was during this unrest, twelve years soon passed, filled with many activities including, music programs, school plays, harvest festivals and basketball games. And soon, it was their senior year, filled with excitement and decisions for the future. Senior class officers elected were: President – Helen Isom; Vice President – Herbert Brisby; Secretary – Howard Hatcher and Treasurer – Betty Jane Holder.

Members of the Annual Staff were; Merkle Rigsby – Sports Editor, Herbert Brisby – Art Editor, Thomas Vaughn – Class Editor, Howard Hatcher – Secretary, Helen Isom – Assistant Editor, Judy Read – Editor-in-Chief, Betty Jane Holder – Business Manager, and Margaret King – Activities Editor

Eagleville School was quite small in 1953; approximately 240 students with a faculty of twelve teachers for grades 1 – 12. The school faculty consist of Mrs. Martha Elmore 1st grade, Mrs. Virginia Jackson-2nd grade, Miss Cornelia Alexander 3rd and 4th grades, Mrs. Nell Alexander 4th and 5th grades, Mr. D. L. Manier 5th and 6th grades, Mrs. John Dyer 7th grade, Mr. U. R. Elmore - Principal, English and Economics, Mrs. Beatrice Pittard English and Typing, Mr. Harold Hardison - Agriculture, Miss Eileen Russell - Home Economics and Science, Mr. Carroll Smith – Coach and 8th Grade, Mrs. W. E. Pate - Mathematics, Algebra and American History.

The one event that the Eagleville graduating classes looked forward to was the “Senior Trip” to Washington D. C. These graduates, along with chaperones, Mr. and Mrs. U. R. Elmore, Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pate and Mr. and Mrs. John R. Holton, traveled to the U. S. Capitol in a school bus. Bill Pate and John R. Holton shared the bus driving duties for the trip. Lodging for the week was in a tourist home, near the site of historical places that was visited.

These former classmates have celebrated two reunions; their 30th in 1983, and their 50th in 2003. Fourteen of the twenty classmates were present at each reunion.

Five members of the Class of 1953 are now deceased; Jerry Foster, Charles McCord, Carolyn Scott King, Jane Ralston and Alma Leathers Hill.

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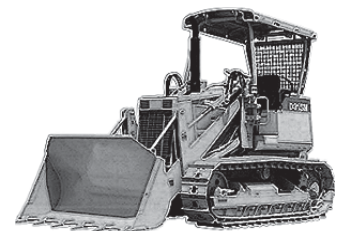
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News from Ms. Hill's Third Grade

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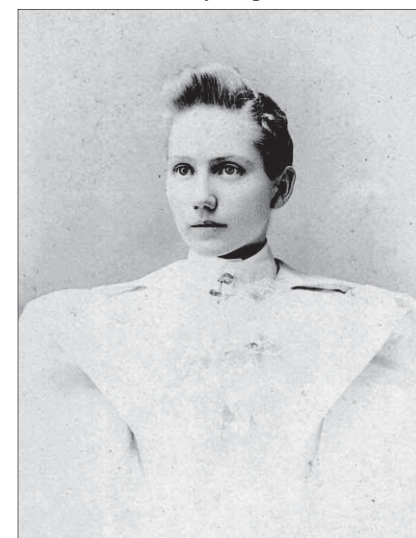

in Charge, asked if the Methodist Church would distribute the collection. They consented, with no idea, it would last this long. Last year Roy Ray, who was Officer In Charge at the Chapel Hill Post Office, organized another food drive and donated the Pantry about 6800 cans of food.

Presently there are six churches, in addition to College Grove Methodist, who contribute to the Pantry on a regular basis: College Grove Church of Christ, Harpeth Lick Presbyterian, Conduit Church in Thompson Station, East Brentwood Presbyterian, Triune Baptist, and Wesley Chapel Methodist.

On Saturday mornings, elementary school age to senior citizen volunteers, gather from 9:30 till 10:30; unloading purchases, adding to the shelves, as well as assembling and distributing the food boxes.

On Thursday of each month, the Pantry receives food donations from "Feed America First". Gary Lorow provides his truck and covered trailer, to make the

pickup, along with David Gill who helps with the loading. When arriving back at the church, several volunteers gather, to help with the unloading and re-stocking of the shelves. Occasionally, the Pantry asks the Grace Works Ministries in Franklin for needed items.

Beverly Collins, the Food Pantry Coordinator, and the 75-80 indispensable volunteers, who donate time and labor, are to be commended for providing this successful community service to southeast Williamson County and the Chapel Hill area. God has truly lead and blessed this endeavor.

Americans waste as much as half of all food available to us. We waste electricity by leaving lights and appliances on and doors and windows open and some of our houses need more insulation and caulking. We have closets full of clothes and shoes that we haven't worn in years. We tromp the accelerator and burn gas faster than necessary. Plastic overwhelms our landfills. But what can we do?

In my opinion we should aim for zero waste. I once told someone that I have no garbage. That's not exactly true. We try to eat what we cook and when we do have something to throw away we use a compost bucket or feed it to birds and other animals. Plastic is compacted. Cans and bottles are separated for recycling. Copy paper is recycled to use both sides and later shredded. Plastic bags are reused as garbage bags and storage bags. I still need to train myself to use the cloth bags for shopping. Polyethylene can take up to 1,000 years to biodegrade. Cloth diapers can also get rid of some more plastic. Cloth napkins and tablecloths are best. Also paper towels are not needed. Save your old towels for the really dirty jobs. True your dishtowels will not be as pretty when you wipe up spills with them, but you've saved a tree or two.

I find the simple cleaners such as baking soda, vinegar and still wool are sufficient most of the time and therefore do not put much pollution into the water system.

Nowadays we are being encouraged to pay our bills on line. Each year the world produces more than 300 million tons of paper. If only 20%

of households switched to electronic billing we would save 1.8 million trees. I really like trees. When planted on the north side of the house they can shield the house from winter winds. In the northern states you sometimes see rows of trees planted to catch the snow and create a warmer place to live.

Our homes should be as free of pollution as possible. Radon is the leading cause of lung cancer deaths among nonsmokers in America. You can receive a free testing kit by going to www.tdec.radon@tn.gov or by calling 1-800-232-1139. We can shut off all appliances, including computers, when not in use. Seventy-five percent of all electricity used in the house is standby power. You can save as much as \$70.00 per year just by shutting off your computer. Those funny looking swirl light bulbs are supposed to use ¼ the amount of energy and last longer than the traditional bulbs. Clothes dryers use an enormous amount of electricity. If you have the space, put up a clothesline. The freshness of the clothes that have been in the sunshine is amazing. You will not need fabric softener. While the clothesline is not convenient to most of our lifestyles, when it works, it's great!

Could we feed all the hungry people in America if we simply did not waste? I've read where certain low-income people simply go and ask for food the supermarket is about to throw out. Why not? It's perfectly good food. The fruit may have a small place on it that makes it unsellable. That doesn't make the rest of the apple uneatable. Think about it. Use up what we have. Renew, reuse and recycle and find a way to keep it out of the landfills!

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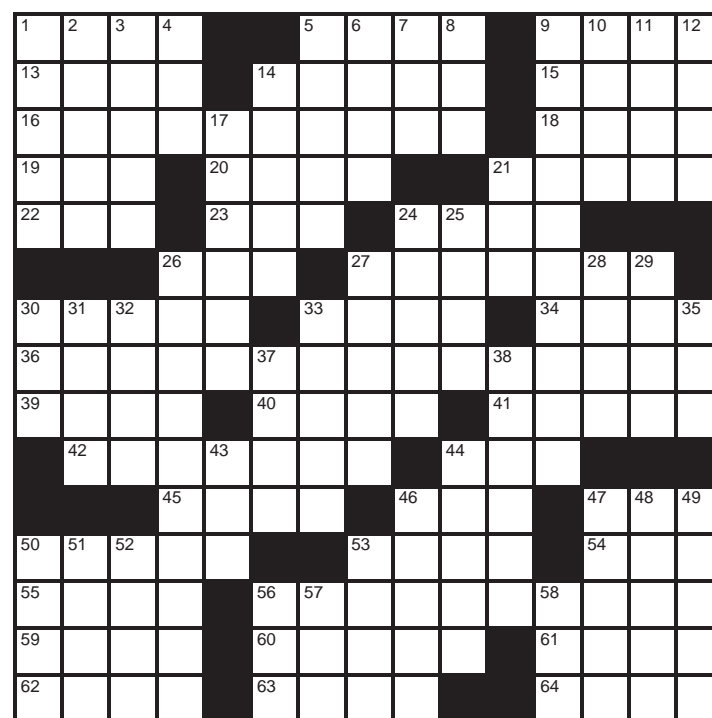

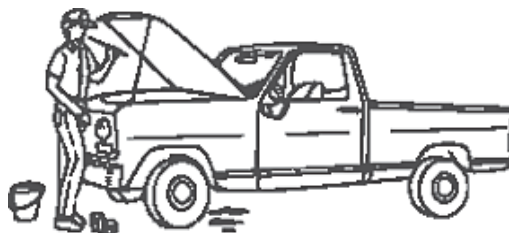
