the citizens, have a huge task in front of us, keeping pace with today's world, but retaining our identity as a small true southern community and city.

If it were not for changes the county commission would not have approved money to build a football field so our student athletics could excel, receive college scholarships, and we could not brag of a 6-0 record. With a victory over Forrest, we will be 7-0.

Wayne Blair Receives National School Board Award

MURFREESBORO – Rutherford County School Board member Wayne Blair has been selected for the National School Board Association's Distinguished Service Award

NSBA recognizes up to 10 school board members in each state annually. Only two school board members from Tennessee received the award this year, which is given to those who have made a significant contribution to the advancement of education in the leadership at the local level and beyond, according to the organization. Blair previously won the same award in 2008.

"Wayne has been a champion for improving educational opportunities in our county since before he was elected to the School Board several years ago," Director of Schools Harry Gill said. "I can't think of anyone who is more deserving of this recognition."

To qualify for the award, recipients must have regular attendance at regional and state workshops / conferences; attend a minimum of three NSBA-sponsored workshops / conferences during a four-year period; and have achieved at least Level III of the TSBA Boardsmanship program.


"There are so many people out there doing so much – it was totally unexpected," Blair said. "I try to be involved in the process and help TSBA. Of course, our district is the priority, but if we can help others across the state, then it's worthwhile."

Blair received the award on Sept. 8 at the Tennessee School Boards Association's Mid Cumberland Fall District meeting.

Other Rutherford County board members also earned recognition at the TSBA fall meeting. Rutherford County School Board Chairman Mark Byrnes and board member Donald Jernigan both earned Level III Boardsmanship from the TSBA.

Blair was elected to the Rutherford County Board of Education in 2006 and served as vice chair during the 2007-2008 school year. He has served as an at-large member on the TSBA Board of Directors, achieved Level IV Boardsmanship from TSBA, and is a TSBA ambassador, among his many accomplishments as a school board member.

LATE SEASON CARE FOR YOUR GARDEN

Six Things To Do Now for a Better Garden Next Year

As the summer garden season nears an end, don't let your guard down. Keeping up with a few basic chores can improve your landscape's beauty and reduce your workload next season.

Continue weeding. Removing weeds now before they go to seed will eliminate hundreds of weeds next season. Destroy invasive weeds, those that have gone to seed and perennials that may root in the compost pile. And mulch the soil if you haven't already done so.

Keep watering new plantings, stressed and young plants, evergreens, and moisture loving plants as needed throughout the fall. Water thoroughly and whenever the top few inches are crumbly and slightly moist. Check my plant guide for more specifics on your plants watering needs. Properly watered plants are better able to survive the rigors of winter.

Reduce future workloads and improve your garden's health and beauty. A layer of shredded leaves, evergreen needles or woodchips will help suppress weeds, conserve moisture, moderate soil temperatures, and improve the soil as they decompose.

Replace faded annuals with cool season annuals, mums, and other fall plants, decorative squash and pumpkins. And add a few fall containers to your front entrance, patio or deck. It adds color and a feeling of freshness to the garden.

Monitor and manage pests as needed. Keeping plants healthy throughout the growing season increases your overwintering success. Hand pick small populations of insects, rake and destroy disease infested leaves, and always use the most eco-friendly products when greater intervention is needed.

Keep applying animal repellents. Use a long lasting all natural product like Bobbex. Keeping hungry animals away from your landscape will help reduce the future risk of critters moving in and dining on your landscape.

FSA Guaranteed Loan Limit Increases

September 20, 2011: The Farm Service Agency (FSA) lending limit for Guaranteed Loans will be increased to \$1,214,000, effective October 1, 2011.

The lending limit increases every year according to an inflation index. The maximum combined guaranteed and direct farm loan indebtedness will also be increased to \$1,514,000.

As a reminder, the one-time loan origination fee charged on FSA guaranteed Farm Ownership and Operating loans will increase from 1 percent to 1.5 percent of the guaranteed portion of the loan, for loans obligated after October 1, 2011.





Food for Fines Week is October 2-8 "Give to a Good Cause for What You Owe"

Got overdue library fines - and some extra groceries? If so, the Linebaugh Public Library System is offering you an easy way to pay off those overdue fines! For one week, patrons of the library will have the option to bring in canned goods to pay off library fines. Not only will you be getting rid of some fines, but you will be helping your neighbor too.

From October 2 through October 8, 2011, the Linebaugh Public Library System (Linebaugh Public Library in Murfreesboro, Myrtle Glanton Lord Library at Patterson Park, Smyrna Public Library in Smyrna, and the Eagleville Bicentennial Public Library in Eagleville) will be collecting food donations. 





Victims of Judges Judging Judges

Editorial - From Tennessee Senator Mae Beavers

Sept. 27, 2011 - The public perception of a judge is often one of dignity and fairness – the ultimate arbiter who always rules on the side of justice. However, to many Tennesseans those black robes represent the opposite of partiality and fairness.

As our Ad-Hoc Joint Committee on the Court of the Judiciary opened hearings this week, we heard from citizens with claims that there are judges in our state who choose to rule and act contrary to their own code of judicial conduct, but yet are accountable to no one. This has led many to believe that these judges are free to rule and act without fear of repercussions.

Our Committee heard from citizens from all socioeconomic, racial, and cultural walks of life, some who tearfully talked about how they fear their testimony may bring about potential future judicial retaliation. However, these individuals feel our system is broken, and know the legislature is the only body that can fix it so others will not face the same problems in the future.

These types of alleged judicial abuses are what led the legislature to create the Court of the Judiciary in 1979 as a delegated arm of the legislature to investigate judicial misconduct and to recommend possible impeachment or removal. This is a duty bestowed to the legislature by Articles V and VI of Tennessee's Constitution like the separation-of-powers framework in our U.S. Constitution. All three branches of our government – the executive, the legislative, and the judicial – operate as checks on one another, a balance of power that usually ensures the most fair and accountable implementation of the law.

Yet, since the legislature enacted the Court of the Judiciary, the result has been a delegation of the legislature's duty to the

very branch of government that we are attempting to monitor. Today, the majority of the Court of the Judiciary is comprised of judges appointed by the Supreme Court – "judges appointing judges to judge judges."

In approximately thirty years of the Court of the Judiciary's existence, only two judges have been impeached (some who committed felonies were allowed to resign without being prosecuted). Since the first year we have statistics in 2006, approximately 92 to 95 percent of the thousands of complaints filed with the Court were dismissed without a formal investigation, including a case where the judge resigned, complaints against him were dismissed, and he was reappointed. This could be due to the fact that only one contract employee is looking into allegations. Another concern shared with committee members relates to the alleged shredding of documents.

In addition, even when a reprimand is given to a judge, it is often private and not subject to the general public's inspection or review by the legislature. This is the same legislature who is constitutionally directed to monitor the behavior of judges in order to know whether to introduce removal proceedings.

Action to reform the Court of the Judiciary is central to our democratic system of government as laid out in our Constitution. One person who has been treated unjustly and who has lost faith in our justice system is too many. We must have full judicial accountability as envisioned by our forefathers. Otherwise, the end result is a system where judges can live in an "above and beyond the law mentality" with no threat of public scrutiny.



Heat oil in pan. Brown the meat that has been dredged in flour. Drain and layer in crokpot along with cream of mushroom soup and dry onion soup mix.


Cook on low for 8 hours. Serve over rice or egg noodles.



Remembering The Dead

arrangements for your body after you no longer have use for it? Some people leave that up

to their families and friends while others plan their funerals down to the last details. Some have shopped for their caskets, grave-clothes and headstones. I've seen a headstone where one spouse has died, but the information on the stone is for both. It stands silent waiting for the death of the other.

Some speak openly about death while others act as if the grim reaper will never show his face in their presence. My son wants to be cremated. His nephew (my grandson) said, in jest, that he wants to be on the mantel beside him. With rising burial cost cremation is not a bad option. There are still options: Of course the ashes can stay on the mantel, or be scattered in a spot special to the deceased and if desired the ashes can still be buried complete with

Not everyone is buried in a traditional manner. At the turn of the 20th century Mr. Bingham who had contempt for the evangelist in his town requested to be buried standing up on the crest of a hill with his whisky and a rock in his hand. Mr. Whiddon arranged to be buried in a vault in the middle of the road about three feet above ground. The top was a gabled roof—the sides were sealed glass so that spectators could see him resting in peace. and concrete was poured over the glass. For fifty-five years the road remained

Have you made divided forcing travelers to pass on either side of the vault. When the road was paved the contractor moved the vault to a nearby cemetery. Often, today, graves are moved in the name of progress and people are buried in vaults above ground.

At the "Bone Church" in the Czech Republic some 70,000 people's remains have found their final abode. The place was built in 1400 beneath the Church of All Saints to be used as an ossuary for thousands of skeletons unearthed from the overcrowded cemetery of Sedlec. The skulls are arranged in an almost lace-like artwork with the giant bone chandelier being the most impressive.

"Known as the oldest continuously inhabited settlement on Earth, Hallstatt, Austria is home to one of the most unusual burial places you'll ever see. Hallstatt ossuary was built in the 12th century when the population of the town exceeded the burial space. There a person rents a grave in the cemetery for ten years and then his or her skull is added to the crowd in the ossuary. Today most folks are cremated, however skulls are added to the ossuary by special request.

Coffins hang on the side of Mount Province in Sagada Philippines. The Igorot people believe the higher the body-the closer to heaven.

If I still had the faculties of a 13-year old, I could memorize a list of things and still remember them an hour later. I might have retained that spur-of-the-moment enthusiasm that my kids have. If I did, I wouldn't have that deer-in-the-headlights look when one of them suggested, "Let's

make soap today, Mom!"

"You mean actually MAKE soap? Wouldn't hopping into a bubble bath be more fun?"

Instead, since I'm an adult, I think about all the pesky consequences the kids don't bother with. I think about the clean-up and delivery of 60 cupcakes.

Still, if it wasn't for my kids and their nothing-is-impossible, throw-caution-tothe-wind innocence, life would be pretty

As an adult, I probably wouldn't climb a tree for the fun of it. However, if a kite, plastic rocket, badminton birdie, or kitten was up there, I would attempt to rescue it. I wouldn't want to. That 13-year old is still there inside all of us, it's just that the activities that motivate us are a little different. It is unfortunate that, as adults, we know ahead of time the consequences for any sort of enthusiastic project. What we have forgotten, though, was that they are worth it.







Chicken Pot Pie

WHAT YOU NEED

- 4 sheets frozen puff pastry
- 1 egg, beaten
- 4 chicken breast halves, (2 cups cooked)
- Seasoned salt and pepper
- 2 tablespoons cooking oil
- 1/3 cup butter
- 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 quart heavy cream
- 1/4 cup chicken base
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic
- 1/2 small yellow onion, minced
- 1 cup frozen green peas, cooked 1 cup chopped cooked carrots
- 4 (2-cup) individual baking dishes

MAKE IT

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

CRUST - Cut each sheet of frozen puff pastry into 1-inch strips, 8 inches long. On a large cookie sheet, weave strips into a lattice large enough to cover each pot pie. Brush beaten egg onto each lattice square. Bake for 5 minutes, or until dough has risen and turned light golden brown. Set aside until ready to assemble pies. Leave oven on at 350 degrees.


FILLING - Season chicken with seasoned salt and pepper. Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add chicken and saute until cooked through. Remove from heat and cut into chunks.

In a large saucepan, melt butter and then slowly add flour, stirring until consistency of peanut butter, but not brown I like a roux. Slowly add cream and keep stirring. Add I chicken base, garlic, and onion and stir until thickened. Add peas, carrots, and cut up chicken. Remove from heat. Fill 4 individual oven-proof bowls with chicken mixture and then top each with a pre-cooked lattice square. Bake for 5 minutes or until bubbly. Any remaining pie filling may be
