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City Opts-Out Of Guns In Park

After a unanimous vote by the council, Eagleville will join other cities and municipalities across the state of Tennessee that have chosen to opt-out of guns in parks.

The new legislation, passed on June 14th, 2009, took immediate effect in state and federally owned parks, while becoming law for local parks September 1st to give cities and counties time to enact provisions to exclude guns from parks, historic sites, greenways, and hiking trails.

The new law would enable state-issued permit holders to carry their guns on recreational property concealed or in open view.

Councilman Fitzgerald, himself a stateissued permit holder said, "it's obvious I support my amendment rights, but I do not feel guns need to be in the park where there are lots of children and ballgames going on."

Many parks across the state of Tennessee already had longstanding bans on firearms, but since the new law superseded any existing city law or restrictions against guns made after April 1986, the new law sent large cities like Memphis, rural communities, like Eagleville, and county and city councils scrambling to reinstate their bans on guns.

"We already had an ordinance that was put into place back in 2004," explained Vice-Mayor Ronnie Hill. "Since it already prohibited firearms in the park, we just reinstated it," he said.

By using the opt-out provision of the new bill, the city of Eagleville will post signs in prominent locations of the city park that explains under the new statue, anyone found under violation of the ban may be found guilty of a misdemeanor, with a maximum punishment of 11 months and 29 days in jai and a \$2,500 fine.

Despite contrasting backgrounds, the couple married and bought their first home and first barnyard friend, a pig, which eventually grew into a farm family of goats and sheep and led the couple to purchase a larger farm.

What started out 2 years ago as opening their farm or birthday parties quickly progressed into hosting larger groups from area churches and mother's day out programs. "From the very beginning we've been hooked," said Amy. "Seeing the smiles on people's faces when they get to play with the animals for the first time is priceless; it doesn't matter if they are 2 or 92, it just warms your heart," she said. "Adding the corn maze, pumpkin patch, and playgrounds, was just a natural progression."

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

seem to be a topic for heated debate uncertainty: everyone has an opinion and is willing

to share. I am unsure when or if I have seen a more emotionally charged debate than the one on healthcare reform. What if we could change the whole debate with an alternative where everyone's a winner?

It is difficult for me to remember my life when I was without a pet of some sort, if only a fish in a bowl. We form few relationships in life that are as strong and unconditional as the bond with our pets, who accept us even if we are fat, skinny, sick, healthy, or moody; pets are there to bring us joy in the best and worst of times. As a nurse caring for patients, I frequently see pictures of companion animals along with family photographs posted on beds and walls in patients' rooms. Because of this strong bond, our pets become a significant extension of our family. I have seen pictures of a pet bring many smiles to a patient's face—more than words or a family photograph can bring.

The devoted companionship we build with our pets is only the beginning of the benefits we reap from a human-animal bond. According to Mayo Clinic cancer specialist, Dr. Edward Creagan, "seniors with pets have 21 percent fewer physician visits, lower blood pressure and better coping skills." The U.S. Department of Health concluded that pet owners who have had a heart attack have a 28% survival rate vs. only a 6% survival rate for those heart attack victims who do not own a pet. Other health benefits of pet ownership include: decreases in blood pressure, cholesterol

Healthcare costs and triglyceride levels; decreased feelings of loneliness; and increased opportunities for exercise, socialization, and outdoor activities. Studies have shown that nursing homes using companion animal therapy have experienced a significant reduction in prescription medications and an overall cost reduction for senior care.

> Studies in Germany, Australia, and the United Kingdom concluded that pet ownership could save governments hundreds of millions, if not billions, of dollars, Research in the United States has shown pet ownership could reduce the number of physician office visits for seniors by 20 to 40 percent. Is it possible these savings could save the Medicare system? Maybe, maybe not. However, when we weigh all the health benefits of the human-animal bond, it becomes plain to see that the savings and benefits are significant.

Bell Buckle is a small town, but it has that "certain something that people love" and draws people continually. Eagleville can grow and do the same and even greater!





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


Annual Picnic Rockvale Church of God



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
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Is Your Child's Vision Affecting School Performance?

It's that much anticipated, sometimes dreaded day for both students and parents . . . report card day has arrived!!! While looking over the grades and comments on your child's report card, you note a disappointing drop in one or two areas. Or perhaps the child has always struggled in school.

"My child seems very bright and attentive and eager to learn. So what gives?" If you've ever been in this situation, it's time for your child to have an eye examination.

"My child did fine on the school vision test", you might say. Many times an uncorrected refractive error, such as hyperopia (far sightedness) or astigmatism, can go undetected in the pediatrician's office or during the annual school vision screening. It takes a full eye exam with an Eye doctor to detect these conditions, as well as other more serious vision and eye health related issues. The end result can be a child who is lagging behind in the classroom.

A child with focusing problems and poor accommodative skills will have trouble focusing from near to far and back. A level of frustration will start to build for this child and he/she may start to avoid reading. These kids would rather be doing more physical tasks, anything that does not involve a lot of focusing. The child may, or may not complain of headaches or blurred vision. Keep in mind that a child does not know what is normal and what is not. He may just

assume that everyone sees things the way he sees them.

Kids are very adaptive. They learn how to compensate when the situation is not ideal. This is particularly evident in children with a lazy eye, or amblyopia. So many times a child will see great with one eye, only to have a serious vision problem with the other eve. This creates an imbalance. These kids can get overlooked for years because they learn how to adapt to this inadequacy. It is so unfortunate to have to report to a parent that permanent vision loss could have been avoided in a child with amblyopia if only the problem had been detected earlier.

So, it is so very important to have every school age child seen by an eve doctor, particularly those struggling in school. Only then can you be certain if the poor grades are related to an uncorrected vision problem or if there is some deeper learning related issues that need to be addressed by a teacher, tutor or counselor.

If you feel that your child could be having vision concerns, please don't hesitate to schedule an examination with an eye doctor as soon as possible. This is the best way to make sure that your child has every possible advantage in the classroom.


Craft Ideas:

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


