





Buddy Woodson of Eagleville was appointed Food & Dairy Administrator for the Tennessee Dept. of Agriculture on Oct. 1, 2004. Buddy has over 30 years service with the Tennessee Dept. of Agriculture after graduating from Middle Tennessee State University in 1972 with a BS in Animal Science. He has served as a livestock specialist, livestock market news reporter, food and dairy inspector, and most recently as a milk rating officer. His wife, Belinda teaches at Eagleville School and their daughter, Megan attends MTSU. Buddy served on the Rutherford Co. Board of Commissioners from 1982 to 1998 and is one of the founders of the Tennessee Valley Pioneer Power Association which host one of the South's largest antique tractor and gas engine shows annually in Eagleville. The Food & Dairy division regulates over 8,000 retail food stores, 1,100 food manufacturers and food warehouses, 750 dairy farms, and 25 milk processors statewide by performing over 27,000 inspections annually enforcing the rules and regulations of the Tennessee Dept. of Agriculture. Buddy's office is located on the Ellington Agriculture Center in Nashville.





A Flag For Rutherford County

Rutherford County now has an official flag! On Saturday, October 23, at 10:00 am on the court house lawn the flag was raised during the Heritage Day Celebration.

Creating a county flag became an endeavor of the Rutherford County FCE Clubs, a non-profit organization dedicated to family and community education (FCE). After much talk, two members, Frances McDonald (Blackman Club) and Jane Jackson (Rockvale Club) set the project into motion after learning the county did not have a flag.

Each year the FCE Clubs from across the state of Tennessee hold their convention in a different region of the state. Part of the program during the convention is the "Parade of Flags", where each county council president walks across a state carrying his or

her respective county flags.

The Rutherford County Council President at that time (2000-2002), Francis McDonald, went to the county mayor's office to borrow the county flag only to be told there was no county flag. Rather than be left out of the "Parade of Flags", two FCE members, on short notice, went to work. Naomi Mullin (Seminary Club) sewed up a blue bed sheet and Nora Van Winkle (Brown's Mill Club) hand painted the Obelisk (a monument marking the center of the state located on Old Lascassas Pike) in the center of the street. A sad comparison to the other beautiful flags.

After three more years of parading this pitiful "flag" at the conventions, Frances and Jane Jackson (a former Council President now serving a second term) decided to do something about creating a flag for the

fastest growing county in the state!

First they visited Shacklett's Photography to look at old photos of county events thinking that maybe years ago there had been an official flag. Nothing surfaced except the county seal. With the seal and several county landmarks in mind, the two visited Screen Art Studio and talked with owner Mike Bickford. Using his computer skills, Tom Burns, an employee at Screen Art took these ideas and did a layout that was very attractive.

Next, the ladies visited County Mayor Nancy Allen to get her opinion on the initial color printout. It was agreed some minor changes were needed and these were made by Tom to the approval of all including FCE members.

After going before the Steering Committee and the Full Commission in August, the design received a unanimous vote of approval as the official Rutherford County Flag from the Commissioners.


EAGLEVILLE HIGH SCHOOL (Part 2)

In the early 1900's Eagleville was very fortunate to have an excellent education opportunity for the children in the area. In Eagleville School, known as the Savage School, enrollment was increasing as well as in the several smaller schools in the area. The Rutherford County High School Board began making plans for the future. In 1912 the Board purchased approximately 5 acres of land on the Eagleville and Salem Pike (same location as the present school) for future planning to build a new school. At this time the members of the Rutherford County High School Board were: A. L. Todd, J. D. Jacobs, M. A. Sanders, J. C. Ransom, J. P. Leathers, H. C. Taylor and H. W. Burk. The land was purchased from J. E. and Emma Sullivan, J. D. Sullivan, Robert Sullivan and H. W. Sullivan. The price paid was \$1000.00. A portion of the deed stated: The above described parcel of land is to be used by said High School Board upon which to erect a school building for the education of the white children of Eagleville and the immediate vicinity, the money to erect said building having been subscribed by the people of Eagleville, and it is agreed that, in the event the above described land and building, or the proceeds, in the event the same should be sold, should ever cease to be used for school purposes at Eagleville, then said property or the proceeds thereof, shall revert to the donors of said fund, or their representatives. The deed was signed 22 July 1912.

In 1914 the consolidation with area schools: Simmons, Greenwood, Mt. Vernon and Little Rock, all one-teacher schools, the Rutherford County High School Board saw the need for a new building and proceeded with their plans.

The new Eagleville High School, a two-story concrete and stucco building was completed in 1915. Classrooms were on the main floor. The Smith-Hughes Act provided teachers for the home economics and agriculture classes, which met in the basement. The home economics room had a kitchen with tables that the students used for eating their lunches that was brought from home. When the weather was bad, the students also would have playtime in the home economics room. Mrs. May Taylor of Eagleville started to school in this school building and remembers one of their favorite outside games to play was scrub. It was played with a ball and bat and the game was similar to baseball or softball, but all students who wanted to play could until they were gotten out. The students weren't divided into teams but played individually. She remembers having a lot of fun playing this game.



The children from closed schools were transported by wagon and then by bus to Eagleville. The first drivers were R. W. Carlton, Hessie Bennett and Will Cole. Mr. Bennett continued driving for thirty-nine years.

Principals in this building were: John D. Wiseman, later an attorney in Nashville, J. D. McFarlin, Frank Jarrell, Kenneth Warren, Frank Hines, Clyde Richards and J. J. Northcott. Among the teachers was W. L. Foster, Mary Owen, Mrs. Scott (Lady Mary) Williams, Mary Dudley Williams, Mary Murphy and Maye Leming who taught home economics.

Pupils continued to graduate from the tenth grade until a third year of high school was added in 1920. The school became a four-year high school in 1921. That year there were two graduates.

In 1921 Dr. E. L. Williams was Board Member, A. P. Elmore and Jim Taylor were the magistrates and Neal Elrod was County School Superintendent.

In August 1923, on Tuesday night, two days after the opening of school, the school burned. It was rumored the fire was set by arsonist. After the fire the classes were held in local churches until a new brick school was built and ready for occupancy by the fall of 1924. (Continued next month)

My Favorite Recipe

Potluck Apple Pie

2 ¼ cups all-purpose flour, divided ¼ cup water
Pinch salt
1 cup shortening

FILLING:

½ cup maple syrup, divided 3 pounds tart apples (8 to 9 medium), peeled and thinly sliced 1 ¼ cups sugar ¼ cup lemon juice2 teaspoons ground cinnamon1 teaspoon vanilla extract

TOPPING:

1 cup all-purpose flour ½ cup packed brown sugar ½ cup cold butter or margarine 1 cup chopped pecans

In a small bowl, combine ¼ cup flour and water until smooth; set aside. In a large bowl, combine salt and remaining flour; cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add reserved flour mixture; knead gently until dough forms a ball. Press dough onto the bottom and up the sides of an ungreased 15x10x1" baking pan. Spread ¼ cup syrup over crust. Arrange apples over syrup. Combine sugar, lemon juice, cinnamon, vanilla and remaining syrup; drizzle over apples. For topping, combine flour and sugar in a bowl; cut in butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in pecans. Sprinkle over filling. Bake at 350° for 1 hour or until apples are tender.
