#### November 11th - We Honor Our Veterans

Veterans Day, an annual United States holiday honoring military veterans, is observed on November 11. It is also celebrated as Armistice Day or Remembrance Day in other parts of the world, falling on November 11, the anniversary of the signing of the Armistice that ended World War I. (Major hostilities of World War I were formally ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 with the German signing of the Armistice.)

U.S. President Woodrow Wilson first proclaimed an Armistice Day for November 11, 1919. In proclaiming the holiday, he said "To us in America, the reflections of Armistice Day will be filled with solemn pride in the heroism of those who died in the country's service and with gratitude for the victory, both because of the thing from which it has freed us and because of the opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice in the councils of the nations."

The United States Congress passed a concurrent resolution seven years later on June 4, 1926, requesting that the President, Calvin Coolidge this time, issue another proclamation to observe November 11 with appropriate ceremonies. An Act approved May 13, 1938, made the 11th of November in each year a legal holiday; "a day to be dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as 'Armistice Day'."

In 1953, an Emporia, Kansas shoe store owner named Alfred King had the idea to expand Armistice Day to celebrate all veterans, not just those who served in World War I. King had been actively involved with the American War Dads

during World War II. He began a campaign to turn Armistice Day into "All" Veterans Day. The Emporia Chamber of Commerce took up the cause after determining that 90% of Emporia merchants as well as the Board of Education supported closing their doors on November 11 to honor veterans. With the help of then-U.S. Rep. Ed Rees, also from Emporia, a bill for the holiday was pushed through Congress. President Dwight Eisenhower signed it into law on May 26, 1954.

Congress amended this act on June 1, 1954, replacing "Armistice" with Veterans, and it has been known as Veterans Day since.

This year, Eagleville Times would like to highlight Herman G. Cunningham, who joins the ranks of other local veterans who have served in the U.S. Armed Forces from the Eagleville Community.

Herman G. Cunningham, Company "M" 117th Infantry, Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, London, Paris, Great Brittain, France, Italy, Belgium. Trained at Camp Sevier, SC, September 11, 1917. Arrived at Liverpool, England on May

at Liverpool, England on May 23rd, 1918. Went to Calais, France and was attached to British 3rd Army Corps. Fought at Kemmell Hill, near Ypres, in Belgium until September 1918. From there, went to Somme front, Hinderburg line, and fought in the Battle of Bellcourt and other important battles on this line. On October 7th, 1918, this company, with a fighting strength of 77 men attached 400 Germans who were strongly entrenched in a railroad cut, a sunken road, and occupied a steep hill. 114 of the enemy were killed, 23 were

found wounded on the field and 263 were captured; 42 machine guns were captured, 4 trench mortars, 2 "whizz bangs", and a large amount of equipment. During the engagement, all of the officers became casualties and the Company was reduced to 34 men. On October 9th, the Company captured Blockstelle Woods and the towns of Becquieny and Busigny, the latter being the largest town captured by the Division. Arrived at Charleston, SC, on April 2, 1919. Paraded in Knoxville, Nashville and Chattanooga. Demobilized at Fort Oglethorpe, GA, April 16, 1920.

The thoroughbreds standing at the farm are from some of the top bloodlines in the thoroughbred industry. Fwhyeye, the farms anchor stallion, was sired by Unbridled's Song. Fwhyeye was thought to be one of the contenders for the 2008 Triple Crown, but was injured after his first race, and retired from racing.

We offer breeding, sales prep, training and boarding. Boarders are welcomed at the farm at anytime and visitors are welcomed from 3 to 5 on Friday and 9 to 5 on Saturday.

Eagleville, Tennessee the new thoroughbred capital of Tennessee? Echo's of Thunder Thoroughbreds may be new to Eagleville, but thoroughbreds are not new to Eagleville. Reed Hill Farm, here in Eagleville, was the first breeding farm in the area to stand thoroughbreds.

While it may seem like a strange concept to have thoroughbreds in Tennessee Walking horse country, it is not that strange. Until the Civil War, Tennessee was top thoroughbred breeding state in the United States. Tennessee was world renowned for its thoroughbreds and that is how Echo's of Thunder Thoroughbreds came to the area.

Keith Damron co-owner of EOTT had been searching for a place to start their breeding program for two years, when he meet Sam Tune and saw the stables at Magnolia Valley and the search was over. Keith Damron, originally from Kentucky, and wife Bunnie Damron, originally from West Tennessee, fell in love with the stables and Eagleville, and knew this was home. Once the couple had set their sites on the farm, the work began to find the Stallions that would set them apart and put them on the same level as Kentucky, Louisiana and Florida. The couple made hundreds of calls and finally made deals with The Nursery Farm in Ocala, Florida, owned by Lita Mattke, and Elite Thoroughbreds in Folsom, Louisiana to bring some top promising Stallions to the farm at Magnolia

The new stallion crop has put Eagleville

on the map as a possible new destination for thoroughbred mare owners. The farm will stand four stallions its first year, anchored by Fwhyeye, the son of Unbridled's Song, who is ranked number 12 in the world for breeding, and Grand Marshall, the son of Smart Strike, who is ranked number 3 in the world for breeding as well.

Echo's of Thunder Thoroughbreds has high hopes and dreams for its farm and the whole Eagleville Community.

The farm has a mare named Halo's Bold One who's sire ran in the 1988 Kentucky Derby and her Grand Dam sire won the 1976 Kentucky Derby and Belmont Stakes and is in foal to a England stakes winner. The foal will be what promises to be the first runner for the farm. The foal is due in March 2011, and the farm would like to get the whole community involved by choosing the name of the new foal. Drop off locations will be put at Hucklebee's, the Barber Shop, and Kandle Kitchen for people to put the name of their choice. The top four names for a colt and filly will be voted on by the community to represent Eagleville where-ever it may call home.

EOTT is also expecting ten 7-10 day old foals from Louisiana. We would like to encourage the town to come out and name these babies as well. Also, feel welcome to bring out the family to bottle feed a foal.

There will be an announcement in the Eagleville Times to welcome all new thoroughbred foals to the community.

The plantation of James and Sarah Williams, "Civil Order", is part of the local history of this area that is relatively forgotten or unknown to most people, other than Williams family and descendents. James Williams had the initiative and ambition, unheard of, in his day. To be able to establish a successful independent community was quite an accomplishment, in the early 1800's. Today, this previous community, on highway 31A (Horton Highway), in Marshall County near Chapel Hill, is marked only with a cemetery and a restored smokehouse located nearby.

On October 8, 1808, James A. Williams, son of William and Nancy Haislip Williams, married Sarah Allison, daughter of Robert and Sarah (Ogilvie) Allison. James was born December 16, 1785 in Granville County N. C. His family was originally from Wales. His bride, Sarah, was born June 13, 1789 in North Carolina.

The newlyweds, James and Sarah made their first Tennessee home, about 3 miles north of the present community of Eagleville and east of College Grove.

At this time, Eagleville must have been a little on the wild side. James Williams, who was a Methodist minister, did not like the free and easy ways of some of his neighbors and felt there was too much disorder in Eagleville for his family. In about 1812, he relocated his family to an area 2 ½ miles south of the present Holts Corner area on Henry Horton Highway (31A). Williams selected the name "Civil Order" for his plantation because he had said, "Here I will have law and order."

Their new home site was on Spring Creek, which furnished plenty of water for the farm and a freshwater spring supplied the family's new two-story log house, until a well could be dug. Slave cabins, a gristmill, tannery, saw mill, barns and other outbuildings were soon added as the Williams plantation continued to grow. A blacksmith shop, woodwork shop and store made the farm almost self-supporting. The mercantile contained a general store, wine cellar and tailor shop. James Williams was a gifted tailor, cutting and fitting men's suits from the finest materials available. A post office was also established and given the name "Civil Order".

Reverend James Williams built a church south of the family home and established a cemetery just west of the structure. He also traveled the region to preach the gospel and hosted Methodist conferences at his home, which drew large crowds.

Merchandise for his store was purchased in Cincinnati, traveling there by horseback. His supplies were shipped via boats back to Nashville, where wagons awaited to transfer the goods on southward to Civil Order. Crowds, in a festive mood, would gather to watch the workers restock the shelves of the store, with new merchandise.

four large rooms and central halls.

It is believed that about this time, the Civil Order post office, was discontinued and the site became known as the McCord


The Civil War came to Tennessee in 1862 and federal troops occupied the area much of the time, for the next three years. There were many nearby battles and Union troops were at the McCord place numerous times, taking provisions and wreaking havoc generally. On one visit they carried away the entire contents of the smoke house and another time they took all the meal that they could carry from the gristmill. The remaining meal that could not be taken away was poured into the mill's raceway through a hole in the floor. The soldiers then set the mill to grinding, with no corn so that the burrstones would be worn slick.

But the great tragic misfortune for the


McCord's was that Sarah contracted a severe form of measles, brought in by the northern soldiers and died in June 1863, leaving her husband with seven children, ranging in age from two to sixteen. According to family stories, Henry Granville McCord, the oldest son, had already ran away at age 15 to join the Confederate forces as a carrier for General Nathan Bedford Forrest. The two older daughters, Martha Adella and Sarah Elizabeth, plus a black nanny, cared for the younger children, Nannie and Cora. A while later, Cowden married his second wife, Sarah Wilson.

Cowden survived the war with his holdings reasonably intact and continued to farm his place until his death in 1879. During this period, most of the old Williams' industries were probably discontinued and Cowden concentrated on managing his land, raising

Cowden McCord carried on probably some, if not most, of James Williams's industries and continued apparently to prosper. Early in the decade, as their family grew, the McCord's built the attractive two-story front addition to provide more living space in the old home. The addition faced the new road to Nashville and contained





crops, cattle and hogs. He was a Justice of the Peace, a Democrat and a Cumberland Presbyterian.

Cowden's son, Henry G. McCord graduated from Cumberland University in 1873 and, in 1877, married Cynthia Virginia Ogilvie and they became owners of the McCord place after his father's death. The raised their family of seven children and continued to farm the land. When Henry died in 1910, his second daughter, Camilla Sue, dropped out of Cumberland University and returned home to help her mother, Lillie, run the farm.

In about 1914 or 1915, Camilla and Lillie remodeled the old home. They had the back section, which had been built by James Williams torn away and replaced. The remodeled house had a bathroom, featuring running water. It was drawn up from the well by a massive (by today's standards) gasoline-powered pump to a reservoir above the bathroom. Gravity then provided the power to the taps.

Camilla married Clarence N. Giles in 1920 and they continued to live at the McCord place with Lillie. Soon the first members of the fifth generation to live on the farm were born. The couple continued to farm, but on a greatly reduced scale, and Clarence managed the Wilhoit Mill on Duck River.

Lillie died in 1935 and, a little later, the Giles family moved to Lewisburg. The house was occupied for a while by several of the children of Marks Wright McCord, who was the eldest son of Henry and Lillie. In 1940, the place was sold to Powell Maxwell.

In 1975, the old house burned to the ground. The only original building left is the old log smokehouse, near the location where the home stood.

The well-kept Williams-McCord Cemetery is located south of the home site, near the present Horton Highway. Tall impressive monuments marks the graves of James Williams (Sacred to the Memory of Rev'd James Williams who was born 26th Dec 1785. Departed this life 22<sup>nd</sup> Oct. 1850 in peace with God) and Cowden McCord (Jan 14, 1809 Departed this life Aug. 4, 1979). Other marked graves are:

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#### As several states struggle to get ballots to military, Tennessee's new law makes it easier for troops deployed overseas to vote

(NASHVILLE, TN), October 21, 2010 As several states struggle to get ballots to those serving in the armed forces, Tennessee's new law is working to make voting easier for troops who reside in the state and who are deployed overseas. The new law, Public Chapter 636, sponsored by Senator Bill Ketron (R-Murfreesboro), took effect on August 20. Ketron said election commissions across the state are encountering no evident problems thus far during the law's first election after implementation.

"It is outrageous to even think that any of our men and women who serve us in harm's way might not have their votes counted," said Ketron. "However, that is what occurred in the past in Tennessee and is unfortunately the case in many other states during this election. This new law works to ensure that those who preserve our freedoms are given the opportunity to exercise their right to vote."

Tennessee's new law authorizes county election commissions to e-mail ballots to members of the armed forces and other citizens temporarily living outside the United States who are entitled to vote and who have submitted valid applications for ballots. Ketron says this expedites the process so the voters have more time to make decisions and return their ballots on time. The new law also requires Tennessee to develop a database that voters overseas can use to see if their ballots have been received by their county election commissions and their votes are counted.

The legislation helps the state comply with the federal Military and Overseas Voter Empowerment (MOVE) Act, which took effect last October. That law requires election officials to send out ballots to military members serving overseas at least 45 days before the elections.

The U.S. Justice Department (DOJ) recently announced agreements with officials in Alaska, Colorado, District of Columbia, Hawaii, Kansas, Mississippi, Nevada, New Mexico, New York, Wisconsin and the U.S. Virgin Islands, where problems enforcing the MOVE Act have occurred. The DOJ has referenced an agreement with North Dakota, has filed suit against Guam and is reported to be looking into ballot delays in Illinois. The Military Voting Project (MVP) has also claimed in published media reports that it uncovered MOVE Act violations in several other states.

Tennessee was among states under DOJ action in 2008 when Justice officials stepped in to help ensure that military service members and other U.S. citizens living overseas had an opportunity to vote in the state's February 5 federal primary election. The DOJ entered into agreement for emergency procedures with Tennessee's former election officials under Secretary of State Riley Darnell after the state failed to mail requested absentee ballots to the state's military in sufficient time to ensure the ballots were counted.

"Failure to get ballots to our servicemen and women who serve us overseas cannot be tolerated in Tennessee," added Ketron. "We need to do everything in our power to make it easier for our soldiers to vote and to have those votes counted -- and that is what this new law does. Thus far, implementation has gone smoothly."

According to the Pew Center on the States, about half of overseas voters failed to vote or to have their votes counted because of voting rules in 2008.

Halloween's Lucky 13 To Safety

The thought of Halloween fills head with mysterious haint tales and russet leaves blowing

across a path, with the eerie sights of carved pumpkins glowing in a mist of flickering light. Halloween is filled with ghosts and goblins running amuck in search of tricks and treats. The fall air fills with sounds of mischievous giggles and laughter as they mix with the smell of scorching pumpkins on a cool, crisp night. Ooh, the magic of Halloween! Suddenly, giggles and laughter cease when a child lies motionless on the cold, dark pavement—the result of an accident caused by a Halloween 9. distraction. Had I only changed one thing—giggles and laughter would still fill the night.

Halloween safety is a must and we all play an important role in keeping ghosts and goblins safe. Use the Halloween Lucky 13 steps to a safer and happier Halloween:

- 1. Swords, knives, and similar costume accessories should be short, soft, blunt, and flexible to prevent injury.
- 2. Costumes should be well fitted to avoid trips and falls. Masks should not block vision or impair hearing. Consider a cosmetic mask instead of a loose-fitting mask that could restrict breathing or vision. Always test make-up in a small area first for sensitivity and irritation. Remove all make-up before bedtime to prevent skin and eye irritations.
- 3. Make sure costumes are made of flameresistant material and stay clear of lit

candles and bulbs. Review the "Stop-Drop-Roll" technique in case clothes catch on fire.

- 4. Fasten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see trick-or-
- 5. Carry a flashlight to aid your vision; the light will also help others to see you.
- 6. Avoid trick-or-treating alone. Walk in small groups or with a trusted adult.
- 7. Walk on sidewalks or the far edge of the road, facing traffic.
- Use designated crosswalks and look both ways before crossing. Avoid running out from between parked cars and driveways.
- WALK-don't run-from house to house; avoid running across lawns where ornaments or furniture may present unforeseen dangers.
- 10. Choose safe houses for trick-or-treating; children should not enter any home or apartment unless they are accompanied by a trusted adult.
- 11. Eat only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats unless you know the cook well.
- 12. Warn children not to eat treats before an adult has carefully examined them for evidence of tampering and/or choking hazards. Limit the amount of treats that are eaten.
- 13. When possible, wear brightly colored costumes to increase visibility.

The 13 steps to a safer Halloween aren't just for children. Adults face the same visibility hazards as children; therefore, as you head out to Halloween parties to



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enjoy the festivities, be sure to apply the same rules. Drivers, please slow down and look out for ghosts and goblins of all ages. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention report that children, ages 5 to 14, are four times more likely to sustain pedestrian injuries on Halloween between the hours of 4 p.m. and 10 p.m. than on any other night of the year.

Keep your eyes on the path ahead and your ears tuned to the giggles and laughter as you watch and listen to the traditions of Halloween. Enjoy the sights and smells of carved pumpkins while ghosts and goblins trick-or-treat. As quickly as a candle flickers in the night. Halloween's distractions could end a life.

#### Fall Gardening Maintenance

THE BUZZ AROUND CO-OP

As the growing season ends and gardners mow, snip and spade the final time this fall, it's time to think of cleaning and storage of all that equipment. Just a little preventative maintenance this fall can prevent expensive repairs in the future. Maintenance extends the life of tools and equipment and makes working with them easier and more efficient.

While hoses don't need a great deal of care, you just drain all the water from them and store in a dry location. Most tools can be cleaned with a wire brush, scraper or strong stream of water. Sharpen hoes, spades, pruners, loppers and saws, lubricate all tools (WD-40) including pivot points and springs.

All sprayer parts should be thoroughly washed and rinsed. Tip the sprayer upside down and hang upside down when not in use so that they can drain and dry. When the sprayers are used with pesticides, triple rinsing is recommended.

Power equipment, such as lawn mowers, tillers and chippers require additional winter preparations. The most important winterizing step is to remove all gasoline from the tank by running the engine until it stops, remove the spark plug and squirt a little oil into the cylinder head. Give the engine a turn or two to coat the cylinder walls with oil, and then replace the plug. Two cycle engines, or engines that run with gas and oil mixture, also should have the oil-gas mixture removed. Run the engine with the choke open to remove fuel from the lines.

Avoid storing gasoline over the winter. Old gasoline does not ignite easily, making the machines using it work harder.

I hope that some of these maintence ideas save you time and money in the spring by having your tools ready to go to work.
