It was quite a learning experience for most of us, but working together for a family with a son confined to a wheelchair was so rewarding. It was more than worthwhile.

The house was dedicated and the key

turned over to the new owners September 27th at 1:00 pm. The new owners had worked 400 hours to earn their right to purchase the house interest free. Professionals who also had volunteered their time supervised everything.

Though a small church, we always have some project to help others and this one was truly one we shall always cherish.

CITIZEN OF THE MONTH John Redmond



Small towns are known for colorful characters, and Eagleville is no exception. John Redmond is perhaps most easily recognized cruising through town in his golf cart waving to friends and visiting the merchants in Eagleville. He is a regular at the Dairy Bar, opens up Joyce's Beauty Shack for her on Thursdays, and counts those who work at the Drug Center as friends.

John Redmond, the son of Irene Lorance, born in 1941 is the oldest of eight children. He remains close to his four sisters, Virginia, Betty, Jessie and Barbara and two surviving brothers Herbert and Larry. His brother Jimmy is deceased and missed by this close-knit family. John has two daughters, Jamie and Emily and one very cute two-year-old granddaughter, Occoee.

John grew up in Eagleville and attended all twelve years at Eagleville School. While in high school he worked at Howard Marshall's Grocery Store. Following graduation, John was employed at Genesco and Colonial Bread Company. He then worked at the Cocacola Company for 10 years.

In the late 1960's, John reported for active duty with the U.S. Army and eventually was sent to Viet Nam. On December 31, 1967 the unit he was assigned to was patrolling a roadway. Around 1:00 a.m. the unit was hit with an RPG round. Eighteen of the soldiers in the unit were killed. John was seriously wounded and was burned over a large portion of his body.

On January 6, 1968 John's family in Tennessee was notified that he had been killed in action. Devastated, the family mourned the loss of brother, son and father. On January 23, the family was noti-

fied again that John had lost his life. Confusion now invaded the families' mourning and uncertainty about the circumstances of his death surfaced.

At the same time, John was a half a world away in Southeast Asia beginning the slow recovery from the injuries he received. Finally on February 2, 1968, John regained consciousness and was able to communicate to his caregivers. Joyfully, on February 27, 1968 the family received the news that John was alive.

Over the next year, John was treated in hospitals in Japan, Ft. Sam Houston, and Nashville. He received two purple hearts for his service in the Army and he eventually came home to Eagleville.

John leads an active life, is often on the go, and makes friends wherever he is. He rarely misses a community event in Eagleville such as Chittlin suppers, the tractor show and the horseshows. He strongly supports Eagleville School activities and is a dedicated fan of the sports teams there. He is a long time member of the Lions Club, Eagleville Chapter and is always on hand and ready to help with their projects.

John's tragic experience in Viet Nam makes all of us pause and reflect. Yet, John communicates a positive outlook on life and enjoys every day to the fullest. Eagleville is fortunate to have a hero among us and a living reminder of all those who have sacrificed for our country. We are blessed and better for our relationship with John Redmond.







After much anticipation and waiting, the Just Dance studio has moved into their new larger dance building on Main Street in Eagleville. Holiday Safety Tips - Don't be a Victim

Provide by Sgt. Charles Holt, Eagleville PD

As the holidays approach home burglaries, as well as personal crimes rise. Here are a few tips that will help you from becoming a victim. Remember, these tips can be practiced year round as well!

When purchasing large items for your home, break down the boxes or containers that they came in and place them in your garage or out building until you time to dispose of them. If you do not have a place to store them, place them in non-see through bags before placing them outside. This will keep any criminal from driving by your home and "street shopping" for items to steal.

When shopping at the mall, do not place items in your vehicle and return for additional shopping. Many criminals watch for this practice so they can target cars with items inside *just waiting to be stolen*. When arriving at the mall before sundown, look for overhead lights to park under. This will allow you to have the security of the lights when leaving at dark. *Mall and store security are there to be used!* Ask for an escort to your vehicle if you have numerous items to transport to your car or if you were forced to park in a bad location. When carrying items to your

car, be sure to have your car door key in your hand before exiting the building. This prevents you from becoming distracted in the parking lot and allows you quick access into your car if necessary.

Be sure to keep all of your store receipts, especially your credit card receipts. This will aid you incase of credit card fraud. In cases when you have to return items, this practice also guarantees a full refund on items that are marked down after the holidays. If you loose your credit card *report it immediately!* Most banks require that you report the loss within a 24-hour time period. Any delays past 24 hours can make you responsible for unauthorized purchases!

When using ATM machines, use only machines that are visible and well lit at night. Be sure to take your receipt with you before you leave and do not throw them away until you get home, where you can shred them before disposal! Advice on telemarketers, "Don't"! If you didn't call them you don't need to take the risk! Shopping on the Internet has increased every year. Only use well-known businesses to shop from. Check with your credit cardholder for fraud protection on Internet purchases. Most do, or can offer special cards with mi-

crochip technology that protects you from Internet fraud. "Do not" give anyone your credit card number unless it is part of a transaction initiated by you! When available, use "secured sights" for credit card use! This will help protect you from fraud.

Charities are also actively seeking donations during the holidays. If you have a charity you support, send a check directly to them! This keeps all the money at the charity instead of pennies on the dollar when received through telemarketers. Always ask how much of your donation will go directly to the charity. By law they must tell you! If they don't or try to avoid answering, it's a good sign that it's a telemarketer donation not a charity donation. By donating with a check you will have a receipt for your donation at tax time.

If you have any questions, or need to report any questionable person s or practices, please contact your local law enforcement and have a safe and happy holiday!



"TIPS FROM THE PRO"

With the warmer days starting to get a little harder to find, on those days when you have an opportunity to "tee it up" for a round of golf, its time to start thinking about what lies ahead for the winter months.

Some people think November means its time to put the clubs in storage and wait until spring to get them back out again. But, really winter is a great time for both the more accomplished players and those who want to take up the game.

While the temperatures may very well drop several degrees, so do the number of your typical players on any given day. For the beginners, colder weather means there will probably be fewer players on the course and that presents a wonderful opportunity to take your time and learn the game...to work your way around the course without the hassle of worrying about a large crowd. The more accomplished players can play faster and keep their games in shape for the coming spring.

A few tips for winter golfers:

- 1) Always wear clothing in layers rather than some cumbersome heavy coat. This will keep your swing from being so restricted and keep you warmer at the same time.
- 2) Minor investments into hand warmers, stocking caps, etc. will also make your golf round more enjoyable.
- 3) While on the course, bear in mind that colder temperatures dictate the ball will not fly as far, so be sure to use more club than normal. Generally, at least one more club will be needed and in some cases, depending on the wind, it may take as many as two more clubs.
- 4) Winter is also a great time to deal with worn grips because in the weather these grips can become very slick. Either clean your grips with a mild detergent and warm water or have them replaced if they or worn badly.
- 5) And keep in mind that if you are going to take refreshments on the course; don't rely on alcohol to keep you warmer. In fact, alcohol actually reduces your body heat.





# Rockvale Elementary School Annual Harvest Festival




Rockvale Elementary School hosted its annual Harvest Festival on Friday, October 24th. It proved to be a successful "harvest" of patrons coming to support the school.






