CARSON HELPS EAGLEVILLE PRIDE FLY

Pride is something that typifies small town America. Proud of who you are and happy about where you are at is commonplace in rural Tennessee. For the folks in the tight-knit town of Eagleville, this is absolutely the case, but for more reasons than just a zip code.

Nestled in the southwestern corner of Rutherford County, Eagleville has longbeen recognized as a prideful community. Now, thanks to a high school football team that has made the state playoffs in five consecutive seasons and visited the quarterfinals in back-to-back years, the town pride is a little more prevalent.

"Eagleville has always had a lot of pride in the community," says Eagles head coach Steve Carson. "It did not start when our football team started winning, the pride has always been here. But I will say that you do see a few more football shirts walking around now."

Steve Carson is now in his sixth season as the head football coach at Eagleville. After helping lead Smyrna to back-to-back state championships at the highest classification, Carson spread his wings and landed as the Eagles head coach. Some may think the adjustment from big to small may have been tough, but the former Bulldog offensive coordinator was happy to make the move.

"One of the reasons I really wanted this job is the whole community thing here," says Carson. "Going to a place where everybody knows everybody and the high school football game is what you do on Friday nights are things that are very attractive to me. I thought it would be great to be in this

type of environment, but I really have been blown away by the support we have gotten from the community of Eagleville."

As a coaching offensive guru and former standout player at Franklin County, Carson has long been associated with the game of football. And as he tells it, the sport is the same no matter what level you are at.

"The number of players is certainly different at a smaller school like Eagleville as opposed to Smyrna," says Carson. "When you get between the white lines at practice or on game nights, it is the same game. No matter what size the school is, it is still about executing the fundamentals of the game and playing with great effort."

His record at Eagleville during his tenure tells the home folks Carson and his staff understands what it takes to be successful. With former MTSU football coaches Floyd Walker and Tom Fiveash along with others on staff, Carson gives a lot of credit to the people surrounding him.

"For the fourth straight year we have had no turnover in our staff," says Carson. "We have also been fortunate enough to have some really good players to go along with these great coaches. At the end of the day, having good players and a good staff around you are the primary ingredients to winning. That combined with the tremendous support from the community and our administration make things much easier for the head coach."

Having a head football coach that is committed to winning and just two years ago delivered an undefeated regular season has certainly made it a lot easier for the community of Eagleville.


PASTOR'S PONDERINGS

School has been back in session for several weeks now, the football stadiums are now filled on the weekends with fans shouting out encouragement for their favorite teams. Words are floating everywhere: in the classroom, on the playground and in the stands. But these words that are being learned and shared brings to mind a verse of Scripture that we would all do well to remember. "For by your words you shall be justified, and by your words you shall be condemned" Matthew 12:37. Here is a sentence, the searching implications of which are often missed by all too many Christians. It might be summed up like this: "Words are deeds." For in this passage which this verse climaxes, Jesus is teaching the abiding reality of words. So very real are they, He points out in 12:36, that in the day of judgment we are to be held accountable for every idle word.

How important this teaching is! Reflect upon it and you will see the crucial importance of words. How do men and women reject Christ and His salvation? Is it not by some form of words, some expression of the rebellious heart? Nor are all words necessarily spoken. There are the silent words of the heart, the words of the thought-life, multitudes of them, idle, others corrupt, others flatly rejecting the Lord Jesus. Yes, words are the mode of justification, for with them man either denies his Lord or confesses Him.

What of our words, spoken and unspoken? Will they justify us or condemn us in that inevitable day of accounting before the all-seeing Judge?



Contestants, ranging in age from 5 to 12 years old, were challenged to see which one could eat the most ice cream in a three minute time period.




Wildcats 8 Year Old Baseball Team Looking For Competitive Players To Fill Roster
