

Eagleville School Scores High

Eagleville School scores were straight A's on the 2007 state report card in math, reading/language arts, social studies and science.

The scores are up from last year's two A's and two B's. The A's last year were earned in math and reading/language, with the B's being in social studies and science.

The report card tracks student achievement in grades 3-8 on tests in the four subjects. Grades are also issued for value-added gains, which measure how well students show progress from the previous year regardless of skill level.

Eagleville's value added grades, which are three-year averages, are up from the year before. The scores reported in 2007 are A's in reading/language and science, a B in math and C in social studies.

"These scores have really improved," Principal Rhonda Holton said. "The teachers and students have just worked really hard, and we are learning better every year how to analyze throughout the year and go back and reteach to move kids forward."

Holton said Eagleville teachers have attended differential instruction conferences, which has paid off in the value added area.

"We have to look at it from the standpoint of children who are kind of struggling and move them forward," she said. "The children who are normal average, we have to make sure they get a year's growth and then the kids who may be gifted or extremely

Eagleville School scores were straight bright (have to receive a year's growth)."

Teachers are challenged to differentiate their instruction to meet all those different learners, she said.

The report card, which the state released Nov. 2, also provides a profile of demographics and attendance and graduation rates.

The school profile shows Eagleville, which is a prekindergarten through 12th grade school, had 718 students in the 2006-2007 school year.

The demographics show that the student body is 5.6 percent African American, 0.5 percent Asian/Pacific Islander, 0.8 percent Hispanic, about 93 percent white and one student of Native American or Alaskan descent. The report shows the student body has 6 percent more males than females.

For 2007, Eagleville had a 94.9 percent attendance rate for grades K-8 compared to the state goal of 93 percent. In grades 9-12, the attendance rate was about 93 percent which is the state goal.

According to the report as published on the state department of education website, the graduation rate at Eagleville was 95.6 percent in 2006. The report noted the graduation rate is under revision for the 2007 school year. The state graduation rate goal was 90 percent.

The 2007 report card is based on performance and statistics from the 2006-2007 school year.

Apartment Structure Comes Under Environmental Scrutiny

An apartment structure that Eagleville City Councilman M.A. Smitty is developing next to his home on East Highway 99 has come under state environmental scrutiny.

The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation issued him a notice of violation on Sept 21, saying construction of the structure began prior to obtaining a septic tank permit.

The agency gave him a 30-day deadline to apply for a permit, but a TDEC spokesman and Smitty said the matter is still ongoing.

"We have not received enough information from him at this time to make a decision," Meg Lockhart, deputy communications director with TDEC, said last week. "We have asked for clarification and will work with Mr. Smitty once we receive the information we have requested in the notice of violation."

Smitty said he has been in touch with state officials since sometime before the 30-day deadline and steps are now in place to get the proper septic system.

"I have a soil scientist coming out who will test the soil, and we'll then go on from there," he said.

The city of Eagleville issued Smitty a building permit in July to remodel "2,806 square feet." Smitty's home and the structure he is remodeling are located on a ¾ acre lot next to Cheatham Branch. Smitty said he has modified the structure within the same footprint.

"Right now all I have standing here is a garage building, and it is staying that way until I get the septic system updated the way that they want it," he said.

The Rutherford County planning office has issued eight addresses for Smitty's property, which are in addition to his home address. He said he might have up to eight apartments if the state will allow it.

"But that is in the future," he said. "I am just doing this project as I can afford it."

TDEC public information officer Tammy Heise said the type of sewage system required for the apartment structure will depend on the particular conditions that exist on the property.

"Mr. Smitty has been asked to have his property mapped by a soil scientist to determine if his soil is suitable for a septic system," Heise said.

With this information, TDEC will de-

termine if it is appropriate to permit expansion of his existing system, permit a new system for the proposed apartment units or permit a single system for both his home and the proposed apartments.

"If the results of the soil mapping show the soil is not suitable for a septic system, Mr. Smitty's proposed project will not be permitted," Heise said.

The city council rezoned Smitty's parcel of land from medium density residential (R-2) to high density residential (R-3) in December 2006 with the final reading of an ordinance. The first reading of the ordinance was on Oct. 26, 2006. The R-3 rezoning permits the multi-family dwelling and apartment use.

Researching the rezoning process for Smitty's property has brought up a question that the Eagleville Times to date has not been able to get an answer to from the city or its contract community planning service.

The question is whether an R-3 district, which permits multi-family housing and apartments, is permissible anywhere in the Eagleville city limits because the city does not have a public sewer system.

The city's current zoning ordinance, which was adopted in April 2006, states the following about an R-3 district:

"The (R-3) district is designed to provide suitable areas for high density residential development where sufficient urban services, specifically including water services adequate to provide fire protection and public waste water service is available, or where the extension of such services and facilities will be physically and economically facilitated."

The area where the proposed apartment structure is being developed was highlighted in a recent study done by the Harpeth River Watershed Association (HRWA) concerning possible contamination of surface and ground water streams in the Eagleville area.

The HRWA's tests found that Cheatham Branch, which runs between Smitty's property and the Eagleville Community Center, showed E. coli counts that exceeded recreational limits. The tests also showed high E. coli counts in a ditch that runs behind some of the houses in the neighborhood.

Because of the lack of a public sewer system, residents and businesses in the city of Eagleville rely on septic systems to handle their wastewater.

That would leave some type of alternate treatment system, such as one with a drip irrigation field.

One of the systems used in the area is a STEP system, which is available in Rutherford County through the Consolidated Utility District (CUD). The STEP system uses a recirculating sand filter with drip field lines, rather than having a discharge into a stream.

Planning Commissioner Bobby Turner, who plans to use a CUD system in his 87-home development, said CUD has been installing the STEP systems for a while now and is "having extreme good luck with their system."

Another possible option mentioned was Eagleville sending its wastewater to Murfreesboro for treatment at that city's conventional treatment plant. The city of Murfreesboro is already extending its sewer system lines to Rockvale School and Eagleville would be just about 8 miles further.

"What you would really gain (if Eagleville used the Murfreesboro system) is that you wouldn't have to worry about treatment and disposal of wastewater," Ward said. "You would just pump it to them and pay the bill."

Ward suggested that someone from Eagleville should talk to Murfreesboro officials about the feasibility of hooking up to that city's system. Someone at the meeting suggested that the Murfreesboro system may already be reaching its capacity, and that there may be problems in running the lines to Eagleville because of geological issues. Also, running the lines might be cost prohibitive.

Barham asked what MTAS could do to help the city on developing a public sewer system.

Ward said he could meet with the elected officials to define what the problem is and to define what the city wants to do to solve the problem.

The next step after the elected officials and planning commission have exhausted their resources would be to look for some professional help from an engineer, he said.

Turner and others reminded Ward of the 1980s-1990s unsuccessful effort that Eagleville went through to develop a public sewer system. That effort ended up costing the city about \$400,000 just for engineering fees alone with no sewer system being built.

Ward said one of the most important tasks would be to define what officials would want the engineering firm to do. Plus the city would need to maintain control of this process, he said.

Barham indicated that through the help of a citizens group (that has been endorsed by city council) and MTAS that the city can keep from making

mistakes that were made in the past.

He and others also noted that the city still has the easement descriptions and the design of the sewer collection system from the engineering done on the first effort. This information could be useful and could possibly save some money toward developing another sewer system plan.

Councilman Ronnie Hill said he had heard that Larry McElroy of CUD had offered engineering services for free toward developing a system that would work for the city.

On funding, Ward said that resources such as grants to help pay for sewer systems are hard to get, and the amount of money that it takes to build a system is "almost unfathomable."

Keith Carey, who is chairing the citizens group endorsed by the council, said he sees the funding as a multifaceted approach.

The citizens group is charged with facilitating the research and implementation of options and funding to install a waste water treatment facility in Eagleville.

Carey says he envisions that it will not be just the city coming up with at least \$2 million to put in a wastewater treatment center but other groups could participate also.

He indicated the school's wastewater treatment facility has problems and he has heard the county is willing to contribute "a pretty good chunk of money" toward solving the treatment issues.

Also, Turner and other potential developers are responsible for paying for the STEP or other treatment centers for their developments.

Then there is money currently available from at least three different levels, Carey said, and the Harpeth River Watershed Association has money set aside to help people upgrade their septic systems

"If we focus and approach this at all levels and then see how we can pool all these resources," he said. "Together you'll have a pretty sizeable chunk of money to deal with the problem."

Ward suggested he will help with defining the project, then the city should look at getting engineering advice with the possibility of using CUD's engineer.

He cautioned about just telling an engineering firm to "design us a system."

"Let's take it in small steps and just start with preliminary design and before the cash register moves rapidly, let's stop and look at that," Ward said

Mayor Barham noted that the city's "cash register is on empty right now."

Now in its fourth season, 'Biggest Loser' can be seen on NBC at 7:30 p.m. Tuesdays.



A new Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) site at the College Grove Senior Center is seeking a volunteer site coordinator. Responsibilities of the coordinator include, but are not limited to scheduling volunteers, making appointments, stocking supplies, and capturing and reporting data when required. ONE WOMAN'S OPINION

In response to Mr. Phil Williams' Letter to the Editor published in the NOVEM-BER 16-30, 2007 edition of the Eagleville Times, I agree that perhaps it is time to re-think how we handle the position of City Recorder, but I think maybe we should approach it a little differently than how he suggests. It is true that our previous city recorder was apparently paid at a rate that was "ludicrous, outrageous, and one that our cash-starved city coffers cannot maintain." However, there is a solution that is much better than letting a "part-time student employee" handle the job alone. What would that solve? If the person is employed part-time, we would still have several hours a week when the office could not be open for business.

Maybe we should just hire a competent professional person who would keep business hours with little time off, manage the office as a business should be handled, and not demand "an arm and a leg" for a salary. Why do we have a part-time student employee in the first place? It sounds as if one competent professional accountant could do the job and help with anything else that came up, such as doing the bookkeeping for a police department should we ever have one again. Who is keeping the books for the fire department? That could be done by a qualified professional in this position as well.

While it is true that the City of Eagleville has had virtually no growth in the past twenty years, do we really think that this trend is going to continue in today's world? How many subdivisions have sprung up in the surrounding areas and how many people have moved into this area in the past two years?

Think of what the next twenty will be like. It is true that we want and need to

keep our small town, quaint atmosphere, but we can't hide our heads in the sand either. We are going to have to have at least one policeman in the next couple of years if not before then. Then there is the absolute fact that a new high school is going to be built in Rockvale and another one in Unionville in the next year or two, which will most likely attract more people to Eagleville to live. Let's face it, folks, this town is a great place to live – great for our children and ourselves alike, and we have been a well-kept secret for a long time, but that is about to change. So whether we like it or not, we are going to have to grow. The only thing we can control now is how

Do we really want to keep a part-time student employee in a position of responsibility with our city records and the records of our property and businesses for all of us in this community? I think that is dangerous.

Let's hire a responsible, competent, and reliable professional accountant who will do the job in a better way than it has ever been done and at a much lower salary than the previous city recorder. We need to start our search in our own community for a person who cares about our town and has the expertise and experience to handle this position as well as budgeting experience to help the Mayor and City Council better plan how to spend our tax dollars without putting it into his/her own pocket. Office hours from 8:00 a.m. through 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday would be maintained, absolute confidence would be kept, budgets would be implemented, and all at a considerable savings to the city coffers. Maybe we could get a local "professional" person for the salary of a "clerical" one, and get the job done the way it needs to be



Just imagine a group of Eagleville citizens sitting around in one of the local businesses discussing the world events sometime in 1913. The big news in the area was about the Franklin Interurban, an electric rail car that was carrying passengers between Nashville and Franklin. It had been in operation since 1909 and by this time had been expected to have a route through Eagleville.

According to the Review-Appeal dated October 13, 1910,"One of the

quiet investigation have been made with respect to the construction of an Interurban line between the towns of Franklin, Lewisburg and Shelbyville and data have been procured, surveys made and estimates furnished.


The purpose is to construct the line from Franklin in an easterly direction up the Valley of Harpeth River so as to give the service to Arrington, College Grove, Eagleville, Chapel Hill, Unionville, Shelbyville and Lewisburg.

Nicholas N. Cox, a former state representative from 1891 to 1901 from Franklin, had been very influential of getting the Interurban to Franklin from Nashville. After serving as an representative, he resumed the practice of law and engaged in the practice of banking in Franklin. It is believed that he withdrew his support for the plans to run the rail-lines to the other purposed communities.

The topic of conversation among these citizens at this time was probably about the Interurban that never materialized for their community, so Mr. J. S. Ogilvie wrote a song. Sam Edmonds and several other men in the commu-

nity had a "Brass Band" and it is believed he wrote the words and the band may have added their own music to it. The title "Eagleville Swan Song" was probably considered a very appropriate title among this group of citizens. Swan Song, is a reference to an ancient belief that has become an idiom referring to any final work or accomplishment. These Eagleville citizens, probably considered the cancel-







Pilgrims and Indians

Following the animal paths into middle Tennessee, the ancient Indians and later the pilgrims came to

the "Happy Hunting Ground," bordered on the north by Ohio and on the south by the Tennessee River. As early as 1540 Hernando DeSota followed the Indians trails across the country.

The Smobilian Indians which include the Cherokees, Creets, Seminoles, Choctaws, Chickasaws, Chickamauges and Natchez settled Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee. Each tribe had their own language and customs. They fought among themselves. Some lived in houses in well fortified villages while others lived in camps alongside rivers.

Indian tribes often found themselves in disagreement. The Northern Indians (Iroquois) sold land to England by the Treaty of Fort Stanwix. The warranty of title reads, "so long as grass grows and water flows." This treaty greatly enraged the Southern Indians (Smobilian). But, it was by the right of titles like this acquired from the Indians in treaties that prompted the early pilgrims to travel to and settle middle Tennessee.

William and Sarah Nolen from North Carolina married in 1783 and in 1797 ended up in the area which is now Nolensville when they stopped to repair a broken wagon wheel. They stayed and built a log cabin which is now part of the Newt McCord home on Nolensville Road. They later planted a peach orchard where the town is now. In all, there were sixteen children. It was said the children wore cow bells to protect them from being kidnapped by Indians or getting lost in a cave.

One Choctaw legend tells about how spirits called, "Little People," lived in the forest. The spirits often kidnapped young boys, taking them to a cave. Arriving there, the spirit would offer the child a knife, a bunch of poisonous herbs and a bunch of good herbs. If the boy accepted the knife he was certain to become a bad man. If the child accepted the poison, he would never be any help to his people; but, if the boy accepted the good herbs, he was destined to become a great doctor. The child stayed with the spirit for three days and then was returned to his home where he never spoke of his adventure. However, older Chactaw doctors often talked of how they received their powers from the spirits as a child.

The name, "Nolan," is Irish, anglicized from O'Nuallain. There are 26,387 "Nolans" in the immigration records from 1500 to 1900. While many people and perhaps even other "Nolans" came this way, only one had the foresight to purchase land and sell lots to build a town. Descendants of the early Nolensville settlers still live in Nolensville. To them and their ancestors—we say thank you.

My friend Mickey told me about a newscast she had recently viewed. It told of huge numbers of people that are being killed in the United States in hospitals. Doctors and medical facilities are the culprits!

I remember having tonsilitis very early as a child and I always had a high fever. Dr. Core (who lived in Flat Creek, Williamson County) was the nearest doctor and he prescribed a pink pill for me that was a laxative. After a day or so, the laxative had cleansed the body of infection and I felt fine again.

My brother Owen was two years younger and had lots of bouts with infected tonsils. At age 7 he had nephritis (a disease of the kidneys) and I remember that his growth was stunted and that he had to learn to walk again. His growth was stunted and finally his tonsils were removed at the age of 12.

The consequences of these medications may require exorbitantly expensive organ transplants (which the middle class cannot afford) or death. of obesity.

mine. He had used the brand Sudafed for years until it was recently removed from the shelf by our government. He cannot afford a half day off work or his family will not have food, shelter and clothing. It was no easy decision for him to "guess" what might relieve his discomfort.

EVERYTHING'S COMING UP DAFFODILS AT CARNTON Carnton Plantation Makes Daffodil History

Historic Carnton Plantation in Franklin offers area gardeners an opportunity to plant history making daffodils with the historic site's current bulb sale. Bulbs are currently available for purchase, in limited quantities.

"Carnton Plantation's 1847 garden has just been named to the American Daffodil Society's prestigious Display Garden list. Very few gardens earn this distinction," says Angela Calhoun, Carnton's executive director, "and we owe a great deal of thanks to Carnton volunteer Anne Owen and our garden manager, Justin Stelter for their relentless efforts to research, find, and plant not just daffodils but roses and other ornamental plants and bulbs that are appropriate to our period of interpretation, 1840-1866."

Carnton has the largest pre-1867 daffodil display anywhere in the Southeast, according to Calhoun. "Daffodils are a quintessential part of the southern spring landscape and they are especially pretty massed in the Carnton garden."

"The peak time to come enjoy this spectacular show will be from mid-February until early March here at Carnton. But we're making it easy for gardeners to have their own historic showing at home with the purchase of bulbs here," she said.

Among daffodil bulb varieties available for purchase are "Butter and Egg", "Hoop Petticoats", "Texas Star" and "Twin Sister".

All proceeds from the bulb sale will benefit Carnton's 1847 Garden.

Carnton's garden restoration began in 1995 when garden historian Gerry Doell discovered the location of Carrie McGavock's 1847 garden, located just west of the historic house, which served as a Confederate hospital during the bloody battle of Franklin in 1864.

Anchored by a trio of three historic trees, an Osage orange, cedar and pecan, the garden is planted with heirloom flowers, fruits, herbs and vegetables in symmetric brick-lined plots.

Nationally acclaimed landscape architect Ben Page designed the rustic cedar arbor now draped in ornamental vines, as well as the second focal point, a massive classical urn atop a stone base.

"The garden has become nearly as big an attraction as this history laden house.

It's a beautiful place to be any time of year, but particularly enchanting from late winter until late autumn," says Calhoun.

money for a good cause and we support the event by attending every year.



Harvest Baked Apples

A Favorite Recipe

8 medium baking apples

- 1 cup apple or orange juice
- 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon
- 1 cup (4 oz.) shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup raisins
- 1/4 cup chopped pecans

Preheat oven to 350°F. Remove cores from apples to within 1/2 inch of bottoms of apples; pierce the skins with a sharp knife. Place apples in shallow baking dish. Combine juice, sugar and cinnamon; pour over apples.

Bake 30 to 35 minutes or until apples are tender, basting occasionally with the juice mixture. Remove apples from oven. Combine cheese, raisins and pecans; spoon evenly into centers of apples. Let stand 1 minute.


