#### **Court Date Set** For Bennett

Former Eagleville City Recorder Michelle Bennett was scheduled in court Monday morning to answer an indictment that alleges altering a city document, theft of city funds and forgery, but an attorney appeared for her.

A worker in the criminal circuit court clerk's office said Bennett's attorney had filed a waiver of arraignment on her behalf and she did not have to be present at the proceedings, which were held in Murfreesboro before Circuit Court Judge David Bragg.

#### Vice Mayor Accused of Illegal Burning

State environmental officials are expected to issue a notice of violation to Vice Mayor Ronnie Hill for alleged illegal burning at his farm equipment sales location.

Eagleville fire fighters extinguished the remains of a fire at a rubbish pile on the north side of his Farm Sales & Service Co. property on south U.S. 41-A on the morning of Sept. 8. According to the fire department report, the pile contained numerous oil filters, rubber hoses, containers and tires. Aerosol cans were also evident in the debris.

Tim Hooker, assistant director of the county's Emergency Management Association (EMA), also stated in his report that the ground around the burn site was "contaminated with oil from the numerous oil filters which have been dumped there."

Hooker and a sheriff's deputy responded to the scene after the fire was out, and an inspector from the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation's (TDEC) pollution control department responded the next day.

"The inspector spoke with Mr. Hill, who was very cooperative," Tisha Calabrese, a TDEC spokesperson said. "Mr. Hill agreed to begin taking cardboard to a recycling facility and to install a dumpster for other debris."

Calabrese said the inspector told Hill a notice of violation would be issued in the next one to two weeks.

Hill can appropriately dispose of the waste that was in the pile in a Class I landfill, she said. According to the TDEC website, a Class 1 landfill can be used for disposal of domestic, commercial, institutional, municipal, industrial and other wastes, including automotive tires.

"This type of debris does not constitute a hazardous waste according to the department's regulations," Calabrese said.

As for information about a fine, Calabrese said Thursday that the state inspector was just at the site two days earlier and it was premature to speculate on a possible civil penalty at that time.

Hill said that he has been burning debris at the site for 22 years. He said he knew the burning was not legal and that he would "pay the fine."

As for tires in the burn pile, Hill said there was part of a tire which had been there for a long time.

"We haven't burned tires for years, and there were no tires being burned that day," he said. "But there is evidence there was a tire because (the fire chief) blew the trash pile away with his hoses."

Concerning the oil, Hill said that the oil filters are drained before they are put in the trash pile.

"We put the oil filters in a rack in the heat-

er and then drain them out and put them in truck had already responded. the trash," he said, noting that he heats his shop with an oil heater.

Hill said that instead of installing a dumpster and taking the cardboard to a recycling center he plans to take the cardboard and other trash material to the county convenience center and to take the oil filters to the scrap iron people.

He said he plans to take the cleanup material from the burn site to the BFI landfill.

Hooker said that the sheriff's department responded to the scene for support because there were reports that the property owner was apparently disturbed about the fire department's response to the scene.

"I don't know the extent though," Hooker said, noting that for him it was a matter of hearsay because he was not at the site at that time.

A person in the sheriff's department records office said Monday that a complaint was called into the office about the burn on Sept. 8 but said there was no written report.

A source said that Hill was upset when the city's large red fire truck responded to the burn site because the smaller brush

Martin said he responded to the fire with the brush truck and had the large fire truck respond when he needed more water. He also said the fire was called in by a passerby.

Hill had no comment on the matter except to say he was upset that day.

"After seeing Fire Chief David Martin in action, I have a new level of respect for him," he added.

Hooker said that there is a large problem with illegal burning in the county, especially in the Eagleville area.

'When people burn on their private property or someone else's property or at a business, they are only allowed to burn what the good Lord gave them," he said. "In other words, they can burn grass, tree and bush trimmings and wood."

It is illegal to burn such items as plastic products, oil or petroleum products or rubber and so forth, and people burning such materials are subject to various fines and penalties, Hooker said.

According to the TDEC website, improper outdoor burning can lead to fines up to \$25,000.

Attorney Ben Parsley, who represented tion on the former city recorder. Bennett at the arraignment, said afterwards that Bennett's appearance has been "reset for a discussion day." Parsley is a member of the Murfreesboro law firm of Waldron & Fann.

The clerk explained that a discussion day is when the district attorney makes the defendant an offer for a plea agreement. That date is set for Oct. 10.

A plea day is set for Oct. 21 if the case still remains unsettled. Cases which are not settled by the plea days will be assigned a trial date, according to the court rules for the district.

The Tennessee Bureau of Investigation (TBI) arrested Bennett Sept. 5 after a Rutherford County Grand Jury indicted her on nine counts. The indictment was handed down after the TBI and state comptroller's office conducted a seven-month investiga-

Bennett was booked into the Rutherford County Adult Detention Center on a \$15,000 bond and was released the same day on bond, according to a jail official.

The indictment includes one count of theft over \$10,000, one count of fraudulent use of a credit card over \$10,000, two counts of official misconduct, one count of tax evasion and four counts of forgery.

In the indictment, Bennett is accused of altering the city ordinance book so she could receive compensation for sick time she accrued while she was employed by the city of Eagleville. She received the sick pay after she resigned from the city in October.

She is also accused of unlawfully using a city credit card, purchasing items under the city's tax exemption status and forging people's names when signing store receipts.






#### Uncle Bubba, We will miss you!



#### GRAND OLE OPRY STAR CHARLIE WALKER PASSES AWAY AT AGE 81

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (Sept. 12, 2008) Grand Ole Opry star Charlie Walker passed away this morning in Hendersonville, Tenn. Walker, 81, had recently been diagnosed with colon cancer. He is survived by his wife Connie as well as 10 children: Ronnie, Cindy, Arthur, Charlie III, Elissa, Charlene, Catherine, Christina, Caroline, and Charlton; 15 grandchildren; 3 stepgrandchildren; and 1 great-grandchild.

"The Grand Ole Opry family will miss our friend and Opry member, Charlie Walker," said Pete Fisher, Opry vice president and general manager. "We are truly grateful for all of the musical moments he has shared with us on the Opry stage and over the airwaves as a disc jockey."

Charlie Walker started singing as a Texas high school student, then played country music during World War II over the Armed Forces Radio Network as part of the Eighth Army Signal Corps occupation forces in Tokyo. Back stateside, Walker relocated to San Antonio in 1951 and quickly became its most popular country music announcer, soon to be recognized as one of the nation's Top 10 country disc jockeys.

Alongside his burgeoning radio career, Walker succeeded as a country recording artist. He achieved regional hits with "Tell Her Lies and Feed Her Candy" and his first charting song, "Only You, Only You" on the Decca label. Walker hit gold on Columbia Records in 1958 with "Pick Me Up on Your Way Down," penned by young future Hall of Fame songwriter Harlan Howard. The song became a million-seller and a country music staple. Membership in the Grand Ole Opry followed in 1967 along with successful tours and other hits including "Who Will Buy the Wine" and "Don't Squeeze My Sharmon." Walker was inducted into the Country Music Disc Jockey Hall of Fame in 1981.







STORMLEFTTHEM ON A FEATHER BED - March, 1913

The home of Frank Morgan, residing three miles north of Eagleville, was completely destroyed by the tornado, which passed through that section Thursday Mr. and evening. Mrs. Morgan and their little granddaughter, Flora Wray, of Nashville, were in the house at the time. Their escape was miraculous. Mr. Morgan started from the back room through another room to see that the front hall door was fastened and as he reached the first door, which was by a stack chimney, he was thrown to the floor by a brick hitting him and when he came to himself the house was gone and he was where he went down on the bare ground, but only slightly hurt. Mrs. Morgan and her little grand-daughter were on a bed in the back room. The house was swept away, leaving them on the feather bed, though the bedstead was carried from under them. The bed was splintered to pieces. They received a few scratches. The remains of the house, con-

sisting of three rooms, porch and hall, were scattered for a mile, not a piece of furniture being left, but all was torn to pieces. Feather beds were torn open except the one they were on. The hen house and smoke house were swept away. Some of their clothes and pictures were found two miles or more from home.





#### Mom, Apple Pie and Baseball

Baseball has to be one of the all American pastimes. For most, it's the love of the game and the passion of collecting things that makes baseball memorabilia the multimillion dollar business every year. Just about anything in baseball can become a collectors' item. That brings me to this edition of Hobbies and Collectibles on baseball and its memorabilia.

I have pictures of my husband when he was about two years old in my homemade baseball uniform. He treasures those black and white photographs of himself in the front yard holding his bat while sporting his cloth diaper. He played baseball all through school and was quite good I've been told. People still come up and tell me stories of how everyone shouted "back up, back up" as he prepared himself to bat. He even played after high school and stood a chance at a career until one evening he had a run in with a base and a torn ACL. Hence, his baseball career ended. Another little boy's American dream that will remain forever retired player would bring or for that mattucked in the back of his heart.

While researching I discovered that fans and collectors alike have been traveling to Cooperstown, New York to visit the Baseball Hall of Fame since its inception in 1939. The town, nestled in the farmlands of mid New York State, has grown with the influx of fans. Each year, in July, some 40,000 fans converge upon Cooperstown for the annual induction of the new 'Hall of Fame" players. The Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum contains everything from past World Series rings to lockers of Babe Ruth, Mickey Mantle and Joe DiMaggio. They have displays of how the baseball and mitt are and have been made to memorabilia such as ticket stubs, programs and various baseball cards. For most fans, a visit to the Hall of Fame and Museum is a life

long dream. An avid fan could spend hours searching through everything and still want to look more.

Baseball fans collect everything from autographed balls to pennants, banks to photographs, caps to bats and even hand written letters. Used tickets as well as unused tickets are also collectibles. A World Series ticket from the 50's could bring up to \$500. Like any other collection of anything, condition is the key to value and baseball memorabilia have a grading system with number from 1-10 with 10 being the best for most items. I'm told baseball cards have a grading pricing guide. A signed baseball is judged on the condition on the ball and the quality of the signature. Assuming the autograph is authentic, the way in which it was signed is important also. Needless to say, the scarcity of the item also affects the price. For example, a baseball signed by a player still in the league won't bring what ball signed by a ter by a deceased player would bring. Once a player passes away, especially a Hall of Fame player, the value of the collectibles increases.

Shows are always being held all over the country however; a lot of players don't attend. Their schedules and their family time don't always allow for these. You can find just about any baseball item at these shows. Gamed used equipment, autographed items and game used autographed equipment seem to be what's hot these days. Jerseys, uniforms, caps, bats, gloves, and even shoes are also popular.

Baseball and its memorabilia have remained a true American pastime. The sport is part of our American heritage and will remain so for a very long time to come. Play ball!





## Eagleville Grocery Store Completely Destroyed In Fire

The Eagleville Grocery store was totally destroyed by fire early Tuesday.

Eagleville fire fighters arrived on the scene about 1 a.m. and saw heavy smoke pouring from the front and back of the building. Fire Chief David Martin said that all the doors were locked when the fire fighters arrived and there was no evidence of vandalism.

Fire fighters at first tried to enter through the front door but had to back up because the smoke was too heavy but they were able to begin their attack on the building from the front side of the store.

Seven fire departments responded, 16 fire engines and about 45 fire fighters, Martin and Assistant Fire Chief Chris Wood said early Tuesday. The chief estimated about 200,000 gallons of water were used on the fire. No injuries were reported.

The cause of the fire was unknown as of 8:30 a.m. Tuesday, Wood said.

Both the owners of the building and the grocery business were at the scene, he said. Former longtime grocer Leon Puckett owns the building, and Brad and Ryan Perrryman own the grocery business.
