Eagleville Marching Band Inaugural Season

With the Eagleville High School football team beginning it's second season of play, the 2003-2004 school year has been full of many exciting "firsts". Along with regional/district football games, a brand new football stadium for EHS, and new sponsors for the cheerleaders, taking the football field for the first time in the history of the school was the first ever Eagleville High School Marching Band.



"We spent all last year reorganizing the band's instrumentation from a concert band to a marching band," says Band Director Kelly Medford. "We needed to bring in more brass instruments and drummers, as well as train the girls for the color guard (flag twirlers). Fortunately, all of the band members have really come through by learning new instruments and recruiting their friends to

meet those needs."

With the support of the principals and the Rutherford County Board of Education, the EHS marching band has been provided with much of the necessary marching band instruments and equipment, including a complete set of marching band uniforms.

The EHS marching band will be performing a pre-game and half time show for all home football games, and plans to attend two or three of the closer away games. There will also be 2 or 3 Saturday marching band competitions, including the Tennessee State Division I Marching Band competition on October 25th, hosted by Riverdale High School in Murfreesboro.





CITIZEN OF THE MONTH - Mr. Harry M. Patillo

A long time resident of Eagleville, Harry M. Patillo will celebrate his 85th birthday the first day of November this year. Born in Murfreesboro, he began first grade at MTSU, then called the Normal School, moved to Central High School, then called the Training School, and then on to Smyrna High School where he graduated in 1939. He always got a chuckle out of telling people that he started college when he was only 6 years old. After serving in the Air Force in WW II in the chemical airfare division between 1942 and 1946, he was discharged having attained the rank of sergeant. Shortly after returning home, he took the civil service exam and was sworn in as postmaster of the Eagleville Post Office on September 12, 1949. Three days later he married Lillian May Webb and they began their lives in the community of Eagleville.

As postmaster for 35 years, he is known and loved by many. He was postmaster in 1952 during the big fire when a quarter of the town was burned to the ground. The Post Office was then housed in the back of Puckett's Grocery at the present location of the Dairy Bar. Because of his quick actions, all the letters, equipment and the safe, which was pulled down the street with a chain behind a jeep, were all moved before the fire got into the building. They lost nothing and were open for business the next day. For eight years until the present building was built in 1960, the post office was housed in the

Crosslin Supply Company. When asked what the biggest change in the postal system was during his years as postmaster, his ready answer was the "zip code".

My most vivid memory of my father as postmaster during my growing up years in Eagleville, was how early he got up to open the post office and raise the American flag over the town, and how reverently he lowered the flag every afternoon at 4:00 and carefully tri-folded it to be ready for the next morning. If I happened to be there with him, he would let me help him fold the flag, never letting it touch the ground, all the while teaching me about respect for the country it represented. During the last ten years before his retirement, he became a training postmaster and was sent all over Tennessee giving instruction to new postmasters in the area.

He retired in December of 1980 and was honored with a reception given by fellow employees: Herbert and Evenly Crick, Ellie Wilkerson and Charlotte Ralston. Although retired from the post office, he was not retired from life. He spent many hours working on his farm and raising Black Angus cattle. He is still and active member of the Eagleville Lion's Club. He is the only active charter member, which in now in its 59th year. Together he and his wife Lillian, enjoyed life together. She was know around town for her ready smile and laugh and her good cooking, especially her angel food cakes. She was a member of the local homemakers clubs and they enjoyed attending events at the community center and the local basketball games. They were long time member of the Eagleville Church of Christ. After 45 years of marriage, Lillian passed away in September of 1994.

Harry and Lillian's greatest joy was their two children and three grandchildren. Their daughter, Charlotte, attended David Lipscomb College and then married Dr. Jim Gray, and taught science in Louisville, KY until their children where born. They now reside in Springfield, TN. The granddaughter Deborah, is a first grade teacher in Springville, Alabama. The middle grandson, son Michael and his new wife

are in Alpine, Texas where he is pursuing a graduate degree in Range and Wildlife Management, and the youngest grandson Jonathan, is attending Abilene Christian University in Abilene, Texas, pursuing a degree in Computer Science.

Their son, John Thomas, is well know in the middle Tennessee area as a much sought after mechanic and a farmer. After graduating from Eagleville High School, he graduated from the Tennessee State Area Vocational Technical School with a degree as a machinist. Having completed several courses in advanced engines and training with John Deere, he worked for the John Deere dealership in Triune until it closed it doors.

Harry and John still reside in the only home they have ever known in Eagleville, where John's familiar gray 1966 Chevy truck full of tools still comes to the rescue of many a farmer, and Harry's familiar red 1990 Chevy truck still makes that trip to the center of town to the dairy bar for lunch or the post office to mail a letter.







Moose—Up Close and Personal

The border between Minnesota and Canada is exquisite and challenging as Scout Jeff Davis and his father, assistant Scout Master Don Davis discovered first hand this past summer. The two scouts from Eagleville Troop 123 joined John Green, Scoutmaster and members of troop 137 out of Franklin for a high adventure trip, Scout Style.

The scouts flew from Nashville to Duluth Minnesota and then took a shuttle to Ely Minnesota, their point of departure. In Ely, the group was outfitted with canoes and provisions. Food and tents were stored in backpacks and group members shouldered their canoes to begin a 6 day and 5 night trek through Quetico Provincial Park in Canada. Quetico has been preserved as a park since 1909 and has some of the most clear lakes and non-polluted waterways in the world. The group paddled a total of 68 miles through 18 different lakes. Group members had to hike the portages (land areas between lakes) loaded with the packs and canoes.

The scenery was spectacular with amazing sunsets and sunrises. The group members saw various fish including bass and northern pike and saw moose and other wildlife at the waters edge. The clarity of the waters allowed the group members to see well below the surface and the water was pure enough to drink. Jeff Davis described the trip as awesome and unforgettable.


The Park restricts campsites to no more than 9 people per site and there are few sites designated. This keeps visitors to a minimum, reduces traffic on the lakes and trails, helps to preserve the area and makes for a very peaceful trip.

Members of the group packed in all their supplies, equipment and canoes. Scouts practiced their skills in camping, hiking, canoeing and outdoor cooking. They made new friends and learned leadership and teamwork skills. Each team member also demonstrated his determination and commitment to completing their goal. The memories they created during this trip will last them a lifetime.







Edmunds got the idea for this vehicle in 1911, which plays a great part in today's transportation of goods. In 1918, a patent was obtained on this six-wheel vehicle not only in the United States but in Great Britain, Germany, France and Canada. Edmunds spent most of his time in his later year producting an efficient cheap, water pump that he invented. He is said to have been prouder of this achievement than anything he had ever done because it helped his neighbors have a ready source of water.

Mr. Edmunds died March 14, 1943 at the age of 82.





ROCKVALE CHURCH MEMBERS gather for the groundbreaking on August 31, 2001.


The first Lord's day worship of the Rockvale church of Christ was held on September 26, 1943, in the home of our late Sister Pearl Williams, whom we affectionately called 'Mother Pearl'. Services were held there until a building could be constructed. On December 10, 1944, the first service was held in the new one-room building located on Rockvale Road. Brother Charles Locke preached and James Porter McKnight, at the age of 16, led the first public prayer in the church. They were the only men in attendance. The property on which it was constructed was given to the church by the late Brother and Sister Ed Worley. It is believed that Mrs. Bertha McKnight donated the first communion table, which is still in use

and will be used in some capacity in our new building.

In 1954, three classrooms were added to the building. Since that time, we have seen other additions including more classrooms, a nursery, a library and a large outdoor pavilion for fellowship. Even with these additions, we continued to outgrow our facilities, and in 1996 a wing was added to the building to enlarge the auditorium. This also added three more classrooms.

Our first permanent minister was Charles S. Locke. Since that time several men have served the congregation in this capacity on a part-time basis, one being, Robert Vick, who labored with us for more than twenty years. Bobby Richardson, our first full-time minister came to us in September,

Jay Priestley joined our church family in September, 2001 as our first Youth Minister. Jay is a graduate of David Lipscomb College and has been a great asset for our young people. This summer, he and the group worked doing odd jobs for the sick and elderly in our community and Murfreesboro. The young men lead singing, prayer and conduct Sunday evening services the fifth Sunday of the month.

Now, in 2003, we find we must relocate to accommodate our growing number. Codes do not allow us anymore expansions. Sunday, August 31, we had our 'groundbreaking' for the new building which will be located at the corner of Rockvale Road and Highway 99. The plan for completion is summer of 2004.

Rockvale church of Christ is actively involved with missionary work in various countries around the world and evangelism right here in our own community. We hold successful gospel meetings and exciting vacation Bible schools on an annual basis.

Our congregation is known for

the friendliness and close fellowship that we have with one another. Visitors always find open arms and loving hearts at Rockvale. We strive to grow in grace and in knowledge of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Sad to report, our minister, Bobby Richardson, passed away in May 2003 of a heart attack. He was excited about ou new building

Annual Decoration Service Held at Elmore Cemetery

On the fourth Sunday of August each year, a very unusual decoration service is held at the Elmore Cemetery, located near Rover. This custom began in August 1924 due to a need to have enough space to have a Lamb/Beasley family reunion. Nannie Lee Lamb Jackson and her family were visiting from North Carolina. Together with her sister, Addie Casteel and cousin, Lela Ghee and Mary Hudson, a family reunion was planned. In searching for a place for all the families to meet, it was decided that the Cemetery would be a good location. Basket lunches were carried and shared. The children played horseshoes, ball games and other games in the field next to the Cemetery. The older folks visited with each other. The city folks and the country folks swapped news of the different families. There was Bible reading, preaching and singing after lunch. It wasn't long until they started decorating the graves with flowers handmade of crepe paper. Over the years, little has changed. It is still a day when lots of kinfolk get together as well as family members of ones buried there.

Lunch is still carried and enjoyed. Bible reading, preaching and singing is conducted after lunch. The oldest woman and man attending are recognized and given a box of candy. Wrapped candy is scattered over the ground (where there are no graves) for the children to pick up.

The deed for the Elmore Cemetery was recorded April 14,

1852. One of the oldest tombstones marks the grave of James A.B. Smith, son of James and Lavina Smith, born December 14, 1824 and died September 27, 1832. This is the child of one of the men who deeded this land for a public burying ground. It is located on land now owned by Herbert Gleaves. Some of the family names buried here are: Smith, Underwood,

## Different Strokes For Different Folks-Becoming Stroke Savvy

Brain Attack, Stroke, cerebrovascular accident, TIA (transient ischemic attack or mini stoke), these are the most common terms used to describe the 3rd leading cause of death and the number one cause of adult disability in the United States each year. More than 750,000 people will suffer a stroke this year in the U.S. Of this number, 160,000 will die from stroke or its complications. Surprisingly only 3/4 or 500,000 roughly will be above the age of 65. The rest, 250,000, will occur in younger people—many of which do not know the risk factor associated with a brain attack.

The "medical conditions know to increase risk include in high blood pressure, high cholesterol, heart disease, atrial fibrillation, blood clotting disorders, diabetes, carotid artery and peripheral vascular diseases.

Lifestyle risk factors include smoking, being overweight, and excessive consumption of alcohol. Other risks include birth control pills, hormone replacement therapy and the risk is more than tripled of you smoke and take estrogen products together.

Some of the lesser known contributing factors include an autoimmune disease (i.e. lupus), a history of multiple unexplained miscarriages, a previous blood clot.

What can you do to prevent the occurrence, disability or death associated with stroke? First recognize the symptoms. Common stroke symptoms include:

- 1. Sudden numbness or weakness in the face, arm or leg—especially on one side of the body.
- 2. Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.
- 3. Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.
- 4. Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
- 5. Sudden severe headache with no know cause.

Call 911 if you have or see anyone having these symptoms. TIME IS CRUCIAL! Treated early, many strokes may be stopped before permanent damage or death occurs. Be aware, just because symptoms come and go away rather soon—this could be

a TIA—which is often the early warning sign of an impending major stroke.

Next, make necessary lifestyle changes to decrease your risks.

- 1. Know and control your blood pressure. Ideally blood pressure should be around 120/80 or a little less. If your blood pressure is greater than 135/85—you need intervention.
- Control your blood sugar if diabetic. Diabetics contributes greatly to heart disease and vascular disease commonly called "hardening of the arteries".
- 3. Find out of you have atrial fibrillation. This is an irratic (not just irregular) heartbeat which can often be diagnosed by tour doctor with a stethoscope and EKG in the office.
- 4. Know your cholesterol and if necessary change diet and if that doesn't lower it sufficiently, talk with your doctor about medication to lower your cholesterol.
- 5. STOP SMOKING...nuff said.
- 6. If you drink alcohol, do so in moderation. Some studies show one glass of wine or beer may actually be beneficial, provided you have no other medical contraindications. However, if you drink more, your risk may increase for several medical conditions. If you don't drink, it is not advised to start.
- 7. Exercise at least 5 days a week. A brisk walk for 15 to 30 minutes is a good place to start. Even if you must break up your routine and squeeze in several small activities daily—you still will benefit. If you haven't been exercising or active, always check with your doctor before starting a strenuous workout program.
- 8. Lower the sodium and fat in your diet. Eat your vegetables! A recent study showed that 5 daily servings of fruits and vegetable can lower your stroke risk by 30%! Include lean meats, low-fat dairy, up to four egg yolks or egg substitutes per week and plenty of fiber including whole grain breads, cereal products or dried beans. Use olive or canola oil and avoid other


vegetable oils.

- 9. Other food considerations include those rich in folic acid like asparagus, cereals, fortified breads; vitamin B12 and B6 rich foods like cereals, low fat meat, fish—especially salmon, mackerel, trout and tuna; poultry, milk products, bananas, baked potatoes and watermelon. In some cases B12 injections may be necessary.
- 10. Vitamin supplements especially Vitamin E and C are probably beneficial, but don't go overboard. If you're eating a diet rich in the above mentioned foods, you probably don't need a lot of additional vitamin supplements.
- 11. An aspirin daily may be beneficial to prevent clot type strokes and other vascular events—
  however, a small percentage of people will have bleeding (known as hemorrhagic) type strokes. An aspirin given during a hemorrhagic stroke would actually potentially worsen this kind of stroke.

  This is why it is important to get

to a medical facility to have the proper testing and treatment implemented right away.

This is a broad overview of a very common and devastating medical condition—which I hope serves to make you aware and proactive for yourself and your loved ones to become stroke savvy and make lifestyle changes to lead a healthier and happier life. If you have any questions, contact us or ask your own medical provided and have regular checkups to know your risk factors better to make informed decisions about your life.

# Fall's A Fine Time For Transplants



The long hot summer days are almost over, and people are beginning to think about pretty fall colors in the landscape.

Trees offer up the lion's share of seasonal color.

Sugar maples and sweet gum trees have some of the most showy leaves. Sugar maples turn yellow, then orange. Sweet gums change from yellow to red and purple.

Ginkgo and hickory show off in shades of yellow. Red maple and red oak are named for their bright fall color.

The average peak period for fall color

in Tennessee ranges from mid-October to the first or second week in November, depending on the weather.

Fall is the best time to transplant trees and shrubs. In some ways, it is better than the spring.

The soil is easier to work, and the plants are easier to dig out of the ground.

There is less shock to the plant when it is dug up. Plants will need less water to survive. The roots will become established faster than in the spring.

The moist soil and cool weather give plants the best chance for survival.

Most evergreens should be transplanted

before late October, so they will be well-established before cold weather.

Deciduous plants, those that lose their leaves, can be transplanted any time in the fall or early spring, as long as the ground is not frozen.

Fescue lawns can be fertilized now. Make an application of a complete fertilizer, such as 13-13-13 or 6-12-12.

If your fescue lawn was thin, it's a good time to over-seed it to establish a thicker turf

## Margaret's Helpful Hints




Fill a large salt shaker full of flour for dusting baking pans, making gravies, etc. It isn't messy and saves flour.

Deodorize the kitchen drain. Pour a cup of vinegar down the drain once a week. Let stand 30 minutes and then flush with cold water.

If bed slats continually fall out, slip large rubber bands over the ends of the slats to prevent them from moving easily.

Clean the microwave. Boil a solution of 1/4 cup of vinegar and 1 cup of water in the microwave. Will loosen splattered on food and deodorize.



# CRISP CUCUMBERS AND ONIONS

Peel & thinly slice cucumbers (4 or 5) Peel medium onion and cut into pieces Mix cucumbers and onions.

Mix together the following:

1/2 c. sugar

1/2 c. vinegar (white vinegar, the best)

1/4 c. water

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon dillweed, dried

Heat until dissolved and hot. Pour over cucumbers and onions and chill. Good with vegetables or on a sandwich.


