Big Win Sends Eagles To The Playoffs

The Eagles won a Class 1A TSSAA Playoff appearance last Friday night, beating host Huntland 24-12, and making this Friday night's game against rival Middle Tennessee Christian School critical for playoff seeding.

"The game Friday night was a big win for us," said Eagleville Head Football Coach Steve Carson. "This Friday night's game against Middle Tennessee Christian is doubly big. It's a rivalry because they are the only other 1A school in Rutherford County, and because the winner will get better seeding in the playoffs."

It's been 4 years since the Eagleville Football Team has found their way into the postseason and only the second time in school history, but, they may not have to travel far for the first-round playoff game if they can pull out a win against Middle Tennessee Christian School.

"We are going to have to go out and play ball," said Carson of this Friday's upcoming game. "We are capable of winning, we just can't make silly mistakes and turn over the ball."

"The offensive line has done a great job for the last 2 weeks," said Carson. The offensive line, made up of six key players- Brady Ledwell, Kevin Brown, Austin Brennstuhl, Cody Baker, Mac Chrisman, and Brad Turner, "have done a tremendous job in blocking for our backs."

As Friday night's big game quickly approaches, Vice-Principal Bill Tollett invites the entire community to come and show it's support for the Eagles at a community-wide pep rally and bonfire this Thursday night, October 29th, 2009 @ 6:30 p.m. in the new gym parking lot with free hot dogs and drinks while they last!

"We need everybody in Eagleville, Rockvale, and the surrounding areas to come out and make some noise for us," said Carson. Kick-off for Friday night's game against the Middle Tennessee Christian School Cougars will be at 7:30 pm. Senior Night will begin at 7 pm.

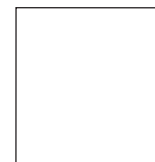
The awards presented by the county government were given to individuals who were nominated for their unique contributions within their local communities here in Rutherford County.

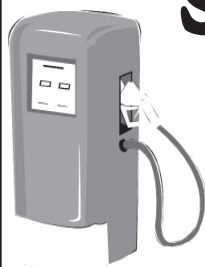
Fall Festival this year at the New Gym on Friday evening, November 13, 2009. The fun begins at 5 p.m. and does not end until 8 p.m.

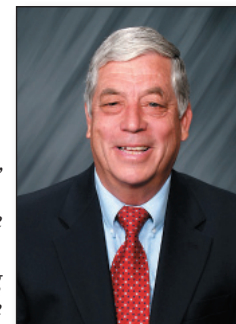

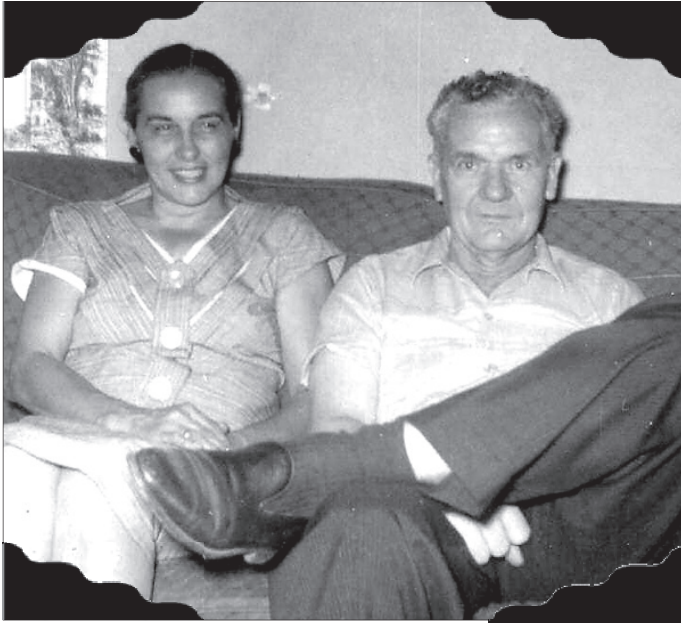

Sue and Russell Puckett built and lived in the Chalet type house on 41 A South before their deaths in 1985 and 2004 respectively. Russell was an aviator serving in the US Army in World War II. He was the proprietor of Puckett's Grocery in Eagleville, which burned in the fire of 1952 and manager of Puckett's Brothers Grocery for Leon Puckett from 1955 to 1959. He was later the President of the Bank of Eagleville. Sue was the "ambassador of Eagleville" whom everybody loved. She was often found feeding everyone's pets in the community.

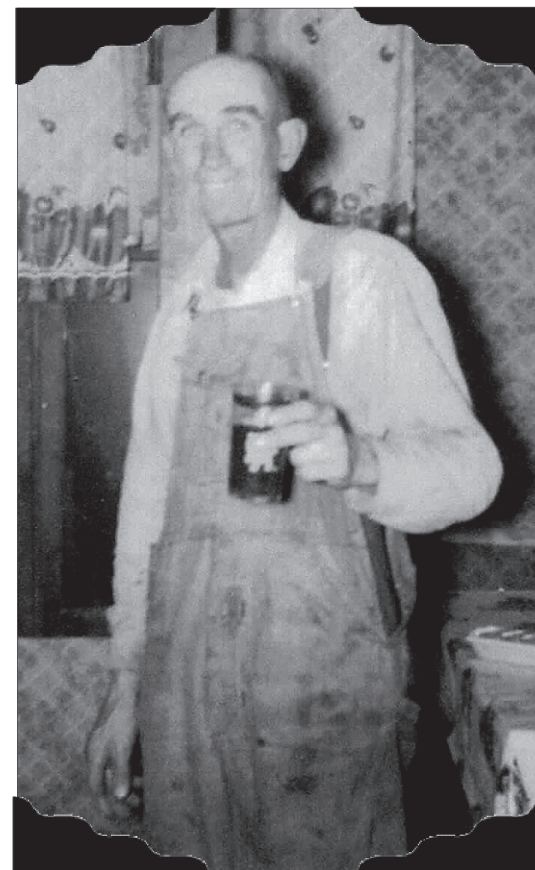

Halloween's Lucky 13 to Safety

The thought of Halloween fills my head with mysterious haint tales and russet leaves blowing across a path, with the eerie sights of carved pumpkins glowing in a mist of flickering light. Halloween is filled with ghosts and goblins running amuck in search of tricks and treats. The fall air fills with sounds of mischievous giggles and laughter as they mix with the smell of scorching pumpkins on a cool, crisp night. Ooh, the magic of Halloween! Suddenly, giggles and laughter cease when a child lies motionless on the cold, dark pavement—the result of an accident caused by a Halloween distraction. Had I only changed one thing—giggles and laughter would still fill the night.

Halloween safety is a must and we all play an important role in keeping ghosts and goblins safe. Use the Halloween Lucky 13 steps to a safer and happier Halloween:

1. Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be short, soft, blunt, and flexible to prevent injury.
2. Costumes should be well fitted to avoid trips and falls. Masks should not block vision or impair hearing. Consider a cosmetic mask instead of a loose-fitting mask that could restrict breathing or vision. Always test make-up in a small area first for sensitivity and irritation. Remove all make-up before bedtime to prevent skin and eye irritations.
3. Make sure costumes are made of flame-resistant material and stay clear of lit candles and bulbs. Review the "Stop-Drop-Roll" technique in case clothes catch on fire.
4. Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see trick-or-treaters.
5. Carry a flashlight to aid your vision; the light will also help others to see you.
6. Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in small groups or with a trusted adult.
7. Walk on sidewalks or the far edge of the road, facing traffic.
8. Use designated crosswalks and look both ways before crossing. Avoid running out from between parked cars and driveways.
9. WALK—don't run—from house to house; avoid running across lawns where ornaments or furniture may present unforeseen dangers.
10. Choose safe houses for trick-or-treating; children should not enter any home or apartment unless they are accompanied by a trusted adult.
11. Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats unless you know the cook well.
12. Warn children not to eat treats before an adult has carefully examined them for evidence of tampering and/or choking hazards. Limit the amount of treats that are eaten.
13. When possible, wear brightly colored costumes to increase visibility.

The 13 steps to a safer Halloween aren't just for children. Adults face the same visibility hazards as children; therefore, as you head out to Halloween parties to enjoy the festivities, be sure to apply the same rules. Drivers, please slow down and look out for ghosts and goblins of all ages. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that children, ages 5 to 14, are four times more likely to sustain pedestrian injuries on Halloween between the hours of 4 p.m. and 10 p.m. than on any other night of the year.

Keep your eyes on the path ahead and your ears tuned to the giggles and laughter as you watch and listen to the traditions of Halloween. Enjoy the sights and smells of carved pumpkins while ghosts and goblins trick-or-treat. As quickly as a candle flickers in the night, Halloween's distractions could end a life.

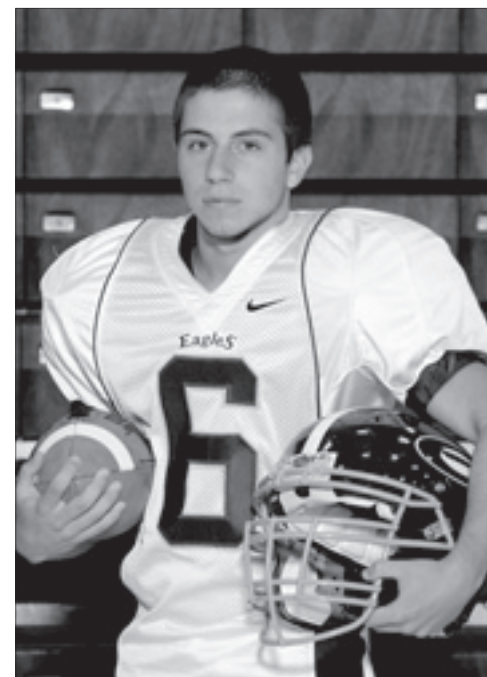

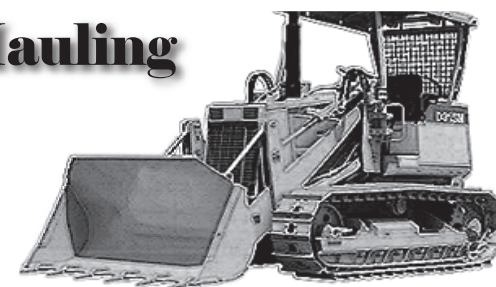

Making Potato Salad

Every family has traditions they follow for certain times in their lives. It is one of the most comforting things about coming home. Some traditions aren't even related to a holiday.

For example: potato salad. We make potato salad every time we have a barbecue. It doesn't matter if the meat being barbecued is chicken, steak, or hot dogs and hamburgers. If it's cooked on the grill, we have potato salad.

My only daughter likes to cook, thank goodness. So the recipe that was passed down to me from my mother and her mother before her, will, hopefully, continue to be fussed over by the newest generation.

My daughter is only eleven years old, but she does her best to learn the skill of making potato salad because she knows that she can never have a barbecue if she doesn't know how to make potato salad.

However, because of her age and inexperience, we need to improvise on a few things. First, I have a special knife I use to peel the potatoes. But my daughter needs to use a short handled knife. If she didn't there would be too much handle on the end of my knife which would cause a lever action and eventually the knife would lever just enough to fall out of her little hands. Since she has not gotten the hang of peeling over the table, the knife would fall and imbed itself into the floor... or worse, her foot. I'll pass my special knife on to her when her fingers are longer and she has mastered the art of coordination.

Spices are another story. While I just add spices indiscriminately: A little salt, a little pepper, etc., she will hold the shaker and

make stabbing motions at the salad – once, twice, three times – and then look in the bowl to see if anything has changed. I'm not sure what she's looking for, but she probably saw a chef on TV do that once and thinks that's simply what you have to do.

I ought to determine the exact measurements for the spices, but that's not the tradition. The tradition is shake, stir, taste... shake, stir, taste. You have to make a lot more salad than you actually need because of all the tasting going on. My husband likes to get in on that step. It's traditional.

Stirring is another challenge for my daughter. As with the knife issue, physics plays an important role here as well. You must wield a long-handled spoon as if you were stirring a witch's brew, bringing the bottom of the salad to the top and the top of the salad to the bottom. My daughter, however, insists on using the spoon like a catapult. She'll push the spoon deep into the salad and because she isn't tall enough to stir to the top, she'll use the side of the bowl for leverage. As a result, she showers my kitchen with potato salad at least once a month. I have, inadvertently, been caught in the strike zone once or twice. However, I've heard that mayonnaise is good for your complexion.

We both enjoy the experience so I don't think we'll need to worry about the potato salad tradition dying out as long as my daughter has a daughter some day.

Some traditions are usually founded by unintended events. So who knows? Catapulting potato salad on Barbecue Day might become a new tradition.
