

The FireWatch

Eagleville's Bravest Men & Women Serving Our Community

With winter quickly approaching, there are several things we should consider to keep our families safe.

- Make certain your central heat is ready for winter use. During the summer when we are not using our heat, many risk factors can develop that could cause a serious problem the first time the weather gets chilly. Dust can build up in your vents, wires can become corroded and many other problems can arise. You should have a certified HVAC technician checkout your system in the fall before you begin using it for the winter months.
- Many folks use space heaters, wall heaters, propane heaters, etc. to keep warm during the winter. These types of heaters have added risk when in use. Before using a portable heater in your home, check the owner's manual to make certain it is approved for indoor use. Many portable gas heaters are not intended for use in confined spaces. As the gas burns to heat your harm it can release deadly toxins into the air. Portable electric heaters are a safer alternative for indoor use but still pose threats. Check the power supply to the outlet you will be using to make sure you do not overload the outlet. After storing the portable heater over the summer you will also want to make sure you dust the unit off properly and check the power cord for possible damage. Find a safe location in your home to plug in the heater out of reach of children and pets. These portable heaters become very hot and can easily burn you when touched. Make sure that no household products or curtains are touching or in close proximity to the unit to avoid a possible fire.
- Campfires are common in the fall and can be a fun way to spend time with family and friends. Keep in mind the possible dangers that can happen when you are careless. Make sure that there is a clearing around the fire pit and all debris and grass has been removed from the adjacent area before starting a fire. Also make sure you build a fire ring around the area you plan to use. Many people use rocks or brick blocks to build a ring. Do not use gasoline to start a fire. Using a starter log is a much safer alternative. Do not


- allow children to get to close to the fire ring or help put logs on the fire. Children could easily stumble and fall into a fire pit. If you plan on drinking alcohol at your campfire, please make sure to limit your consumption and have a designated person who is not drinking in charge of the fire. The designated person should be responsible for putting additional logs on the fire and for extinguishing the fire properly at the end of the evening. Make certain to have a water source close by or an extinguisher by the fire in case of an accident.
- Many people are starting up their fireplaces for the first time this time of year. Many dangers can be avoided by taking a couple of simple steps. First, check your flu to make certain it is open. Second, check the chimney to make sure no birds have built nest over the summer or leaves have clogged it up. You may also want to burn a CSL (Creosote Sweeping Log) to make sure the Creosote levels in your chimney are minimized. Creosote buildup can cause a major chimney fire. When building your fire in your fireplace do not make the fire too large. Make sure there is no risk of the logs rolling out of the fireplace and that you have a proper screen on the fireplace to avoid flames or sparks entering your living space.
- If you are planning on burning brush or leaves, make sure you call and get a burn permit before you burn. The Forestry Service has specific guidelines for burning between Oct.15-May 15. You are required to have a burn permit and it can be revoked if weather conditions change. Do not plan to burn on any day when it is windy or it has been dry for an extended period of time. Plan to have a water source or extinguisher nearby on small brush piles or contact the fire department to be on standby if you are burning a large pile. Also remember that burn laws mandate that only natural substances (leaves, limbs, brush, etc) is burnable material. Any manmade products or trash must be disposed of properly in a landfill. Burning manmade products is against the law. To receive a burn permit call 1-800-367-3507.

■ District earns all A's for grades 3-8, meets or exceeds scores for Gateway except one

MURFREESBORO — Rutherford County offers one of the best school districts in Tennessee according to scores on the state's 2008 Report Card, which was released today by the Tennessee Department of Education.

For grades 3-8, all districts are judged in two categories: achievement and what is known as value-added learning gains. Rutherford County Schools posted perfect scores — all A's — in both categories. Only eight other districts in Tennessee — and none in the counties surrounding Nashville — scored as well as Rutherford County Schools

On the high school front, RCS met or exceeded expected scores for Gateway testing in all but one area and scored above the state average on the valued-added grades on the ACT.

"We have shown that it is possible to earn all A's in both achievement and value-added," Director of Schools Harry Gill Jr. said. "The report is a tremendous accomplishment for our district. Teachers, students, parents and administrators deserve the credit. Their hard work and dedication is what continues to make our schools second to none. The report card clearly shows are schools are superior in Tennessee, despite receiving \$1,000 less than the state average per student in funding."

Noteworthy items from the Report Card:

- For grades 3-8, Rutherford County Schools earned perfect marks for achievement with all A's in math, language arts, social studies and science.
- For grades 3-8, RCS earned perfect marks for value-added learning gains with all A's in math, language arts, social studies and science.
- RCS earned all A's for fifth- and eighthgrade writing scores
- 99.6% of core courses are taught by highly qualified teachers
- RCS is showing a notable increase in the number of students moving from the proficient category to the advanced category on test scores.
- RCS is exceeding state goals for both grade promotion and attendance
- Above or meeting scores for all Gateway and end-of-course exams with the

exception of Algebra I.

- Value-Added scores for the ACT are above state average in every category
- Total graduation rate of 88%, which is above the state required improvement track goal.

Areas needing improvement

The report card shows the graduation rate at Oakland High School is improving, but it did not meet state goals for the federal No Child Left Behind Act. As such, Oakland High school is listed as School Improvement 2 on the state report card.

The district has added graduation coaches to track student progress at all high schools in the county, including Oakland. In addition, the school became fully certified as an International Baccalaureate school beginning this school year, which offers specially trained teachers and advanced programs for students. The current principal, Bill Spurlock, recently took the helm of the school after the recent retirement of Butch Vaughn.

For Algebra I, schools are now using commercial formative assessments that were purchased by the district. These tests are given throughout the course and allow teachers to intervene more effectively because student progress is tracked before they take the Algebra I Gateway.

Five schools have been placed on target status by the state for failing to meet a No Child Left Behind goal for one year. (NOTE: Target status is a system the Tennessee Department of Education uses to warn schools when they are in jeopardy of missing a No Child Left Behind goal for two consecutive years. It is not a part of the No Child Left Behind Act, which only reprimands a school when a goal is missed for two consecutive years).

LaVergne High School, Smyrna High School, Central Middle School, Roy Waldron and LaVergne Primary School were all placed on target status. LaVergne and Smyrna missed their graduation rate goals; Central for math scores with Students with Disabilities (SWD), Roy Waldron for math scores with SWD; and La Vergne Primary was targeted only because it is the K-1 feeder school for Roy Waldron.





The Old Rover School (A Historic Site) Residence of Wendell and Judy Rowland 4363 Hwy. 41-A N - Unionville, TN

Built in 1925 as a 2 room elementary school, the old Rover school house now serves as the residence of owners Wendell and Judy Rowland. The old school served grades 1st-8th grade, with 4 grades on each side, and most of the time, 2 teachers. A stage across the back extended to both classrooms, while outhouses served as bathroom facilities. The



original structure was an elementary and high school combined, which burned down in 1924 before being built back and utilized as a 2 room elementary school from 1925-1948. Owner Wendell Rowland has many fond memories of the old school house, having attended 3rd-4th grade here as a child, and can even tell you where his desk was. The original structure did not have a front porch; but an extension which served as the lunch room, whose smells filled the classrooms. The lunch room only had enough room to cook, so each child filled their plates and returned back to their desks at lunch time. Also rich in history is the old Tollgate House around back, once located between Rover and Unionville. Built in the 1900's, the Tollgate House was moved here and serves as Judy's weaving room where you can find several looms, along with her beautiful hand-woven creations. This residence is truly a piece of local history and will have a great cedar Christmas tree traditionally decorated in the living room; don't miss your opportunity to come and visit!

Allison Heights

(National Register of Historic Places) Residence of Jay and Jackie Morel 8931 Horton Hwy. - College Grove, TN

Built by the Allison's in 1827 on a Revolutionary War grant, this sprawling antebellum home will open its doors and greet guests for the holiday season. Located in the "Allisona" area of the College Grove community, this home is rich in local history and finds its way on the National Register of His-



toric Places. This home will be beautifully decorated in keeping with its original time period of 1827, with some modern touches. A large cedar Christmas tree, (cut fresh from the back of the property), can be found in the parlor covered in a collection of ornaments that spans 42 years. The accumulation of Christmas ornaments were purchased by homeowner Jay Morel's mother who wanted each of her children to have a collection of ornaments to carry with them into adulthood and into homes of their own one day. Antique furnishings can be found throughout; including what is thought to be one of the original Empire couches from the Carnton House in Franklin, TN. Original mantles and banister to the home will be flanked with an array of live greenery-cedar, pine, and of course, magnolia.

Lockard Residence

Deer Valley Dr. - Eagleville, TN

The Lockard's home was built in 2007. The home's design was based on a home the couple owned in the Percy Priest Lake area of Antioch. The Lockard's wanted to get away from the troubled area of South Nashville, but were not satisfied with the design concepts of new construction homes, so they



contracted a duplicate of their old house with the addition of the two story bay window in the front, as well as additional storage space. The Lockard's chose Eagleville for its quiet, country setting and its convenience to Murfreesboro and Franklin. The home features a collection of family heirloom antiques handed down from Ann's family, hand built furniture by Russ' father, Jim Lockard, and a set of figurines from Russ' mother that survived the WWII bombing of London. Also in the home is a soapstone pipe carved during the Civil War by a relative in Russ' family. Many prints found in the home are pictures from the couple's travels taken by Ann, who is a photographer by hobby. In the sunroom, an oil painting is hung that was painted by the late Margurite Lockard, Russ' Grandmother. Ann also has a collection of Fitz and Floyd teapots that depict landmarks of the world, such as St. Basil's Cathedral, and the Roman Coliseum. The rooms are decorated in a variety of themes, including a bedroom decorated as a tribute to the movie Gone With The Wind, Ann's favorite movie.

Residence of Meredith Cunningham

126 Deer Valley Dr. - Eagleville, TN

Home of an avid reader, this residence boasts an impressive collection of books in the home library, as well as many collections representing the interests of the home owner. Celebrating its first holiday season, this home has many antique fur-



nishings and an artwork collection from several Tennessee-based artists; including P. Buckley Moss, Phil Ponder, and Burton Dye. Much of the collection is featured on the "Tennessee Wall" found in the Great Room. Longaberger baskets will be used and on display throughout the home and a collection of Jim Shore and Possible Dreams Santa's are nestled here and there. The Bonus Room hosts a bear collection, with the kitchen decked out accordingly with a gingerbread theme. Live holly and magnolia add to the nostalgia, while a 2nd bedroom will feature a snowman collection.

Carey Residence

10564 Ditch Lane - Rockvale, TN

Built in the 1820's, this large antebellum home has many nostalgic features and will greet holiday visitors with fresh greenery and natural Christmas décor. There is a lot to see at this residence, as you step inside the foyer and find a kissing ball made of mistletoe, and a table made from an original door belonging to the home. Fresh wreaths, gar-



land, and candles will keep with the old fashioned holiday theme, while modern Christmas accents add a festive flair. Fireplaces made from rocks original to the property will be festively decorated and the dining room will host a fragrant, live tree in an elegant silver and white theme. The play room will have a fun tree featuring an accumulation of the kid's ornaments received throughout the years and the family room will have a homemade gingerbread village on display. Tucked away in an apartment over the garage, you will find a pottery studio with pieces of Christmas pottery on display from homeowner Rhonda Carey's students, (Milk Barn Pottery). ALLISON HEIGHTS FARM

Jay and Jackie Morel will open their historic home on December 7th, for the College Grove Historic Home Tour. James Allison owned the Allison Heights Farm, originally a Revolutionary War Land Grant, in the early 1800's. Soon after his marriage to Nancy Ogilvie, daughter of William and Mary Ogilvie, he built a log home in an area of Williamson County, that later was named, Allisona, in honor of the Allison family. (Portion of the log home still stands). It

is believed at the time of his death in 1821, he had started building the two-story brick home that was finished in 1827 by his son, William. In 1832, an addition to the first four rooms was completed in the rear of the house. The Allison family chose to name their plantation, Beech Wood, because of a grove of beech trees located near the site of their home but later, the name was changed to Allison Heights Farm.

In James Allison's will, he left one half of his property to his wife

and only son, William; the other half was to be divided among his four daughters with the understanding that the son would inherit his mother's part at her death. William Allison, who married Louisa Perkins, daughter of Samuel and Sarah Leah Perkins of Triune, died in 1834 about three years after the death of his wife. His mother, Nancy Ogilvie Allison lived about fifteen years after the death of her son, William. (The William Allison House was added to the National Register of Historic Places on April 13, 1988.)

After the death of Nancy Allison and by the order of a will, James and Thomas Fearn Perkins Allison inherited Allison Heights. Thomas Allison enlisted in Starnes's Regiment of the Fourth Tennessee Cavalry and did not return home until the war was over. In 1854 he married Jane Marshall, the daughter of John and Margaret Marshall of Franklin. She died young, leaving two small daughters. During the war, Major Allison met Clara Bills and in 1865, they were married. Major Thomas Allison served in the Tennessee Legislature and was twice Commissioner of Agriculture. In 1867, James Allison, who married Margaret Caldwell, sold his share of the Allison property to Major John Houston



Bills, father of Clara Bills Allison. Major Bills willed the property to daughter, his wife of Thomas Allison. James and Margaret Allison moved near Burwood. Allison Heights Farm was home to Major Thomas and Clara Allison until his death in 1913 and the estate was sold to Mr. Robert P. Thurman.

During the

ownership of Mr. Thurman, the farm was often referred to as the "Thurman Place." Originally, a small portal was built on the brick home, but after acquiring the home; Mr. Thurman extended the front porch on both sides to reach the entire width of the house as well as other remodeling. At this time I have no information on the Thurman family ever living in this home during his ownership but several local families have resided there over the years. In the late 1930's and early 40's the Johnson family lived at

> the "Thurman Place" and three of their children; Betty Ann, Edith and Clarence was born there.


> In 1965, Mr. and Mrs. James Martin Morel purchased the Allison Thurman home and approximately 400 acres from the Thurman heirs and operated a dairy farm. They also did some extensive remodeling to make the home more comfortable. Jay Morel, the present resident, remembers how he and his brother enjoyed spending their summers with his grandparents and helping

out on the farm.

Jay and Jackie Morel moved to the Allison Heights Farm in March 2001. Due to an upcoming wedding of Jay's sister, restoration and remodeling soon began on the approximately 174 year old home and has continued to date. The wedding was held on the front porch of this historic home. The extremely well built two-story home has walls that are three bricks thick and pegged timbers placed so close together, they have not let a wall or floor sag. The unusual windows have six panes above and nine panes below. The original floors are wide boards of poplar and ash. A beautiful staircase with delicate round spindles leads to the two bedrooms upstairs. The carved chair rail pegged to wooden bricks every three feet around the wall is sill in tact as the beautiful paneling under and around the windows. All the mantels in the home are original, two of them hand carved sunburst designs and the walls are painted beautiful Williamsburg colors. Antique furnishing can be found throughout the home including what is thought to be one of the original Empire couches from the Carnton House in Franklin.

For the tour, beautiful decorations of live greenery and magnolia leaves will adorn the mantels and staircase banisters. The focal point of the dining room is a beautiful antique chandelier. A large cedar tree, cut from the farm, will embellish the parlor. The Christmas tree will be decorated with dated ornaments, collected by Jay's mother, Pat Moral. When her children were born, she started each of them a collection of ornaments and added a new one each year, for them to have as adults and to be used in their own homes. Jay's collection expands approximately 42 years. Other new and period Christmas decorations will be displayed throughout the home. The College Grove Historical Holiday Home Tour will certainly be a wonderful opportunity to visit this home and six other local historical places in the community.

The Allison Heights Farm, home of Jay and Jackie Morel will also be on the Eagleville Christmas Parade of Homes on Sunday, December 14th.



Little Stories About You & Me

The Kennedy Assassination

Dr. Bill Fleet remembers.

What were you doing on November twenty second, 1963,

the day an assistant press secretary announced, "President John F. Kennedy died at approximately 1 O'clock Central Standard Time today, here in Dallas?"

I walked into my research lab in the National Institutes of Health that day, and saw my assistant, a tall, heavily built, balding black man sitting by the window, crying. He sobbed, "President Kennedy has been killed!" I don't remember much of the rest of the day but I left at my accustomed time in the late afternoon.

Carolyn had spent the afternoon watching TV, sitting with her foot beneath her, folding diapers and watching the unfolding drama of the assassination while the older children played and our baby napped. The day was filled with medical reports, the swearing-in of Vice President Lyndon Johnson and even speculation about a possible political coup. When she stood, her numb ankle turned beneath her, resulting in an immediate painful baseball-size swelling. I insisted we go to the National Naval Medical Center where we received our medical care. Little did we know that President Kennedy's body was to be taken there.

At the hospital, we encountered a six footfour-inch marine holding a rifle with a fixed bayonet, guarding the emergency entrance. After some persuasion, he allowed us into to the Emergency Department, where Carolyn was x-rayed, given crutches and dismissed. Then came a problem; the same Marine refused to let us leave! He listened to our pleas with world-class deaf ears and at six-four with a rifle and bayonet, threats and pleas would have bounced off him like BB's off a tank.

We were herded into a small windowless room off the main hospital entrance and forced to remain there, cut off from the outside world. We had no access to TV or a telephone. Dozens of arrogant aggressive newsmen milled about in the room and discussed rumors of a possible military coup. Armed Marines were everywhere. No one knew anything. Some of us began to listen for sounds of distant gunfire. Finally, we saw grim-faced generals and admirals parade by, not 20 feet away. They were followed by Bobby and Ethyl Kennedy, Ted and Joan Kennedy, Eunice and Sergent Shriver and then Jackie, still in her pink. blood-spattered suit and pillbox hat. Once they had passed, we were allowed to leave.

We hobbled home at about ten o'clock, tired, hungry and shaken. We had lived through another of those rare days like Pearl Harbor or the death of President Franklin Roosevelt that are etched clearly in our memories forever.

1 cup chopped pecans

In a small bowl, combine ¼ cup flour and water until smooth; set aside. In a large bowl, combine salt and remaining flour; cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add reserved flour mixture; knead gently until dough forms a ball. Press dough onto the bottom and up the sides of an ungreased 15x10x1" baking pan. Spread ½ cup syrup over crust. Arrange apples over syrup. Combine sugar, lemon juice, cinnamon, vanilla and remaining syrup; drizzle over apples. For topping, combine flour and sugar in a bowl; cut in butter until the mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Stir in pecans. Sprinkle over filling. Bake at 350° for 1 hour or until apples are tender.
