JAK Stables - Ready For Lessons & Horse Boarding



Eagleville is the new home of JAK Stables. Joe Quintana, his wife Kathy Lewis-Quintana and daughter Annie Walls are new to Eagleville but not to the horse business. They recently relocated their stable to 2667 Taylor Lane and are ready for lessons and horse boarding. The stable consists of a 26 stall horse barn and is offering boarding with beautiful pastures for turnout, and many other services.

When meeting and talking with Kathy, one instantly notices

her energy and enthusiasm she has for horses. Kathy states "I have been in the horse business forever"! Horses have always been a very big part of her life, from showing to training. She has 17 years experience with training race and steeplechase horses. She has trained and ridden the Iroquois Steeplechase many times. With her expertise, she has trained students that have gone on to win at many state shows and Quarter Horse Congress. Their facility offers lessons for students as young as age 3 to seniors. They offer lessons for the beginner stu-

dents as well as coaching for the advanced rider and their horse. For the English rider, hunt seat and jumper training is available and for the western rider, pleasure, trail, barrels, poles and such.

Kathy and Joe love roping as a couple and the facility is set up for the sport. They have cattle, a Buford (mechanical roping calf), and a lighted arena to practice their sport. They sell horses, trailers and equipment. With all of these services, Kathy has to admit that what she loves best of all in the business is matching the right horse with the right rider. This is a talent that has taken years to master, "one must pay close attention to the rider and know horses to make up a horse and rider team." "Teaching horsemanship is what I love as much as teaching riding to a new student." "When a rider gets lessons here they learn more than how to sit on a horse, they will catch the horse, groom, saddle and bath it. They will learn farrier and health care, safety is stressed in every aspect of the equine experience." Horses are a big animal and you must have total respect for safety at all times. Kathy wants to teach people who want to be horse owners. She teaches horse language, you learn from her how to read a horse, listen to what your horse is saying to you.

The Hills Are Alive With the Sound of Tractor Engines. Yes it is Tractor Time in Eagleville. Tennessee Valley Pioneer Power Association, TVPPA, once again prepares to host the Antique Tractor Show and Pull September 9, 10, and 11th at the Tractor Show Grounds on Highway 99, Chapel Hill Highway. This is

the 18th Show provided by TVPPA and as always will highlight antique tractors and gas engine farm machinery. In past shows, the grounds have been dotted with over 500 tractors. Many of the tractors have been restored to pristine condition and others have come directly from the field where they still provide necessary services for local farmers. This year promises to provide spectators and exhibitors with a fun and exciting show.

The Show Grounds open Friday morning at 7:00 a.m. and the Tractor Pull will begin at 6:00 p.m. On Saturday a full day begins at 7:00 a.m. At 11:00 a.m. the Parade of Power begins and the children's pedal pull and tractor race follow. The pull begins at 2:00 p.m. and will last through the evening. Throughout the day, vendors on the hill provide a variety of food choices, flea market items, and

tractor collectables. Under the pavilion, soft drinks and water are sold and tables give the crowd a place to sit and visit. Bluegrass Music is also scheduled during the day. A tent on the hillside across from the vendors features a Swap and Shop offering parts for Tractor restoration enthusiasts. Admission is \$5.00 per person, children 12 and under admitted free with a paying adult.

Sunday provides another day of activities. Church services are provided at the Show Grounds after the gates open at 7:00 a.m. The Parade of Power begins at 1:00 followed by the children's pedal pull and tractor race. A Slow Race follows the children's activities and the Tractor Pull begins at 2:00 p.m. And as always TVPPA gives spectators, volunteers, exhibitors, and participants a weekend of relaxation, fun, reunions among friends, good food and a celebration of our rural past.

Marsha recently returned home from a mission trip with Mission Discovery in Tecate, Mexico. Her team built a home for a family in four days and lead music (in Spanish) for the daily children's bible club sessions.

"This was a wonderful opportunity and privilege to go and to serve the people of Tecate," said Marsha. The team stayed at a Christian Retreat Ranch with three other teams from across the country. Each of the other teams also built a house and had their own responsibility for bible club. It was exciting to make friends from Hendersonville, Pennsylvania, and Washington State. Every evening everyone would meet for chapel rally for praise and worship. The trip was not all about helping people, but about growing spiritually as well. "Life is so simply in Tecate and there is no time, place, or need for the many things that we take for granted. Our lives are too often crazy, chaotic, rushed and unappreciative.

Marsha has been a very busy person since she left Eagleville. She graduated from Austin Peay with high honors where she was a member of three national and international honor societies and a cheerleader. She was also a member of Alpha Delta Pi sorority. She is married with two children, age six and three. She is very involved and active in her church choir, drama team, softball team, and numerous mission groups: Mustard Seed Kids, Annabelle's Wish, First Fruits, FBP food ministry, and Mission Discovery. She is presently teaching 5th grade in Dickson County.

Marsha tells us that she is now preparing to travel to Montego Bay, Jamaica. She will be staying and working in a school/church and an orphanage. "There is no other work like doing God's work. It is however very costly financially, emotionally, and physically. God has lead me to go and I ask that the community pray for me as I continue to serve others".

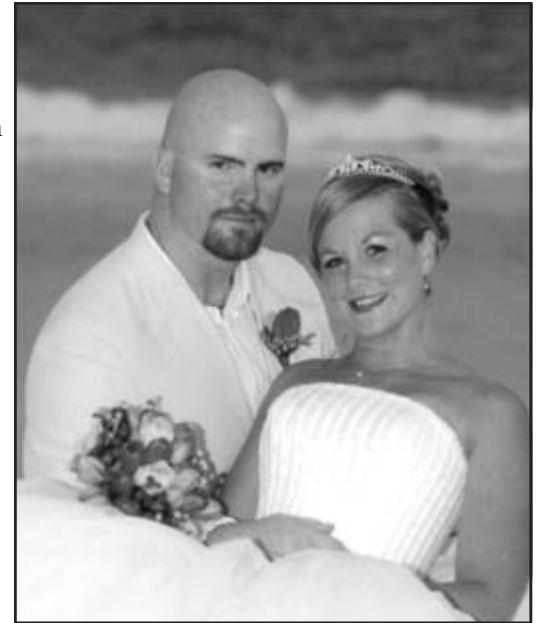

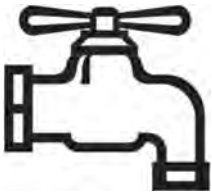

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Margaret Virginia Taylor Jackson

Margaret Virginia Taylor, daughter of William Cullen and Emma Denton Epperson Taylor grew up in the Rover area of Bedford County. She had four siblings; Emmett who married Mary Pearl Lorange; Ralph never married; Ruby married Charles Rust and Dorothy married 1st Clarence Wheeler and 2nd Earl Waymaker. William Cullen, Virginia's father, served many years as justice of the peace and other public offices in Bedford County.

Virginia was attending the Rover School when it burned in 1924. After the fire, students attended classes in the area churches until a new elementary school could be built. She finished her 8th grade in the Rover Baptist Church and started high school at Eagleville as a freshman in 1925. She stayed with an aunt and uncle who lived in Eagleville until a school bus route was started through Bunker Hill. At this time, she moved back home and rode the bus to school. Her first school bus driver was Mr. Hezzie Bennett, and later Mr. Ralston. The Eagleville School had also experienced a fire, and the new school was only a year old when Virginia started attending there. The principal was Mr. C. M. Pickler and assistant principal, Mr. H. B. Smith. There were nine teachers including the principals and music teacher, Miss Ethel Elmore. Virginia graduated in 1929 in a class of eighteen and is the only living member of her graduating class. During her senior year she participated in The Franklin Literary Society, class basketball and was a part time librarian. After graduation she and a cousin attended college in Murfreesboro, boarding off campus with a family. After two years of college education, she taught in Bedford County for seven years. During this time she taught at several different schools, which includ-

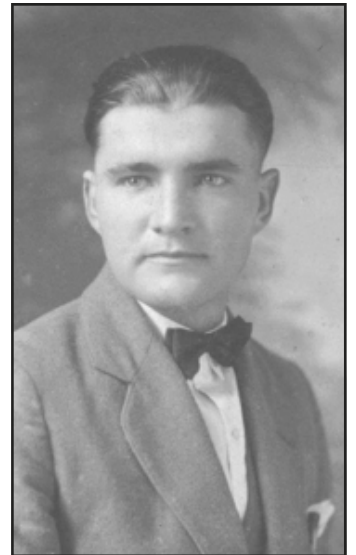

ed teaching all grades in one-room school buildings. Because of lack of transportation to school each day, she boarded with families that lived near the school where she taught.

In July 1937 she married Evin B. Jackson son of John and Eleanor (Ella) G. Wood Jackson and lived near North Fork in Bedford County. In November 1944 Evin died suddenly. They didn't have any children so Virginia moved back home with her parents and sold the farm. Soon after moving in with her parents, Mr. Wheeler principal at Eagleville asked her to fill in for a teacher, starting after Christmas. She accepted and taught the 8th grade until the end of school. She returned the next year as a regular teacher and taught the 2nd or 3rd grades for the next 11 years. Due to the number of students, grades were often split with 2 different grades in the same classroom. In 1956 Virginia felt she was needed at home and quit teaching at Eagleville. For the next two years, she often substituted for other teachers and taught homebound students who couldn't attend school because of illness.

After the death of her parents, Virginia continued living at the home place in Rover with her brother Ralph until his death in 1997. Virginia who is an active member of the Enon Primitive Baptist Church will celebrate her 96th birthday on January 8th, 2006.

In the rolling hills of Moore County, Tennessee, you will find the Jack Daniel Distillery. Which has been in existence for approximately 140 years. The area was originally part of Lincoln County where Jasper Newton Daniel (later called "Jack") the youngest of 10 children was born in about 1850. Jasper Newton, son of Calaway and Lucinda Cook Daniel was an uncle to Mrs. Sterling Owen "Ethel" Motlow Edmonds. (See article, "Step Back In Time," Sterling Owen Edmonds).

Jack's mother died when he was just a baby. Several years later his father remarried. Jack left home at the age of 6 to live with a nearby uncle. As a young boy he was befriended by Dan Call a local Lutheran minister and storekeeper. He took Jack under his wing and trained him to work in the store. But Jack was not happy working there. He had a keen interest in the "still house" which was located on the property. Making whiskey at that time in that area was an acceptable practice though it was never consumed on Sunday's. Dan promised Jack he could come to the still house whenever he wanted and he would teach him the art of making whiskey.

When the war came to Lincoln County in 1861 (Lynchburg was in Lincoln County at this time), Jack was too young to serve so he remained as an apprentice to Dan Call, learning the sour mash method of whiskey making.

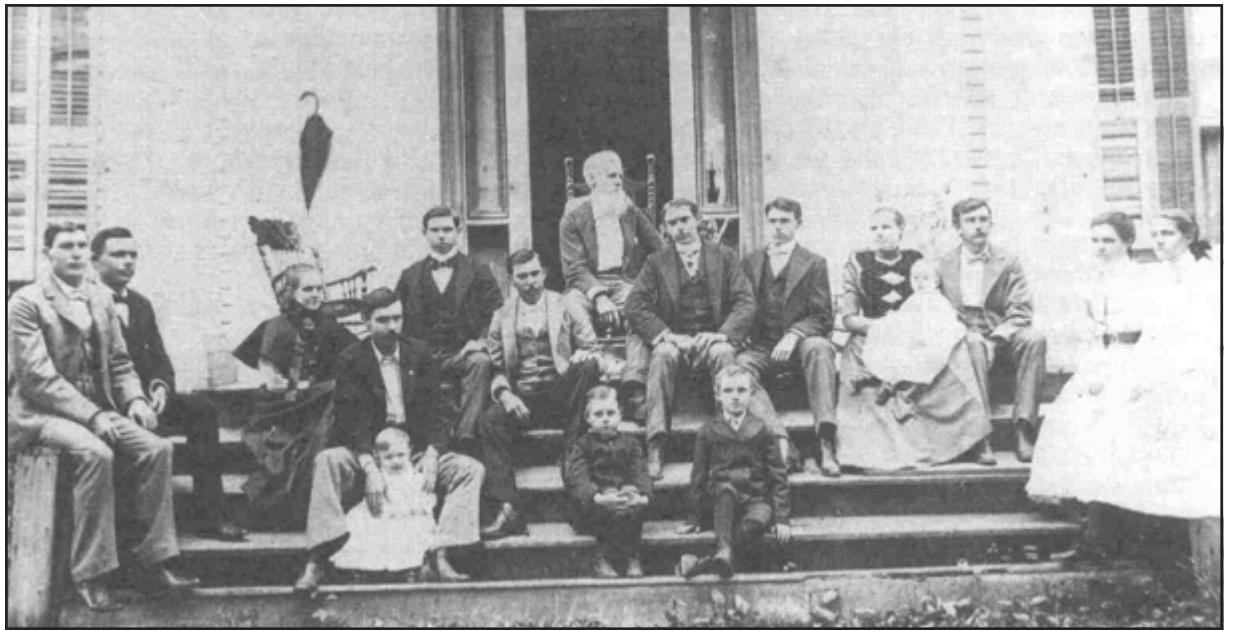
In 1863 after hearing a fiery sermon the evils of alcohol, Dan Call's wife, along with their entire congregation, called on Dan to make a serious decision regarding being a minister and operating a distillery. Rev. Call decided to sell his business to 13-year-old Jasper Newton Daniel.

The War Between the States was over and Jack realized the Federal government would soon be taxing his products. Thinking ahead, Jack at the age of 16, took the step of being the first distillery to register with the United States government.

In 1904 Jack secretly entered his brew in the St. Louis World's Fair. He completed with older, more established products from Europe. Amazingly, he won the Gold Medal for the Best Whiskey in the World. In 1905, he won another

prestigious award in Belgium. He now had customers around the world and Jack Daniel Whiskey was famous.

In about 1905, one cold morning Jack Daniel kicked his office safe when it refused to open. His toe was crushed, and unattended, later becoming gangrenous and his health declined during the next 6 years. After his injury, he left most of the management of the plant to his nephew, Lem Motlow (brother to Ethel Edmonds), who had come to work for Jack in 1887 at the age of 17. In 1907 Jack Daniel deeded the company over to his nephew, Lem Motlow. Jack Daniel died October 9, 1911. It was Lem who expanded the Jack Daniel Distillery, known worldwide today. Lem Motlow died in 1947 and the ownership of the distillery was continued by his sons, who operated it even after its sale in 1956 to Brown-Forman of Louisville, also a family-owned distillery. All these years the distillery has never suspended operation and to this day, it is located in a dry county.

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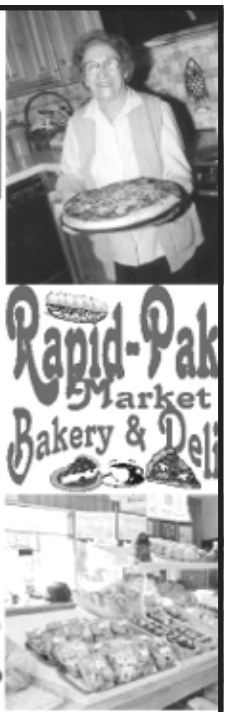

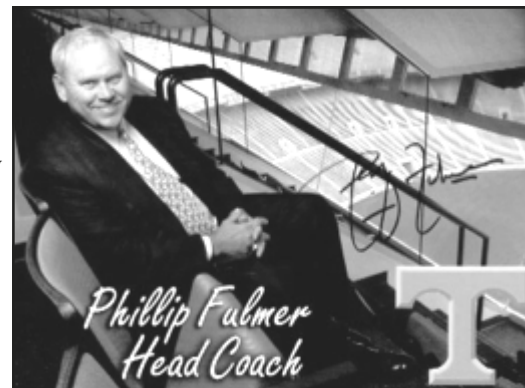

www.eaglevillebooster.com.

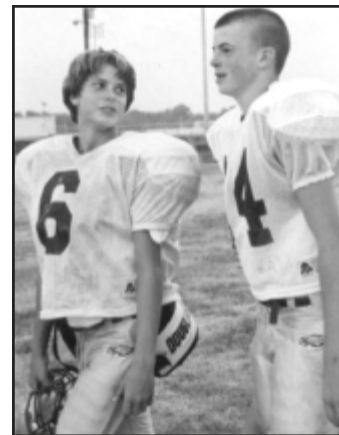
Speaking of our website, we also want to pass along some information about

A Step Back in Time

The Edmonds family arrived in Williamson County (the Eagleville area) between 1842 and 1847. Sterling H. Edmonds, a schoolteacher arrived in Eagleville from Brunswick County, Virginia with his mother Lucy, wife Martha and 5 children. Another child was born soon after their arrival. The Edmonds family had traveled to Tennessee with several other families. In 1850 they were living near Chesley Williams and attended the Harpeth Baptist Church, located about 1½ miles north of Eagleville.

On March 25th 1850 Sterling H. Edmonds died. His mother, wife and children: Minerva, Rebecca, Jane, Joseph Sterling, Martha and Lucy continued living in Eagleville. Joseph Sterling, the only son was 10 years old when his father died. He grew up quickly, working and helping with the responsibility the family's survival.

Joseph Sterling married in 1866 to Drucilla Price Owen, daughter of Peter and Matilda Brooks Owen. They had 4 children: Samuel Houston, Sterling Owen, Edgar and Ethel Edmonds. Joseph Sterling was a very successful businessman. He was known to be one of the best mechanics in the area. He had the reputation of fixing anything that was broken. As his sons, Samuel "Sam" and Sterling Owen "S. O." became adults, they joined him in some of his business adventures; the J. S. Edmonds & Son Funeral Undertakers, a grist mill, blacksmith shop and grain hauling business to name a few. The other Edmonds children; Edgar married Mary Cantrell and Ethel married Ervin Moon, left the Eagleville area after their marriage. Joseph Sterling died in 1911 and his wife, Drucilla died in 1925.

Joseph and Drucilla's oldest son, Samuel Houston Edmonds, born in 1867, married 1st Margaret C. Elam in 1893. She and her baby died during childbirth and are buried in the Russell Cemetery, north of Eagleville. Sam married 2nd to Luda May Wilson, daughter of Thomas Jefferson and Sarah Alice Swaim Wilson. Luda was born in 1874 and died in 1968. They had four children; Sammie May who married Sam A. McPherson and 2nd Sam Jones Bellenfant; Joseph Thomas who died in 1911 at the age of 14; Ann Ella who married Melvin Tomlin and Sarah Price who married Earl Barnes. Sam ran the blacksmith shop after the death of his father, along with helping his brother,

Sterling O., with other business ventures and with some of the inventions that Sterling perfected. He was also recognized in the community for his music ability. He and a group of friends organized a band, often playing at church and other functions. Sam Edmonds died in 1937.

Sterling Owen Edmonds, born in 1871, often called S. O. or Dump, married in 1904 to Marge Neelly daughter of John and Cynthia Neelly. She and their son died July 1913 during childbirth. They are buried in the Neelly Cemetery, north of Eagleville.

Later in 1913 S. O. married 2nd to Ethel Motlow, daughter of Felix and Finetta Daniel Motlow of Lynchburg, Tennessee. Ethel, born in 1885, was a schoolteacher in Eagleville at the time of her marriage. S. O. died in March

1954 and Ethel died about 4 months later. They had no children. S. O. is buried in the Neelly Cemetery and Ethel is buried in Lynchburg, Tennessee. Ethel's family were very prominent and respected residents of Moore County. Her uncle, Jasper Newton "Jack" Daniel was the founder of Jack Daniel Distillery in Lynchburg Tennessee. (See separate article, "Jack Daniel Distillery"). In 1967, Ethel's family, the Motlow's of Lynchburg donated 187 acres of land for a college to be built in Moore County. The college was opened in September 1969 and was named Motlow College.

Sterling Owen, the son of a mechanic, found inventing came easy for him. As a boy he rigged up various gadgets in his dad's shop that were found to be a great help around the shop and the Edmonds home. One of his inventions came out of a need to make a job easier. As a partner with his Dad and brother, Sam, in the funeral home business, he invented a device that could be used to lower caskets in the grave without manual labor. Those who knew of his ability for inventions considered Edmonds a genius. As time passed and more of his inventions were put to use, he became a familiar name to households throughout Tennessee.

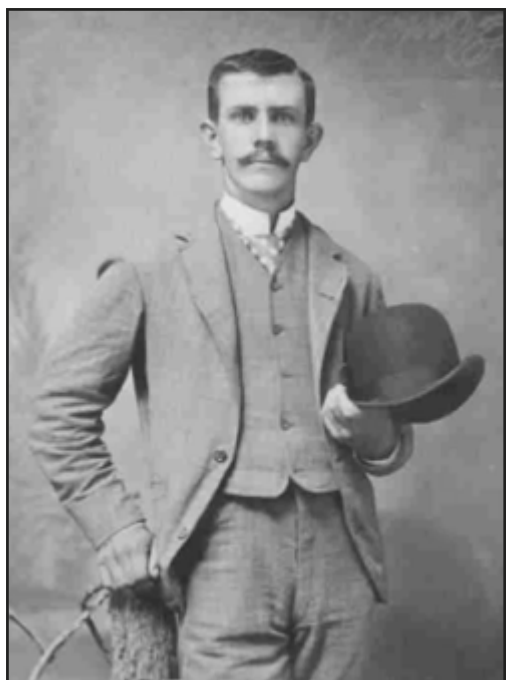
The following information is from an interview with Edmonds in the late 1930's for a newspaper article. Few people today know that it was an Eagleville inventor who conceived the idea of the first trailer truck and gave his invention to the U. S. Government in 1917.

"I was in the grain business and operated 40 teams and wagons on the road. The automobile had been in use around here for several years, but as yet, no one had thought of making a truck. So I decided to attach a flat bed wagon to the front part of a Model T Ford, making it the first truck, I think, in the country. From the hybrid automobile-wagon contraption, the truck grew in a more stable status". This is how inventing the truck evolved in the inventor's own words. "I took the back wheels off a Model T, and replaced them with a sprocket having the desired teeth to give a reduction of speed. Then I mounted the front end of a steel-bodied trailer instead of the wagon on the front end of the prime mover." In 1916 a patent was obtained on the six-wheel truck, which was the first of its kind in the world. The patents were obtained not only in the United States, but also in Great Britain, Germany, France and Canada.

Edmonds and a group of investors established the Trans-Mo Truck Company of Nashville, which did a flourishing business as circulars, was distributed by the company. The circulars carried designs, which were produced at the factory under the brain and brawn of the inventor. He added the hydraulic lift to some of his designs, making a dump truck. (This is how he got the nickname "Dump"). Then the war came and needed metals went into munitions. The Trans-Mo Truck Company faced a shutdown, but its organizer decided



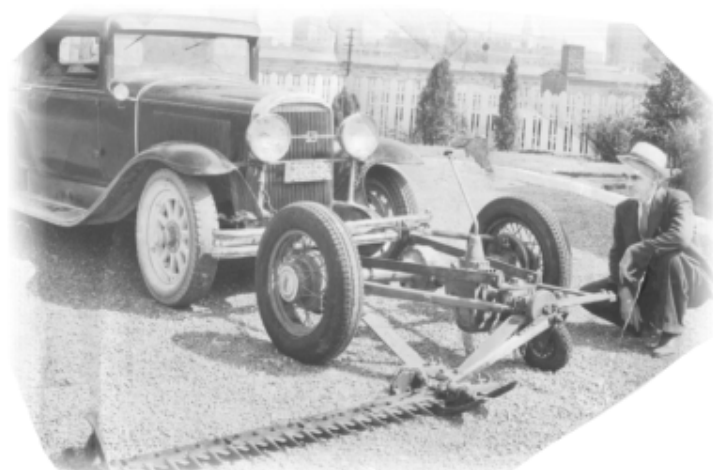
Sterling Owen Edmonds-circa 1900

to buy out its partners. The shutdown came and Edmonds went to Washington and presented to the Quartermaster-General of the United States Army the invention. "I suppose the truck was more needed to beat Germans than to beat Tennessee roads," he commented.

The war was

over, the Eagleville inventor set about dismissing the trailer truck from his mind. He went to work on plans and specifications for a vacuum street cleaner and made one for the City of Murfreesboro. He also made various gadgets like the So-Easy jack for big trucks, an idea he sold to a Chattanooga manufacturing firm; milk coolers and insulated receptacle for milk bottles when brought by the milkman; an air jack that raised the car for the spare and a revolving rural mailbox. It is thought that the idea for guardrails on roads also came from Edmonds.

"Back in 1919 they had a fair at the Rutherford County Fairgrounds and this fellow did a stunt with an airplane." Says Edmonds. "When it landed the thing turned over and several of us went over to pull the pilot out from under it. Then I got to thinking that it would be a find thing if somebody would invent an airplane that would land straight down. Later I decided that somebody was me". Edmonds drawing of the autogiro was based on the same principle as the one patented four years later by the Spaniard, de Cierva. He filed an application for the patent, spending about \$600 with Washington patent attorneys. When the attorneys told him they could put it over for about \$400 more, Edmonds went about dismissing the autogiro from his mind.

In 1933 Edmonds attended the World's Fair in Chicago with his mower invention. This trip boosted his business since it was a great help to the farmers.

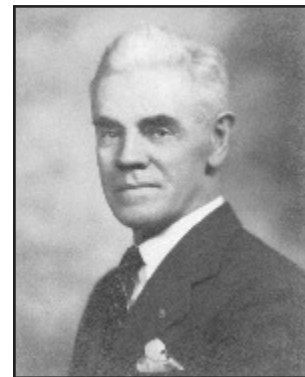
Sometime in the late 1930's Sterling O. Edmonds invented the pressure pump, which he thought was his most important invention because it was the greatest help to the farm family. The pump, suitable for spring wells, creeks, shallow and deep wells could be installed at half the price of any other pump and will give better service than most of them. He applied for a patent on the pump but no records can be found, concerning received or not. "My pumps are going at the rate of two

a day and I have more orders than I can fill." Edmonds stated. The "Dump Edmonds Pumps" as they were referred to in the Eagleville area, were introduced to the public at the Tennessee State Fair.

Edmonds genius mind was not all on the utilitarian side. He was the man who made possible all those revolving signs motorists saw at filling stations, for it was his idea to construct cylinders on them so that the sign would revolve in the wind. Another invention was the automatic lipstick. (Lipstick tube) "I visit so many of-fices and see the young ladies taking up a lot of their employers' time putting on lipstick." He commented. "So I got the idea of having a gadget that will do the work automatically while the stenographer types. It ought to work", added the inventor. "Fiddlesticks," said his usual understanding wife.

These are only a few of his inventions that we know about. I'm sure there were many more that was put on paper, but never materialized. I personally knew Dump and Ethel Edmonds when I was growing up. In 1930 my Dad, Junior Redmon, started working for him at the age of 16. I remember Dump coming to our home at night to discuss business with Daddy. When I was very young, I thought he was one of my grandfathers. I looked forward to him coming to visit. Dump's old shop was located just behind the present Eagleville post office. Daddy took over the business when Dump died in 1954 and continued, making pressure pumps, farm gates and doing all kinds of plumbing until his death in 1961.

The Edmonds home was the second house directly behind the post office on highway 99. When I was born, my parents and sister, Hazel, was living in a small trailer located between the Edmonds home and the shop. Hazel remembers Ethel Edmonds coming over during the summer and taking her home with her. She would put a washing tub of water out in the sun to warm up and let Hazel play in the water and take her bath in it. We considered Dump and Ethel as part of our family. Jane Shelton of Eagleville also remembers Dump bringing bags of candy and fruit for all the children to the Baptist Church at Christmas and how glad they were to see him. She remembers him laughing with the children. Lynda Sledge, a great granddaughter of Sam Edmonds, brother to Dump, remembers being scared by stories that Dump would tell her about the time they were in the funeral home business. Dump Edmonds enjoyed being around children. He was a rather quite person, but enjoyed his friends and family. His inventions made life a lot easier for many, many people that never knew him.

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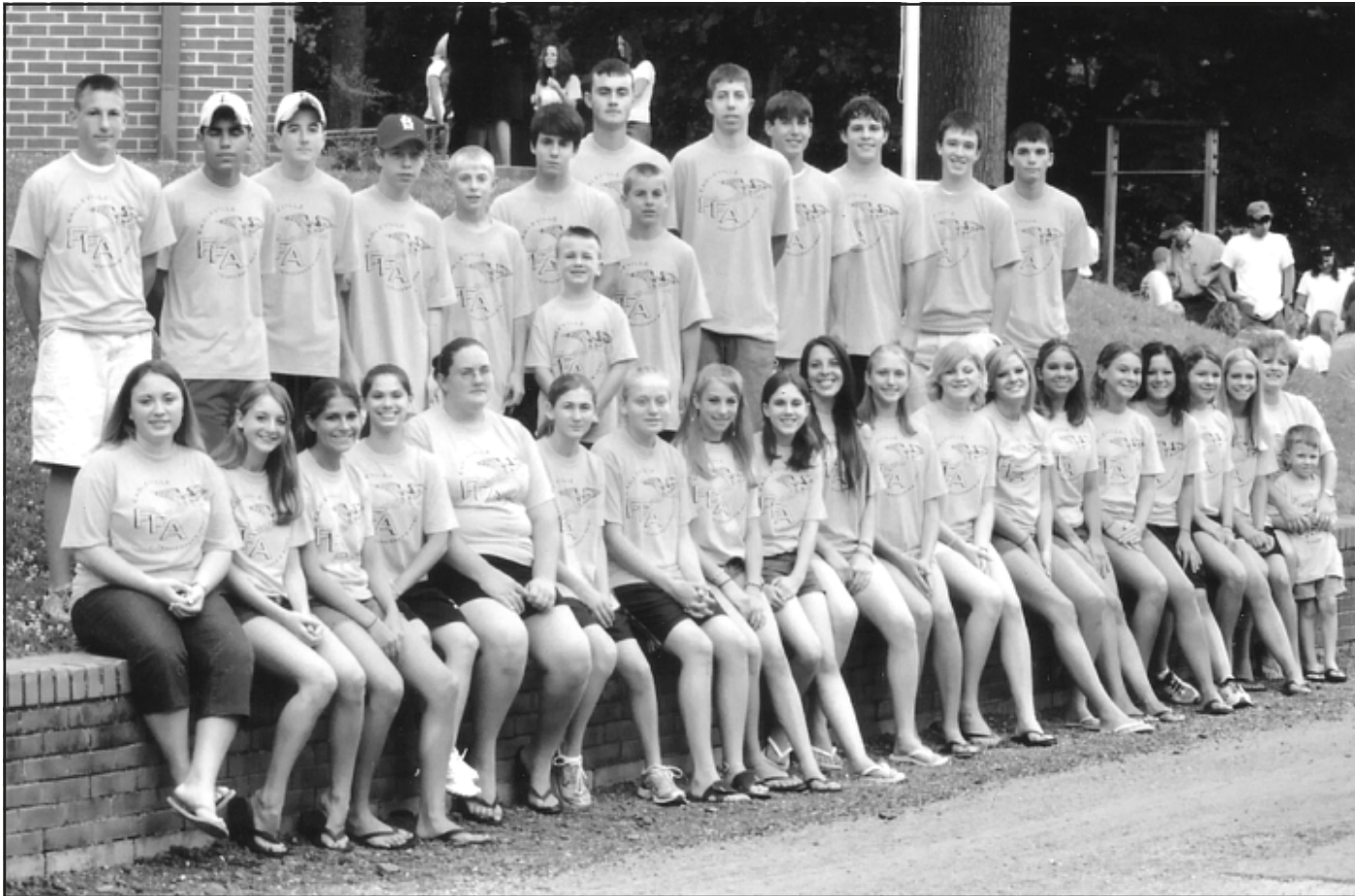

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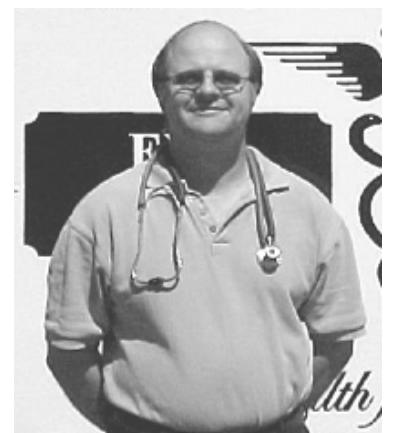

Favorite Recipe

Key Lime Margarita Pie



1-1/4 cups crushed pretzels
1/4 cup sugar
6 Tbsp. butter or margarine, melted
1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
1/2 cup lime juice
1 envelope KOOL-AID Lemon Lime Unsweetened Soft Drink Mix
1 tub (8 oz.) COOL WHIP Whipped Topping, thawed, divided

Mix crushed pretzels, sugar and butter. Press firmly onto bottom and up side of 9-inch pie plate. Refrigerate until ready to fill. Combine condensed milk, lime juice and drink mix in large bowl until well blended. Remove 1/2 cup whipped topping; set aside. Gently stir in remaining 2-1/2 cups whipped topping. Pour into crust. Freeze 6 hours or overnight. Let stand at room temperature 15 min. or until pie can be cut easily. Garnish with reserved whipped topping before serving. Store leftover pie in freezer.

Helpful Hints



Instead of throwing away a sponge that has a stale odor, simply toss it in the dishwasher and wash it with the next load of dishes. It will come out clean and fresh smelling and will kill any bacteria in the sponge, so it's a good idea to toss your sponges into the dishwasher often.

To keep lint and dust off glass top tables, wash them in a solution of warm water and fabric softener. Add one tablespoon of liquid fabric softener to one quart of warm water. The fabric softener will clean the glass inexpensively and will help keep lint from gathering on the glass. Also great for computer screens and TV's.

To speed drying time of big bulky items and jeans, add a dry towel to the wet items you're placing in the dryer. The towel will help absorb some of the excess moisture.

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We have all heard the story of the frog that couldn't tell when the water was too hot to jump... or so it goes... But this is a story of an entire country that is suffering the same plight. Now I don't want to sound unpatriotic, but when you think about it, I think it's unpatriotic Not to tell my side of the story....

I was born in Brookhaven, Ms, and moved as a child to Nashville in the late 60's. My father owned one of the largest beef plants in the

southeast for almost 25 years, but suddenly it all came to a screeching halt. Fortunately, we lost most of our family fortune before I became too spoiled, and as a result of the way I grew up, I saw things in a much larger picture. You might say that I grew up backward... but I truly think that having "lost it all" at an early age instilled in me the success that I share today.

When I was young, Everyone and I mean Everyone had a job and made good money... not to mention how safe it was to walk to school... or to have a homemaker mom. But even more importantly, the money that they made actually could support an entire family on ONE INCOME... Nowadays, it seems that both parents are working, and the children are even working part time for some pocket cash... In other words, the family is slowly dissolving, and no one seems to know what to do about it.

In 1987, I was expanding my horizons by enrolling in a Tae Kwon Do class. The instructor, Mr. Song Yi Shin, is one of the highest regarded instructors in the country, and he taught many things that instilled in me a deep moral code to this day. One afternoon while stretching, Master Shin stood on my thighs while pulling my body downward and forward in an attempt to stretch out my hamstrings.... And as the saying goes "EUREKA!" – came into my thoughts and my eyes!

Within a week, I was talking to my cousin about this nifty little piece of fabric that I noticed in my "Dobok", or uniform. That little triangle was there to allow the pant to stretch farther without binding or breaking a seam. I looked it up and found it was called a GUSSET, and it dated back to the 1500's as it applied to suits of armor. Now at that time David (my cousin) was a salesman for Lee® jeans. He had also been a regional salesman for Levi® for several years before that, so when I approached him with the idea of a gusseted jean, he was actually quite interested. These days, he pretty much runs the entire operation, but recently we have been fortunate enough to work together again.

If you've ever developed a product, or gadget, then you know how many prototypes and samples you go through before you have something that's marketable, and we were no different. At first we went to the company in Cookeville that was making the Dobok. Mr. Khyson Swong of Sarang Mfg. and his wife were two of the nicest people we have ever met along the way. We spent many hours in their plant watching Mrs. Swong sew samples, and ironed out many kinks in the process. David and I would try on these jeans and take long walks around the neighborhood talking about the comfort of the pant, and ways to further improve on the design. Before too long, we had a name for the new pant, Diamond Gusset® - and were ready

to search for a jean manufacturer in the area to produce a small run and try it on the public. In March of 1987, we arrived at Stitches, Inc. in Red Boiling Springs, TN. The Turners were really great people, but our company was too young to survive the economy of the late 80's. Even though we sold just over a million dollars that year, we couldn't make it the way we were going without major marketing and exposure. Eventually, we "pulled back the reins" and brought the company to Bon Aqua, Tennessee.

Back in those days, Tennessee was a large producer of clothing products, with too many plants to name. Thousands upon thousands of our friends and neighbors were employed and feeding their families with the jobs in the sewing industry. But this has changed, and it has happened without many of us noticing the change, because just like the frog in heated water, the temperature is rising too slowly to notice a difference by the hour. Today, Stitches, Inc. has closed, along with just about every other sewing and laundry operation in the state... but it goes much deeper than this. Today, it's almost impossible to find a local sewing operation in ANY state in the US, and I know, because we've searched for backup production, and it's hard to find. One thing I can say is thank goodness for the proud workers that we have now! – they do a Great Job! I cannot stand it when people argue over quality, *you will never beat true American pride!*, but remember, *it has to be coupled with American innovation to compete in today's markets.*

You may ask why America has exported this industry to the Caribbean, Mexico, China, and many other developing countries... and I DO NOT have a good answer. Apparently our industry "friends" have decided that we don't need this type of work here at home... and that maybe it would be best to start exporting this type of industry and replace it with a market based economy. *But they never asked my thoughts on the matter*, and although I admit that the new "information age" is great, I don't agree that it had to come at the cost of manufacturing... in fact that notion is absurd to me.

While it's argued that today that one can find less expensive clothes at most of the Major retail chains, I have to ask myself, is it really a bargain in the long run? It's true that the average working family spends a bit less on clothing, but the savings are not at all what the true savings to manufacturing reflects. In other words, the savings are not being fully passed on to you and me. You can call it whatever you like, but the bottom line is this – we have given up most of the apparel manufacturing skills and machinery that once existed in our back yards, and sent it somewhere else so it can be done cheaper – and NOT always better.

Now this might make sense for a short term gain of a few, but I submit that over the long run it has done nothing but lower our standards, and made us work harder in fewer places to eak out a living in this new "global economy". And even with all of its credits, it's not putting food on the table for all of my friends.

The next question might be "What can we do about it?", and I have an answer – BRING IT BACK! – and, thankfully, *we never left*. Today, our company has grown large enough to purchase a building in Lyles, Tennessee (a town that has suffered like many others) and we are opening a facility there for our own production. Even though many industry guru's have suggested great rewards by going "offshore", we wouldn't consider this at all, and what's even more notable is that our determination has served to

make us extremely popular with American's today! In fact, we're honored to be among those with Governor Bredesen this October as a spotlight company in the Buy American Campaign.

Our jean company ONLY purchases denim that's grown in the Southeastern U.S., places like Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, and Tennessee to name a few. We ONLY purchase buttons and rivets from Universal Fastener of Centerville, Tennessee. We ONLY use American made hang tags, and size tickets printed in Franklin, Tennessee. Our jeans are currently produced in the town of Magee Mississippi at J.B. Little Mfg. – and we currently have them laundered in Winder, GA at JORO, Inc. In other words, we're doing our part, and that's all we can do... and why not, since we both live right here anyway - I live in Arrington, TN and David lives in Nashville.

Where does this leave us? – Actually, it's in the drivers seat. You see, although we've seen many changes in the apparel industry, we haven't seen many changes in the American people, or their needs. While other companies seem to be chasing dollars, we have remained focused on the goal... THE PRODUCT. We provide the most comfortable jean available, and pay special attention to detail. In being Innovative, we have returned the value of what AMERICAN MADE stands for. We need to remember that this country has always been at the forefront of innovation, and today we still soar far above other nations in our ability to create new markets and serve a greater purpose... but don't forget that if we give up the very tools and minds of those who can bring it all about, then we may well suffer the consequences.

I urge each and every one of you to look at where you purchase your goods and services and why. Do you go to a local grocery and look for locally grown? – or when you purchase shoes and clothes, where were they made? – what about your car or truck? – I have no problem with those who purchase used equipment, from elsewhere... but when you purchase NEW goods or services, are you really getting the most value, the most service from it? And are you really saving that much in the long run... And the same goes for the manufacturers who are sending all of our production and skills elsewhere... are you really saving that much? – what about spending some of your resources on becoming innovative in your own community?

I recently ran across a quote that I find particularly useful to illustrate my point :

"What's the point in trying to save a penny when the pennies saved will weaken your customer... why not invest in them as well" author unknown.

Think about this the next time you feel the heat in your own life.

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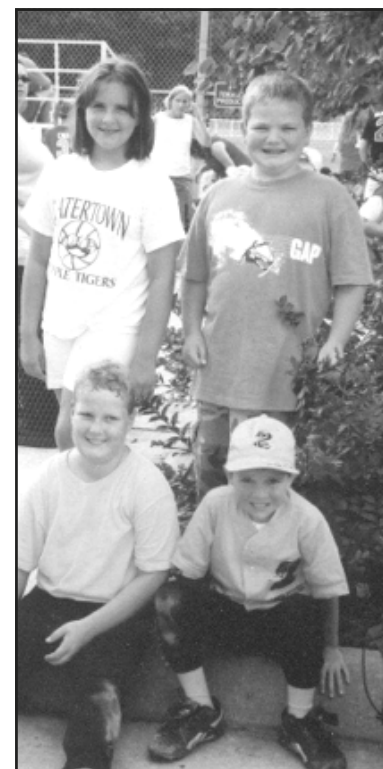
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TYBA National Championship

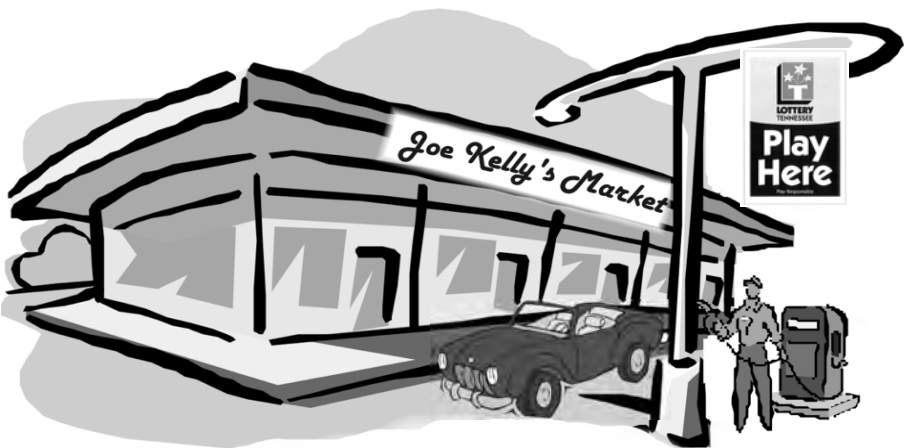

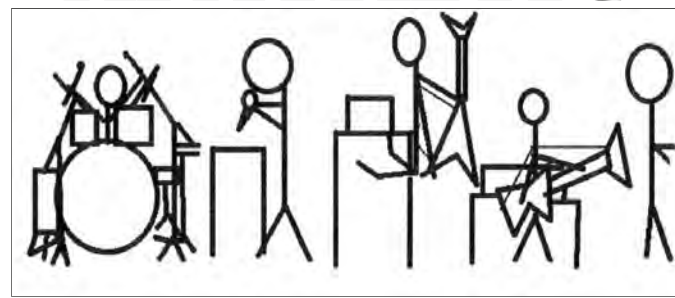

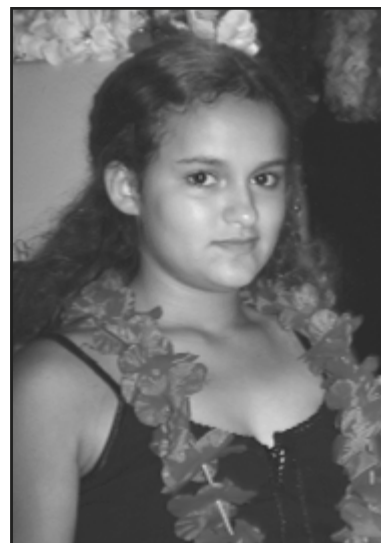
