BURNING Regulations

In the State of Tennessee and Rutherford County there are items that are ILLEGAL to burn at ANY time!

It is illegal to burn:

- Tires and any rubber products
- · Vinyl siding and shingles
- · Asphalt shingles and other asphalt roofing materials and demolition debris
- · Building material, construction debris and
- Plywood, oriented strand board and pressure treated wood, including railroad
- Asbestos-containing materials
- · Metals, Aerosol cans, and food cans
- Copper wire or electrical wires
- Plastics and other synthetic materials
- Paper products, cardboard, and newspaper
- · Any Household garbage/trash
- · It is ILLEGAL to burn any materials that are transported from one site to another for the purpose of burning. Transporting any materials natural or man-made, dumping, and burning on another site or receiving materials to burn is subject to steep fines.
- · State law allows for a civil penalty of up to \$25,000 per day for each day of violation of the Air Quality Act regardless of the size of the burn.

WHAT YOU CAN BURN: You may burn ONLY Leaves, branches, trees, stumps, grass clippings etc.

OFFICIAL BURNING SEASON = PERMIT REQUIRED!

Between Oct. 15 - May 15, every year state law requires citizens to obtain a permit from the Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry before conducting any open burning of wood debris. Permits are free of charge. You must call 1-800-367-3507 to obtain a permit. Days outside of the official burning season do not require a permit however, state regulations must be

OTHER Regulations:

At least 1 person shall be constantly present at the burn site the ENTIRE length of the burn.

Each burn shall not exceed 48 hours in duration

Burning shall not occur more than twice in any 30 day period.

If burning occur within 100 feet of an occupied building it may occur ONLY if an adult occupant of that structure give written authorization for the burn to occur and has not rescinded authorization in writing.

State Representative Pat Marsh District 62 — Covering Eagleville, Tennessee

As you know, the 107th Session the Tennessee Legislature ended in May this year and we are off until the second Tuesday in January. However,

I continue to go to many meetings and events in the district and occasionally in Nashville. I wanted to let all of you know what I was proud of that we accomplished in this past year's Session:

- Passed a balanced budget that \$1.2 billion in spending with no tax increases
- Tenure reform so only our best teachers receive it and remove ineffective teachers
- Lawsuit reform so businesses can quantify their risk, expand, and bring more business to Tennessee
- constitutional Started amendment process for no income tax
- Passed bill to protect teacher pay
- · Reformed workers comp law
- Ended pre-trial diversion for felons a legal maneuver not found in our constitution
- · Lifted the cap on charter schools so students in rural areas and inner cities can have access to high-performing schools
- The murder of a pregnant woman is now treated as two murders
- Protected Tennesseans who do not want to participate in Obamacare
- Made it so those who loot after a disaster are made to rebuild the community/ help with cleanup efforts as opposed to paying a fine or jail time
- Brought Tennessee in line with federal law with regard to corporate contributions
- Ensured integrity at the ballot box by making sure Tennesseans who vote show a photo ID
- Ended 5 weeks early, saving tax payers \$450,000
- Cut the budget by \$1.2 billion
- Put over \$70 million more in the Rainy Day Fund
- Did all this with NO new taxes

Here is some information on the state budget:

In the fiscal year that just ended in June, we are \$439 million better off in Revenue than we were at the same time last year. We were almost \$300 million higher in our sales tax collections. Things are definitely better off in Tennessee this year versus last year.

I want to let you know in general where our state funds are collected and where they are spent in our state budget. Revenue: 54% comes from sales tax, 13% comes from Franchise and Excise tax, and 7% comes from gas/ fuel tax. Expenditures: 42% goes to education, 29% goes to health and social services, 9% goes to safety, Law enforcement, and corrections, 7% goes to transportation, and 7% goes to City and County governments.

Some of the things that I have been doing this summer have helped me better understand the 62nd District, and also how the State of Tennessee operates.

I attended the Cable Show in Chicago to expand my knowledge about part of my role on the Commerce Committee. I was astonished at how the cable industry works and how many new ideas and products are coming to our area.

I also was very fortunate to visit China (at no expense to our State) on a fact-finding trip with a group from the University of Memphis. We toured five major cities and attended government meetings, and also some of China's largest universities. The amount of construction activity there is impressive. I got to meet, and have dinner with, the president of the major company, Fushi-Copperweld, in Beijing. Copperweld has a plant in Fayetteville and employs a number of individuals there and is also opening an international sales office in Brentwood, Tennessee.

I recently attended the William R. Carter memorial Bridge dedication in Fayetteville and also the ribbon cutting for our new bypass in Shelbyville. I have been to the annual Farm Bureau meeting in Lincoln County and attended the Kiwanis and Rotary meetings and enjoyed the Bedford County Fair.

Most recently, I have been assigned to be a part of a Small Business and Economic Development Task Force at the State Legislature. We have been meeting and plan to come up with ways to limit government regulations on businesses and to help businesses expand and entice more businesses to move to Tennessee.

We are focused on doing everything we can to attract jobs to Tennessee and give our existing businesses the room they need to grow. But we understand that government doesn't create jobs. Instead we can pave the way for sustainable job growth in the private sector.

While I am proud of our record of accomplishment and encouraged by the hard work of the Governor to make Tennessee the number one destination for high quality jobs in the South, there is much work to be done.

Tennessee is open for business and providing a shining example of how government can step out of the way so our small businesses can thrive.


What's That New Building Project Going Up on Hwy 99 in Rockvale?

Middle Tennessee Electric Membership Corporation is building a new electrical substation, located next to Rockvale Church of Christ in Rockvale.

"The new substation will help to handle any present electrical loads and provide for efficient growth in the area," said Paul Hanson, project site manager. This is one of 30 substations providing electrical power to Tennessee.

"Projected completion date of the project is set for this November, providing the weather permits," said Hanson.

New electrical poles are being replaced in the area provided to efficiently handle the extra circuit load. The new poles can handle double the circuits. All the area in front of the substation site on Hwy 99 has not had poles before, so those poles are newly added.



Eagleville School Expansion

Information obtained from the minutes of the Health & Education Committee that met on August 23, 2011 concerning the Eagleville School expansion project:

Chairman J. Jordan advised the Eagleville bids were opened August 16 and the Stewarts Creek High School bids were opened earlier today. The Committee was provided information on the Stewarts Creek bids reflecting savings of \$1,750,000 through value engineering and a \$567,000 decrease due to cuts by contractors. There were five bidders today versus seven in the last bid. The Committee was also provided information on the Eagleville project and advised it appeared the Eagleville work would be possible.

A Step Back in Time By Bobbie Sue Shelton-Lonas

Imagine, looking at a present-day Nashville paper and finding an article and picture which includes your grandmother! Well, that is what happened recently. Ann Marie Clark Hooper was glancing at a newspaper and saw an interesting article on St. Thomas Hospital. Reading the article, she saw her grandmother's name, Irene Hay, mentioned and could not believe it.

The paper was the June issue of the 'Nashville Retrospect', which is printed monthly, and contains pictures and articles that have previously appeared in Nashville newspapers. In 1955, Irene Hay of Eagleville had participated in an historical event, the first of its kind, in the United States. The Saint Thomas Hospital in Nashville was the first hospital in the nation to establish a fire prevention plan. During the intensive training, Irene, who was a nurse at Saint Thomas, participated in a demonstration of the efficiency of removing patients from the hospital in case of a fire. In the demonstration, Irene acted as the patient, and was carried out of the hospital, by other nurses, on a hospital bed mattress.

The picture and article was also a surprise to Irene. She had no knowledge of the article or picture ever being in the newspaper.

With permission from the Retrospect Editor and Publisher, Allen Forkum, the readers of the Eagleville Times can also enjoy the article.

The following article appeared in the Nashville Banner, June 2, 1955.

FIRST IN U. S. WITH HOSPITAL FIRE PREVENTION PLAN

1955 – The Nashville Fire Department is staging the first extensive hospital fire prevention program in the United States.

Its first object of training is St. Thomas Hospital, where the personnel have a motto: "Every week is Fire Prevention Week." Hospitals are among the many institutions, the City Fire Department is training.

The Fire Department's indoctrination at the Maxwell House, for example, impressed authorities when an actual fire broke out recently, and occupants filed out of the building without panic and with clockwork efficiency.

Schools, hotels and businesses are also

getting the indoctrination. Each employee has a special job if a fire comes.

Members of Truck Company No. 1 put on a demonstration at St. Thomas on Wednesday, ending the current training there. City Fire Marshal Dan Hicks, Inspector Herman Slonecker and Drillmaster Maurice Schutt supervised the rescue and emergency evacuation demonstrations.

Nurses were taught that a "stretcher" easily can be improvised by tying the sheets around the mattress like bands, so that the patient is held in the trough securely; and the "bands" can be used for handles in carrying out patient and mattress. Firemen H. T. Frensley and Thomas Soule demonstrated the fireman's carry, when Frensley hauled Soule down an extension ladder from a window.

Soule later got an unusual ride to the ground, bound in a mattress, with teammates lowering him by a rope. Fireman G. E. Pidcock showed how the small but powerful "Davy fire escape" works, by harnessing himself into its chest band and descending from the third story as slowly as he cared to. The Davy will support 1100 pounds, and has gears inside its pulley box to control the speed. In a Toronto hospital fire, the Davy saved 17 lives.

Drillmaster Schutt explained that each nurse at St. Thomas now has a special duty in the event of fire. "Each baby, incubator and all, must be removed," he pointed out. "So there is a nurse for each baby. We don't want any of this carrying out one baby, then going back for another one. That takes time."

Sister Catherine, hospital administrator, keeps the staff aware of fire prevention, along with the help of Ed Shea, personnel and public, relations director. Fire extinguisher demonstrations, compulsory fire prevention films and drills are regular programs.

"Planned action saves lies," say the officials. "Know what to do!"

Irene, daughter of George Washington and Bertha McCluskey Sulser, of Lincoln County, graduated from Blanche HS in 1943 and St. Thomas Hospital of Nursing in 1946. She was introduced to an Eagleville resident, David Marion "Buddy" Hay, while a student in pursing school. On June

22, 1946 Irene and Buddy were married in Nashville, and after a few years living there, they moved to Eagleville. They are parents of two children; Peggy Marie and David Michael.

Irene started her first professional job as a registered nurse at St. Thomas Hospital on Hayes St., Nashville. Irene was traveling to Nashville working at St. Thomas as head nurse on the women's surgical floor and later held the assistant supervisor position on the medical floor for 11 years. In 1952 Irene had one of her nursing high-lights. She was taking care of Minnie Pearl's mother and one day Minnie Pearl put her arms around Irene and thanked her for taking care of her "sweet little mother". Being hugged by Minnie Pearl out in the busy hospital hallway was certainly a thrill for Irene.

During this time, Buddy was working at GE, he and Irene decided to quit going to work in two directions, so on December 26, 1961, Irene started to work at the Rutherford Hospital in Murfreesboro, which later became the Middle Tennessee Medical Center. By working in Murfreesboro, she and Buddy was able to ride to work together each day. The first year, she worked on the medical floor as a

medicine nurse, during the second year she was head nurse in the surgical unit. The rest of her employment at the hospital was as head nurse in the recovery room. In the later years, the head nurses at the hospital got a new title: Patient Care Directors.

Irene was very instrumental in the planning and building of a new "Same Day Surgery Unit" in the old Middle Tennessee Medical Center. She was asked to plan and design the new unit. She and Buddy traveled to other hospitals looking at their units and equipment until she was able to work out the plans and knew what equipment was needed. She got the unit all set up, started and worked in it until her retirement March 30, 1993, after 32 years of service. Irene's face was the first one a lot of people saw when they were waking up from surgery. During these years at the hospital Irene also helped many of her Eagleville neighbors thru surgery or during their hospital stay. She was a great comfort, not only to the patients, but to their families also.

Since Buddy's death in 2007, Irene continues to live in Eagleville, enjoying her children and their families which include several grandchildren and great grandchildren.




Megan Irene Christopher, a resident of Eagleville



Healthy Patroitism

Some of my fondest childhood memories are of my grandfather.

I remember walking through the mountains listening to him tell stories about his service in the U. S. Army. He often reminisced of a small boy who would approach him on the streets of Europe

asking for food. My grandfather's chest would swell with pride and his eyes with tears as he talked about giving the boy his food rations. The stories of my grandfather were not of self-pride and gratification, but more about his pride of being an American and his service to his country.

A few weeks ago, as I drove through North Carolina in what used to be the furniture capital of the world; I noticed cranes with wrecking balls tearing down factories where once people worked. Driving though Chattanooga Tennessee you see graffiti on the walls of old factories where once people went to work with pride. As a teenager I can remember standing on the streets of New York City and looking down at a manhole cover which read "Hoe Foundry, Middlesboro Kentucky." I went to church with the Hoe family—I knew them. As I stood on that manhole cover, I remember being filled with pride as I realized this piece of iron came from my hometown and I knew the men who forged it. As an adult living in Knoxville, Tennessee the manhole covers in my neighborhood were made in China.

I encourage you to take notice of the number of flagpoles in your neighborhood and town. I find it concerning how many flagpoles fly a tattered flag or stand empty. The most disturbing flagless pole I have noticed stands in front of the National Guard Armory in Jefferson City, Tennessee. It is a dishonor to the men and women who sacrifice daily and have given their lives for the freedoms we often take for granted, for a National Guard Armory not to fly our flag.

What does our flag and patriotism have to do with our health? The United States unemployment rate is at a 25 year high. We stand by and watch wrecking balls tear down factories as graffiti artist disgrace and vandalize the remnants of what once stood for American prosperity and opportunity. Is it any wonder doctors in a major hospital in Boston report that the percentage of children 3 and younger who are underweight increased from 12% in 2007 to 18% in 2010. According to the same article: "The percentage of families with children who failed to secure adequate food monthly, increased from 18% to 28% during the same period" (Boston Globe).

Today it is hungry children—tomorrow a hungry nation. The pride of our grandfather's erode like tattered factories and faded flags, and go unnoticed till once they are gone. During the Labor Day celebration, I encourage you to fly our flag with pride.

Healthy patriotism—may not cure hunger, but the hunger for patriotism may starve a nation!

Each year about 150 people in the US are infected with leprosy, a bacterial disease that can lead to nerve damage and disfigurement.

There are now reports of humans contracting the disease who have handled the animals or were exposed by gardening in soil where the animals have burrowed. At this time the infected animals are in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas and Alabama, but the armadillo population appears to be spreading North and East and could bring the leprocy with it.
